

ROTARY CLUB OF DRYSDALE

On the Rotary Calendar, November is designated as the "Rotary Foundation Month". THE OBJECTIVE OF THE ROTARY FOUNDATION is the furthering of understanding and friendly relations between people of different nations through the fostering of tangible and effective programs of a charitable and educational nature.

THE MISSION OF THE ROTARY FOUNDATION is to support the efforts of Rotary International to achieve world understanding and peace through international humanitarian, educational and cultural exchange programs.

Contributions to the Rotary Foundation come from: 1) Individual Rotarians, 2) Rotary Clubs, 3) Friends of Rotary

One of the world wide programs of the Rotary Foundation, which was given the highest priority since its inception in 1985, was the Polio Plus program with the objective to eradicate this dreaded disease affecting millions of children world wide by

the year 2005. To date Rotary has committed \$US 378 million to global Polio eradication. By the year 2005 this figure will surpass a half a billion US Dollars. Rotarians have mobilised by the hundreds of thousands to ensure that children are immunised against this crippling disease and that surveillance is strong, despite the poor infrastructure, extreme poverty, and civil strife of many countries. More than 2 billion children have received the oral polio vaccine since 1985. At the start of this program there were 125 polio-endemic countries. By the year 2000 that figure had declined to 30.

One of the other Humanitarian Programs is the (3H) Health, Hunger and Humanity program, which are 2-5 years international development projects to improve health, alleviate hunger, or enhance development through self-help activities. There are a host of other humanitarian programs covering many facets of society.

Just to mention a couple of the Educational Programs of the Rotary Foundation: 1) Ambassadorial Scholarships: to students who serve as ambassadors of goodwill to improve international understanding while furthering their studies overseas. 2) Group Studies Exchange Awards which enables outstanding young non-Rotarian business and professional persons to further their vocational expertise in another country for 4-6 weeks.

The above are but a few of the Rotary Programs under the umbrella of The Rotary Foundation.

The Rotary Club of Drysdale meets every Monday evening at the Drysdale hotel 6:00 for 6:30 start and we invite any professional/ business people, male, female, who are interested to volunteer their time and talents in service to the community on a local, national and international level. Since our meetings are dinner meetings it is essential to book for catering purposes by Monday noon on 5253 3456.

TRAVELTALK

Considered as one of the last vast and unspoiled continents, a trip to Africa is a unique experience and the adventure of a lifetime. Glenn and I travelled to Botswana and Zambia in September and had the most magnificent time.

The Okavango is the greatest inland river delta in the world. Within it's vast domain, an extensive network of rivulets, channels and islets support a rich variety of bird and plant life, along with a multitude of small animals. The ideal way to get around is by mokoro – a traditional canoe – paddling through the tangled web of waterways that provide a framework for this fascinating ecological system.

We stayed at Landela Safari Lodges. They provide outstanding personalized service and the ultimate in rustic luxury to provide accommodation that is second to none. Xudum Camp is on a 3000ha private concession where desert and Cheetah, Elephant, delta unite. Lion, Red Lechwe, 100's of birds and many other animals live in the area. From here we went to Rann's Camp. Tucked away on a private island amongst a wide diversity of trees, wildlife and some more of Africa's magnificent birds. This is where we went mokoroing (dug out canoes) with the Hippos! A short charter flight north took us to Kisane



and the Chobe Valley Lodge. This is the home to 100's of elephant and is near the Zambezi River bordering Botswana, Zimbabwe and Namibia. Here I met Stephanie, ex travel agent from Australia and went fishing with her husband, Stefan, the owner of the lodge. I nearly broke Glenn's heart by catching a huge 7kg tiger fish first up. 9 hours later he managed to catch one at 8kg. Lucky or we'd still be trolling up and down the Zambezi!

Many consider Zambia "the real Africa". The north of the country features many national parks, which are plentiful with game, boasting magnificent bushvelds, and is largely unvisited by tourists. Scotty, an Australian Expat and her husband Allan Elliot have recently opened new lodges in Zambia "Star of Africa". They are the most luxurious of lodges in stunning safari destinations. South Luangwa is one of the greatest wildlife sanctuaries in the world and is home of the Chichele Presidential Lodge. It has a turn-ofthe-century hunting lodge atmosphere and is ideal for walking safaris. Livingston, a wildlife reserve sits on the Zambian side of Victoria Falls and the Zambezi River. Here we stayed at Sussi & Chuma - Victoria Falls. Located in the Mosi-Oa-Tunya National Park upstream from Victoria Falls, the luxury tree houses are built among the branches of Ebony. This was a beautiful way to end a fantastic holiday - cruising on the river (with Glenn fishing, of course), relaxing by the pool and having a Gin and Tonic while watching the sunset over the mighty Zambezi.

In Your Garden

The dams are full, the garden is lovely and moist, now all we need is some sunshine and our gardens will be glorious. The start of Summer is with us but it feels like the middle of Spring! No really hot days, just pleasant temperatures to make the most of the wonderful rain to recharge our gardens. The only down side to the weather that we

have been experiencing is the per-The strong growing conditions will

fect conditions for growing fungussss's, or maybe that's fungi. Roses are probably the best indicator of the amount of fungi about, with more than their fair share showing Black Spot, Powdery Mildew and the odd bit of Rust. There is not a lot you are able to do other than spray with a fungicide of some sort or another. Triforine, Baycor, Kocide and Mancozeb with all help in the eradication of fungi. You will probably have to do a number of sprays over a period of time to fix the problem, and if the weather continues wet the period of time could be quite long.

produce excellent new growth on plants, but be watchful that excessive growth does not become susceptible to wind damage, ie. too long and it tears off in the wind. Enjoy the warmer weather that accompanies the Summer season happy in the knowledge that water restrictions should not cause us any grief in the coming year. Speaking of the coming year, Christmas is upon us once again! It seems not very long ago that it was Christmas, but it's back again. Oh well it's a good excuse to have a big get together and eat lots of lovely food. 


"Out There" - Clifton

It was my pleasure to recently attend a dinner at the Clifton Springs Golf Club in support of "Out There", an initiative of the combined Churches, which is tackling youth issues on the Bellarine Peninsula. The evening was an opportunity to celebrate the Churches achievement and to draw attention to the challenges they face. "Out There" is doing valiant work against the odds in addressing youth needs, abuse of alcohol and drugs, and "sleeping around" as one youth worker put it.

As a result of the issues raised that evening, I acknowledged the work of "Out There" in Parliament. As we all know, young people require some guidance during their childhood and teenage years in order for them to make positive and life enhancing choices. Facilities and their associated activities play a large part in their positive development. "Out There" is providing the programs and mentoring to make a difference, but I am deeply concerned the facilities for this age group are virtually non-existent. I have called on State and Local Governments to address the lack of facilities for children and young people on the Bellarine Peninsula as a matter of urgency.

How do you want to see?

This may seem a very simple question, however many people are so used to the vision which they have that they are not aware of other possibilities of seeing. Usually when there is a vision problem a visit to the local optometrist or G.P. is the first port of call to find out if there is anything wrong. In most cases this is remedied with glasses so that the sharpness of sight comes back. This can be most satisfying initially but after a while things can get fuzzy again. Then, in the majority of cases, an increase in the strength of lenses takes place which can be quite annoying because the dependence on glasses becomes more evident. Nowadays everyone believes that once you start wearing glasses that this is the downhill slide from here.

Would you like to know that another outcome is possible? As amazing as this may seem a new method of prescribing lenses has now been developed which has a more restorative nature. Just like in dentistry, orthodontic braces can be prescribed for the realignment of teeth which after a specified period of time can then be disassembled. A method to 'realign' the eyes is also possible, opening up a far greater potential for a person's vision over a period of time. This can subsequently lead to different career choices which may not have been possible or improve the golf game to even a greater sense of wellbeing.

Vision is so fundamental in our lives considering all the activities in which we require it. So wouldn't it be nice to take control of your vision to allow the things that you do with your eyes to be done more easily and enjoyably?

Michael G Christian is an optometrist and vision therapist who has recently joined the Drysdale Clinic to offer an integrative approach to vision care to this community. Essentially this means he prescribes glasses which have not only an optical benefit of seeing better but an enhanced effect on the sense of perspective. This can change the way you see in a more dynamic manner. Introducing a 'dynamic' to vision can then start activating and reintegrating muscle systems of the eyes to take more control of themselves such that lenses then become more of a therapeutic tool than just an optical aid. He has successfully prescribed glasses to people of all ages and in many cases got them out of glasses with sequentially decreasing lens strengths over a period of time. The effects of this therapy can have profound effects on the rest of the body, e.g. balance problems, neck tension, just to mention a couple. He has recently written a book about this called "Get out of glasses with Glasses!" and is in the process of getting it published. Michael and his family have recently relocated to this area from Western Australia and are very happy to live in this beautiful part of Victoria.



SCHOOL LEAVERS SHOULDN'T IGNORE AMBULANCE COVER

Rural Ambulance Victoria is urging school leavers to ensure they are properly covered for the use of an ambulance in an emergency.

The call comes as figures reveal almost 1,900 rural Victorians have taken out Ambulance Service Victoria membership during the past

Business Development Manager Mike McCrabb said the latest membership figures revealed an increase of 3,608 Ambulance Membership in the three months to October 2001.

"This clearly indicates rural Victorians are becoming more aware of the need to have Ambulance Service Membership."

However, Mr McCrabb today said some young people might not be

covered under their parents' Ambulance Membership.

"An \$80 a year family subscription covers all children up until the age of 25, provided they are dependent on their parents," said Mr McCrabb.

"However, once a young person turns 18, gets a job and is no longer dependant on the family, that person must take out their own Ambulance Service Victoria Membership in order to be covered for the use of an ambulance."

"One of the benefits of being a member of Ambulance Service Victoria is that any medically necessary trip anywhere in Australia is free,' Mr McCrabb said.

"Ambulance fees for those who are not members or entitled to free services can be expensive and the cost of an emergency ride in an ambulance from rural Victoria to a Melbourne hospital can average \$4,000."

"Ambulance Service Victoria membership also funds about 19% of Rural Ambulance Victoria's annual budget."

"The cost of a subscription is not high, \$40 a year for singles and \$80 for families: and it's a small price to pay for what could be a life saving trip."

Mr McCrabb said a new Ambulance Service subscription could be arranged by phoning 1800 64 84 84.

TIRED DRIVERS TARGETED IN UNIQUE SAFETY CAMPAIGN

Tiredness behind the wheel could be the cause of more than 25 per cent of the 400 plus fatal crashes in Victoria. But a new and unique road safety awareness campaign explains how to avoid being a dangerous and tired driver.

The 'Too Tired to Drive' campaign was devised by RACV, Rural Ambulance Victoria (RAV) and Metropolitan Ambulance Service (MAS) amid fears the Christmas road toll could be one of the worst in recent years. It targets an estimated million Victorians in their work places in one of the biggest direct email road safety campaigns ever undertaken in Victoria.

Through the memberships of the Australian Human Resources Institute (AHRI), more than 17,000 human resources professionals nation-

ally, 31 per cent of which are in Victoria, will receive potentially life-saving information through the campaign. They will be asked to email or pass that information to their workforce in time for the Christmas holidays - a peak danger period on our roads.

"Human Resources departments care about worker safety in the workplace or away from it. Our email campaign with AHRI will be arming them with a fatigue checklist to pass to their work force," said RACV Manager Public Policy, Dr Ken Ogden.

"The Too Tired to Drive checklist alerts drivers to the dangers and the danger signs of being fatigued on the road. Perhaps the most startling statistic is that being awake for 17 hours has the same affect on your driving ability as having a Blood Alcohol Concentration of 0.05."


Rural Ambulance Victoria (RAV) Paramedics know only too well the horrors of road crashes.

"Every holiday season. Paramedics attend an increased number of road crashes," said Rural Ambulance Victoria Acting Director of Operational Services, Alan Pegg.

"The results of these crashes are shattered lives and bodies, and emotional trauma for the families and loved ones of those involved. The tragedy is most of these crashes could so easily have been prevented, and there is absolutely no doubt in my mind that fatigue has been a contributing factor."

"I urge every person travelling on the State's roads to learn from the past - follow the checklist, eliminate fatigue to ensure you're not too tired to travel and increase your chances of travelling crash free and enjoying your holiday."

MOSQUITOES

As residents are aware, mosquitoes are a menace on some parts of the Bellarine Peninsula. I have raised the issue in Parliament, calling for the Government to cooperate with the City of Greater Geelong in facilitating a comprehensive mosquito-spraying program.

The mosquito common to the area belongs to the Aedes genus and can carry life-threatening diseases such as Ross River fever and ARBO. They are found particularly on the salt marsh environs of the Bellarine Peninsula, especially around the lower bluff area of St Leonards.

This year mosquitoes are in plague proportions and are tormenting residents and making life a misery. I am advised, however, that some Government officers insist mosquitoes are natural fauna and therefore should be left alone. By contrast, Mr David Renton, a local

and respected mosquito control expert with over 25 years of experience in the field, says that mosquito control can be achieved with minimal effect on the environment.

He uses biological controls including a product called Vectobac BTI, in a mist application with a maximum residual effect of 24 hours; with minimal harm to the environment.


The City of Greater Geelong, which is responsible for local mosquito control, is getting plenty of criticism for its handling of this issue. However, the problem is that the Department of Natural Resources and Environment senior policy advisers are refusing to cooperate with the City of Greater Geelong's environmental officers who are concerned about the potential threat.

With the approach of summer, I have asked the Minister to intervene

and instruct her department to cooperate with the City of Greater Geelong and deal with the problem before any serious health consequences eventuate on the Peninsula.

Dreams and Potential

Who knows what a child's actual potential really is and who knows what may happen in the future to curtail that potential?

Compare: - the number of elite sportsmen successfully making a profitable living from sport to the number of children receiving sports coaching and participating in junior sporting activities. - the number of musicians and instrumentalists who gain fame and fortune to the number of children who are given music lessons. - The number of wealthy business men and women to the number of children receiving "advanced tutoring" and so forth., In all instances the percentage is rather low.

Many children dream of acquiring fame and reaching the pinnacle of a chosen career/activity. Many parents perceive their child as having great potential and dream of their child achieving great things. In reality only a very few achieve such

heights.

The intention of this article is not to say that one should not dream, as dreams are important for providing direction and motivation to achieve and do better, and without them the child/teenager could feel hopeless and have no feeling of future worth.

How parents deal with their child's dreams and their own perceived expectation of their child's potential is important. If the dream becomes an expectation, by either the child or the parent then all too often the child/teenager is being set up to fail.

Parents need to help children/ teenagers set achievable realistic goals that can be met now. The dream can always be there but the fulfilment of a perceived potential, or a future dream, should not place pressure on what is happening now. By focusing on the present and attainment of short-term goals the individual has greater chance of succeeding and being motivated to continue in this area. And if the dream or perceived potential is not met, there has been success along the way and the individual is more likely to continue to participate and be satisfied with their achievements.

When encouraging and praising, parents also need to place equal - if not greater - importance on the process rather than the product. When parents value and praise only accomplishments (eg good grades or trophies) they are increasing the chances of the child/teenager failing, as not everyone wins. Further more the child/teenager may not feel valued for who she/he is but rather only for what they do. This in-turn can lead to the development of a selfconcept based on what they do, rather than what they are and possible low self-esteem. High achievement in children should be encouraged but should not be the benchmark against which the child measures him/herself, nor should it place any undue stress on the child/teenagers who are over ambitious and/ or perfectionists.

All children/teenagers need to experience success if they are to develop into well adjusted adults – and all can – it just depends what you're measuring.




Think through your daily routines – the garbage bin for instance. Leaving it at the gate will give the game away. If you don't want to ask the
