We are grateful to City of Greater Geelong for the funding of the next stage inn development that we have taken along the journey of moving our **Streetscape towards an Artscape**. Two items on the Streetscape plan needing attention were the Clifton Springs Fountain and the Entrance to Drysdale. Thanks to community efforts and City of Greater Geelong these have both been worked on and feedback has been very positive for the Fountain and the Roundabout.

The project has also focused on building a business case around the concept of bronze statues of Anne Drysdale, Caroline Newcomb and some sheep to be installed in Pioneer Women's Park. The launch of the Pop Up version at what would have been **Anne Drysdale's 223rd birthday**, was well received and a great launch.

Coryule Chorus sang a song written by Dr Gillian Turner about our pioneer ladies, two of the artists were on hand to be celebrated, who helped create the Pop Up version. Many people helped us celebrate and many people want to be part of the next process to achieving the goal of permanent bronze statues in High Street Drysdale.

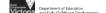














#### Coordinator's News

#### **NEWS from Lisa Neville MP** Member for Bellarine

#### Support For Drysdale Clifton **Springs Community Assoc.**

On the 20 August I was pleased and proud to support the DCSCA with a speech in Parliament that is printed below. I have also sent a letter to Milemaker, the petrol station operator, calling on it to waive its costs awarded against DCSCA.

"This morning I call on Caltex Franchisee, Milemaker Petroleum, as a show of good will to the people of Drysdale, to waive the \$5500 in legal costs recently awarded against their **Drysdale Clifton Springs Community** Association. The Drysdale and Clifton Springs Community Association is a very much respected volunteer led organisation that works tirelessly in representing the views and concerns of local residents. In doing this, the Association in January 2014 lodged a submission opposing the proposed

Milemaker service station with the City of Greater Geelong. Like many other local submissions, the Association argued that the site was an inappropriate location and zoned Rural Living. As Local Member I also provided my full support to this reasonable position, as did a petition of more than 400 people. However, COGG approved the application and the Association then appealed the decision to VCAT. The appeal was dismissed on the grounds it was lodged late. Milemaker applied for legal costs, which was awarded by VCAT to the tune of \$5500. This is a very substantial amount for any voluntary Association and there is genuine fear that if these funds cannot be raised by the community, the Drysdale Clifton Springs Community Association will fold. That would be a devastating effect on the individuals involved and of course the wider community. I therefore reiterate my call on Milemaker, as a show of good will, to waive this cost and



begin the important process of building bridges with locals and in doing so becoming part of the wonderful community that Drysdale is."

# Lions raffle boosts local groups

# Council Ward Boundary Review

Please have a think and be ready to have a say

Perhaps you'll be able to remember before 2008 when we used to have a Councillor that represented the whole Drysdale, Clifton Springs, Portarlington, Indented Head and half of St Leonards. The other half of St Leonards was part of Bengala Ward with Ocean Grove and Leopold was in Cheetham Ward with Moolap and Whittington.

The last review for City of Greater Geelong was held over the Christmas New Year Season in 2007-2008. When the final report was published and the community of interest of Drysdale Clifton Springs had been cut in half and placed in two different wards. I learned a great deal from this process and I have asked for information so that the Drysdale Clifton Springs community would not be discriminated against and let down again.

Over the last 3 years I have been asking people to think about how they would like to see the Council's Ward boundaries redesigned.

The City of Greater Geelong Amendment Act 2012 and it states that prior to 2016 the number of Councillors will be reduced to 11 plus a Mayor. This will happen during the Representational Review which will commence on Wednesday 11 November 2015 and will run over Christmas and New Year as happened 8 years ago and must be completed by 22 April 2016. Other reviews recently conducted usually take 16 weeks, which should probably take us through to the start of March.

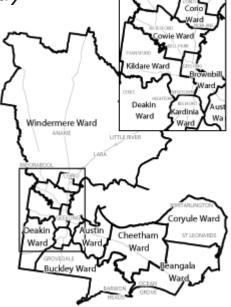
Although the schedule for our review is yet to be published, we will probably only get til mid December to lodge a preliminary submission. The preliminary report is likely to be ready by mid January and we'll have til mid February to put in submissions against the preliminary report, then there is usually 5 days til a public hearing and another 3 weeks til the final report is presented in mid March. The schedule is tight and it's at an interesting time of the year for our community.

On the Victorian Electoral Commission website http://www.vec.vic.gov.au/Electoral Boundaries/PastCouncilReviews.html there are preliminary and final reports which show how communities have been able to influence decisions. The reports have many interesting facts. The number of people that our Councillors represent are close to being or are the highest in the state. Some Councillors represent as few as 1,500 people. Our Councillors, in 2012 were representing approximately 13,000 each.

We need to think about would we be better off with multi Councillor Wards or are we better off with single Councillor Wards. What are the benefits and limitations? If there are 11 Wards with a single Councillor in each there will be more people for each Councillor to represent and more square km to be familiar with. Would we be better with 5 Wards with 2 Councillors in each and 1 single Councillor Ward, or would we be better off with 3 Wards with 3 Councillors in each and a 2 Councillor Ward or some other combination. Some of the reports for recent reviews recommend multiple Councillor Wards especially in areas where growth is going to happen.

I found it interesting to see that a not-forprofit group called Proportional Representation Society of Australia (Vic/Tas) Inc submits to each review.

Please start to think about this and be ready for the kick start on 11/11/2015. Concerned citizen and voter Anne Brackley

# antainet gardening

Modern gardens are often small with a lot of hard surfaces and not much free space. Even if we do have the space for a big traditional vegie patch, we may not have the time for one.

Fortunately lack of space or time need not stop you from growing a few fresh vegies. Containers can be used as 'pop-up' vegie gardens to provide your family with year-round healthy food and are easy and quick to tend.

Terracotta pots are an option for herbs and other small plants, but they require watering every day in summer. Burying the base of the pot in the soil and using the dappled shade of trees can help to reduce

the watering requirements.

Wicking tubs generally have a capacity of 20-50 litres, which is enough to grow salad greens, bush beans and other small annual vegies. They need to be filled with a good-quality compost. The water reservoir means they only need watering 1–2 times a week, even in the hottest

Grow bags are a good option for vegies that need a bit more room. They come in various sizes from greenharvest.com.au. Forty-five litres is fine for silverbeet, capsicums and broccoli; 100 litres is great for tomatoes, potatoes and pumpkins; 400 litres is suitable for all vegies and even dwarf fruit trees. Fill the smaller ones with a good compost, but for the larger ones you can use the 'lasagne' method: layers of newspaper, compost, peastraw, manure, etc. That's cheaper and holds

Raised beds are generally permanent, but some can be dismantled quite easily - good for renters. They can be several metres long. Some of our beds are galvanised steel, some are made from timber. I've also seen some great ones made from recycled material: just make sure it's sturdy, rotproof and non-toxic. Eighty centimetres is the most comfortable height – you don't need to bend to tend your vegies. I put whole peastraw bales in the bottom, then 30 cm of compost on top of that.

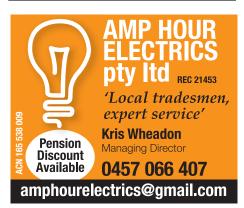

#### Drysdale Harvest Basket Produce Swap & Edible Gardening Group

Drysdale Harvest Basket Produce Swap was started by a group of people who wanted to find a way of sharing excess produce from their gardens. More than that, they hoped that through the Swap, the idea of growing your own food at home would be promoted and community connections would be built and strengthened. SpringDale came on board as the umbrella organisation and in October 2009 the first Swap took place at SpringDale.

Over the next couple of years and as membership grew, members at the Swap were sharing tips and edible gardening stories, good and bad. "Why do my carrots never grow straight?" "How do you make your compost?" So the Group decided to introduce workshops, garden visits or speakers after some of the Swaps, usually run by Harvest Basket members and always related to Edible Gardening.

A few more years went by and the Group realised some members were saying, "Oh, I'm not coming to Harvest Basket this month, I haven't got anything to swap" Now, my husband Steve (Williams) and I haven't had anything to swap for months, as we have got better at preserving, but we were still going along, so we would say, "Come along anyway

for the like-minded company and the gardening chat." Often they did come.

It was clear that the Group had become more than just a swap, just as the Harvest Basket 'pioneers' had envisaged. It is every bit as much about sharing gardening information as it is about sharing the produce. We now have an 'event' each month

which is set and published for the whole year. Also the Group has successfully run two Four Steps to Edible Gardening courses with a third to start in October (see SpringDale Course Guide). There is no doubt that community connection and involvement HAS occurred as a result of the Group and strong friendships have been forged.

As a result of this evolution, we have rebranded ourselves as The Drysdale Harvest Basket Produce Swap and Edible Gardening Group. We meet on the first Saturday of the



month from 9am until 10.30am in the SpringDale hall. Our membership fee is \$8 for the year, renewable in February. Members do need to also have SpringDale membership, which is currently \$12 per annum. We welcome anyone who is interested in learning about growing their own food, whether they already do or not and whether they have 50 acres or a balcony. So, come along, we would love to see you.

## SpringDale Community Garden

Happy to report that our garden project continues its progress. We have now cleared that terrible carpet weed from around half of the area, and we have marked out the pathways and the fruit tree growing area. Our recent working bee saw around 10 of our gardeners whirling like dervishes to sieve the large piles of dirt to remove the weeds, and enclose the "clean" soil in black plastic to kill the remaining weed seeds.

We have also had an offer of a large water tank from a church parishioner, which we will hopefully be able to relocate, once it has been emptied. We have also met with a local plumber, with a view to harvesting the water from the roof of the building used by the Church's playgroup — an expensive exercise, but we can't grow anything without water.

We are applying for grants from CoGG, GMHBA, and the Bendigo Bank, to fund our continued progress – these organisations are wonderful supporters of worthwhile projects in our community.

#### Lake Lorne Masterplan

Council has confirmed that they hope to organise an open/launch of Lake Lorne Reserve once the final stage of the project (the new Boardwalk) has been completed. The Boardwalk creates a crossing over the low lying lake area and will provide views, interpretive signage and a link between the old and the new walking trail and it is hoped to be completed by the end of 2015.

#### Bypass – Points of Interest from recent DCSCA Meeting with VicRoads

- 1. Jetty Road Intersection. Overpass is "off the table"; current preference is for a single large roundabout or possibly traffic lights.
- 2. Peninsula Drive VicRoads are requesting the City of Greater Geelong to continue Peninsula Drive through to Belcher's Road

before work commences on the bypass. Grub Road traffic can then access the school precinct without needing to encroach into the construction zone.

(Note! DCSCA has been informed that the City is working to achieving this outcome and is seeking alternative funding options to enable delivery in a timely manner.)

- 3. There will be a bike path following the route of the bypass but separate from it.
- 4. Pedestrian crossing adjacent to school precinct – two options are under consideration – an underpass and a signalised supervised crossing.
- 5. Drakes Road will possibly have a roundabout.
- 6. It is intended that work begins in about 18 months time and will be completed in 2019.
- 7. High Street VicRoads are looking at footpath/road paving to make cycling and walking safer and easier.

#### **Pad Thai**

125g (half a 250g pack) rice noodles

- 3 tbsp lime juice about 2 limes
- ½ tsp cayenne pepper
- 72 tsp cayenne pepper
- 2 tsp light muscovado sugar
- 2 tbsp fish sauce (nam pla)
- 2 tbsp vegetable oil

200g cooked and peeled tiger prawns, tails left on

- 4 spring onions, sliced
- 140g beansprouts
- 25g salted peanuts, finely chopped
- a small handful of coriander leaves

To serve

#### 1 or 2 lime, cut into wedges sweet chilli sauce

Put the noodles in a large heatproof bowl, pour boiling water over them and leave for 4 minutes, then drain and refresh under cold running water.

Put the lime juice, cayenne, sugar and fish sauce in a bowl and mix well. Have all the other ingredients ready by the cooker.

Heat the oil and fry the prawns until warmed through. Add the spring onions and noodles and toss around. Tip in the lime juice mixture, then stir in the beansprouts and half the peanuts and coriander. Cook for 1 minute until everything is heated through.

Pile into a large dish, scatter with the rest of the peanuts and coriander, and serve with lime wedges and sweet chilli sauce.



#### Thai Beef Stir-fry

2 tbsp vegetable oil

400g beef strips, or steak cut into thin strips 1 red chilli, deseeded and finely sliced 2 tbsp oyster sauce

Handful basil leaves

Heat a wok or large frying pan until smoking hot. Pour in the oil and swirl around the pan, then tip in the beef strips and chilli. Cook, stirring all the time, until the meat is lightly browned, about 3 minutes, then pour over the oyster sauce. Cook until heated through and the sauce coats the meat. Stir in the basil leaves and serve with plain rice.



#### **Thai Prawn Curry**

1 tbsp vegetable oil
1 onion, chopped
1 tsp fresh root ginger
1-2 tsp Thai red curry paste
400g can chopped tomatoes
50g sachet coconut cream
400g raw frozen prawns

**coriander, chopped, to serve (optional)**Heat the oil in a medium saucepan. Tip in the

onion and ginger, then cook for a few minutes until softened. Stir in the curry paste, then cook for 1 minute more. Pour over the chopped tomatoes and coconut cream.

Bring to the boil, then leave to simmer for 5 minutes, adding a little boiling water if the mixture gets too thick.

Tip in the prawns, then cook for 5-10 minutes more, depending on how large they are.

Serve alongside some plain rice and sprinkle with a little chopped coriander, if you like.

Most adults tell me of periods when perhaps time drifts and they have a feeling of losing the plot. We have that feeling every morning when we get up and move out to the big green shed that is located at the back of our house.

For opening the doors we come face to face with our moment of madness. Some three years ago we bought the plans for a boat and now every day we go out and toil away.

The boat – in moments of jest we call it our dingy - is as large as some houses. It is a large catamaran 4 metres high, 8 wide and stretching some 17 metres down the shed. It is made from many exotic materials but in the main is constructed of balsa. Yes the same material as the little throw gliders that most kids play with some time in their lives. There is carbon fibre and epoxy resins and different forms of glass fibre, but surprisingly very little metal. Metal is so old hat! Visit http://www.schionningdesigns .com.au/1700c to check out all the technical information of our catamaran which was custom designed to our specifications (want list).

We have learnt how to double our bills: it is simple just ask the price of anything marine. An ordinary fitting might be \$100 for your house but the moment it is to be used on a boat it is at least \$200 (but comes from the same factory – go figure that.)

A boat is built on a simple formula as the old boat builders tell me. When you are 5 years into a 5 year build you will only have 5 years left to go. When asked how much will a boat cost to make – their answer is – every penny that you have and then you will be half way there. (By the way these guys are the optimists). Anyway you might like to share in our madness. Because early one Sunday morning in December we will be trucking the boat down Beacon Point Road on our way to launch it at Portarlington. If you are up that early just shake your head and if you are sensible, go back to bed.

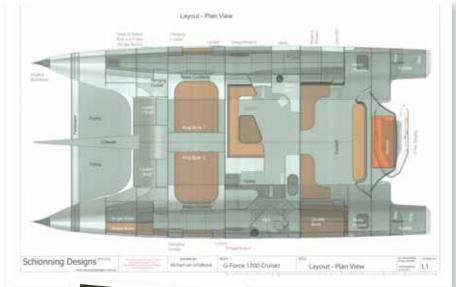

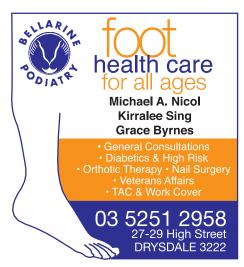

## Fishing adventures

I remember going with the Drysdale Sportfishing Club, three of us Ray Straton, John Davis and me. It took a full day's drive to get to Bermagui just this side of Narooma, with a stop at Lakes Entrance for lunch and to check the trailer and gear. Zane Grey, a world renown fisherman in the early days went fishing there.

We won a hamper and I ate heaps! Probably too much. We went on Ray's boat and it got very rough. "Where is the fella that keeps telling us all the stories?" the boys asked, but my chin on the stern I couldn't open my mouth to answer their questions. But luck was on my side.

The thing that saved me was John hooked a hammerhead shark – for some reason that's when I came good. Then the boys baited up to catch marlin and started to trawl. Both lines hooked at once. Both Marlin came up in the air and danced on their tails. We were wanting to tag them and that was my job, I

was the person to put the tags in.

John got his in but Rays was heading for Narooma "Ray let me have a wet towel so I can hold the line and help slow it down", I said but my offer was rejected. The marlin kept on going and snapped the line.

The thing that has amazed me all my life - squid can change colour. But the marlin near the side of the boat I could see multiple coloured rings of light around its body that kept changing - I call them bangles - we saw this before we let it go. It was a long time ago - people keep telling me my memory is ok!

Another time, we went out after tuna, we were out so far that I said "I can hear Maoris doing a war dance in New Zealand"- they were really hard to get in. John said either get your lines in or cut them off. There was a huge storm coming in over Narooma. The waves would have been 18 feet high. I did pray a little that day until I said thanks when I saw big water tower at Bermagui.

The reason for sharing these stories is to weave in a celebration of a 10 year old boy, Harry Martin, who went with the Drysdale Sportfishing Club to Eildon and caught an over 4kg brown trout on 2kg line. Kel is so happy for this young lad. He'll go into the records and fishing magazines - couldn't get better than that.

#### Drysdale RSL - Our plan is to regularly feature one of our members, we commence with Ernie Truman



Ernie Truman is a member of the Drysdale RSL

Ernie registered for service in 1941 and in 1942 he joined the Royal Australian Air Force. His enlistment took place in Melbourne and he was soon joining training in various parts of the country. His first training was in Benalla where he underwent training to become a pilot. Ernie also trained as a navigator in Mt. Gambier (South Australia) before heading to Sale to be trained in aspects of bombing and gunnery During World War Two Ernie was deployed in England serving in bomber command. He was involved in the Defence of Britain campaign. During this campaign Ernie was a crew member (bomb aimer) on a Lancaster Bomber. On a mission over Germany near the city of Stuttgart, the Lancaster in which Warrant Officer Truman was part of the seven man crew, was hit by enemy fire.

Ernie pays tribute to the pilot of the Lancaster, Flying Officer Peter Birt. He says the Officer kept steadying the aircraft in order that four of the crew could successfully parachute from the damaged aircraft. This occurred on January 28th 1945.

The four survivors from the Lancaster were captured and spent the rest of the war incarcerated in Germany. Warrant Officer Truman remained a prisoner of war until the surrender was signed.

During 2012 two Drysdale RSL members were invited to join in the unveiling of Bomber Command's Memorial – Ernie Truman and Arthur Cowley. They were flown to England for the celebrations. Unfortunately, Arthur Cowley has passed on.

The Drysdale RSL plans to hold a golf day in November to raise money that will be used to assist members and their families. The event is to be held at the Clifton Springs Golf Club on Monday, 9th November. It will be known as the Drysdale RSL's Remembrance Golf Day. Golfers who are interested in competing in the 4BBB Stableford Game can apply for an entry form from the RSL Club.

# Matthew made History

It was in 1802/3 that Matthew Flinders carried out his epic voyage when he circumnavigated Australia, bringing with him a small team of scientific people charged with the responsibility of documenting the strange flora and fauna which existed in this remote part of the world. He set out from the UK in HMS Investigator, a small, leaky, near unseaworthy ship with rotting timbers, a ship which proved to be barely adequate for such a huge task.

Flinders gave the name Indented Head to what we now know as the Bellarine Peninsula, after sailing into Port Phillip in 1802. In the days following, he camped overnight at or near Portarlington, before crossing to the western shore of Corio Bay, then walked across country to the You Yangs.

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He climbed to the highest point, which he named Station Peak (later renamed Flinders Peak), so as to determine whether Corio Bay provided another outlet to the ocean from Port Phillip, before he returned to the Bellarine Peninsula. His team of scientists spent time examining flora in the Swan Bay area, as described by present day signage at the Edwards Point Reserve near St Leonards, which states 'Edwards Point is home to the only known stand of natural coastal woodland remaining on the Bellarine Peninsula. In fact most of the 95 plant species recorded when Flinders visited the area with naturalist Robert Brown in 1802 are still present in the reserve 200 years later'.

The Bellarine Historical Society believes that it is time for a new memorial to be established at Portarlington, not only to commemorate Flinders' achievements as an explorer on the Bellarine Peninsula, but to ensure that his achievements are not forgotten by residents or visitors to our area.

Matthew Flinders was a remarkable seaman, an amazing navigator, an extraordinary explorer, one who earned the right to be remembered with a fitting memorial on the Portarlington coast for his significant place in our history.

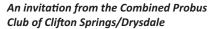

#### Stranger Danger

In recent weeks, there have been reports of alleged incidents involving school aged students being followed by unknown individuals.

The following ideas may be a starting point for parents to discuss with their children the issue of their safety in the neighbourhood.

- Walk straight to and from school with no distractions or side trips and without stopping to play on the way
- Walk to school in company with one or more other students, NOT by themselves
- · Remind your child not to talk to strangers (people they don't know) and that they should walk away from people they don't know and tell someone straight away
- · Remind your child not to get into vehicles even if they think they know the person unless you have told them someone else will pick them up
- If your child attends an after school or sport activity, ensure you pick them up on time so they are not left alone and unsupervised
- If you are running late to pick up your child from school, call the School and have your child wait at the office - not on the street.
- Remind your child to report any incidents or concerns they may have to their parents or teachers straight away if they occur

While we want our children to have independence and a sense of freedom, WE MUST ENSURE THEY ARE SAFE AT ALL TIMES.
