

The children were disappointed to see him leave.


"Goodbye Bertie," they called "Please come again".





New Chaplain for Bellarine Secondary College.

James Veryzer, the new chaplain at the Bellarine Secondary College was warmly welcomed into the dual campus position last week by the Principal, Mr. Rob Hurley. James, having worked as the chaplain at Echuca Technical School for four years and relieving at Geelong High School, Footscray Girls High, Oberon and Scoresby takes over from Rod Scoullar as he takes up a position as chaplain at Hileybury Junior School at Brighton.

All 42 public secondary school chaplains in Victoria are employed by the Council for Christian Education in Schools. Even though chaplains do have a teaching role, their main task is to be available to students and the school community when they encounter problems not directly related to students subjects at school.

Some of the issues they tackle include suicide, grief and death. James Veryzer or "Chippo" as he is known by the students said "What we might consider as small things, seem to be major issues when you're young. I encourage them to change their perspective, get them to look forward to things." Mr. Veryzer said a lack of clear goals was one of the biggest problems among youth. School chaplaincy is funded partially from the State government, the CCES, fund-raising and donations made to the Bellarine Secondary College Chaplaincy Committee. COMMUNITY BENEFITS

A local community group will receive \$870.00 as part of Victorian Government funding to help them carry out their roles more efficiently and effectively, the State Member for Bellarine Garry Spry, announced today.

Mr. Spry said the works and services allocation was on top of the regular annual grants which the organisations received from the Victorian Government to provide a service or activity to the community.

"\$870.00 was granted to the SpringDale Community Cottage, Drysdale as a contribution towards fly screens and screen doors, ceiling fans to classrooms and kitchen, and chairs:", said Mr. Spry.

"In many instances, the cost of the items was quite small, but the agencies and groups were not able to set aside the money from their annual budgets".

"Community groups and organisations carry out a valuable role in their local areas, and this one-off grant funding will help them to do their job even more effectively," Mr. Spry said.

The Member for Bellarine, Garry Spry, also announced today that the State Government would provide over \$500,000 this year for child care needs of parents undertaking community based further education.

"Parents, in particular women with family responsibilities, will be able to access the range of courses on offer at Neighbourhood Houses and at Adult Learning and Community Centres, knowing their children are in safe, good quality care". Under the ACFE child care program, children can be cared for at registered child care centres or in family day care schemes.

Approximately 224 Neighbourhood Houses, Adult Learning Centre and community groups across the State have been approved to receive funding" concluded Mr. Spry. Those on the Bellarine Peninsula include:

\$8,700.00 (formerly the Whittington Neighbourhood Centre)

Ocean Grove Neighbourhood Centre \$1,811.78

Queenscliff Neighbourhood House \$2,414.25 SpringDale Community Centre \$2,718.75

How to fix those fleas

Fleas not only make life uncomfortable for infested animals, they act as a host to tapeworms and are the major cause of skin allergies in dogs and cats.

The biggest problem in fighting fleas is that adult fleas spend little time actually on an animal and most of the flea life cycle takes place in the surrounding environment, i.e. carpet, bedding, kennels, soil etc.

Flea control must then be aimed at:

1. Treating all animals in a household at the same time.

2. Treating the animals' environment.

Flea treatment for dogs and cats:

The modern flea treatments available focus on disrupting the flea's life cycle. Two products exist: Ovitrol, a spray which prevents larvae hatching into adult fleas and Program, a monthly paste which prevents fleas laying fertile eggs. The costs are approximately \$23.00 for the spray and from \$5.70 to \$10.70 per month for the paste depending on the size of your dog or cat and whether you purchase it singly or by the box.

BOTH THESE PRODUCTS HELP ENSURE THAT FLEAS WILL NOT RE-INFEST YOUR ANIMALS

Treating the environment:

1. Vacuum all areas thoroughly, including outdoor areas such as kennels and doormats.

2. Wash bedding frequently and use an insecticidal spray that will sterilise the flea eggs.

3. Keep areas free of debris and litter.

4. Use an insecticidal fogger inside, e.g.: Siphotrol (average cost per house approximately \$50.00 for a three bedroom home. This will treat a house for nine months.



The versatility of the electronics in the programmable hearing aids enables a large range of hearing losses to be appropriately fitted, and offer a range of adjustment alternatives not available in conventional aids. 





REMEMBER AUSTRALIA

1945-1995

"Give us the tools, and we will finish the job". Winston Churchill

Broadcast address. 9th February, 1941.

During the war, I was an assistant in the central 'Department of Aircraft' laboratory, Melbourne.

Our job was to assess gauges used in the manufacture of aircraft parts.

We had heard Churchill's vital address. So had the enemy. They infiltrated our laboratory and sabotaged our critically important work.

Within the Australian Department of Aircraft, Churchill's "tools to finish the job" were at serious risk - a significant victory for the enemies of the Allies.

They achieved this as the result of a calculated assault on laboratory staff morale. By cleverly using a campaign of misinformation, they turned friend against friend, staff against superiors. Standards deteriorated and output became unreliable.

People who should have been at work at their desks were crying in the sick bay, presenting sick leave certificates, even having full-blown nervous breakdowns.

Once, we went on strike!

Some of us were vulnerable teenagers, which made it easy for the saboteurs. Others were hardened workers, who still fell to the strategies of malicious gossip and manipulated division of loyalties.

One of the older employees was, incidentally, an aunt of Richard (later Sir Richard) Attenborough. Complications deepened when the Communists, legalised in December 1942, entered the laboratory and stirred up staff rights issues.

We were caught between intrigues of the Nazi Fifth Column and the Communists.

It didn't leave much energy for reliable assessment of Winston Churchill's vital "tools".

As an insecure and very shy teenager I was particularly vulnerable. For many years after the war I found any argument by anyone, even at a distance, unbearably distressing.

At the time we knew we were in trouble. We knew work was being seriously jeopardised by our deep divisions and mistrust of one another. We found out why just before my health finally gave way: a major inquiry detected the saboteur who had been working for the Nazi Fifth Column. The saboteur disappeared. The Communist, now legal, stayed.

So did other Communists who had been similarly employed, and who had practiced their sabotage skills well before December 1942 (no wonder some people saw "reds under beds!". Distance and naivety made it easy for us to believe that neither Nazi, nor Communist, saboteurs could be here.

I often wonder. Do ordinary Australians know what soft targets we were?


Home Child Care Allowance (HCCA)

The HCCA is an allowance paid to a dependent spouse with dependent children by the Department of Social Security. It was introduced by the Federal Government, effective 29 September 1994, to replace the dependent spouse rebate - which traditionally has been claimed by taxpayers in their income tax returns. An application must be made to the Department of Social Security in order to receive the HCCA.

Legislation was recently passed in the Federal Parliament amending the Taxation laws to allow, "The with child spouse rebate", to continue from 29 September 1994, with the intention of the Government being able to phase out the rebate over the next few years.

From 1 July 1995, taxpayers will be unable to claim "the with child spouse rebate" through the PAYE system. A claim can therefore only be made as a lump sum rebate in the return of a taxpayer at the end of the year. Accordingly, any taxpayer who claims the rebate in their pay will be required to notify their employer via employment declarations.

In order not to disadvantage any taxpayer whose partner chooses to receive the HCCA, the Government will allow a taxpayer to claim the difference between the HCCA received during the year and with the child dependent spouse rebate entitlement which would otherwise have been allowed if no HCCA was received. That is, should the dependent spouse rebate exceed the HCCA received, a claim may be made for the difference in the tax return of

the taxpayer for that year. This reconciliation is only available where the taxpayer's partner is in receipt of the HCCA.

I will provide an example of the reconciliation which may be done in the return of a taxpayer.

Example

A taxpayer's partner is employed part time for 3 days per week over 40 weeks

(a) <u>Home Child Care Allowance</u> HCCA \$1,560.00 Less \$1 for every \$4 of income over \$282 \$729.50

HCCA allowed \$830.50

(b) <u>Spouse Rebate with Child</u> Separate net income of spouse: Gross Income (\$80.00 p.a. @ 40 weeks) \$3,200.00 less work expenses (\$56.50 p.w. @ 40 weeks) \$2,260.00

Separate net income \$940.00

Maximum spouse rebate with child in 1994/ 95 \$1,452.00

less separate net income adjustment (\$940 - 282)/4164

Spouse rebate with child allowed \$1288.00 Difference between B and A \$458.00

In this example the difference between the rebate allowed and the amount of the HCCA re-

bate allowed and the amount of the HCCA received is \$458. This may be claimed in the taxpayers income tax return for 1994/95.





In your Garden

Autumn, that very pleasant time of the year when the weather is not too hot and not too cold. Well at least I hope it happens soon. The start of Autumn hasn't been particularly flash, windy and warm. These conditions compound the damage done by quite a dry Summer, so it will be worthwhile continuing the mulching and deep watering to keep everything alive until the weather breaks.

The shortening days herald the change in the season. With the change comes the availability of late Winter and Spring flowering bulbs. Daffodils of all shades, shapes and sizes can now be purchased and planted. Jonquils, freesias, Dutch Iris, Tulips, Hyacinths, Anemone, Ranunculus and lots more can be planted to provide a colourful welcome to the end of Winter. There is plenty of time to plant your bulbs so it may be worthwhile planning the effect that you would like from them. Single

planting of bulbs will provide short term spots of colour, whereas a massed planting of 15-20 bulbs of a variety will give a colour burst to a garden bed that will be most impressive. Bulbs do not like soggy conditions so a well drained bed is a must. Sun, plenty of food, in the form of manures or fertilisers and good quality bulbs should get the required result. Depending on your garden there may not be a lot of room for a bulk display, so why not think of some nice pots with bulbs in. Pick your favourites for colour, scent or flowers and plant them into pots. It might even be nice to plant some Lobelia in the pot to remind you that there is something in there. When things start to look good move the pot to a prominent position and enjoy the instant effect.

We are currently seeking people who may like to assist us, by simply being available during the immunisation sessions, to chat to new parents and provide a comforting presence.



Fixtures and Chattels.

An often asked question by both purchasers and vendors is *"What's included?"* with a property when it's sold.

As a basic guide, anything which is a fixture, unless otherwise stated, is part of the sale. These usually include all stoves, hot water systems, wall to wall floor coverings, blinds, clothes lines and fixed television antennas. Other items which can be sold with a property are referred to as "chattels" and include drapes and lights fittings.

The Professionals Property Consultants are well aware of the "grey areas" which can result in disputes between purchasers and vendors. Dishwashers are an item occasionally in dispute, with purchasers considering them, and rightly so, to be a fixture. However, new property owners sometimes find when they take possession that the dishwasher has gone.

Garden sheds with their foundations set in concrete should be considered a fixture, and therefore sold with a property. Vendors have been known

to take garden plants which are in tubs, claiming they are not fixtures. Rarely, they will also want to dig established plants out of a garden.

The best advice for both purchasers and vendors is to have an inventory of fixtures and chattels as part of the contract of sale. To avoid a dispute, the vendor can also list items that the vendor specifically identifies as not being for sale.

Purchasers are urged to exercise their right to reinspect the property seven days prior to settlement. If a vendor has removed a fixture deemed to be included in the sale, then this would be in breach of contract.

However, while the purchaser has a right to pursue the matter, it will not give them an entitlement to terminate the contract. During the pre-settlement inspection the purchaser may find the vendor has left property or rubbish behind. The cost of its removal is an issue which should be mutually resolved.
