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

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
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GREAT NEWS!

The new Ambulance Station in Grubb Road will be officially opened by the Hon. Marie Tehan, M.L.A., Minister for Health, at 11am, on 4th November!

After many years of lobbying the respective State Governments, the residents were successful in obtaining a promise for funding for an Ambulance Station.

The land donated by the then Bellarine Rural City Council in Grubb Road, Drysdale was chosen as it is the most central point from which to serve the whole of the Bellarine Peninsula including Queenscliff and Barwon Heads. Response times will be reduced from



20-30 minutes at present to 4-10 minutes in the future.

The Bellarine Ambulance Auxiliary recognizes the support given by the residents, organizations and corporate businesses by achieving the target for \$100,000 to purchase a fully equipped ambulance, which already has been purchased.

This now gives us a 24-hour, two-vehicle station, and a feeling of greater security for all residents.

An Open Day will be arranged at a later date to enable the community to inspect the complex, showing Ambulance and SES facilities, and to gain an insight to what the area will look like when the Secondary College is also built.

A Working Day by the Ambulance Auxiliary and SES to plant out the garden beds prepared by the City of Greater Geelong will have the area ready for the Official Opening, 11am, Friday, 4 November by the Hon. Marie Tehan, M.L.A., Minister for Health.





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ASTHMA AND THE SPRINGTIME.

Spring is a delightful time of year; however, it brings many airborne allergens which can be a danger for many asthma sufferers. The most common allergens which can trigger asthma attacks are house dust mites, animal dander, fungal spores and pollens. It is important that asthma sufferers make a serious effort to minimise the risk of asthma attacks by avoiding their particular trigger allergens. Some suggestions for this are as follows:

1. Dust-mite allergen avoidance.

a.Ventilate rooms by opening windows as much as possible.

b.Avoid fluffy toys or articles.

c.Wash bed-linen in hot water- above 50 C.

d.Encase mattresses, pillows and doonas in special mite-proof coverings. Make sure the items are thoroughly dry before doing this, otherwise they may become mouldy.

e. Avoid wall to wall carpets, especially in the bedroom. Floors should be cleaned regularly.

2. Pollen avoidance.

a. Wear sunglasses when outside to prevent pollens from entering the eyes.

b. Avoid dusty areas especially where crops are being grown or harvested.

c. Avoid blossoming trees or flowers.

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d. Use a surgical mask to avoid inhaling pollens from grass clippings if you must mow the lawn.

3. Fungal spore avoidance.

The bathroom should be thoroughly cleaned to remove any mould. The bathroom also needs to be well ventilated to reduce mould growth.

4. Animal dander avoidance.

Keep away from animals to which you know you are allergic.

The Six-Point Management Plan

A Six-Point Management Plan has been developed by the National Asthma Campaign to help asthma sufferers. If you are not aware of this plan then it would be wise to discuss it with your doctor. The six points stressed in the plan are as follows:

1. Knowing how severe your asthma is.

2. Achieving your best lung function.

3. Determining your asthma trigger allergens and avoiding them.

4. Using appropriate medication to keep at your best lung function.

5. Having an action plan worked out with your doctor on how to manage an asthma attack.

6. Seeing your doctor regularly to check on your asthma management.

Asthmatics who use a nebuliser pump must maintain their equipment in top working order. If this is not carried out they run the risk of it not working efficiently during an emergency or life threatening situation.

Allersearch and Pharmacy SelfCare have developed a 3 - step maintenance plan for nebuliser pumps.

1. ONCE a year, have the nebuliser tested for correct air flow and pressure at your pharmacy.

2. TWICE a year, replace the jet nebuliser especially if it is used on a daily basis and keep a spare jet nebuliser on hand in case of emergencies.

3. THREE times a week use a specially formulated disinfectant on the jet nebuliser, mouth pieces or masks and peak flow meters to help reduce contamination from bacteria and moulds.

PAP'S WE SHOULD!!

For most women, having a pap smear has never been a frequent favourite. But considering its success in preventing cervical cancer in over 90% of women. ... 'paps' we should reconsider.

Well Women's Clinics are conducted at the Drysdale Community Health Centre by trained Women's Health Nurses. These nurses provide "well women" with this routine checkup in a relaxed and informal manner.

Screening is particularly poor in women over 50 years of age even though these women are at high risk of invasive cervical cancer. Pap smears every two years can prevent this.

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TAX CORNER, Motor Vehicle Expenses

If you use your Motor Car for cludes a record of the followbusiness purposes whether in ing:

the capacity as an employee or a self employed person, then you may be entitled to claim a tax deduction for that Motor Vehicle.

Car expenses are defined to include all running costs (fuel, registration, insurance, repairs, services), interest on money borrowed to purchase a car, lease costs and depreciation (only where the vehicle is owned).

There are basically four methods available to you to substantiate car expenses:

1. Log book Method

This method has the following requirments:

- Maintain a log book for ٠ a continuous period of 12 weeks to establish business usage.
- Maintain documentary . evidence of car expenses

A taxpayer is essentially required to record all business trips in the log book which in-

- date of trip
- odometer reading at the start and end of the trip
- number of kilometres travelled purpose of trip
- name of the driver
- date on which the entry is made
- name of person making the entry
- signature by the person making the log book entry for each entry

Please note that where a number of trips are made during the day, it is permissible to record one entry for the total journey. The tax deduction claimed is based on the business percentage arrived at via the log book which is applied against the car expenses incurred during the year.

2. 1/3 of actual car expense

This method can only be used if you travel more than 5000 km for business. A log book is not required to be maintained, however, you must keep a reasonable estimate of kilometres travelled. A taxpayer is also required to maintain documentary evidence of car expenses incurred during the year. The tax deduction claimed is calculated as 1/3 of the car expenses incurred.

3. 12% of Cost

This method also can only be

used where the total business kilometres travelled exceed 5000 km. Although there is no requirement to maintain a log book, a taxpayer is required to have a reasonable estimate of business kilometres travelled during the year. Documentary evidence must also be maintained of the cost of the vehicle, The tax deduction claimed is calculated at 12% of the cost of the car (up to a cost limit).

4. Set Rate Per Kilometre

This method is only available to be used by a taxpayer who travels no more than 5000 business kilometres. There is no requirement to maintain a log book, however, a reasonable estimate of business kilometres should be kept. The tax deduction claimed is calculated as follows:

Total business km x set rate per kilometre.

The set rate per kilometre is determined by the engine capacity of the motor vehicle owned by the taxpayer. Please note that this method cannot be used if a taxpayer travels more than 5000 km for business purposes.

It is very important that whichever method is used by you to claim a car expense that you meet the substantiation requirements set down by the Income Tax Assessment Act. If you are unsure of your obligations please contact your Accountant or-feel free to contact me.



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Drysdale Fire Brigade

350 guests at 50th **Anniversary dinner**

Formed in 1944, Drysdale Urban Brigade is a particularly strong brigade in every aspect and has a proud history, this being celebrated in style over a weekend last month. The celebrations took the form of a torchlight procession through the town, a dinner attended by more than 350 people and an open day at the station.

Drysdale Brigade received excellent support from district brigades for the torchlight procession, 14 other brigades joining in for a spectacular opening to an historic weekend.

The dinner was a particular highlight for present and past members, many of the latter category being in attendance with some making a special trip from interstate.

At the dinner a compiled history of the brigade was launched. "The First 50 Years" is an extensive publication of 60 pages which contains a wonderful coverage of the brigade,

its activities and its membership from the formation in 1944 until the present day.

In welcoming everyone to the dinner on the brigade's behalf, Firefighter Ray Bennett made particular reference to Captain Laurie Thomason who represented the Country Fire Authority, Urban Association representative exCaptain **Royce Collier, Regional Officer** Ken Stephens, Mr Gary Spry MLA and Mr Ian Couper of the City of Greater Geelong.

Congratulations and tributes to the brigade came from a number of visitors during a toast list. The toast to Drysdale

Fire Brigade was proposed by Mr Spry, who commented on the brigade's great tradition of service and some of its achievements.

Captain Thomason, a Member of the CFA Board, presented the Brigade with two framed certificates, one denoting 50 years service by Drysdale Urban Brigade and the other giving similar recognition to Drysdale Rural Brigade. The two brigades operate in conjunction with each other, with the rural brigade actually being formed in 1942.

It was a very proud Captain Bernard Filbay who accepted these certificates and acknowledged the commendations to his brigade.

He referred to the brigade's endeavour to be an efficient unit and mentioned the importance of competition work - "the grassroots of a good and efficient brigade."

This has been proved at Drysdale where a strong competition team has existed for much of the brigade's history. Many of the members involved in this activity have gone on to officer status.

Another reason for the obviously successful functioning of Drysdale Brigade is strong and stable leadership. In 50 years there have been only four Captains:

Bob Clarke, (1944-51), Cec Bennett (1951-73), Harold Peel (1973-82), and the present Captain, Bernard Filbay, who has served since 1982.



"A Truly Remarkable Effort!"

On 3 November 1993 these were the words the Minister for Community Services, the Honourable Michael John, M.P. used to describe the achievement of converting a \$20,000 Government Grant into the SpringDale Community Cottage that opened its doors that day, just twelve months ago.

On the eve of yet another opening, Ambulance & SES, marking once again a truly remarkable effort by the community of Clifton Springs/Drysdale, we at SpringDale can look back over a year of incredibly hard work, some disappointments and many, many successes. May we list a few of these successes?

The number of participants in the classes which SpringDale runs has increased by some 286%.

The subjects covered range from Creative Writing to Decoupage, from Introduction to Computers to Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation, and just about everything in between.

Our tutors are local people & our students come from all over the Peninsula & the Greater Geelong area.

We have forged a link with Skillshare, to provide accommodation locally for their employment programmes, so that our residents, who are unemployed & seeking retraining, do not have to travel to Geelong, another added cost burden, to update their skills.



Facilities for child care in the area have also been very limited, especially for parents who are not in the work force. To overcome this problem we applied for, & successfully gained, a one-off grant to build an extension to the little Cottage, which will enable us to offer 'Take a Break' & other children's services, hopefully by February next year. Building starts in the next few weeks.

A number of Single Interest Groups have been started by our Volunteers. Trimliners, Bellarine Writers, Toy Library just to name a few, & there are others in the pipeline.

We have actively supported the establishment of Neighbourhood Watch & Drysdale Apex Club, especially through the pages of the "Messenger".

The Messenger itself has grown dramatically from eight pages in November '92 to twelve pages November '93, and this issue twentyeight pages. For this we must acknowledge the continued support of our advertisers, for without them we could not produce your "FREE" Community newspaper. The more they advertise, the more community information we can afford to print & so keep you, the residents of Drysdale/Clifton Springs and the rest of the northern side of the Peninsula up to date with what goes on in your community.

The new Community Noticeboard is the latest addition to our Community Information Service.

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VALID NEWS

Caring for the Intellectually Disabled in this State can be a pretty daunting prospect. Over 5,000 adults need accommodation plans and options. Over the past ten years, State Government expenditure on Intellectual Disability Services has gone from \$50m to over \$300m.

During this same period, the increase in accommodation support places - the number

one priority in Intellectual Disability Services - has increased by just 50 places, from app. 3,650 in 1983 to app. 3,700 in 1993/94.

In addition to the 3,700 registered clients receiving accommodation support, 1,000 are thought to be living independently. Given that there are app. 10,000 adults registered to receive services, that leaves app. 5,300 registered adults still living with their families. H&CS reports that only 3,000 have indicated that they need accommodation support, but all families need accommodation plans and respite options, to sustain them into the future.

While H&CS reports app.
300 on their "officially urgent"
list for accommodation support, each of the 1,400+ clients living with parents over age 60 should be considered in serious and immediate need of accommodation plans and respite options.

The pool is open 7 days a week for public swimming.



from Bellarine State Emergency Service Unit, Drysdale

The Victoria State Emergency Service (VICSES) is a state-wide organization formed to combat the effects of natural and man-made emergencies.

VICSES is the response authority for floods, earthquakes, and storms, and provides an essential, and often life-saving, road accident rescue service.

Bellarine SES Unit services the entire Bellarine Peninsula including Queenscliff and Pt Lonsdale to the east, and Newcomb and Whittington to the west, although assistance would be provided to other units when requested in other areas of the City of Greater Geelong and beyond.



The main activities of VICSES are as follows :


<u>Floods:</u>- When severe flooding occurs, it is the VIC-SES volunteers who help relocate evacuees, remove stock to safe areas, and supervise the construction of emergency levee banks.

Storms:-When storms occur VICSES volunteers are quickly on the scene, making temporary repairs to ensure buildings are secure until owners can arrange for permanent repairs to be done.

Earthquake and Civil Defence:- In the event of earthquake, the VICSES, has the combat responsibility for rescue, safety and clear up. It also has the combat responsibility for civil defence activities.

History of the Bellarine SES Unit :

The Bellarine SES Unit held their first meeting on May 24, 1977 (known initially as the Civil Defence Unit) -



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meeting originally at the Clifton Springs Community Centre. The Shire of Bellarine allocated the use of the current headquarters in Ocean Grove to the Bellarine Unit in October 1978, with members using private vehicles to provide emergency services. The first vehicle, a Holden panel van plus a rescue trailer, was acquired by the Bellarine SES Unit on January 18, 1980.

The Bellarine SES Unit participated in the Ash Wednesday bushfires during Feb 1983, with assistance provided to the Lorne, Anglesea and Torquay regions.

Communication equipment, including UHF radios and pagers, has been continually updated. The Bellarine SES Unit was provided with the life saving "Jaws of Life" on April 30, 1985, to be followed by the provision of the hydraulic cutting shears on May 3, 1985.

The relocation of the Bellarine SES Unit to the new Bellarine Ambulance and SES Joint Facility in Grubb Road is a positive move towards the provision of emergency services for the Bellarine Peninsula into the future.

The Bellarine SES Unit acknowledges the support of the community, the City of Greater Geelong - Bellarine District, the Ambulance Service Victoria South Western *continued page 21*

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Veterinary notes

Caring for your pets.

Look in Ear !

Ear complaints are one of the most common reasons that people bring their pets to vets.

Signs of ear trouble include shaking the head, holding an ear down, scratching the ears, the presence of a bad odour, or excessive amount of discharge coming from the ears, inflammation or pain in the area, and swelling of the ear flap.

The anatomy of dog and cat ears makes them prone to problems: the ear canal has a horizontal component leading from the ear drum and a vertical component extending to the outside. This enables wax, moisture, debris and foreign bodies, e.g. grass seeds, to become trapped in the horizontal section close to the ear drum.

Dogs with floppy ears, hairy ear canals, excessively waxy ear canals, and dogs that swim a lot are especially prone to problems.

If your pet shows any of the above signs of ear disease you should consult your vet. Examination of the ear can be difficult due to the narrow, windy nature of the canal, especially if the ear is sore. The instrument used to examine the ear is called an otoscope. In many cases sedation or general anaesthesia is necessary to examine and treat the ear.

The most common causes of ear disease are





bacterial and yeast infections. If there isn't too much discharge present treatment may just involve applying prescribed drops. In more severe cases however, the ear canal needs to be flushed and cleaned. Occasionally the infection recurs in which case your vet might advise a swab of the discharge to identify the infectious agent involved. If untreated, ear infections can extend past the ear drum to the middle and inner ear, causing loss of balance, lethargy, circling and depression.

Ear mites are often seen in kittens and puppies. The mites live in the wax glands of the ear canals and lead to excessive wax production and intense irritation. Ear mites are easily treated with insecticidal drops prescribed by a vet.

Foreign bodies, especially grass seeds, can easily become trapped in the ear canal, causing intense irritation. The animal will shake its head vigorously, hold its ear down and hold the head to that side. Your veterinarian will retrieve the object using a pair of special forceps; this is usually done under sedation or general anaesthesia.

Some ear conditions are related to generalised skin conditions, where the skin of the ear flap and the lining of the ear canal becomes inflamed and irritated, e.g. allergic skin disease. Treatment should be as directed by your veteri-

narian. Another common ear condition is an aural hematoma. This occurs when a dog shakes its head so vigorously that a blood vessel in the ear flap bursts and the flap fills up with blood. Treatment involves lancing the 'blood blister' and suturing the two sides of the ear flap together to prevent it filling up with fluid again.

If your pet is prone to ear problems the following preventative methods could be tried:

- Regularly clean the ears with an ear cleaning preparation to help dissolve wax and keep the ear canals dry.
- Pluck hairy ear canals.
- Dry your dog's ears after a swim and prevent water going in the ears during bathing.
- Air your dog's ears if they are long and floppy (as seen in Cocker Spaniels) by tying the ears above the head.

> The next task is to keep the birds off it until it begins to grow, which should be in one or two weeks. The first couple of mows should be fairly high, just to encourage the grass to thicken up. Don't forget to water, otherwise the new grass will burn off.

Tips and Hints

If what you are doing doesn't work, you might like to try one of the following:

To keep flowers & water fresh in vases for up to a month, take a piece of charcoal the size of a first thumb joint, add four or five small pieces of gravel, & place them in a piece of material big enough to pull together very tightly with thick string or cord so the stones & charcoal don't come out. Next put water into the vase as usual, drop the parcel of charcoal & stones into the bottom of the vase & arrange your flowers. At the end of the month you can remove the flowers, & if you feel like it, drink the



water, as all water supply pumps are packed with charcoal to purify the water.

I follow the practice of sowing vegetable seeds by the moon phases. Vegies that mature above soil, sow 3 days before the full moon; vegies that mature below soil, 3 days after the full moon. They come up quicker, grow faster, & taste better because the moon controls our weather & tides.


