

The name ANZAC was coined from the names, "Australian New ZealandArmy Corps," and was first used in World War 1.

Since that day the name has always been given to the Army personnel.

It is on this day, when the Ex-Service organisations gather together to march and remember those brave young men and women who made the supreme sacrifice in order that this great nation of ours could live in peace. On this day, Ex-Service men and women, who have passed on since the conflicts ceased, mainly because of war-caused illnesses, are also remembered.

There are some among us, who believe that ANZAC Day is a holiday to enable them to go to the football or the races; there are others who believe that the RSL carry on this tradition, in order to glorify war. This is far from the truth.

ANZAC DAY is a day on which, not only the Ex-Service personnel, but the whole community can take part and commemorate the memory of all those who died for their country.

The ANZAC Day service of the Drysdale RSL Sub-Branch will be held in the Senior Citizens Hall, commencing at 10.30am.

At the conclusion of the service, the Ex-Servicemen and women, Scouts and Guides will form up on the lawn outside the hall, and march to the War Memorial, in High Street, when a wreath laying ceremony will be conducted.


Contrary to what was in the papers recently, Drysdale children are permitted to march with their ex-service parents or grandparents.

Legacy attempts to ensure that those families receive the care and assistance promised by governments, before, during and after war and has accepted that the support given will still be needed for many years to come and that the Legatees now doing the caring will not be there to carry on.



COUNCIL TO SEEK MEETING OVER GAMING

The City of Greater Geelong will formally place its concerns of gaming in the Geelong region to the top levels of Government in Victoria, following a recent refusal by Council for

another gaming centre in the City.

The Council agreed to advise the Premier Jeff Kennett and the Minister for Gaming, Roger Hallam of Council's resolution of refusal in relation to a Belmont Hotel proposal and that Council also seeks the assistance of the MAV to further articulate Local Government concerns in relation to gaming in Victoria.

The proposal placed before the March meeting of Council, was for the Hotel to take over an office block development that initially housed the Department of Social Security, to be changed to a gaming and entertainment centre associated with the adjacent Belmont Hotel.

As required by Council for this application, the proposal was advertised and 1,629 objections were received. Two meetings were held between the applicants, the objectors, Council staff and Councillors in order to clarify issues.

The application was considered at a Councillor Hearings Panel on 17th February 1997 at which a Notice of Refusal was issued.

Issues raised include:

- establishment of another gaming venue in the area is not necessary
- the detrimental effects gambling has on the community

* there should be a moratorium until the State studyon gambling is completed

 increased funding needed for community based support agencies

* less disposable income available for the purchase of consumer goods

At the Councillor Hearings Panel held in February, these concerns were further re-iterated by objectors speaking against the proposal.

In order for Council to detail concerns raised within the community relating to gaming in the Geelong region, Council voted to seek an appointment with the relevant Minister to further discuss the issue.


On another matter, I wish to congratulate Cr. Gerry Smith on retaining the Office of Mayor of the City of Greater Geelong for the next 12 months.



TRANSPORT SERVICE REVIEW FOR THE BELLARINE PENINSULA

Public Transport services along the Bellarine Peninsula are to be reviewed.

Minister for Transport Robin Cooper said the review will make sure services are meeting the needs of the local community and visitors to the region.

"In recent years there has been extensive residential growth in the area, especially in Clifton Springs and Ocean Grove/Collendina," Mr. Cooper said.

"Apart from a major retail development, a new Government Secondary College and a new Catholic Primary/Secondary College in Drysdale, there also has been the introduction of a new large passenger and vehicle ferry between Sorrento and Queenscliff. All these changes to the region have combined to warrant a review.

"The Member for Bellarine, Garry Spry, has been particularly concerned to have a review of bus services undertaken and as a result of his rigorous representations I have ensured that the review commences immediately".

Local Member Garry Spry said the review will look at how retail, school and ferry developments have and will change travel patterns and how new services can be developed in a cost-effective manner.

"In recent times local residents have requested extra bus services and I would encourage everybody, including current and potential travellers to make submissions to the review," Mr. Spry concluded.



ROTARY CLUB OF DRYSDALE NEWS



IN YOUR GARDEN

The season of falling leaves is upon us, hopefully they are turning lovely Autumn tones for you before you have to rake them up. When they are raked into a pile don't put them in a garbage bag and throw them to the tip, put them in the compost heap and make some lovely food for your garden. There are many different types of compost thingy's that you can use, but all perform the same function. They provide a nice warm, moist spot for all manner of goodies to rot down into nutrient rich goop to add to the garden. Yes you can add vegetable scraps, egg shells, the occasional sheet of newspaper, a thin layer of dirt (mainly for the weight), grass clippings the main thing is to not have toooo much of the one thing. No you should not water the compost heap to help it work, you will drown all the beasties that are breaking down the contents. Compost heaps should never be hurried, it is better to let them perform at their own pace and do a good job at it. It is not a bad idea to have two if room permits, then you can use one while the other festers at its own pace.





The cooler calmer weather can bring with it a few problems in the way of fungal infestations. Black spot and Powdery Mildew on roses will be quite common in these conditions. Even though the flowering season is almost finished it is worth spraying to clean up any disease so that it does not over-winter on your plants. Any rotting fruit left on your trees should be removed, don't leave any there to rot unless you want next years crop to suffer from fungal problems.

CONVEYANCING: KNOWING WHAT YOU ARE PURCHASING:

A contract for the sale of real estate should contain an accurate description of exactly what it is that the vendor is selling. Difficulties arise between vendors and purchasers when the particulars of sale in a contract have not been drawn accurately, or there is disagreement about what the particulars mean.

If, for example, the particulars of sale are: "PROPERTY: the land together with any improvements known as 68 Tivoli Road, Geelong" and there is a shortfall between the area of the property as fenced compared to the area of the property shown in the relevant certificate of title, what are the legal rights of the parties?

În Koadlow v Bolland (1996) V ConvR 54-547 the property did not comply with the title measurements and the Supreme Court of Victoria, Court of Appeal held that the subject matter of the sale was the land shown in the certificate of title, a copy of which was attached to the contract of sale, rather than the land as occu-

pied and fenced.

If the particulars of sale are: "Lot 81 and the land known as unit V3" and the "gross floor area" of the unit is stated to be 120 m2 in subdivisional plans attached to the contract and the purchaser discovers the total living space amounts to 110m2, which amounts to a shortfall of 10 per cent, what are the legal rights of the parties?

In Sivakriskul v Vynotas Pty Ltd (1997) V ConvR 54-556 the Supreme Court of Victoria held that the subject matter of the sale was the

apartment as described in the plans attached to the contract and that the purchaser could not withdraw from the contract because of the alleged shortfall because the plans correctly displayed the measurements of the apartment as including the external walls. Gross floor area did not mean actual living space.

The law says that purchasers should get that for which they bargained and contracted. In any dispute the questions are: what was the subject matter of the contract between the parties and what precisely has the vendor bound him or herself by contract to sell?

The answers to these questions will determine whether:

© the property is subject to a defect in title, enabling the purchaser to withdraw from the contract and have his or her deposit returned;

or

© there is an error or misdescription in the contract, enabling the purchaser to claim compensation from the vendor but at the same time enabling the vendor to enforce the contract; or the purchaser can neither rescind the con-

tract nor claim compensation.

Seek legal advice before you sign a contract. Contracts, their conditions and their attachments require careful examination. If you are buying a property "off the plan" where there is no opportunity to inspect the "finished product" it is even more important to be diligent in your inquiries. Your legal rights will depend on a correct interpretation of all the documents.




