

# "SpringDale" GETS A LIFT

#### **New Cottage Extensions**

The future of the Spring-Dale Community Cottage received a big boost when Member for Bellarine Garry Spry announced a major funding injection of \$36,000 for the expansion of the SpringDale Community Cottage.

Mr Spry said: "The grant has been made available by the Minister for Community Services the Hon Michael John through the Occasional Care Capital Grants program in response to the Cottage's application for an urgently needed addition to the existing facilities.

"The extra room will cater for "Occasional Care", "Take a Break" and a "Three Year Old Kindergarten" needs specifically." "These services are in response to the rapid growth of Drysdale Children's Services Centre which has recently asked SpringDale to assist with its expanding demand.

"Emergency child care support for families without an established family network, is also a service which will benefit from this much needed addition.

"The extraordinary community acceptance of the Drysdale Community Cottage, particularly after the commissioning in November last year of its new building, is a phenomenal testament to the Committee of Management, the programs which are being conducted there, and the benefit the community derives from the service," said Mr Spry.

The extension is to be added to the rear of the existing building, and plans are currently being drawn up by the City of Greater Geelong. Completion is scheduled for September, 1994.



# Pharmacy News,

# by Robin Humphrey (Taken from 'The Pharmaceutical Journal') URINARY INCONTINENCE.

There are many people in the community who suffer with incontinence and many of these people do not seek help. Perhaps they are embarrassed to discuss the problem, or perhaps they do not realise that there is help available.

There are several different types of incontinence and many factors which can cause the problem. Some of these factors are:

- An ineffective urinary sphincter which allows some leakage during physical activity.
- 2. Weak pelvic floor muscles which make it difficult to close the urethra. (The tube leading urine out of the bladder).
- 3.An obstruction of the urethra can prevent complete emptying of the bladder. This could be caused by an enlarged prostate gland in men. Another cause could be severe constipation.

4. Environmental reasons such as difficulty in access to a toilet. There may be mobility or dexterity problems.

- 5. Urinary tract infection or other medical problems.
- 6.Certain Drugs for example diuretics and sedatives.

To effectively manage the problem one must first determine the cause. This may mean talking to your doctor to determine if there is a medical problem present.

To reduce incontinence there are three main areas that require attention.

- 1. One needs to drink 6 to 9 cups of fluid each day as reducing fluid intake can make incontinence worse. Don't drink too much tea or coffee, especially in the evening.
- Avoid constipation and being overweight. A good way to deal with these problems is to increase the fibre content of your diet.

3.Increase the amount of general exercise such as walking or swimming. Pelvic floor exercises will help people with problems in this area

People with incontinence which doesn't improve with the above measures may need to undergo bladder retraining. A health professional could help with this type of program.

About 50% of incontinence sufferers will resolve their problem with implementing these measures.

For people who still have problems there are medications which may help, and there are many incontinence pad and pants available. Some are disposable while others are reusable. Your pharmacy has a range of these products.

If you have an incontinence problem or if you know of someone else who has such a problem don't tolerate it. Do see your doctor, nurse, pharmacist or other health care person.



## WELL WOMEN'S CLINICS

opened in Drysdale.

This will give women a chance to have routine pap smears and breast checks.

According to the Victorian Cancer Registry, about 100 women die of cervical cancer each year. Most of those have never had a pap smear or have not had them every two years.

The good news is that 90 per cent of cervical cancer may be prevented with adequate screening.

Many women feel too embarrassed or scared to have pap

Well Women's Clinics have smears more often. A lack of accessible services also prevents some country women from being regularly checked.

> Women's Health Nurses from the Bellarine Peninsula Community Health Service conduct these clinics on a rotating basis in Ocean Grove, Drysdale, Portarlington and Point Lonsdale.

# The NEW BELLARINE SECONDARY COLLEGE

Further developments have taken place following the decision to develop a major Years 712 campus on the central Bellarine site on the Cnr of Grubb Road and Andersons Road. Drysdale.

On Saturday, June 18, the Member for Bellarine Garry Spry and General Manager, Barwon/South Western Region of the Directorate of School Education, Don Tyrer, hosted a 'sausage sizzle' to give parents, students and teachers of schools in the region an opportunity to have a look at this marvellous location.

The event was well attended with a steady stream of interested persons coming through.

Bill Dix, Chairman of Commissioners of the City of Greater Geelong, also took the opportunity to have a look at the site.

Final soil testing of the area confirmed that the site was suitable for development and the first intake of students at year 7 is expected in 1997.

The school will have a capacity for about 1200 students and the VCE Years 11 & 12 cohort will be in the region of 500, which will enable a full curriculum to be developed.







Local doctors, health carers, & other specialists in the care of the aged were recently invited for a preview of the new aged care hostel at Drysdale.





## THE SNUFFLY CAT

In our last edition we talked about coughs and colds in dogs; snuffles and sneezing are common complaints for cats too.

The most common causes of colds and flu in cats are the two Feline Respiratory Viruses: the Herpesvirus and the Calicivirus.

Both these viruses are highly contagious. Signs include sneezing, snotty nose, runny eyes and conjunctivitis, ulcers in the mouth and less commonly, coughing.

The disease varies in severity. Some cats only develop mild snuffles and sneezing with runny eyes and nose and are otherwise quite healthy. Most of these cats recover within 4-5 days.

Coughing is seen less commonly in cats compared to dogs but its causes are just as varied and diverse.

The respiratory viruses as discussed above can cause coughing especially in more severe cases. Often a cough

In more severe cases, cats develop secondary bacterial infections with a snotty nose and pussy eyes.

They can become very depressed and won't eat or drink. These cats are at risk of developing pneumonia and could eventually die if not treated.

Occasionally cats that have had a severe secondary infection of the nasal passages (i.e., sinusitis and rhinitis) develop a chronic snotty nose and have to be treated with long term antibiotics.

Even after recovery, however, cats carry the virus and can succumb to mild symptoms of flu if they become stressed or run down. These

in a cat is triggered by the common furball irritation and doesn't persist; nor is the cat sick in any other way.

of persistent coughing in cats is allergic bronchitis, or asthma, which can be treated



cats are also a source of infection to other cats.

Cat flu is best prevented by vaccination and we recommend routine vaccination against these viruses.

Some vaccinated cats can still get very mild symptoms i.e., runny eyes and nose if they are run down but they don't develop the severe form of the disease.

There are other causes of conjunctivitis and nasal discharges in cats such as fungal agents, Chlamydia, foreign bodies, nasal polyps and tumours.

If your cats develop pussy discharges in the eyes or nose then you should consult your veterinarian.

Some of these cats have trouble breathing and this is often the first noticed sign. Other causes of coughing are lungworm (which is not very common) and other respiratory infections.

If your cat develops a persistent cough or seems to have trouble breathing, you should consult your veterinarian. Sometimes it's necessary to take a chest xray to establ i sh the cause and severity of the problem.

# Confributions from Readers Tips and Hints

If what you are doing doesn't work, you might like to try one of the following:

To Keep Chimneys Clean

Take a baked bean tin, small preserved fruit tin, or tin of similar size, crushed to save space, and place tin in the fire. After 3 fires remove tin & put another one in. While the fire is burning with the tin in it, a vapour goes up the chimney or flue, and brings the soot down. Make sure it is a tin can - aluminium soft drink cans or steel beer cans don't work.

This treatment never fails. The soot comes down into the ashes & when fireplaces, heaters, grates or stoves are cleaned out, ash & potash are put into the compost bin or on the garden.

I might add that within 150 miles, or 240 Kms of Melbourne those areas badly lack potash in the soil, according to the Victorian Agricultural Department.

lacking copper sulphate in the soil.

To prevent leaf curl in stone fruit trees drive a 2-1/2cm copper nail into the tree trunk, but don't break off the bark. According to the size of the tree more than one nail might be required. Drive the next nail into the trunk not quite opposite the first, & about 2-1/2cms higher.

Your tree should be free of leaf curl for 3 to 4 years, when the procedure can be repeated. Copper nails can be obtained at hardware stores & boat supply agents.

To Control wilt in Tomato
Plants

When the main stalk of the plant grows to the size of a pencil or ball point pen, take a 7-1/2cm length of bare copper wire (7-strand copper earth wire is the correct size), cutting the wire on an angle so you can get a point.

Place one finger behind the stalk just above the soil, push the point of the wire right through the stalk, pull it through until the ends are even, & bend the wire round the stalk.

The wire remains until the plant is finished, and prevents wilt. Wilt is a fungus which comes up through the root system, & placing the copper wire through the plant & close to the soil stops the progress of the fungus.

For Cauliflowers

The following hints were passed on to me 70 years ago by my father, who had learned them 60 years before that from a Chinese market gardener, & there's no better gardeners anywhere in the world than the Chinese.

If your caulis aren't starting a flower, instead of pulling them out, just take a sharp pointed knife & 2-1/2cms below where the leaves form on the main stalk, push the blade right through the stalk, twist the blade sideways & push some small wood chips into the space. Gently withdraw the knife & leave the chips in place for the life of the plant.

The flowers don't set if the outer skin of the stalk is too tough, which doesn't allow enough air to get inside.

By opening up the stalk more air is allowed in; leaves of all plants breathe in air & the roots draw moisture from the soil, & the combination of air & moisture creates sugar energy to feed all plants to grow.

My father was also told cauliflowers flower & grow well if a mixture of one part urine to three parts water is applied down the rows three times a week after opening the bark. Flowers should set 8 to 10 days after splitting bark.

This time of the year does have some advantages. It is the best time of the year to be moving things around the garden as most plants are fairly dormant and the transplant won't upset them too much if it is done properly.

When moving established plants make sure that you take as large a root ball as possible to the new location. When planting in the new spot try to

look its best from where you will see it the most, give it a good water in and a light feed. If all is well then Spring should yield some positive results.

> Pruning of fruit trees and roses is another popular pastime during this part of the year, and yes, it is the right time to do it. When pruning your fruit trees remember not to be over enthusiastic, the chainsaw is for removing trees, not pruning them.

The general aim of pruning a fruit tree is to encourage growth out and away from the

> This shape maximises the amount of sunlight into the tree which into turn allows better ripening of fruit.

> Rose pruning is roughly along similar lines, promoting outward growth on healthy stems, which in turn will provide flowers in due course. Any diseased, dead, or dying wood, (usually noticeable by a wrinkly stem, discoloured brown or grey wood,) should be taken out of the bush.

> Roses are quite tough and will generally recover from the worst pruning, the shape however may take a little more time to restore.

> Clean up all of the dead leaves and prunings around your roses and send them off to the tip. They are no use as compost, not only because of the thorns, but because they can harbor fungal diseases.
