

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# NETBALL ON THE BELLARINE PENINSULA

Twenty-seven years ago the "Peninsula Netball Association" was known as the "Bellarine Women's Basketball Association" and was founded by Mr. Bill Jones and other interested persons. Mr. Jones started the Association because many children in the Peninsula area didn't fit into the Football, Cricket, Swimming criteria, so had nothing to do. The game has undergone many changes since being introduced to the Peninsula by Mr. Jones and co. and has gone from strength to strength. Thirteen years ago the Bellarine Women's Basketball Association became the Peninsula Netball Association and is still the PNA today and is bigger than ever.

A modified version of Netball has been introduced to the Peninsula and is called NETTA, this allows children in the 6 to 9 year old age groups to learn a team sport and enjoy themselves without any competitiveness. Netta is their first introduction into Netball and other age groups are: -

11 and under, 13 and under, 15 and under, 17 and under and Seniors. The competitions are played on Saturday mornings during Winter with an average of 450 children participating. Wednesday nights during Spring/Summer with an average of 650 children participating and there is a Ladies Social Competition on Monday mornings with a crèche for the little ones. There are nine clubs from around the Peninsula participating in the competitions. The different competitions are very effectively run by the girls of the PNA and everyone "big kids and little kids manage to have a fun time".

## THE ANDREW LOVE CANCER CENTRE

Breast cancer is the most common cause of cancer death in Australian women. In Australia around 7,000 women are diagnosed with breast cancer each year.

The International Breast Cancer Intervention Study (IBIS) is seeking 3,000 healthy women volunteers to take part in a study to see whether the drug Tamoxifen can prevent the disease. In Australia the study is co-ordinated by the Australia-New Zealand Breast Cancer Trials Group and funded by the National Health and Medical Research Council.

The Andrew Love Cancer Centre at the Geelong Hospital is now running a clinic each month for women who would like to take part in the study.

We are looking for women aged 35-70 who are assessed to have at least twice the average risk of breast cancer, usually due to a family history of the disease.

For women aged 35-45, a strong family history includes a mother or sister who had breast cancer before the age of 40, or two or more close blood relatives who have had breast cancer before the age of 50.

Tamoxifen has been taken by more than a million women worldwide. It has proved effective in treating women with early stage breast cancer and has also been shown to reduce the risk of women developing a new breast cancer in the other breast by about 45%.

Women interested in taking part in the study will receive detailed information clearly setting out the risks as well as the potential benefits. All participants will be seen six monthly by a study doctor and have a yearly mammogram.

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# OFF TO THE WORLD TRANSPLANT GAMES

Representing your country in sport is a dream most Australians have, but few ever achieve. Queenscliff resident Sandi Dalladay will do just that at the World Transplant Games, being held in Sydney. Sandi, who had a life-saving kidney transplant 14 years ago, will be competing in swimming, 50m, 100m, 200m, 400m freestyle and the 50m butterfly.

Over 1200 competitors, all transplant recipients, compete at the games which are held every two years. The organisers of the Sydney games expect teams from about 40 countries to be there. The patron of the games is world no. 1 golfer, Greg Norman.

The event is designed to encourage people to decide to become organ donors, and very importantly, to tell their family. "Australia has one of the lowest donor rates in the western world and many people die because of the shortage of organs" Sandi said.

Other objectives include giving recipients a chance to play sport at a competitive level and enable them to express gratitude to the families or organ donors. Most of the competitors would not be alive today without their transplant, which was only made possible by the extremely generous donation they received. In my case I received my kidney from mother.



### IN YOUR GARDEN

Spring is well and truly in the air though it's not officially here yet. The Daphnes have been flowermg profusely, the heady aroma a must in every garden. With much energy being placed into the producing of flowers on a Daphme quite often the leaves will yellow and drop off. A dash of Epsom Salts will help with the yellow leaves, while a light feed will renew vigor of the plant. Daphne does well in a morning sun situation where it is moist in the Summer and well drained in the Winter. A humus or compost rich soil with regular feedings will give good results in late Winter - Spring m the form of perfumed flowers. Pick the flowers for inside and you not only have that smell inside, but you keep the bush a nice compact

Another of the very smellies is the slightly temperamental Boronia. There are now a multitude of different Boronias available, varying in colour and size, but the smelliest is still the brown. Not all Boronias have the awesome aroma, but not all are that easy to turn to compost. Many of the pink Boronias actually love the hot sun and flower for very long periods from Spring to Autumn They all tend to like the well-drained soils with moisture available in the hotter months. Boroinas can grow most quickly and can become long and lanky in just a couple of years. The best pruning practice is to take cut flowers for inside, removing about one third of the foliage. If you can't bear to cut it for flowers then after it is finished is the time to prune it for shape. You can get an awful lot of pleasure from each plant even if it only lasts a couple of years.

The next trip out is on the 19th August, a shopping spree to various outlets. Details of the outcome of that will be in the September issue of the SpringDale Messenger.



## VICTIMS OF CRIME ASSISTANCE ACT 1996

A new scheme of compensation for crime victims came into operation on 1 July 1997.

The new scheme will apply to acts of violence committed at any time after 1 July 1997 and to those committed between 1 July 1996 and 1 July 1997, providing an application for compensation has not been made under the old compensation scheme.

A victim of an act of violence can claim compensation on the basis of being either a primary victim, a secondary victim or a related victim.

Primary victim

A person who is directly affected, i.e. is injured or dies as a result of an act of violence, can claim compensation of up to \$60,000 for:

the cost of counselling and medical services; up to \$20,000 in loss of earnings (not covered by WorkCover); the cost of lost or damaged clothing worn at the time of the injury; "in exceptional circumstances" other expenses such as moving costs or the cost of installing a burglar alarm.

Secondary victim

A witness to an act of violence who is injured, and a parent or guardian of a primary victim who was under 18 and who is injured as a direct result of subsequently becoming aware of the act of violence, can claim compensation of up to \$50,000 for:

the cost of counselling and medical expenses; "in exceptional circumstances" loss of earnings of up to \$20,000.

Victim related to a deceased

All related victims of a primary victim who died as a direct result of an act of violence, such as close family members, dependants and

people of "intimate personal relationship" can be cumulatively awarded up to \$100,000.

Within 21 days of lodging an application (or any extension granted by the Victims of Crime Assistance Tribunal) a related victim must notify the Tribunal of every other person who she or he believes may be or may be alleged to be a related victim, or a person who is not a related victim but has incurred funeral expenses.

Any one related victim can be awarded up to \$50,000 for:

the cost of counselling services and medical or funeral services; the loss of money that the related victim would have been reasonably likely to receive from the primary victim up to two years after the death; distress experienced or reasonably likely to be experienced as a direct result of the death.

Victims can no longer claim compensation for pain and suffering, however offenders can be ordered to pay compensation for pain and suffering as a result of legal proceedings being issued by either the victim or the state.

Applications for compensation should be made within two years of the commission of the act of violence. Application forms can be obtained from the Victims of Crime Assistance Tribunal 233, William Street, Melbourne 3000, telephone (03) 9628 7855.

It is advisable to seek legal advice when completing an application form and victims are entitled to legal representation in the Tribunal hearing.

NOTE This new scheme of compensation commences on 1 July 1997. The cut off date for claiming compensation for pain and suffering under the previous legislation was before 30 June 1997. If you believe that you might be affected by the new Act, obtain legal advice quickly.







# PROPERTY INVESTMENT THE PLAIN SAILING GUIDE

Investors who insist on the highest rent the market will bear often end up with a greater level of vacancy once tenants have time to make comparisons and find a better value option. The key to both negligible vacancy and tenant harmony is setting rent at ninety five percent of market value. At the end of the year, even a few weeks vacancy means a lower net income than if rent had been set at ninety five percent.

Investors whose properties are good value get more enquiry and can afford to be more selective about the type of tenant they install.

References are a must. There are many questions a landlord could ask but the bottom line is Do you believe she/he would be able to pay \$x per week for y weeks? An investor's managing agent is the person with the expertise to advise on the tenant's ability to meet their lease obligations.

Many novice investors don't know what to ask of their managing agent. If you can tell them up front what your needs are it's much easier to keep abreast of what's happening and avoid confusion.

Your agent should provide a monthly statement of all income and expenses with your cheque banked directly into your account. Ask for an annual written report of state of repair (internal and external) and cleanliness and a mid-year kerb side report of state of repair and cleanliness.

Apart from this all you need to do is carry out an internal inspection of the property yourself once every two years so that you can visualise its state of wear and tear when maintenance and repairs are discussed.

It takes three to six months to get to know your agent and how he/she operates.

Until then you should require all expense items to be referred to you (other than emergencies) prior to the agent spending any money. After the initial period, set a limit on the amount the agent can spend (usually about the equivalent of one week's rent) without reference to you.

Like any contractual arrangement, you should always have your agreement with your agent evidenced in writing.

It sounds obvious but it's amazing how many people don't think of it. Any business arrangement is more likely to be plain sailing if both parties have their rights and obligations clearly delineated.
