

Over the past twelve years the North Bellarine Peninsula area has seen a dramatic increase in population, particularly in the growth area of Clifton Springs.


With this population increase has come development in local business - retail, trade and professional services. Also the need for better and more comprehensive educational facilities had become apparent.

St. Thomas Primary School and the Bellarine Campus of the Catholic Regional College - as well as the continued growth of the Christian College Bellarine Cam-

pus and both Drysdale and Clifton Springs Primary Schools the Drysdale/Clifton Springs area becomes the chief focus of Education on the Bellarine Peninsula.

SpringDale also intends to continue to provide even more extensive Adult Education both in Leisure Classes and with the co-operation of the Bellarine Secondary College, further General Education classes as well as Adult Literacy and Numeracy - one to one - assistance.

#### "THE COMMENCEMENT OF BELLARINE SECONDARY COLLEGE, CENTRAL BELLARINE CAMPUS"

Following several years in the planning the magnificent new campus of the Bellarine Secondary College will commence operations in time for the 1997 school year.

The first intake to the new campus will be years 9 and 10. Students currently in year 8 at the Ocean Grove Campus of the Bellarine Secondary College and currently in year 9 at the Queenscliff Campus should be excited at the prospect of pioneering the first intake.

Eventually the Campus is expected to accommodate between 1,000 and 1,500 students from years 7 to 12, with the additional Campus continuing at Ocean Grove for years 7 and 8.

The new site in Grubb Road in unsurpassed. With approximately 9 hectares high on the hill below and to the south/west of the water tower, the sloping terrain offers enormous potential for landscaping and above all will give students an outlook over Corio Bay towards the You Yangs, to the north - north/west, which hopefully will inspire students to reach great personal and academic heights.

The new location is designed to accommodate the needs of an expanding population on the Peninsula into the foreseeable future.

The modern buildings which have been designed with the advantage of input from the

existing school community, will incorporate the latest technological facilities and eventually will be complemented with additional sporting and recreational facilities to accommodate the needs of not only students but the general community, in a central location unique to the Bellarine Peninsula.

I wish the school every success: I wish the students the wisdom to understand that they are starting the traditions of something new on the Peninsula: I extend to the dedicated staff who will serve at the school my congratulations on a planning job well done and my best wishes for a full and rewarding career, serving the students of the eastern end of the Peninsula. May I also wish the school community generally, wisdom and energy in the increasing important role of continuing to assist in providing the best for your children.

To the Catholic School next door, which will increase the overall student cohort in that location, I also extend my congratulations and best wishes. I am certain the two schools will mutually contribute much to each other in a spirit of harmony and cooperation.

#### DRYSDALE CAMPUS SET TO OPEN

#### HISTORY

Queenscliff High School officially began in 1957 with 109 students. As the population of the Bellarine Peninsula grew so did the school. This led to the need for a new campus at Ocean Grove, established in 1985. Ten years later, with a substantial growth in population on the northern side of the Peninsula, we now look forward to the opening of our third campus at Drysdale. The Queenscliff Campus, the core of the secondary education on the Bellarine Peninsula for 40 years, closes at the end of 1997. Our current student population is over 1000, with 85 teachers and 25 support staff.

#### FACILITIES: NOW AND IN THE **FUTURE**

On December 12, 1995 the then Minister of Education Don Hayward turned the first sod of earth to symbolically begin the construction of the Drysdale Campus of Bellarine Secondary College. One year later, after substantial input by staff, students, community representatives, architects, and builders Stage 1 is ready to welcome 400 Year 9 and 10 students when school resumes in 1997. The campus, with its magnificent views of the You Yangs around to the Heads, has the most up to date buildings and features.

Some of these include:

1. An open-plan Technology Centre catering for the subject demands of Metalwork, Plastics, Woodwork, Electronics and Robotics.

- The latest in Computer technology (multimedia). There will be computer outlets in all rooms, and connections for large screen displays of videos and computer generated im-
- 3. Modern, spacious Science facilities for practical work.
- 4. Modern Home Economics facilities and Dining Room.
- Secure, covered external locker Bays.
- 6. A landscaped passive recreation area, an oval, and a hardcourt area for more physical activity.

Starting in March 1997 the Second Stage will be built. This includes the Administration area, Library and Arts Centre. As the campus expands, so will the number of students. By 1998 Years 9 to 12 will attend the Drysdale Campus. Years 7 and 8 will attend the Ocean Grove Campus. Beyond 1998 there are plans for a Gymnasium, Theatre and second Science block. This is the third and final stage.

Bellarine Secondary College Principal Rob Hurley says that the Drysdale Campus "will be a major educational asset for the community not only during the day but after school hours when the Library, Computer and Technology facilities can be utilised".

school is for all students to have the opportunity to reach their full potential academically and socially. The school provides many programs which can facilitate these goals.

These include:

1. Broad education programs covering the eight key learning areas.

2. Increasing elective choices at Year 9 and

3. Curriculum emphasis on physical fitness and basic skill development and social development through team games.

4. The study of Indonesian or French as choices of language. There will be the opportunity to undertake language study tours to Indonesia and France.

5. Integration and Learning Assistance programs established to help individual students.

6. Participation by students in the decision making processes of the school through Student Government and the Student Leadership Programme.

7. Artistic involvement through participation in the Instrumental Music Program, School Band and Rock Eisteddfod.

8. Year Level camps at Years 7, 9 and 11.

Careers counselling.

10. A strong emphasis on Student Welfare through the Welfare Co-ordinators, School Chaplain, Form Teachers, Student Managers and Sub-school Co-ordinators.


#### **FURTHER INFORMATION**

#### ST. THOMAS' DRYSDALE

St. Thomas' is located on a picturesque 9.8 hectare site on the corner of Anderson and Gillies Roads, Drysdale. The Primary School services St. Thomas' Parish, Drysdale. The secondary school is a campus of Catholic Regional College, Geelong and services the Bellarine Peninsula.

The school is commencing in temporary accommodation in February 1997 with students in Years Prep to Year 8 and will progressively grow to Year 12 by 2001.

#### Curriculum

We aim to provide a curriculum that has continuity and coherence from Years Prep to 12. 

The 'foundation year' at Christian College Bellarine has been a great success. One of the highlights of the year has been the developing links with the local community.







#### DRYSDALE PRIMARY SCHOOL

Located centrally on the Bellarine Peninsula, Drysdale Primary School has an enrolment of approximately 560 students having grown from the small rural school opened in 1875. There is still the air of the rural village about Drysdale Primary, retaining a sense of community support and cohesion. Over the eight years since 1989, The Drysdale enrolments have inexorably and consistently grown. The physical environment is well developed and attractive with both passive and active areas for pupil use. #### BELLARINE CALISTHENIC COLLEGE



The Bellarine Calisthenic College commenced classes in March, 1994 with 35 pupils and over the past 3 years has doubled in size, catering for over 70 girls aging from 3 years upwards.

Calisthenics is a competitive team sport in which girls are trained in physical culture including apparatus technique, aesthetic exercise, modern dance, national folk dancing, march-

ing and singing.

Through the various items girls gain value in the areas of physical development, co-ordination and rhythm, concentration, self awareness, self discipline and social awareness. Calisthenics provides the opportunity for children to experience a wide variety of activities - not specifically gymnastics, dance, drama as is encompasses a 'taste' of many interests.

Girls train once a week, and from mid July to mid September, the College participates in three competitions - two local and the State Titles in Melbourne.

Over the three years the College has been running, the girls have received numerous

awards for their efforts including many 1st placing and competition Aggregate trophies.

The College is registered with Calisthenics Victoria Incorporated and Coaches are Level 1 Accredited with the Australian Coaching Council. Pupils may, if they wish, participate in Pupil Skills Programs on an individual ba-

The cost of sending a child to our classes is most affordable compared to other classes and sports and in fact the organisation of the College is such as to enable as many girls as possible to participate in this wonderful sport.

Classes are held at the Uniting Church Hall in Drysdale on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, the time and night dependent on your girls age.

#### DRYSDALE FIRE BRIGADE

#### New Fire Station under way

Residents of Drysdale/Clifton Springs will have noted activity of a different type at the site of the old Fire Station and the 'House' next door. Demolition of the 'House' has made way for the first stage of the development which will be the major part of the new complex and include meeting room, office, kitchen, toilets, communications and motor room. It is interesting to note that at this stage the site will have three Fire Stations, the original station (used as a workshop), the current station and most of the new station! The second stage will require demolition of the present Fire Station and clearing of the remainder of the site to allow for the workshop/storeroom which will complete the complex.

The Brigade members are very excited that after a considerable number of years of seriously pursuing a new station their efforts have finally come to fruition. Negotiations with the Country Fire Authority (CFA) have been very satisfactory with most of the Brigade's requirements being fulfilled. The complex is being built by Rendine Constructions Pty. Ltd. and has been designed with the local 'Village' theme in mind.

#### **Busy Fire Season**

With the very dry conditions and consequent high fire risk the Brigade has had a busy start to the season with three Total Fire Ban (TFB) days in a row in mid January. Crews

were on stand-by for the Bellarine Group Task Force during those days and on one occasion the Task Force was activated and five trucks were placed in readiness at the Leopold Fire Station. Considering that the Drysdale Brigade is manned wholly by volunteers there is a big commitment of members time during the Fire Season.

#### Competition

This aspect of the Volunteer Fire Service is important in attracting younger people into the Service and the Drysdale Brigade has a very successful competition team. They started the season in December by travelling to Casterton to compete in the Western and Wimmera Championships where they ended second to Mildura after being neck and neck until the last event. The team is looking forward to the State Championships on the long weekend in March held locally at Portarlington for which Drysdale is a member of the organising committee.



## Victorian Urban Fire Brigades Association

STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS To Be Held At PORTARLINGTON March 8th, 9th, 10th, 1997

The Drysdale Urban Fire Brigade joined Ocean Grove, Portarlington and Queenscliff Brigades in forming the Bellarine Peninsula 1997 Championship Committee who successfully applied to hold the 1997 State Championships at Portarlington during the long weekend in March. Chairman of the Committee is Mr. Garry Spry MLA, Deputy Chairman Mr. Lex de Man, CFA Area Manager Regions 6 & 7 and Secretary Ex-Capt. Royce Collier OAM with the various Sub-Committees chaired by members of the participating Brigades.

The Committee has met regularly through most of 1996 and the preliminary organising is now well in hand. Almost 100 Brigades will be attending the Championships and accommodation has been arranged for the majority of these Brigades. Several working bees have carried out maintenance to the competition tracks and the VUFBA have made their final inspection with a positive result. The Committee is pleased with the support received from businesses and organisations within the local areas of the City of Greater Geelong and the Borough of Queenscliff together with other organisations connected with the Fire Service.

The Championships are a very prestigious event in the Volunteer Fire Service and it provides a great opportunity for the local community to see Local Brigades compete against Brigades from all over Victoria together with several from Interstate. There are 20 events

held over the 3 days which have evolved from early days of firefighting and equipment and rules have been adapted to be more suitable for competition use. It is a very competitive sport, most demanding on competitors and equipment and a considerable amount of training is required to be a competitive Brigade. Last year the Drysdale Brigade was runner-up to Maryvale in the 'A' Class Aggregate and equal first with Maryvale in the 'Wet' Aggregate which was an excellent result. They also hold the record the 'A' Section Hose and Reel Eights set at Mildura in 1994 and their marching team won the Discipline Contest at Echuca in 1993.

Most of the events provide spectacular viewing for Spectators and entry to the Championships over the 3 days is by program for which there is a nominal charge. The Opening Ceremony and Discipline Contest commence on Saturday 8th at 0930 hours together with 5 events throughout the day. The 'Torchlight Procession' will commence to move through the Streets of Portarlington on Saturday evening at 2030 hours and it is expected that a large crowd will line the streets to view the Procession. Events on Sunday and Monday will commence at 0845 hours. During the Championships food and refreshments will be made available by the Ladies Committee and other outlets. There will be displays by the CFA and major sponsors

together with sales of memorabilia.

#### IN YOUR GARDEN

Well, here we are well into the new year and what a dry start we have been having. The constant wind and sun has dried out the gardens and lawns all over the place, giving that all over brownish, deadish sort of a look. Its very trendy everyone's got it. In the last Messenger I did encourage you to mulch and if you did then a lot more of your plants will still be fairly happy. There is still plenty of hot weather to come so its not too late to put of layer of mulch around the place to make sure that the water you put on the garden actually stays there.

The good thing about this weather is that the roses have been fantastic, lots of flowers and not much in the way of Black Spot or nasty insects. Remember with your roses that you should be watering them in the morning, not at night, as the moisture overnight aids in the spread of disease. This is the time of the year to be thinking about giving your roses a summer prune. Not much more than about a third needs to come off, just enough to get it all back in shape. This is to encourage compact bushy growth and thus more flowers on their Autumn flush. It is also a good opportunity to give them a bit of a tidy up after a strong Spring/Summer growing season.

Petunias, Marigolds, Portulaca, Aster's and the like have been making great shows in gardens, again because of the warmer weather, as long as they get the occasional watering. On the subject of watering, it may be useful to give the bigger trees in your garden a bit of a soak, just to make sure that they too will not suffer from the extended dry, especially the fruit trees.

#### SPRINGS DELL MANAGEMENT PROJECT



The production of a Draft Master Plan for the development of the Clifton Springs Foreshore Reserve has been proceeding over the last couple of months.

Together with the consultants, Chris Dance Land Design, the Clifton Springs Foreshore Advisory Committee have been working through an analysis of the site, and examining the opportunities and constraints provided by the area. In the course of this process a number of important issues relating to management and public use of the foreshore reserve have been discussed.

These issues include:

- providing for pedestrian access along the foreshore;
- capitalising on the stunning views of the area;

- eradicating environmental weeds;
- providing for passive recreation and children's play, particularly at the Dell picnic area;
- recognising the history of the mineral springs area;
- \* allowing for improved boating access;
- controlling erosion of the shore and cliff line.

The analysis of the site and recognition of opportunities and constraints have been important stepping stones towards the development of an overall Master Plan. The production of the Draft Master Plan is the next step in the design process.

At the completion of the Draft Master Plan, public participation will be sought through a workshop process where the community will be able to provide not only their comment but also their input into the Master Plan proposals. The Draft Master Plan will also be placed on public display for general public comment prior to finalisation of the design.

It is intended that the Master Plan will have reached a suitable stage to allow prioritising and costing by the end of March 1997. This will enable initial implementation projects to be included in Council's 1997/1998 Capital Works Program.

## BLUE-GREEN ALGAE REPORT LAKE LORNE, DRYSDALE

As a result of concerns about odours coming from Lake Lorne, an inspection was carried out on Friday 3rd January, 1997 by Council officers who found an extensive amount of algal bloom in the water, as well as along the shoreline. The dangers to humans and animals is potentially quite significant from toxins released by this species of algae when it dies causing unpleasant odours.

Currently, Council in co-operation with Barwon Water, are testing water samples on a weekly basis. This procedure will continue until algae counts drop to an acceptable level. Advice indicates that a drop in temperatures in late Autumn together with sufficient rainfall through the Winter period will help to reduce algal levels and flush the system.

The main problem is that Blue Green Algae has toxins that are released into the water following the death of algae which is colourless and could remain potent for up to several weeks after the algae has disappeared.

Nutrient availability, particularly phosphorous and nitrogen, is one of the major factors affecting algal growth.

These nutrients enter our waterways from many sources including urban stormwater runoff, irrigation drainage, soil and riverbank erosion and agricultural run off.

The maintenance of a balanced ecosystem with native fish, zooplankton, other invertebrates, aquatic plants and a diversity of desirable algae species will assist in providing natural control of undesirable algae.

The use of algicides or copper sulphate to control Blue-Green Algae is not considered appropriate as the compounds may also kill fish, bird life and other aquatic plants and animals that make up a sustainable ecosystem.

At this stage, the lake will be monitored throughout the Summer/Autumn period until Autumn/Winter rains flush the system and return the algae count to a satisfactory level.

#### SAFETY FENCES FOR SWIMMING POOLS:

The Building Regulations 1994 require that all private swimming pools, wading pools and spas which are capable of containing a depth of water of more than 30 cm must install a suitable fence or barrier to prevent children under 5 years gaining access.

If a person is in the process of selling a property with a swimming pool, the above fencing requirements must be disclosed in the Vendor's statement.

If a person is in the process of purchasing a property with a swimming pool then they must comply with the regulations which require the purchaser to fence the swimming pool within 30 days of settlement or the 1st July, 1997 whichever date is the earlier.

Failure to comply with the Building Regulations 1994 is an offence the for which can be up to \$500.00.

#### WHEEL CLAMPING:

The Road Safety (Wheel - Clamping) Act 1996, commenced operation on the 1st August, 1996 and made wheel-clamping by private wheel clampers on private property illegal. Where a vehicle has been parked or left standing on a public highway, a declared road, a public parking area or a "council controlled area", only a member of the Police force can authorise its removal.

#### LEGAL PRACTICE ACT 1996

The major provisions of the Legal Practice Act 1996 came into operation on the 1<sup>st</sup> January, 1996. The new Act replaces the Legal Profession Practice Act. One of the more important aspects of the new Act is that it requires

legal practitioners (barristers and solicitors) to provide in writing what the likely legal costs will be in a matter. This must be provided be a legal practitioner can be engaged to do any legal work. Part 13 of the Legal Practice Act introduces some stringent requirements in relation to the operation of Conveyancing Businesses (more commonly known as Conveyancing companies.)

Section 326 defines conveyancing work as "work, other than legal work, carried out in connection with the transfer or conveyance of a freehold of leasehold interest in land"

"Legal work" is defined as -

the preparation of any document that creates, varies, transfers or extinguishes an interest in land;

the giving of legal advice.

It is illegal and an offence under the Act for Conveyancers to undertake or engage in legal work, such work must be performed by a legal practitioner (a solicitor).

Section 327 prohibits certain persons who can carry-on or conduct a conveyancing business. For instance, a person who has been convicted in Victoria or elsewhere within the last 10 years of an offence involving fraud, dishonesty, drug trafficking or violence. (How can you checkup on such things).

Section 327 (1) (b) states, inter alia, that a person who is prohibited from engaging in legal practice in Victoria or in any place outside Victoria must not carry on a business as a conveyancer. Penalty: 100 penalty units.

It is to be noted that legal practitioners are the only persons who can engage in legal practices in Victoria.

Consequently, before engaging a Conveyancer ensure that he is properly qualified and has the necessary insurances. Insist on viewing his qualifications and insurance policies. Remember, you are handing over the transfer of your home and the proceeds of the sale of your home to possibly a stranger. If that stranger, disappears with the title to your property or the proceeds of sale, who will you turn to for its recovery.

Legal Practitioners, (solicitors) are required to have professional indemnity insurance and have to contribute to a guarantee fund before they can operate legal practice.

Legal Practitioners are the only persons who are legally qualified to do both conveyancing and legal work.

For your peace of mind make the necessary inquiries.






