

DRYSDALE COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTRE AUXILIARY 10TH BIRTHDAY.

Drysdale Community Health Centre Auxiliary was formed in February, 1989. Sister Joan Falahey called the first meeting held at the Bush Nursing Centre in Princess Street.

The aim of the auxiliary was to work towards a new health building and to equip same.

First President was Gloria Russell - Vice Presidents - Joyce Waisal and Ella Goodwin - Secretary - Joyce Nunn, Treasurer - Lesley Taylor. Committee members Isabel Dickins, Joy Ward, Val Kensen, and Bub Naye. 5 members who attended the first meeting are still members today.

Our first fund raiser was a tapestry with the profit of \$131.66.

An application for land to build the new centre was made to Bellarine Shire in March 1990 at 23-25 Palmerston Street.

Thanks to the Senior Citizens we held our meeting in their hall on the second Tuesday of the month until the new building was completed in March 1994. What a delight to have a place of our own with the Commonwealth Government giving only \$50,000 towards the cost with the Advisory Committee, our auxiliary with the help of local service clubs and individuals raising the remainder. The main source of the fund raising was the manning of the show gates, which we helped with but we lost this in 1997.

The Managers, C.E.O. and Co-ordinators have all helped our Auxiliary - first Graeme Howie then Austin Patterson and now our present C.E.O. Mayneen Curtis.

Norma Davis was appointed President in August, 1991 and has held that position to this

day with Lesley Taylor a foundation member going from Treasurer to Secretary.

In over 10 years of operation we have raised in excess of \$40,000. We have purchased crockery, cutlery, tablecloths, paid the changeover on the day care bus \$14,000 and a dishwasher for the kitchen.

The Auxiliary have worked hard fund raising mainly through catering, competitions, fashion parades, bingo days and trips. Shirley and Alby Moore who have organised our Christmas hamper competition for the last 5 years have raised over \$4000 towards our centre.

Over the last 10 years we have maintained a membership of 25.

Our highlight of the last year was taking knee rugs made and donated by our members to Corralin Hostel at Queenscliff. What joy it brought to these residents and joy to us as well to see how much there were appreciated.

If you would like to be shown how to make cream puffs, make a sponge (that took 11/4 to cook in our new oven) see other peoples craft, listen to guest speakers on health and local topics come along to our meetings the 2nd Tuesday of the month at 10.00a.m. In 10 years due to the cost of living the cost of a cup of tea has increased from 10c to 50c.

New members always welcome.


The Rotary Club of Drysdale in conjunction with the Geelong Society of Model and Experimental Engineers (GSMEE) commenced operations on Sunday 3rd January by running three Miniature Steam Trains and offering rides to interested public for a nominal charge. It is intended to run each Sunday in the holiday period and future running days will be advertised.

Some 700 metres of track has been constructed in the Rotary Children's Park adjacent to the Pt. Richards boat ramp car park at Portarlington. The Rotary Club constructed the track, platform and 'steaming bays' with the GSMEE constructing points, expansion joints and the turntable. The Rotary Club has

also planted several hundred trees and shrubs in a beautification program.

In addition the GSMEE has almost completed building an engine for which the Rotary Club has supplied material and components. The engine will be used for pulling several carriages and it is expected to be operating by the time this article goes to press. Plans have been completed for an appropriate station building to be constructed in the near future.

The Miniature Railway has been a very ambitious project that has required hundreds of hours of voluntary work to bring the project to fruition and both organisations should be congratulated for the foresight and effort involved.

THE BELLARINE CALISTHENIC COLLEGE

The Bellarine Calisthenic College commenced classes in March 1994, with 35 pupils, and over the past 5 years has more than doubled in size, with a current enrolment of over 70 girls ranging in age from 3 years upwards.

Calisthenics is a competitive team sport in which girls are trained in physical culture, including apparatus technique, aesthetic exercise, modern dance, march, folkdancing and singing.

Through the various items, girls gain value in the areas of physical development, co-ordination and rhythm, concentration, self-awareness, self-discipline and social awareness. Calisthenics provides the opportunity for children to experience a wide variety of activity not specifically gymnastics, dance, drama - as it encompasses a taste of many interests.

Girls train once a week, and from mid-July to mid-September/October the College participates in Team competition - Local Geelong, State Titles in Melbourne.

Over the 5 years that the College has been running, the girls have received numerous awards for their efforts, including many 1st place and Competition Aggregate Trophies.

In 1998, the Tinie and Sub-Juniors sections became State Champions in their Division after being the Aggregate Winners at the State Titles in Melbourne. Both Sections have been promoted to Division 7 in 1999.

The Junior and Intermediate sections continue to also do well. This year will see many of our Aggregate winning Tinies and Sub-Juniors from previous years move up into the Junior and Intermediate sections. The College also now caters for Senior girls aged 16 and over.

IN YOUR GARDEN

The joys of summer gardening are upon us. Those hot windy drying days provide a good test for the stamina of both man and plants. Fortunately for mankind we can slip inside to the relative cool of the house, but the poor old plants have to tough it out. The preparation that has been put into the garden over the preceding months should now be starting to tell. If you have not fed your garden and laid down a thick layer of mulch you may well be watching the plants suffering from the extremes of weather. A healthy plant with access to plenty of moisture will be much more able to tolerate whatever summer can throw at it. The other major consideration in the garden at this time of the year is water or rather the lack of it. It is widely thought that watering the garden after a hot day for a couple of hours is the best way to help your plants

recover. The best way to keep your plants happy is to have them WELL watered before the really hot stuff arrives, not the leaves the ground. A good soaking once a week will keep the garden, if it is mulched, quite happy. Then after any particular hot day it should only be necessary to give those things which are obviously stressed an extra drink. This still provides the opportunity for one to stand outside and water the plants as a means of therapy to wind down after a hard day. One still needs to be conscious of the fact that a deep water around a plant is much better than a splash.




BELLARINE JONGLEURS JUNIORS



If he cannot physically cope with an obstacle he will ask, without embarrassment, for assistance. His greatest problem today is coping with technological changes. The computer and the photocopier do at times present difficulties when they malfunction. A person without two good hands has a serious problem unjamming paper in the latest photocopying machine and it is very useful to have at least one good hand if you wish to use the keyboard of the computer. However, this does not deter him and he will endeavor to work out a way to do these things without assistance if he can.

All of us who work with Adrian at SpringDale have tremendous admiration for his achievements especially the positive, optimistic, humorous and determined attitude which he displays at all times. He is an inspiration to all and we are absolutely delighted at the awarding of this Honour as public recognition of his courage and service to his Community and his Country.



CLIFTON SPRINGS FORESHORE UPDATE

In 1996 an Advisory Committee was established to formulate a draft Master and Management Plan for the Clifton Springs Foreshore

In 1997, Council adopted the Landscape and Management Master Plan for the Clifton Springs Foreshore and \$60,000 was allocated towards Stage One development.

The advisory committee comprises of members from the Rotary Club of Drysdale, Lions Club of Portarlington/Drysdale, Drysdale Sportsfishing Club Inc, Clifton Springs Golf Club, Clifton Springs Bowling Club, Drysdale Fire Brigade, Drysdale Scout Group and four community members.

The Advisory Committee is now working towards developing part of Stage One of the Master Plan by concentrating on developing the "Fairy Dell" with works including:


- 1. Archaeological Heritage Survey and Report.
- 2. Removal of the old existing playground equipment and installation of junior and senior playground equipment by January 31, 1999.

- 3. Upgrading and painting the existing rotundas in theme colours.
- 4. Repainting of the toil block in theme colours.
- 5. Minor road works including storm water drainage and construction of pedestrian paths.
- Provision of two electric barbecues
- 7. Provision for extra picnic tables/seats.

Plans are currently being finalised addressing traffic/pedestrian safety and storm water/drainage issues in accordance with the provisions of the adopted Master Plan.

It is hoped to have both the junior and senior playground equipment installed prior to end of January with the other works to follow as funds permit.
