The extraordinary rainfalls experienced statewide have also impacted locally, with both rural and urban residents remarking on effects. The heavy September and October rains have resulted saturated paddocks and overflowing dams which have caused some difficulties for livestock and for household adjoining rural properties. The excess water has spilled off over the land into already bursting roadside drains. The Drysdale/Clifton Springs road system has held up reasonably well, although some unsealed roads have developed scouring and soft edges. The Council, in its efforts to ensure public safety, almost ran short of "water across road" signs because of the many trouble spots across the peninsula. The wind, rain, and cold has meant that many a home gardener has had to delay plating of vegetable and flowering annuals, and that some locals have had their latel September seedlings spoilt. Another consequence of the recent poor weather has been the late flowering of one of Drysdale's more popular trees, the Red Flowering Gum.The Springs Drysdale/Clifton Garden Club report that exhibits at their monthly meetings have been down in number and quality owing to the poor conditions. Mr Kevin Steen, a Leading Hand at the Council nursery, has been keeping an accurate record of rainfall in Drysdale since

1977. His avid interest in this topic forms a fascinating snapshot of local

weather conditions over time. For example, in September 1989, Drysdale had approx 1.8" of rain. In the same month in 1990, 1.8", in 1991 3.6", and this year, 3.8". Rain fell locally on 12 days in October last year, on 16 days in October 1990 and on only 4 days in October 1977. (The driest year was 1982, when it rained on 91 days, totalling 1570 points. Last year it rained on a total of 154 days, totalling 2832 point, which is about the average). Drysdale has already had its average annual rainfall, with over 23 inches for the year to date.

An the seasons turn! With the recent warmer weather, grass growth is flourishing, snakes become a hazard and some residents living on unsealed roads are again having to kope with rising dust!



30 BED HOSTEL FOR THE AGED AT PORTARLINGTON

The Community is supporting the establishment of a hostel to provide quality care for the aged in the northern part of the Bellarine Peninsula



.The North Bellarine Hostel for the Aged Inc. is working to build a 30 bed Hostel at Portarlington.

The Hostel will be built on an excellent site adjacent to the Lions Retirement

Village.

The Committee, which was democratically elected at a public meeting, investigated twelve sites before deciding on the chosen site at Portarlington. Five sites at Drysdale, two at St. Leonards, and five at Portarlington were examined. Their ability to meet several predetermined criteria was carefully measured over a period of time to make sure that the best result would be achieved.

The North Bellarine Hostel For The Aged Inc. has embarked on an intense managed capital appeal to raise the local contribution to enable the building to be built. The appeal is now gaining momentum, and at this time \$171,288+ has been given or promised towards the \$820,000 needed for the local contribution towards the \$1.7m. project.

The appeal is based on personal contact, and personal example, and a team of volunteers will call on local residents and invite them to consider making a thoughtfully considered contribution to this worthy cause over the next three years.

The fundraising committee is not seeking ad hoc donations. The only way that a target figure of \$820,000 can be reached is if everyone recognises the importance of this project that will enable our Aged to be accommodated close to family and friends, and then makes a generous commitment over the next three years within their own personal capacity.

Mrs. Jean Cull, the Appeal Chairperson, is leading the volunteers who believe that a Hostel here will provide quality care for our loved ones close to family and friends. We do need as many people as possible to assist at whatever level they are able, and interested persons may contact the appeal office at Shop 5, No. 3 Harding Street, Portarlington. COUNCII CODNED:

The State Government's phased abolition of the former 'minimum rate' will result in the inclusion of a 'municipal charge' on your 1992-93 rate notice, in order to recoup nearly \$1 million shortfall in rate revenue.

The charge applies to most of Victoria's 210 councils and will not generate any additional revenue for the Council, but is simply a reallocation of the rate burden among

all ratepayers.

The Council will phase-in the charge over two years to ease the financial burden. The 92-93 charge will be \$18.00.

out The big winners Government imposed abolition of the minimum rate will be 27 percent of Bellarine ratepayers who own lower valued properties. Vacant land owners can expect up to \$70.00 reduction for their rate bill.

A brochure explaining the new charge will accompany the rate

MAKING FRIENDS



Many residents in Clifton Springs/Drysdale may not be aware programme that aims to link people together in their local community.

Called "Linking Neighbours", it provides an opportunity for both long time and new residents to establish informal networks of friendship and support. "It's a great way to meet a new person in the area with similar interests.

In days gone by, it was common practice for new residents to be welcomed with a cuppa and a chat. But with the rapid growth of numbers of both older and younger families moving into the area, such practices are difficult to maintain. "I can just take a break, and pop around for a cuppa."

Linking Neighbours acts as a catalyst to rekindle the process, with the emphasis on mutual, friendly "neighbourhood" contact, and acknowledges that each participant has qualities, skills and knowledge to offer and share in

the relationship.

People are linked according to their stated interest and the nature of the contact envisaged. Links are formed across the district, within walking distance or a short drive. "All you've got at home is baby talk - it's great

to know you haven't lost all power of communication."

Flexibility is a feature of "the link" - people can choose to form lasting friendships, develop special grandparent/grandchild relationships, or just meet casually down the street to say "hi". It's a great way to get beyond that often difficult first step into the community. "People no longer have their extended family close by. "Adopting" a surrogate parent or grandparent or auntie really fills that gap."

PEOPLE PLACE....

MR BERNARD FILBAY CAPTAIN, DRYSDALE URBAN FIRE BRIGADE

The Portarlington/Drysdale Lions Club have just awarded Bernard their Community Services Award in recognition of his outstanding service to the people in our district. Mr Filbay's achievements are many and varied. He has been an active member of Rotary, (and received their Paul Harris Fellowship Award); a member of the Drysdale Community Health Centre; and for nearly ten vears now, the Captain of the fire brigade.

Married for 32 years, with two sons and three young grandchildren, Bernard has lived in Drysdale all his life and has a deep sense of belonging and commitment to the people and

the district.

As Captain, Bernard's duties are extensive and carry huge responsibility. In addition to the supervision and delegation of tasks to his officers and the on-going implementation of Standing Orders, Bernard also has ultimate authority to develop the fire fighting strategy, order an evacuation, and to direct other emergency services in a fire related incident. All of this requires considerable clear and quick thinking, and an appreciation of the many complex factors involved, particularly in relation to the safety of life, property and livestock. Established in 1944, the



Drysdale Brigade has approximately 45 volunteers and holds monthly meeting and training sessions, in addition to regular Sunday checks of equipment. Most recently, the crew responded to a house fire in Clifton Springs, which fortunately suffered minimal damage due to the quick and efficient action of the brigade. The owners have expressed their gratitude and urge locals to support the brigade in its' fundraising efforts. Mr Filbay is an accountant administration at Deakin University, and his interests include water skiing and vintage engines. "The brigade has a special place in my life", said Bernard, "and it is such an important service. It is important also to keep the juniors interested through the competition teams - and Drysdale earns a lot of prestige through or team's success across the state."

With his eye on the future, Bernard is also helping to establish two major new projects for the town, a new community health centre, and a new fire station. The recent award from the Lions Club is indeed a fitting tribute to a man who has given so much, so graciously, to our com-

munity.
