As one of the largest membership based not for profit organisation with charity status on the Bellarine, there is always something to do. People become members of SpringDale to enable a feeling of connection and belonging. Some people just want to be members to show their support for all the different things we do. Some people have had SpringDale prescribed for them by their doctor. I was surprised when this first happened but we are no longer surprised.

Over the holiday season I was able to devote many hours to our systems that help to keep SpringDale afloat. As I rarely have a chance to be on the front counter these days, it was enlightening to spend time working on our not for profit (but also not for loss) organisation. I rely on my scientific training to help look at what we do and how we do it with a different perspective to that of most Neighbourhood House Coordinators/Managers. I also draw on my more than 40 years voluntary work as a Girl Guide Leader to temper science with community and leadership development.

Over the last few years we have carried out some research projects on Economic Development, Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Autism. Through these projects we have gained skills and experience and we continue to employ the learnings of these projects. We have a couple of new ideas for 2019 and if we are successful we always need partners and community members to help us - please consider volunteering to help.

Volunteers are the life blood of our SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre. We have a volunteer Committee, we have volunteer group leaders and we have some volunteers in our office. At the moment we would love to hear from people who enjoy cooking and may enjoy sharing their love of cooking. For the last few years we have held a very food based event for Harmony day in March and we look forward to another successful evening with your help.

We are offering a few new classes this year based on requests and experience – One is currently called Returning to Earning but its subtitle is Finding out how a Neighbourhood Centre can help you get a job. We have been instrumental in gaining employment for many people over the years by giving people skills, confidence, experience and support. This is a very short course to get you going. We are offering a short course to enable people to determine if becoming a Disability Support Worker might be for you. If you are considering this vocation maybe you could invest some hours to ensure you are on the

right path before you commit to the study hours and the study cost.

Unfortunately we didn't have sufficient space to include the whole Course and Opportunity Guide this month but it is available on our website, via email, via the post and can be picked up at SpringDale and perhaps book in for a guided tour while you are at SpringDale. Most people don't believe what they see and hear on the tour. I have so much fun watching eyes get bigger and jaws dropping further.

Lastly I need to share a new hobby that I am enjoying - Collective Nouns. Recently I came across a list of collective nouns, which reignited an interest that started when I heard that the name for a group of owls is a parliament of owls. Since then I was given a whole book of collective nouns and realise that there are more people who share this interest. Each month I hope you will humour me while I share a couple of collective nouns with you. The first couple that I'd like to share are a wisdom of wombats and a skulk of foxes. I am using quite creative methods to slip these into various conversations whenever there is a low moment. News from Lisa Neville MP Member for Bellarine

New School Year

With the new year now well into full swing, it is of course an important time of year for all of our local students.

Preps are just embarking on their school life, while Year 12 students are commencing the most important year of theirs.

As the Member for Bellarine, the provision of quality education and facilities are of paramount importance to me, as they are for all parents. So I am pleased to report that the State Government is continuing to fulfil its promise of upgrading schools right across the Bellarine.

As readers may recall, I opened the fully refurbished Drysdale Primary School late last vear.

The \$3.49 million upgrade, includes an extended library with a senior centre, a junior learning studio with further classroom spaces, upgraded specialist facilities, and landscaping works.

In addition, with the \$2.5 million dollar upgrade to Bellarine Secondary College completed, the State Government has now committed to building an \$8.9 million VCE Centre, that will include new seminar rooms, a student lounge and administration space.

For Clifton Springs Primary School \$500,000 has been budgeted for master planning of the schools future refurbishment and upgrade.

While work has commenced on St Ignatius

\$8.5 million gymnasium, which includes two additional basketball courts, three learning spaces, change rooms, staff offices and storage areas. The State Government has contributed \$2 million for this project.

This year again will a busy year for all our local schools.



Lions Junior Sports Development Grants



Three Drysdale sporting clubs have successfully applied for junior development grants from Portarlington/Drysdale Lions Club.

Drysdale Football Club (female development), Drysdale Soccer Club (Kids Corner) and Drysdale Tennis Club each received \$1,000 under the program, which is designed to help improve the skills development and general wellbeing of young people on the north Bellarine.

To qualify for grants, applicants undergo a rigorous assessment process. Emphasis is placed on activities that increase the participation of children in sporting activities and that are likely to increase children's' self-confidence.

The grants are largely funded from the proceeds of the annual Lions Charity Golf Day held in October each year at Portarlington Golf Club.

Other successful 2018 applicants are: Bellarine Pirates Angling Club, Bellarine Sharks Soccer Club, Indented Head Yacht Club, Portarlington Cricket Club, Portarlington Football Club, Portarlington Golf Club, Portarlington Tennis Club and Portarlington Sailing Club.

Lions Cub President, Geoff Smith, said the junior sports grants program was only made possible by support for the Golf Day by players and sponsors and he thanked everyone for their input.

He said other Lions Club projects supporting young people included funding 12 children from Drysdale, Portarlington and St Leonards primary schools to attend the Lions Licola Adventure camp in January.



Chicken Run in Nepal



One of the main things I enjoy about being a Rotary member is the friendships I have formed since joining seven years ago. People who are liked minded who want to make a difference and inspire change within out home towns and further afield. Recently three of our members went to Nepal to help the people establish a chicken farm (nicknamed "Chicken Run"). A work in progress as supplies are been sourced and workers on the ground pull it all together. This came about because of two siblings from two different Rotary Clubs in different Districts combining thoughts to make it happen.

Progress report

Land has been made available on a local farm, the chicken house measured out, land levelled, and the foundation completed. Rocks for walls and wood for window and door frames have been delivered to the site, all



transported up the mountain by manual manpower.

So far the beautiful stone walls are only one or two rocks high as yet and it maybe 5 months to finish the chicken four roomed coop. Covering the outdoor area is under discussion due to birds of prey.

It sounds a bit broad doesn't it? International Year of Indigenous Languages?

AL YEAR OF Indigenous Languages

The cold hard facts are that, like animal and plant species decline, the stock of the world's languages is diminishing dramatically.

An example in Australia is Yanyuwa which is described as "critically

endangered". One of the many, many languages lost or almost lost, since 1788. It is however exciting to know that here on the Bellarine Peninsula we have a local connection through the Wathaurong Language Program. Have a look at https://www.vaclang.org.au/languages/wathaurong-language-programgeelong.html And Djillong? Geelong? A new perspective on the mighty Cats? Have a look at http://www.djillong.net.au/djillong-timeline.html

This links through to some very moving stories of the linguistic realities of the Wathaurong.

I come to this International Year of Indigenous Languages from a different but sympathetic perspective: I was privileged to spend most of my working life with first language speakers of Pitjantjatjara.

Because of the remoteness and harsh climate, Pitjantjatjara and its related dialects are understood over a very large area of desert Australia.

I started work with Pitjantjatjara people in the mid 1970s and represented many of them in the Northern Territority Legislative Assembly. I made a point in my maiden speech of giving some explanation of the report on the vast cattle station leases in Pitjantjatjara. It is generally acknowledged as the first time an indigenous language had been used in an Australian parliament. I am proud of having done so.

Another aspect of my association with Pitjantjatjara people is the change over the last forty plus years, principally because of improved transport and communication: there was no email in 1975 and no internet. So that lot more English words are finding their way into everyday Pitjantjatjara, almost as many as the French inflicted on us after 1066.

In conclusion, I urge you to find how these perspectives fit into an international scene. The UN has declared that this will be the International Year of Indigenous Languages, so have a look at the UN site (https:// en.iyil2019.org/)

AROUND THE WORLD WITHTHE FESTIVAL OF GLASS!

Draw a line around the globe connecting Australia, Italy and Canada and you'll catch the international flavour of the 2019 Festival of Glass.

Here in Australia, around 5,000 people including many interstate exhibitors and visitors - are expected to attend the Festival of Glass Expo on Sunday 17 February, to see glass art, sculpture, jewellery, mosaics and home ware; demonstrations of glass-working techniques; the Treasure Hunt draw; and the Glass Art Awards. Glass art workshops will run before and after the Expo.

Renewing the Italian Connection

Internationally renowned glass artist, teacher and jewellery designer Davide Penso from Murano, near Venice will be an International Artist in Residence at the 2019 Festival of Glass. Davide fulfilled this role admirably at the 2017 Festival and his 2019 workshops will offer glass artists and beginners a unique opportunity to learn traditional and contemporary Venetian techniques.

Free Bottle Appraisal Day

The hunt for rare antique bottles is on again on the Sunday 10th February at the Drysdale Court house from 10am to 3.00 pm This annual free bottle appraisal day is held a week before the Festival of Glass Expo at Drysdale and is conducted by the Bellarine Historical Society in conjunction with the Festival of Glass and ABCR Auctions.

Experienced and highly regarded collector David Bruce from ABCR auctions assisted by his father Paul will conduct the appraisals, previous days in the past two years have attracted 70 -80 participants with some real treasures being unearthed, a few of which were consigned to auction with excellent results.

Two such bottles were a Les Bray St Arnaud Ginger beer from the 1900-1918 period which had an estimate of \$200- \$250 and sold for \$650 which was a record price for this bottle.

The second bottle was from Magdalene College at Oxford University and was a handblown wine bottle with a glass seal dated from 1740 the local owner purchased it at a market in London many years ago for \$50.



It had an estimate of \$400 -\$500 but sold for \$980 again a record price for the bottle.

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Memories of Yesteryear by the Older Generation of the Bellarine

The Whitcombe Walk - Part three Robert Austin Whitcombe (Bob) 1896 - 1967

The Great Depression originated in United States of America in 1929 and spread to just about every country in the world. It was the worst economic time the world had seen and it lasted for 10 years. Australia was no exception, over this period, consumer spending and investment dropped, causing many companies to fail and many tens of thousands of people lost their jobs and were living in poverty.

Fortunately, Father was well established as the working manager of 'Spray Farm' and was able to help others in the community and offer employment to many men and **'women'** as there were always tons of white onions to wash and trim.

Unfortunately, Mother continued to have relapses of pneumonia to some extent each winter & in 1932 we were permitted to move into the "Spray Farm" homestead. The change of house did seem to improve mother's health greatly. The 'Spray Farm' homestead was built on a grand scale. It had a Ballroom, Billiard Room, many bedrooms, live in quarters for the Cook, Housekeeper, the Stable Manager, and Gardener, however we only used a limited number of rooms.

During the depression years at 'Spray Farm' Bob put together a large seine net, for night fishing off the local beach (which I'm sure is not legal now) however, it was a great help to all around as there was often a lot of fish for us and any of the local men, who came to help haul in the net.

Also, at this time Bob established a vegetable

We were to remain in the 'Spray Farm' homestead until 1938, when with another change of ownership, we were to move back to the dreaded 'Cote Royd' again for a year.

Bert Oakley offered my father the opportunity of purchasing 'SPRAY FARM' with the financial backing of Strachan & Co, but my father said it just wasn't him – too ostentatious, not to mention the upkeep - outrageously expensive.

As Bob received annual payments, from his share of the sale of his Father's estate and some occasional profits from share farming, he was eventually able to save enough for a deposit on fifty acres, this time on the southern side of Whitcombes Road, Drysdale.

By chance, it was owned at the time by his brother Jack, who had as they say picked it up



for a song in the worst of the depression years. The deposit was paid to Jack in 1936, Alan Bryant was employed to plough the land and some 20 acres of asparagus was planted along with cash crops to pay Alan's wages. By 1939 a house was built, it was called 'Lauriston'. Father named the property after my Mother, Laura. It was a happy move for Bob, he had not appreciated slipping back to work for wages, after the struggle he, Jack and his family had experienced, to lift the family out of a pit of poverty years back.

1939 - This was also the year when World War 2 broke over us.

Mural makeover for Drysdale's arcade

DCSCA and its Festival of Glass sub-committee have received almost \$11,000 from the federal government's Stronger Communities Programme to design and create a glass mural for the arcade off Drysdale's High Street. Entitled "Yesterday, Today & Tomorrow", the mural will depict the past, present and possible futures of the northern Bellarine Peninsula, celebrating the community to itself and to visitors.

The DCSCA committee has invited local community groups to help to design and create twelve glass mosaic panels that will form the mural, each depicting a theme or feature of the north Bellarine. The arcade's owners and tenants are enthusiastic supporters of the project, recognising that the mural will make the arcade a brighter, safer and more inviting space, benefiting businesses within it and pedestrians passing through it. The arcade mural is due for completion in April 2019.

Spring(s) into the future!

DCSCA is collaborating with the City of Greater Geelong in a project to revive the mineral springs which gave Clifton Springs its name. Three mineral springs are believed to emerge between the high and low water marks on the Clifton Springs beach, submerged by each high tide. This project will place a tubular 'collar' around each spring's outlet, effectively lifting its point of emergence above the high tide mark; and create a boardwalk around the nearby promontory, allowing people to see the bubbling springs and to walk continuously along the foreshore. (A small rocky promontory at the site prevents a continuous foreshore walk.) Features in the boardwalk could link the area's past and present. E.g. photos of the site when it was a successful spa; glass art from the Festival of Glass.

Offbeat and offshore!

DCSCA is working with the City of Greater Geelong as it initiates the design of an artificial reef and/or sculpture offshore from The Dell, in Clifton Springs. Such a structure would increase the area's attraction by encouraging snorkelling; increase fish numbers by improving the marine environment; and provide a picturesque view from The Dell Lookout.

DCSCA has lobbied the council and tourism bodies for the creation of such a structure since 2013; it called for an artificial reef for The Dell in its 2015 Community Budget Submissions to the council; and in 2016, it added its voice to those of the Boating Industry Association of Victoria and Tourism Greater Geelong and The Bellarine in calling for an underwater sculpture gallery off Clifton Springs. Now, after six years of false hopes and false

starts, it seems that this idea's time has come and DCSCA will work with the council to ensure that the structure reflects local people's views about the area and its future.

ON THE ROAD Emergency Vehicles

I've written about driving overseas in previous articles and one other difference I've seen is the response of drivers to the presence of emergency



vehicles. The response is immediate and quite dramatic. Cars pull over and slow right down or stop so as to provide clear passage for the emergency vehicle. Driving on a German autobahn on one occasion, I was surprised to see all the traffic move into the emergency lane so as to allow two lanes completely free for a police car. I was flashed by the police car because of my relatively slow response, even though the car was still a few hundred metres behind me and I was in the process of moving over. Australian drivers often don't clear the road at all.

The 'Road to Solo Driving' states, 'You must get out of the way of a police or emergency, enforcement or escort vehicle when its siren is on or it is displaying red, blue or magenta flashing lights. Give way and stop if necessary (despite any other rules), even if you have a green traffic light. These vehicles have exemptions to rules in the case of emergencies and may act unpredictably.'

A newer rule requires drivers to slow down when passing emergency vehicles (with emergency lights flashing) that are stationary or moving slowly (less than 10km/h). You must not exceed 40km/h and you must only increase your speed when you are safely passed the scene. You must slow down whichever side of the road the emergency vehicle is on, unless it is on the opposite side of a divided carriageway (separated by a median strip).

You must also stop if twin red lights are flashing on a road, e.g. outside a Fire or Ambulance Station.

So, if you see or hear an emergency vehicle in your proximity, clear the road so they can pass freely and go about their business – someone's life may depend on it.

2kg ripe tomatoes, halved 8-10 cloves garlic, crushed ¼ cup extra virgin olive oil ¼ cup balsamic vinegar 1 tablespoon honey 2 cups vegetable stock Salt & Pepper

- Prepare a tray with the halved tomatoes and garlic.
- Drizzle with the olive oil, vinegar and honey.Roast for about 45 minutes. The tomatoes

- Use a food mill (moulé) to remove the skins and seeds.
- Combine the juices and puree into a pot, bring to boil and simmer for 15 minutes.
- Add the vegetable stock and bring to the boil and simmer for another 5 minutes.
- Allow to cool (up to 4 hours in the fridge) to enjoy this soup well chilled.

Options to serve:

Fresh torn leaves of basil, chopped almonds, chunks of capsicum, cucumber.

Fresh crusty bread with extra virgin olive oil and sprinkled with oregano.

To freeze:

Once chilled, freeze any leftovers or make it especially to have some in the colder weather. Before adding the stock pour the mixture into ice blocks. These can be used to add a little flavour and colour to vegetables or gravy.

Use this recipe as the base for any other vegetable soup especially to use up garden produce like pumpkin, beans and capsicums.

This is the perfect time of the year to enjoy nutritious cold soups. Roasting tomatoes and making soup or sauce is great way to store the flavours of summer and enjoy them later in the year.



My favourite kitchen gadget: MOULÉ or Food Mill

For years I have used the moulé or as it is known in Italian a passatutto - passes everything.

It comes in handy when making a smooth tomato sauce – no skins and no pips. But that's not all! It keeps all the fibrous matter back when making a broth or one of my favourite finger foods... artichoke patties. For those fussy little eaters who don't want to see big chunks of vegetables it's great to grind everything down like zucchini or carrots to make vegetable soup or patties etc.

Exciting developments and plans for the future are coming for Bellarine Community

Health which will enhance services for people living on the Northern Bellarine was the message delivered to more than 50 members of BCH and other community representatives attending the Annual General Meeting (AGM) held late in 2018.

Guest speaker at the event, G21 CEO Elaine Carbines, outlined the importance of the health sector in the G21 alliance and the role that BCH and other stakeholders play in ensuring the Bellarine is part of future planning.

The Board Chair used the AGM to announce one of BCH's plans for the future; a new mobile Health Care Bus for the Bellarine. The BCH Health Care Bus will deliver services to clients in all 11 towns on the Bellarine. It will be Wi-Fi enabled, allowing clinicians to deliver services via telehealth to clients with restricted access to transport.

The BCH Board has set aside \$100,000 from the remaining Health and Wellbeing fund towards establishing the mobile health bus and is seeking donations to complete the funding in the coming months. Some donations from local organisations have already been received.

Those attending the AGM were also told of BCH plans to re-establish a GP practice from the Portarlington site. This will be a comprehensive clinical practice providing GP services, nursing and a range of allied health services. The small gymnasium at Portarlington currently used for BCH group programs has also be opened for public use.

An update was given at the AGM on the redevelopment of the Community Health Centre buildings at Point Lonsdale. The third and final stage of the redevelopment is nearing completion with clinicians and staff expected to start working from the new building by the end of the year.

The BCH Board is also working on plans and actively seeking funding to assist with refurbishing and reopening the Eric Tolliday units and redevelop the existing Coorabin building.

"Swastika" ladies group in Drysdale 1911

There was a ladies rifle shooting day in Drysdale in 1911 by the local "Swastika" ladies group.

"Swastika" ladies social groups were formed in about 1910 in Victoria. The groups seem to have had cricket and football teams as well as rifle shooting and literary groups and there were groups in Drysdale, Horsham, Colac and Bendigo/Eaglehawk in the country. The "Swastika" groups seem to have started in Melbourne with groups in Fitzroy and Caulfield as well.

The word "Swastika" had different connotations to today where we associate it as an emblem of the Nazi Party.

In 1910 it probably stood for "auspiciousness" or "good luck" whilst by the 1930's it was a symbol of the Nazi Party in Germany---seems like the naming of the group was unlucky timing for the Ladies Social Group Movement.

The Geelong Advertiser Friday 27th October 1911 reported that there were 24 entrants in the ladies shooting events and that winners were W Filbay 1st prize silver mounted hair

brush, J Whitcombe 2nd, F Taylor 3rd.

Ladies shoot of five shots at 80 yards Miss Netta Ray 25points, first prize a silver watch and chain, second prize Miss Elva Bennett 24, third prize a silver shoe horn and button hook, Miss Doris Sutherland third with 23 points prize an EP hatpin stand Consolation prize Miss E Clarke, pin cushion. There are quite a number of familiar local names here.

We are very interested to know more about the "Swastika" ladies social groups. This would be an interesting topic for research. Do any of our readers know more about this group or would like to research it?

The two photos attached from our BHS collection show some of the ladies who took part in the event in Drysdale in 1911.


