Hundreds of people each day comes to SpringDale to find something new, to connect with others, to extend their knowledge, to explore a talent, to keep minds open and active.

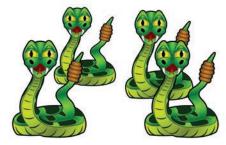

Adrian Mannix OAM Award Nominations

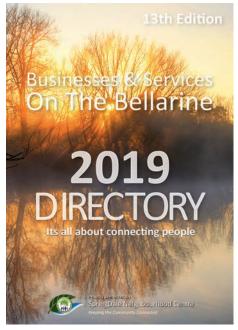

State Government Solar Hot Water Rebates Available

Rebates are now available for solar hot water systems as part of the State Government's Solar Homes package.

Victorian households can claim up to \$1,000 rebate for solar hot water systems and reduce their energy costs by between \$160 and \$400 a year with rebates available for systems installed on or after 19 August 2018.

Not all homes can have solar panels installed because of issues such as roof design or shade, which is why the State Government is providing this rebate. It means Victorians who can't install solar panels will still be able to save hundreds of dollars a year on their electricity bills.

The rebate is available to Victorians with a household income of up to \$180,000 who live in their own home valued at up to \$3 million - and who haven't already installed half price

solar panels under the Solar Homes program.

All solar hot water installations must be completed by a licensed plumber, while electrical work must be done by a Class A electrician licenced by Energy Safe Victoria, or a recognised equivalent from another Australian jurisdiction.

Systems installed under the package must be on the Clean Energy Regulator's Register of solar hot water heaters and the Victorian **Essential Services Commission Registered** Products list.

The Labor Government's Solar Homes program will cut Victoria's carbon emissions by almost four million tonnes - the same as taking one million of Victoria's 4.6 million cars off the road - and generate 12.5 per cent of Victoria's 40 per cent target for renewable energy by 2025.

Victorian Training Awards

Apprentices, students, teachers, employers and training providers with in the training sector can now nominate for the 65th Victorian Training Awards. I encourage locals to submit nominations for the awards, which recognise and honour the outstanding achievements of individuals and organisations in the Victorian TAFE and training sector.

There are 16 categories including six for individuals, four for employers, four for training organisations as well as an Industry Collaboration Award and the Lynne Kosky Memorial Award for Lifetime Achievement.

Winners will be announced at the Victorian Training Awards ceremony in Melbourne in September, with winners receiving \$5000 in prize money.

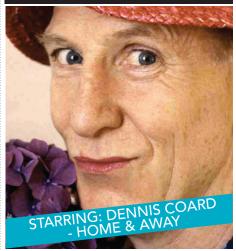

Drysdale Uniting Church 170 Years Old

The Drysdale Uniting Church celebrates 170 years of worship in this community this year.

The Uniting Church was formerly the Methodist Church and before that the Wesleyan Methodist. The first known public worship for Wesleyan Methodists was near McLeod's Waterholes in 1849 followed by the erection of the Tuckfield Chapel in Wyndham Street (with now a private residence on the site), which was also used by the Presbyterians and Anglicans. Tuckfield was the parson for this founding church. By 1855 there was a new chapel on the site with the old chapel becoming the parsonage.

Right from the start of the church there was a link with the Pioneer Women, Miss Caroline Newcomb and Miss Anne Drysdale. Caroline

became the first Secretary of the church trustees with Anne also a trustee. The chairman was the Rev James D Dodgson, who married Caroline in 1861.

Caroline Elizabeth Newcomb (1812 - 1874) was born in London and immigrated to Hobart Town in 1833. She went to Port Phillip in 1836 as governess to the children of John Batman. She met Anne Drysdale in Geelong.

Anne Drysdale (1792 – 1853) was born in Scotland and became a good farmer. She arrived at Port Phillip in 1840, and soon after became a guest of Dr Alexander Thomson and his family in Geelong. He had offered to help her to find a farming run. When Anne decided on Boronggoop as the site for her run on the Barwon River, she became partners with her friend, Caroline Newcomb. They extended with an outstation, Lap Lap (or Leep Leep), on Reedy Lake.

In 1843 the Coryule run was purchased and the stone house constructed and settled in the late 1840s. Coryule became renowned in the region.

Caroline Newcomb had joined the Wesleyan Methodist Society in 1839 and became the first secretary of the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Drysdale, founded in 1849. After Anne's death in in 1853 she continued to run the Coryule property. In1861 she married Wesleyan minister, the Rev James Davy Dodgson. They left Drysdale in 1864 after the chapel was moved to the site of the current Community Hall in 1863.

Caroline died at Brunswick in 1874. She was buried beside Miss Drysdale at Coryule. Both were later reburied at Geelong Eastern Cemetery.

Easter services at Drysdale Uniting Church will be Good Friday 10.00am and Easter Day 9.00 am and 10.45am. The church also operates a mainly music program for pre-kindergarten children each Wednesday morning and Messy Church bi-monthly (the next of 14 April at 5.00pm).

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NO Mobile Phones

We have all seen people using mobile phones while driving. Driving while using a mobile (or other electronic device) greatly increases the risk of an accident. Studies have shown that using a phone, even hands free, and has a similar impact to being under the influence of alcohol.

To reduce this risk, there are restrictions on use of mobile phones whilst driving.

Learners and probationary licence holders (L, P1 & P2) must not use a hand-held or hands-free mobile phone at any time while driving. Similarly, fully licensed drivers may only use a mobile phone to make or receive calls while driving if the phone is securely fixed or can be remotely operated, i.e. it is 'hands-free'. No driver may send or receive text messages whilst driving.

Driving is a complex activity and drivers handle many different challenges. Traffic conditions vary, poor weather increases the risk and distractions inside the car (passengers, pets, radio or mobile phone) all contribute to the difficulty of driving safely. You can reduce the temptation of answering the phone by switching it off, switching it to silent or putting it out of reach.

Use of a mobile phone, or other electronic devices, is dangerous while driving because it takes your attention away from the road. Anything that diverts your attention and takes your eyes off the road will increase the risk of an accident. This also applies to older, more experienced drivers. Using a mobile phone can cause you to wander, follow too closely or miss traffic lights or other signs. Even using a hands-free phone increases your chance of an accident. Texting while driving is particularly dangerous. A CD or DVD player, radio, passenger's phone or a GPS navigation system, could also distract you. You can reduce these risks by removing distractions from your car.

If you must make or receive a call, pull over safely, park and turn off the motor. Remember, stopping in an emergency lane to use a phone is illegal.

Australia is the driest inhabited continent on Earth yet we have one of the highest per capita water consumption rates in the world. Two-thirds of the world's population use less than 60L (litres) of water per person per day, while the typical Australian uses almost twice that amount during a single shower! There is a lot of water in the world, but very little is available for us to use.

The majority of the earth's water (97.5%) is found in oceans, saltwater lakes and rivers of which 2.5% is fresh. Of this fresh water, 68.9% is tied up in ice and snowfields, with a further 30.8% being groundwater or bound in soil/permafrost. This leaves in lakes and rivers just

Although water is a renewable resource, we can still run out of fresh water if it's used faster than it's replaced by rainfall, or if we pollute it so it's no longer useable.

Did you know that Geelong residents use on average 150 litres PER PERSON PER DAY?

Being more sustainable with how we use our existing precious water resources is therefore crucial for ensuring access to water for

everyone well into the future. The good news is we can all start taking water wise actions today, house by house, street by street. Saving water not only helps protect our environment, it'll save you money. You can cut your water usage costs and, by using less hot water, reduce your energy bill too!

Do you know that in the near future Barwon Water will begin to drop it's supply rate for customers but increase the usage rate? So the more you use the more you will pay. And within 10 years it's predicted that water will cost us more than electricity and gas!! It will be the new 'gold' of the future. So now is a good time for everyone to start changing their ways and together we can make a difference ready for the next generation.

Drysdale Bypass barrier installation

The Drysdale Bypass is starting to take shape with earthworks underway along most of the 6.4km site as we prepare to build the road.

As these works progress, we understand our community is starting to think about how the road will look upon opening and one of the interest points is the barrier treatment that will be installed along the Bypass.

About the guard fence system along the Drysdale Bypass

We're installing a flexible guard fence along the outside of the bypass and through the middle median. The guard fence is a made of steel rails and posts with the barrier rail standing 78 cm above the ground.

When a vehicle comes in contact with a flexible guard fence, it helps deflect the huge amount of energy released and reduces risk to the people inside.

We've chosen this style of guard fence because they're more forgiving than traditional barriers, but still slow down a vehicle considerably in the event of a crash.

Where we'll install the guard fence

We'll install the guard fence along the outside and centre median of entire length of the bypass. There will be a gap of about four metres on the left from the lane edge and one metre on the right.

As you approach an intersection, the gap from the guard fence will narrow on both sides of the road. The centre median barrier on the right will end entirely.

How the guard fence caters for an emergency

During the planning phase of the project, we worked closely with local emergency services to ensure they can safely and efficiently enter and exit the bypass at regular intervals.

In an emergency, people can quickly and safely enter and exit the bypass at regular breaks in the guard fence. These breaks will be about 1 kilometre apart and also serve as emergency stopping bays. Most importantly, they will let maintenance and emergency services have quick access to the bypass and surrounding land.

The differing characteristics of flexible guard fence and wire rope barriers

The steel flexible guard fence is a system that has similar safety characteristics to wire rope barriers that is suited to the Drysdale Bypass environment.

Both types of barriers impose lower forces to the impacting vehicle compared to traditional barriers. This is because as the vehicle impacts the barrier tit deflects, dissipating the collision energy and reducing occupant risk. This means it is a forgiving system to vehicle occupants during an impact.

There isn't a one-size-fits-all approach to road safety infrastructure — every upgrade is tailored to the conditions and environment of that particular road. In this case we have elected to install guard fence, which works well on curved roads such as the Drysdale Bypass.

How guard fence works in a changing lane configuration

As you may know, the Drysdale Bypass alternates from one lane to two lanes in certain areas.

These changing lane arrangements will not change the distance of the barriers from the active traffic lanes.

The left-hand lane barrier will remain 4 metres from the active traffic lane and he right hand lane (middle median) barrier will remain 1 metre from the active travel lane.

Other flexible guard fence locations

Flexible guard fence is already in use on the Princes Highway between Winchelsea and Colac and in areas along the Great Ocean Road.

When it's complete, the bypass will make a big difference to the way you get around Drysdale and the wider Bellarine Peninsula while creating a safer, more vibrant town centre for everyone.

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Moon landing

Hi, everyone, it's John reporting from
"SpringDale control." As we start the "countdown" to the
only available "launch window" for our "Moon Landing
Commemoration" (Sunday July 21 2019) maybe we'd
better start familiarising ourselves "afresh" with the
technical details of the multifaceted design concept that
became the "Apollo 11" spacecraft.

In this "internal view" of "Apollo" we can see how cleverly all the equipment required for the mission was "housed" in the very small space available. At the "top" of the picture is the "command module" where the three astronauts sit "line abreast" for the duration of the trip to the moon. The command module is, in fact, the only section of the spacecraft that returns to Earth as it executes its' final task of bringing the astronauts "home."

Just behind the crew we see the "service module." Here we have a store of fuel for the engine which the pilot employs to "move" the craft into and (subsequently) out of orbit around the moon.

Finally at the base of the setup is the two stage "lunar excursion module" used for the actual landing on the lunar surface.

Once clear of the Earth and in "free" space the giant Saturn rocket is released. Then the long orange "nose" and also the "shell" cover over the lunar module drops off. Now, the two man crew of the lunar module can only access the lunar module through a hatch in its roof. But the exit hatch from the command module is in the nose. So they then have to "drop" the lunar module and slowly turn the command module half a turn until the nose is facing the roof of the "lander." The two craft then "dock" nose to roof to allow egress from the "commander" to the "lunar module."

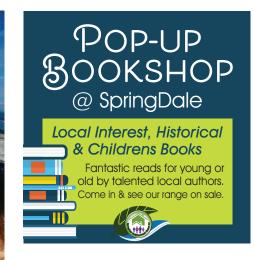
The new configuration is not at all "streamlined" but for travelling in the airless vacuum of space this doesn't matter.

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Memories of Yesteryear by the Older Generation of the Bellarine

The Whitcombe Walk - Part Five Robert Austin Whitcombe (Bob) 1896 - 1967

The 13 years spent at "Spray Farm", was not wasted as my father had acquired a broad knowledge, of the management of sheep for wool & fat lamb production.

During the war & extending into the post war period, he probably produced more asparagus than any other grower in the area. The Drysdale Asparagus Company was formed, Bob & Jack Whitcombe became small shareholders in the Drysdale Asparagus Factory. It was built on Bob's land on the corner of Springs Road & Whitcombes Road. However, it was controlled by Mr Henry Williams of "Victory Products". The asparagus was out of the ground for only a short time before it was under treatment at the factory. In addition to handling the home crop, asparagus was bought from other producers in the district. There were several tons of Asparagus processed daily. There were never any dividends paid, but it did provide a very convenient market for the produce.

Under this war time work load, Father's health was failing, high blood pressure with an ever-present risk of heart attack & by now his hips had deteriorated to a point where he did everything possible on his knees. It was at this time, Christmas 1944, he finally appealed to

me for help, I had been working in Melbourne for a year in quality control at Morland Metal Co. a non-ferrous foundry. Although the war was approaching the final stages, it proved to be very difficult to get a clearance from MAN POWER. However, I was released in time for the spring harvest of 1945. I don't think my father would have survived that harvest without my help. My brother Alan was with the Army Medical Service through most of the war years and for some time thereafter. Hence, his inability to help.

My father confided in me that as a child of seven, while he was recovering from Polio, he had a "DREAM", that one day he would own



the 120 Acre farm "Lilydale" across the road from his father's small orchard. I know now from my own experience, that it was no dream but a "VISION". Tell me of anyone who can remember the details of a dream 24 hours later, let alone 50 years?

If you want to become part of a new place you need to know its history. How fortunate I was, then, when I moved to Drysdale, that my neighbours had lived here for decades and have a keen interest in their town.

I missed meeting two most interesting neighbours, but soon learned about them – the late Dr. M. Vishal, and her sister Sartaj. If I mentioned them to older residents the response would be 'Ah, yes, Dr. Vishal". That "Ah" was one of admiration.

Their property was sold recently. We asked Sartaj and the new owner, Peter Modica, if we could rescue some roses from the garden before new building began. Both agreed. As we were digging out the roses, I mused that we might find them a new home in the Drysdale Pioneer Women's Memorial Garden. This seemed fitting. Dr. Vishal, like Anne Drysdale and Caroline Newcomb, was a woman of independent spirit. As a young woman, she too had refused to be limited by the narrow expectations of society. In the 1960s she gained medical qualifications, then moved to an Australia that had not fully discarded the White Australia Policy, and where non-Europeans and female doctors were still highly suspect. Like them, she won the respect and affection of her new community. She was a person of great empathy, kindness and generosity. She treated patients as people who deserved a full and happy life. And she listened to them.

We put the idea of planting these roses in the Pioneer Women's Garden to the City of Greater Geelong, and received its blessing. So, come some decent rain, new and beautiful roses will find a haven in the main street into Drysdale.

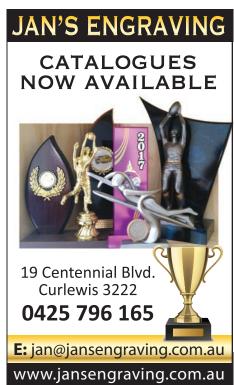
