They last so much better than a bunch of flowers, and provide a lasting memory of the occasion. Choosing for someone else is always quite difficult, so there is a cheats way out, the old Gift Voucher from the Nursery trick. These nifty little do-dars come in almost any denomination, we are however limited by the amount of zeroes that will fit on the paper.

If you are feeling courageous and are prepared to wander the nursery, there is a large range of flowering plants from which to choose the perfect gift. Hydrangeas in flower, pinks, reds, whites, blues, tall and short, just to make it difficult to decide. Roses of many colors, shapes and sizes, David Austin, Hybrid Tea, Floribunda, Ground Cover, Old fashioned, Climbers, Weepers, Standards, well you get the idea there is quite a few to choose from. For the person with the new garden there is a large selection of deciduous trees, Silver Birches, Weeping Willows, Maples, Crab Apples, Cherries, Hawthorns, Fruit Trees. For the special person you might want to splurge a bit and buy a lovely weeping maple, weeping cherry or weeping birch, no that does not mean that they are crying, it means they have naturally cascading habit. Did I mention African Violets in pink, white, mauve, purple, burgundy, single or double, well I have now.

For those of you who are prepared to get your hands dirty to make your own presents there is few different things that can be made very easily. The old hanging basket can be made to look a million dollars if its planted up with some pe-

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tunias or small marigolds with lobelia planted around the edge. Don't be too worried about how big the plants will be, because you can cheat and buy the petunias and marigolds in bigger pots and transplant them straight into the basket, the lobelia can then be planted around the edges to fill the gaps. Terracotta pots come in all shapes and sizes and make a very nice gift by themselves, but with a little thought and effort they can be planted up to make a lovely gift. Petunias, Lavenders, Fuchsias, anything that's in or coming into flower can be put to use to make a very pleasant Christmas gift. For the gardener who always seems to run out of the things they need, perhaps a small hamper of things like garden ties, bug spray, potting mix (that makes the present look big and it feels heavy too), snail bait, plant food, whatever you think they need or use.

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A YEAR OF OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT

The City of Greater Geelong has emerged from a period of unprecedented reform and rebuilding as a leaner, stronger and more focused municipality.

The financial and organisational problems inherited by the new City's first elected Council in March 1995 have been turned around, and the City is now on a path to a sustainable and prosperous future.

The first full year under the elected Council in 1995/96 saw clear directions set and a number of hard decisions taken. In 1996/97 the City began to reap the benefits.

In a period of outstanding achievement: Council's finances have been brought under control.

Council has demonstrated its capacity to give leadership and direction to the community.

Council has worked in partnership with business, industry, government, unions and the community to deliver substantial gains for Geelong.

A clear vision for the future of the City has begun to take shape.

Over the next three months I will look back on the past, talk about our achievements and in leading up to the March 1998 Council Elections outline the biggest challenge to face the Bellarine Peninsula and its many townships and hard working communities over the next three years.

ACHIEVINGA SUSTAINABLE BUDGET

After a review of the City's finances and staffing structure by consultants Mills Oakley was completed in early 1996, Council discovered the extent of the financial problems facing it. Council was looking at a very large deficit in 1996/97. A major difficulty in putting the City's finances in order has been the State Government's rate capping legislation, which has severely hampered Council's ability to manage its own affairs. Under the legislation, rate increases have been limited to the rate of inflation minus one per cent. The impact on the City of Greater Geelong has been particularly severe because of its relatively low rate base. This was highlighted in a rates audit undertaken in 1996/97, with the consultants report concluding that the City's rates were 17-30 per cent below comparable municipalities.

Council moved to reduce debt in 1996/97 with a large asset rationalisation program. It was successful in disposing of 92 per cent of properties identified as surplus to requirements. Major sales included the Market Square shopping centre and the Sizzlers site at Belmont. The program was driven by Council's five year financial strategy. Council also took every opportunity to contain operating expenditure during the period under review, resulting in further significant savings to the budget. As a result a very pleasing rate determination surplus of \$2.46 million was delivered in 1996/ 97.

May I take this opportunity to wish all residents of Coryule Ward a Happy and Enjoyable Christmas and New Year Festive Season.

Many thanks for your support throughout the year and I look forward to working with you in the coming year.

As the holiday season approaches it is the time for celebration and the thoughts of many will be on holidaying away from home 1 would like to take this opportunity to remind those of the community who will be away to take a little extra time in the preparation for their holiday.

A great number of people will be travelling by motor vehicle to their holiday location. Be sure the vehicle you will be travelling in is in a safe and road worthy condition. Make sure byres, brakes, exhaust and other mechanical devices are operating correctly. Plan your trip make sure you are well rested prior to the journey. If there are two or more drivers in the vehicle share the time behind the wheel equally. If there is only the one driver in the vehicle make sure you take constant breaks. Obey the speed limits and other traffic laws. Remember it is bet-

ter to arrive at your destination a little bit late than not at all.

Before leaving your home be sure that it is properly secured. Make sure the mail, newspapers and other deliveries have been cancelled or are being attended to by a neighbour, friend or relative. Investin a timer that turns on lights at different times. Tell your neighbour your holiday plans ask them to keep a look out and report to police any suspicious activity, straight away not the next day or tell you when you return. If you are going away for long stay make plans for someone to tend to your garden. There are a number of things that can be done to deter a burglar from breaking into your home. Persons going on holiday can complete an absence from residence form at the Drysdale Police Station.

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A CHILD'S RIGHT TO CONTACT

Recent amendments to the Family Law Act have done away with the proprietorial concepts of custody and access. The emphasis is now on children's rights and unless it is not in the best interests of a child, the child will have contact with the other parent.

Children now have a right of contact, on a regular basis, not only with their parents but also with any other adult or child who is significant to their care, welfare and development. In deciding whether to make a parenting order (a residence order, a contact order, a child maintenance order or a specific issues order) a court must regard the best interests of the child as the "paramount consideration".

The Act sets out various factors which a court must consider in deciding the best interests of a child.

One of the factors is the child's wishes. The court will give any expressed wishes the weight it considers appropriate, taking into account such factors as the child's age, maturity and level of understanding. The child's wishes are usually ascertained by a psychologist or Family Court counsellor. A child's expressed wishes will not, however, be automatically followed. A child can be forced or feel compelled to express certain wishes that are not in keeping with their real wishes and those wishes may be contrary to what is in the best interests of the child. Also, there is nothing in the Act which compels a child to express his or her wishes.

Another factor is the practical difficulty and expense of a child having contact with a parent and whether that difficulty or expense will substantially affect the child's right to main-



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tain personal relations and direct contact with both parents on a regular basis.

Parents who wish to relocate interstate or overseas pose a particular problem because the recent amendments to the Act were intended to involve both parents more in the parenting of the child. A Queensland Full Court decision is currently being awaited as to the affects of those amendments on relocation cases.

Sometimes a contact order will be made subject to financial conditions, for example, that the person in whose favour a contact order has been made pay the transport costs involved.

A further factor which a court can take into account is any family violence involving the child or a member of the child's family. If a court believes that a child may be harmed in some way by contact with a parent, it will usually place restrictions or conditions on the way in which contact is achieved rather than deny contact altogether For example, a contact order can include provision for non-personal contact by letter or telephone or that contact be supervised by a person approved by the court.

There are nine other factors set out in the legislation. Please contact our office for further information.

Contact orders are never final. In appropriate circumstances a dispute concerning contact with a child can be reheard by a court.

The Family Law Act expressly encourages parents to agree between themselves on the matters concerning their children rather than seek orders from a court. Parents can agree on these arrangements in the form of a parenting plan which can then be registered in a court. When a parenting plan is registered its provisions are enforceable as if they were court orders. Before a parenting plan is settled parents should obtain independent legal advice.

ACHIEVING FINANCIAL INDEPENDENCE

It's nearly Christmas. How has the past year been for you financially? Are you suffering from a severe case of "Cashectomy"? Is your New Years Resolution about not wasting money (you know - the same one resolution that you made last year and the one before that) in tatters?

If this is you - 'don't worry' situation typical. Why not heed the lessons of the past and take a few steps to make sure next Christmas (and all of the other expensive events during the year) are planned for.

Achieving financial independence is possible by keeping a few simple rules:

Prepare a Family Budget

Preparing a family budget is an important step towards achieving financial independence because:

It helps you determine how much you have available to invest;

It makes you accountable for your spending; and

It helps you to assess what you need to spend and what you can do without.





Invest Small Amounts Regularly

Its surprising how quickly small amounts, invested regularly, can grow. For example, \$25

invested each week at a real interest rate of say 6% per annum (i.e. after inflation of say 4%) grows to \$1,350 in one year, \$4,300 in three years and \$18,000 in ten years.

The important thing is to invest regularly no matter what else happens, i.e. make it **compulsory**. If you can't put it in your pocket, you won't miss it.

Understand The Difference Between "Saving" and "Investing".

In prior generations, Mum would take some of Dad's weekly pay and put it in the biscuit jar on the top shelf of the pantry. This might have been a good exercise for her calf muscles but it did nothing for the accumulation of the family wealth. The money was "saved" but it was not "invested".

The best strategy for you is to start investing as soon as possible and invest for as long as possible. You saw above how \$25 invested each week over ten years grows to \$18,000. If the same \$25 per week had been put in Mum's biscuit jar, it would have only grown to \$10,900 (after taking inflation into account).

Diversify Your Investments

Shares, property and fixed deposits all fluctuate in returns over a given period of time.



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For this reason it is foolish to risk all your money in one single investment.

Diversifying means protecting your investment. It means spreading the risk so you can sleep at night.

Understand The Relationship Between Risk and Return.

The basic principle is this - the higher the risk - the greater the return.

If your investment time frame is short term, then it is wise to place the money into investments, which are less speculative, and to accept the possibility of earning a lesser return.

For long term investments it is beneficial to place some funds into those areas which, although subject to short term volatility, will provide greater returns in the long term e.g. shares and property.

Be Comfortable With Your Advisor And The Advice Given

The world of finance and investment can be very daunting to the average Australian. Concepts such as "negative gearing, balanced returns and dollar cost averaging," etc can be confusing.

Make sure your advisor is able to offer a range of investment choices and is not tied to a few investment products. Also make sure that the advisor is able to communicate with you. You need to be able to clearly set out your goals and objectives so that the advisor can prepare an investment strategy, which suits your goals and objectives.

Good luck - here's hoping that 1998 is the year that you commence the journey towards your financial independence.
