Bid to save our native vegetation

ONE hundred and fifty seven years after European settlement, Bellarine Rural City Council is making an effort to preserve the peninsula's remnant native vegetation.

A joint project between the council, Victorian Roadsides Conservation committee and the Department of Conservation and Environment is involving the erection of roadside signs and environmental markers to alert the public and road workers to the existence of significant vegetation.

A team of 10 volunteers scoured the peninsula earlier this year to record and assess remnant native flora.

Rhinds, Lings, Swan Bay, Knights Shepherds and Manifold roads, the southern section of the Queenscliff-Portarlington road, as well as the Indented Head end of Church Road were identified as possessing significant native vegetation, so will carry the special signs.

Some roads will display the larger 'Significant Roadside Area' signs designed to alert travellers, roadside workers and local people that the particular area has higher than usual conservation value.

Smaller environmental markers will be used for the information of roadside workers and adjacent landowners.

Anyone wanting to carry out work in these designated areas must first discuss it with the council.



You will need a kilogram of pumpkin, 60 grams of butter a 440 gram can of cream corn, half a cup of cream, two onions, three-and-a-half cups of chicken stock, three teaspoon of Worcestershire sauce and a tablespoon of chopped chives. Combine pumpkin, onions and butter in a large bowl, then cover and microwave on high for three minutes.

Add stock and cook on high for 25 minutes. Puree, stir in corn, sauce and cream. Sprinkle with chives.



Caring for your children

THE Clifton Springs Out of School Hours Programme is providing quality care for children aged five to 12 in a safe, relaxed environment.

It caters for all primary school aged children attending Clifton Springs Primary School and can be used for permanent or occasional care.

The programme operates from 3.30pm to 6pm each day, after school, and children are provided with a drink and sandwich each afternoon.

Two staff are employed to supervise the children at all times.

The programme aims to capture the children's interest by providing stimulating activities that cater for children's individual abilities.

They will allow the children to develop their ability to use recreational time in a useful way.

The activities offered include art/ craft, free play, cooking, organised games, painting, reading and board games.

Children are able to choose between the activities, free play, or a combination of the two.

Fees are charged on a sessional basis at \$5 per child per session and \$2.50 for a second child per session. Parents of children who attend regularly can pay weekly or fortnightly. Fee relief may be available.

All parents of children attending the programme must fill out registration forms available from the school office, and the children also must be booked in.

This can be done by telephoning the school office on 513581 or by personally telling the co-ordinator.
