



turned Soldiers, Sailors Imperial League of Australia.

Mr A Pratt was elected President, a position he held until 1947.

Meetings were held in Drysdale & Portarlington, and later at St Leonards; the first one to be held in Drysdale was on March 19, 1935. Meetings were held in the Shire Office, now the Historical Centre, each month until October 2, 1939 when, due to the commencement of World War II, meetings ceased to be held; they were recommenced on September 28, 1944.

In the meantime, the Sub-Branch members concentrated their efforts on comfort funds, Red Cross, and other organisations that assisted serving men & women engaged in the war.

At the cessation of hostilities the Sub-Branch grew in numbers, until eventually there were enough members to warrant the formation of a Sub-Branch in Drysdale. This was done in 1952. Prior to this, money was raised by public subscription & other efforts which enabled the Sub-Branch to purchase the present site of the R&SL club rooms in Princess Street, Drysdale, in appreciation of the services rendered during the 1939/45 War, for those who returned & those who paid the Supreme Sacrifice.

The first office-bearers of the Sub-Branch were: President, J. Hornby; Hon. Secretary, W. Nicholas; Treasurer, G. Mortimer. The Trustees of the building were H. Williams, S. Hutchinson, W. Nicholas, K. McKeirnan, L. McGregor, R. Campbell & R. Reynolds. H. Williams was Hon. Auditor from 1952 until 1985.

The Sub-Branch has now recorded they have one State Councillor, W. Jones; three Life Members, F. Edsall, B. Wilson & G. Malcolm.

ANZAC DAY SERVICE



obligation of voluntary service in peace, caring for the dependants of comrades who died on service, or subsequently because of service. There are about 7,500 Legatees - all volunteers - in Australia caring for approximately 120,500 widows & their dependants.

The Geelong Legacy Club, the second oldest in Australia, was formed in 1925 and covers the area from Lara through Geelong, the Bellarine Peninsula, Bannockburn & Anglesea with approximately 2,000 widows under its care, spread through that area. There are 109 members in the Geelong Club, 97 active, plus 12 on reserve. The 97 active Legatees have about 20 widows each in their care, and devote a great deal of time to ensure that those widows are given the best possible attention & advice.

They assist with the preparation of applications for pensions & appeals, provide ad-

vocates to help with presentations to the Review Board, make available financial or other assistance where needed, see that dependant children receive a sound education, and many other things that from time to time need attention.

All of this, of course, requires a great deal of money, which is raised by a public appeal during Legacy Week each year in September, and by generous donations from people who consider Legacy a worthy cause.

There are many voluntary organisations that care for others in need, but Legacy is uniquely Australian; it has upheld a high standard of care for over 70 years, and although we have always hoped that the time would come when that care was no longer needed, it would seem that people have not learned the lessons of war, and we will be on the job for a long time yet.



The United Services Home



Architectural Drawing by Major Albert Purchas of The United Services Home, Crimea St., Drysdale, which was built and opened in 1891.

The Home has been classified by the National Trust of Australia, and placed on the Register of the National Estate.

The building has been substantially restored and is occupied by the present owners Ron and Maureen Green.

A Brief History

Late in the 19th Century. Major General Sir Alexander Tulloch discovered many exsoldiers and sailors existing in deplorable conditions, sleeping in lanes & under bridges.

The idea came to him to establish a miniature "Chelsea Home". Moneys were raised, the then Bellarine Shire donated the land, and Major Purchas prepared the plans to accommodate 16 inmates. The building was opened on 1 July 1891.

One of the original inmates served at Waterloo - others in Sudan, Crimea, India, and even "Eureka Stockade", Ballarat. As some inmates became ill, they went to Geelong. Others who passed away are buried in the Drysdale Cemetery. On the north eastern slope is a neatly enclosed area, dominated by an octagonal monument on which are inscribed the names of the men buried in the enclosure.

Annually, on the closest Sunday to Balaclava Day, 25 October, a special historical pilgrimage is held. The service is organised by the R.S.L. and a visiting British officer is usually the Guest Speaker.

This year the service will be held at 2.30pm on Sunday, October 23.



Price - still only \$6.



Adult Day Activities Programs

Two years ago the four Community Health Centres on the Bellarine Peninsula amalgamated to form the Bellarine Peninsula Community Health Service.

As a result of the amalgamation there has been a restructure in the Day Centre Programs. These programs are now part of the Community Support Program, and instead of two co-ordinators, there is now one.

Monica Sweatman, who was the Co-ordinator of the Portarlington Day Centre Program, has been appointed to this position of Community Support Co-ordinator.

The following groups/activities are provided within the Community Support Program:

- Adult Day Activities, which assist individuals who are elderly, frail, intellectually, physically or psychologically disabled (young & old). The assistance provided to these individuals include socialisation, as well as physical & psychological support.
- Family relief, which provides a respite service for

clients with memory loss or general disabilities, who cannot be left on their own at home, so are looked after at the Centre.

- Carers Support through group sessions.
- Parkinson's Support Group.
- Arthritis Support Group.
- · Hydrotherapy.

Each of the Services from the four Community Health Centres situated at Portarlington, Drysdale, Ocean Grove & Point Lonsdale can provide this support.

The President of the Local Advisory Committee, Mr Bernard Filbay, who has served on the committee since 1961, welcomed guests and reviewed the history of the work of many years and many dedicated workers which has culminated in the completion of the Drysdale & Community Health Centre.

The Drysdale Bush Nursing Centre was established in 1922; in 1939 a cottage was transported to land in Princess Street donated by the then Shire President, Mr George Wisbey, & in 1965 a waiting room & surgery were added. Funds were raised initially by paper drives, using trucks lent by farmers, cars & trailers - hard work for a small return.

In 1970 Mr Howard Peel, a member of the local Advisory Committee & a member of the Geelong Agricultural & Pastoral Society arranged for volunteers to man the gates & the ticket boxes at the Annual Shows; with the assistance of members of the local Fire Brigade the list of volunteers has grown to almost 120 and an amount equivalent to \$100,000 in to-day's terms has been raised.

Other principal donors have been local organizations such as Combined Church Guilds, C.W.A., Golf Clubs, Bowling Club, Callisthenics group, Craft Shop, and coffee mornings held by Jessie Lewis & Joyce Hammond. An anonymous donor (\$1000); the Edsall, Lawn & Ross families. The Rotary Club of Drysdale (\$13,000). Ladies Auxiliary (\$25,000). Drysdale / Portarlington Lions Club (\$10,000). CWA (\$5000). Minister for Health (\$70000). The Garden Club (Landscaping & planting).






