All festival proceeds are shared equally between the two schools.



Let's give 'em a go!

LET us introduce you to LETSystem, a local employment trading system operating during recession-ridden times in this area.

LETS is a non-profit community trading organisation that benefits anyone with time or skills to share.

It's a kind of sophisticated bartering that works something like this:

Jan is a truck driver and Ken a welder who wants some steel delivered but has no money.

Jan doesn't want any welding, so that's usually where it stops. However, if Jan and Ken are

members of LETS, then Jan delivers the steel and Ken pays her in LET\$.

An acknowledgement form is either deposited in the nearest collection box or Ken telephones 531729 to record the transaction.

Jan's account increases by 40 LET\$ and Ken's account decreases by 40 LET\$.

In turn, Jan employs a carpenter, who has a haircut, gets some clothes made and buys some food from a farmer.

The farmer now has a way to pay for a welder, so Ken gets to work again.

The Bellarine LETSystem began in May 1990, and now has more than 90 members.

Among the services on offer are roof plumbing, computer programming, lawnmower repairs, house design, professional photography, gardening and dress-making.

Membership costs just \$5.



BELLARINE Rural City Council has been holding two-week school holiday prograr's for a number of years during the four school holidays.

Any primary school-aged child interested in the activities or excursions is eligible to attend.

The program activities are based around art/craft, sporting activities and excursions.

The cost to parents is about \$45 per child per week. This takes in the cost of the care of the child, excursions, materials and transport.

The council hires out capsules for the safe carriage of babies up to six months of age in vehicles.

They can be sought for six months from date of birth - but, beware, there is a waiting list, so book early.

THE council warns of an increasing

trend to park vehicles on the wrong side of the road.

Traffic regulations state that vehicles must be parked with the left side wheels as near as practicable to the left boundary of the carriageway on the correct side of the road.

"The practice of parking on the wrong side of the road is dangerous and often causes other motorists concern," warns the council.

"In most cases the vehicle must be driven on the wrong side of the road to get there, and then on the wrong side of the road to leave.

"Modern vehicles are not fitted with reflective devices on the front; therefore the dangers increase at night."

The council says "there is no acceptable reason" for leaving vehicles on the wrong side of the road - including nature strips.

Council by-law officers are fining the owners of an vehicles illegally parked. Patrols will continue, with a greater emphasis on public safety.

Around home...

MARCH RECIPE - pineapple fruit cake: 40z butter, 1 cup sugar, 15oz can crushed pineapple, 1 teaspoon mixed spice, pinch salt, 1lb mixed fruit, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon carb. soda, 1 cup plain flour, 1 cup self-raising flour.

Boil butter, sugar, pineapple, mixed fruit, spice and carb. soda for three minutes, then cool. Sift flours and add to the fruit mixture with the two beaten eggs and pinch of salt. Place in eight inch square tin and cook at 160 degrees for one-and-a-half to two hours.

GARDENING TIP:

Have you mulched your garden for the hot weather? It will help save time and money through watering, as well as reduce the growth of weeds. An excellent native mulch is available from the Drysdale Waste Disposal and Recycling Centre in Becks Road. For a minimal cost, bring some home after your next delivery of waste to the tip. Seaweed also is cheap, effective and readily available.

HANDY HINT;

A pin placed in the water when boiling an egg will prevent it from cracking. Also, don't forget to immediately run cold water over the egg to prevent discolouration around the yoke.

The event will be celebrated when a speaker is obtained.


The RSL's women's auxiliary is celebrating its 40 years with a luncheon on April 13. Ring secretary Joy Ward, 512974, for details.


Overall, the tournament proved that, with more experience, the Flames could be a force to be reckoned with.
