

AUSTRALIA REMEMBERS -

DRYSDALE 1938 - 1945

In 1938 Drysdale was like the rest of Australia just recovering from the Great Depression, when war rumblings started in Europe. Most young men of the district were employed in the local farming sector or other areas. Ford and International also gave the prospect of work for some.

Drysdale consisted of the Post Office, Hotel, butcher, 2 Newsagents, 2 grocers, 2 blacksmiths, 1 general shop, 2 fruit & lolly shops, 1 garage, Police Station, Public Hall, part-time bank, and from Bennett St. to Port Philip Bay (down Beacon Pt Rd.) there were seven houses.

From the township and surrounding areas 141 men and women served in the Armed Forces of Australia. There were also those who served in the Women's Land Army, munition production, and other essential services. An Army camp was established on the recreation reserve, where recruits were taught the basics before moving on to other training camps. Entertainments and recreation were much needed, such as dances, concerts etc.

As most residents were working in essential services, and young men were away in the Services, musicians were not easy to come by, but three locals provided the music. Amongst others were Mr R. Sayers - drums (Robur Tea Box) Mr D. Carlon - squeeze box (accordion), and Mr W Carlson on piano.

We also remember rationing of food - meat, sugar, tea - as well as petrol, clothing etc. People learned to live with these restrictions.

We also remember those people who never came home, the P.O.W's, and the badly injured in mind and body. They fought for a peace well worth fighting for, which we all enjoy today. We remember the members of the Comforts Fund, the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, the children of the State School, and all the support groups for men and women who were serving in the armed forces. And the Merchant Navy.

When hostilities ended in Europe - 8th May 1945 - and the Pacific (Japan) - 15th August 1945 - celebrations were held everywhere. But a lot of Service people were not home to join in. However they were relieved that the end had come and Australia was safe once again.

R.S.L. LADIES AUXILIARY

When news came through peace had been declared, some Auxiliary members (in their teens then) were at a dance in St Leonards. Quickly they got themslves back to Drysdale where they found people dancing in the street, some even in their nightgowns.

Celebrations followed with a huge bonfire on the Common, now known as Elgin Street. A procession through the Town finished down in the park where everyone joined in for a B.B.Q.

The Auxiliary was amalgamated with Portarlington for some years. In 1952 the Drysdale R.S.L. Women's Auxiliary was formed. This month the Auxiliary celebrated 43 years service to the Sub Branch.

The Auxiliary assists the Sub Branch with catering and fund raising. Monies raised help with welfare, building, furnishings, kitchen needs etc.

The Auxiliary meetings are held in the Clubrooms on the first Tuesday of the month. Any ladies wishing to become a member can do so by coming to a meeting or contacting Secretary P.Davis. Ph. 512328.

But we knew it wasn't all over. There was still the War in the Pacific. Australia was closer to it than anyone. And our Service men and women were not yet coming home to us.

Along with the relief and the joy and the celebrations there was the fear, the terrible knowledge of lost loved ones, and the awful anxiety for the loved ones still fighting. Or worse, in prison camps.

On V.E. Day, May 8th 1945, our feelings were mixed.

Fifty years on we remember the joy.

But those who were there also remember the harrowing months from May 8th to August 15th, 1945.

We remember the men and women who never did come home to us, and the ones who did from the prison camps.

LEGACY - 72 YEARS OF CARING

Legacy cares for the dependents of servicemen who lost their lives overseas or who died later from an accepted war related illness. In its early days and again after the second world war the emphasis was on the care of families with children, providing some of the stability, guidance and advice which a husband/father would normally provide in a family. Now there are many widows and fewer children, this has changed the emphasis but not the task.

Probably the predominant job undertaken by Legacy is advising on, and handling applications for war Widows Pensions, many of which are approved after the initial application. For those which are not re-examined by the Pensions Committee, and if in their opinion the claim was reasonable and should have been allowed, they will recommend further action. Firstly the widow will be advised of their opinion and asked if she wishes to proceed or not. If she confirms that she wishes action to continue, the file will be handed to an advocate who will prepare an application for appeal before a Veterans Review Board for hearing.



Should the appeal fail then the widow has a final chance by asking for her appeal to go to the Administrative Appeals Tribunal.

Nearly 50% of all appeals to a Veterans Review Board are successful and of those that go on to the Administrative Appeals Tribunal about 85% are successful.

Legacy cares for more than 120,000 widows in Australia, the majority of whom would be receiving War Widows Pensions and the benefits that go with them.

The ideal situation would of course be for the widows of all servicemen who served a period of declared war to receive a War Widows Pension. It would be interesting to see how the cost would compare with the savings in time and money involved in the present unsatisfactory system.

REMEMBER AUSTRALIA

1945-1995



War Time ingenuity and resourcefulness of our mothers and grandmothers was incredible. But we young people took them for granted. It's only in hind-sight that we begin to appreciate how very hard it must have been for them. Coupons were needed for clothing and food, but some things were exempt because they were basics. One of the exemptions was blankets. My Grandmother made me a princessline floor length dressing gown from a fluffy cream blanket. It was bound in blue satin; a beautiful garment. Although she didn't use her coupons much, and gave them to us to buy clothes, she couldn't help us out with our stockings.

I remember painting my legs because there were no stockings. We had to paint the seam up the back of our legs; you had to be a contortionist to draw the seam line.

In Geelong there were 40 women to each male, and that included babies and grandmothers. If you went to a dance without a partner you could be sure of being a 'wall flower'. Not too many American servicemen came to the Geelong area.

The brown-out did not affect us. We weren't at all afraid to be out alone in the dark, even when Leonski was committing his murders in Melbourne. We lived too far away!

I had a friend who lived in Melbourne. At times she had to be out alone at night. She was very scared. So she walked home backwards down the tram track in case he was following her.

Although they didn't make a fuss about it Mother and Grandmother must have been very afraid too. When the Japanese bombed Darwin, Mother was packed and ready to evacuate to the You Yangs. My sister had the rabbit ready.



IN YOUR GARDEN

Our gardens will be breathing a sigh of relief with the arrival of some good soaking rain over the last couple of weeks. Now is the best time to capitalise on the very good growing conditions and fill the holes that have occurred in the garden over the long dry Summer. Plants planted now can take advantage of the abundance of moisture and the occasional burst of sunshine to get established before the Winter and be ready to do their thing in Spring. Azaleas are an excellent example of this, with some coming to flower now, so that you can choose your colors, plant them, and in Spring reap the rewards of your planning.

It's still not too late to plant out your bulbs for late Winter/Spring. Sometimes it can be an advantage to space your planting by a couple of weeks to spread the timing of the bulbs by a little bit. Autumn trees are now coloring up beautifully with many magnificent specimens in and around Drysdale and Clifton Springs. Now is a good time to check out the neighborhood to see what might look good in your place. Write down the names and keep them for when bare rooted plants arrive in the nurseries come the Winter time.

Apricot and Cherry trees should be pruned this time of the year to avoid the occurrence of gummosis, which is like a thick sap that oozes from the pruning cuts on the trees. These two types of trees are quite susceptible to Gummosis if they are pruned during the Winter months because of the reduced sap flow. Even though the trees still have leaves, pruning them now gives them a chance to heal the wounds over before Gummosis can enter the tree.

TAX CORNER

Contractors and Tax Audits

If you are a contractor who has a contract for the provision of personal services in areas such as building, engineering, government, insurance agents, computer services, medical profession, teaching, then beware. The Australian Tax Office is proposing to audit taxpayers who have contracts for personal services and interpose a business entity to enter into the contract.

The Commissioner of Taxation is looking to strike down arrangements where a Contractor derives income solely from their own personal services and have a business entity such as a Company or Trust contract for those services and receive the income under the contract. The Australian Taxation Office will look at a

The Australian Taxation Office will look at a number of factors to determine if the Contract income is being derived by the business entity. The existence of the following factors will generally indicate that income is derived by the business entity and not the Contractor personally:

- * A contract exists to deliver a predetermined outcome or to perform agreed service;
- * Contract income is generated from more than one source;
- * The business owns and uses assets such as plant and equipment and motor vehicles to derive income under the contract:

- * The business entity has a right under the contract to use other persons to perform the contract:
- * There exists a written contract clearly setting out the terms and conditions of the arrangement:
- * The contract income is generated from the engagement of employees and other persons engaged in the business:
- * The business entity carries on an independent business and offers its services to the public in general.

Please be aware that if you have set up a business entity to contract for services which are no different from those provided by salary and wage earners, that is, services involving personal activity such as labour, personal skill and judgement, then the Australian Taxation will seek to strike down the arrangement and argue that the income generated by the business entity is income derived by the Contractor personally.







BEFORE I PUT MY HOUSE ON THE MARKET, HOW CAN I ESTABLISH THE RIGHT PRICE?
