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Drysdale/Clifton Springs has received high praise from the judges of the 1991 Tidy Towns Award.

The community was entered in the Heritage Preservation and Beautification sections of the sought-after Keep Australia Beautiful Council presentation.

The judging report says: "The Drysdale and Clifton Springs community is commended for their successful; Tidy Towns activities this year and, with the Rural City of Bellarine, on the positive and

methodical approach they taken towards the development of a positive Tidy Towns programme.

"There is clearly a great deal of potential in this progressive community for extended participation within the general framework of current and proposed initiatives."

The judge, Trevor Lagstrom, commented on the rich heritage of the area and the drive to preserve historical items and buildings. He praised the work of the Bellarine Histori-

> cal Society and the Geelong Steam Preservation Society.

> Mr Lagstrom listed the upgrading of the railway station in vintage colours and clean-up work done on the Drysdale Court House Museum and the Clifton Springs entrance and fountain.

> He was impressed by the community's beautification work, both on private properties and public buildings. Mr

Lagstrom particularly commented on the work done by schoolchildren, Brownies and garden club members at the railway reserve.

Other beautification projects to catch his eye were at Clifton Springs Primary School, the Clifton Springs fountain and the cliff face area at the Clifton Springs boat ramp.

Interested in Neighbourhood Watch?

Drysdale Police want to gauge the need for a Neighbourhood Watch.

Sergeant Dennis Green says Neighbourhood Watch is a communitybased crime prevention programme aimed at minimising PREVEN-TABLE crime, especially burglary, within defined areas.

He has an area in mind, but three criteria must first be met: it must have about 600 households, have a significant crime rate, especially burglaries, and have a demonstrated community interest.

"Experience has shown that the quality of the programme should never be compromised by speed of implementation or the possibility of falling

away in interest in a new project,' said Sergeant Green.

"These programmes are permanent and can produce enormous satisfaction for all participants."

He's urging anyone with a view on the subject to drop a brief note at the police station, in Eversley Street.

CONCL DING

The small but busy Drysdale police station is often unattended while officers go about their daily business.

Now Sergeant Denis Green wants to reassure the public that help is always close at hand.

"If you want the police to attend somewhere 'NOW' to report a crime to them, report an emergency to them or to tell them about something you think they need to know straight away, then ring 11444," he said.

"This number connects you to D24 Melbourne, and you should be advised that in busy times it may take a few moments to get through.

D24 emergency telephone "The operator will take details from you and write them, on a card, which travels by conveyor belt to the radio operator. "It is not the function of the telephone operator to help you immediately: their job is to get the information quickly to the radio operator, who knows what cars he has available to him and where they are.

"Just because no-one is at the station when you call or the tapre message is when you call or the tape message is on when you ring does not mean that police are unavailable to you," said Sergeant Green.

"For a great percentage of the time they are in the car on patrol, and may be very close by to respond to your call.

"Do not hesitate to call us at any time, and if you can safely have a peek at the problem, then please do.

"The colour and make of a strange car in your neighbour's drive, but, most importantly, the registration number, is of vital concern to us.

"Also the number, description and direction of travel of a group of passers-by wrecking letterboxes is vital information that helps us to help you.

"If you have a query of a routine nature, then by all means call Drysdale on 512201 or our brother station, Portarlington, on 592606.

"However, your best bet may be to call Geelong police on 253100," he said.

New shop-front library in Village Walk DECEMBER'S

Bellarine Rural City Council is to set up a shop-front library in the Village Walk complex early next year.

The location has much going for it - a central location, plenty of parking in Village Walk and at the nearby supermarket, and easy access from the main roads.

It is also expected to help revitalise a block of shops hard-hit in the recession by bringing people back to Village Walk.

This is the first step in the establishment of a static library over the next five years. It's intended to go along the same lines as Ocean Grove - from a shop-front service to a full library. Library demand is great in the Drysdale/Clifton Springs area - the current mobile has 862 registered users.

Experience at Ocean Grove has shown that usage increases when a shop-front service is introduced - 4411 of Ocean Grove's 8500 population are members of their library.

On those figures, it's expected that, at the very minimum, a third of Drysdale/Clifton Springs residents would join a branch located at the busy centre of the tiown.

The council's new mobile library will continue to serve the community after the shop-front service is opened by being available at all its regular stops, apart from the High Street location opposite the shops.

DECEMBER'S RECIPE....

At last! The warm weather has arrived, so how about something simple but delicious for the family or when entertaining.

Strawberries in the Snow 2 cups of strawberries, hulled.

2 tablespoons of kirsch (optional).

Half a cup of castor sugar. 4 egg whites.

1 cup of cream.

Sprinkle sliced strawberries a with tablespoon of sugar and kirsch. Stand for 15 minutes. Beat egg whites until stiff and add rest of sugar. Whip cream until stiff and fold egg whites into it. Serve with layers of cream mixture and strawberries in parfait glass or mix strawberries into cream and serve in glass dish. Decorate with strawberries.
