The cast of over 30 singers and dancers from across the Bellarine Peninsula and Geelong have been in rehearsals since early February, and Ron says that he is delighted with the sound that is coming from the voices, particularly the harmonies of the chorus.

To be performed at the Senior Citizens' Hall, Symonds Street, Queenscliff over the period 2nd - 10th June, with seven performances, including two matinee on the Saturdays, this delightful musical will feature songs from the music hall era of Britain in the early 1900s. Evening performances on 2nd, 3rd, 8th, 9th and 10th June commence at 7.30pm; matinee performances on the two Saturdays, 3rd and 10th June, start at 1.30pm

News from the Friends of the Bellarine Rail Trail



Hello to all our readers once again,

Even though we are having a very dry start to the year - we have begun our planting program on the trail - countering this dry situation with a lot of repeat watering of the first year plants. 682 plants have been installed over 3 locations and the number of volunteer hours spent by our members so far this year totals just over 500.

One of the major problems on the trail at present is the spreading of the (introduced) Broom plant behind the Curlewis Golf Course, which is growing predominately in clusters. Two working bees have been conducted in this area and much of the Broom has been removed. The Council supplied a lot of specialised removal / safety equipment that enables us to cover a good area fairly quickly.

Coming up shortly will be a writeup from field naturalist David King - who is an expert on bugs, reptiles etc. His write-up will concentrate on what creatures used to live on the trail, and also what creatures have been lost within this habitat, so we look forward to his findings.

The installation of 5 parrot nesting boxes is complete, those boxes installed at various locations between Moolap and Curlewis. More boxes are planned in the future, for other bird species and animals.

On a safety issue - our group is concerned about the (unauthorised) intrusion of cars onto the trail track, especially between Andersons Rd. Drysdale and Fellows Rd. Point Lonsdale. We are asking CoGG to replace the gates and barriers that have been damaged, and in some cases, removed or stolen. One of the main attractions of the trail is that it is CAR FREE and we want to keep it this way!

CoGG has once again supported our group with annual funding and we thank them and our two local Councillors for their continued support. Other "Funding Applications" have been sent to the Federal Government Envirofund and one other environment organisation – so fingers crossed. More funds mean that we can eventually have a better trail that is more attractive and utilised community asset.

Finally, the CoGG Advisory Committee (which has 2 Friends representatives) is continuing to work with CoGG staff and other stakeholders, on a Draft Report that seeks to identify, and bring to reality, Priority Improvements on the trail – over the next 10 years. Whilst the final objectives are yet still to be determined, the themes of trail preservation, increased community participation, any new facilities designed to reflect a railway heritage, and group partnerships - are all central. More info on these developments as they come to hand.

See you on the Rail Trail sometime.

My experience with Drysdale Leopold Pony Club

I joined in 1996 as soon as I got my first pony. I was with the club for 9 years. My first reason for joining was so I could get regular monthly lessons, from a variety of different instructors. During my time at the club I had the chance to compete at many PCAV (Pony Club Association of Victoria) events. This opened up the doorway to many exciting and varied competitions and experiences.

The club is a great way to network and meet many new like-minded people. Usually each year a camp was put together as a fun way of mixing horses and socializing. At the end of each year an awards evening and break up is held. Awards are given out to the riders who have put in a superior effort all year, as well as an encouragement award to the riders who have attended every rally for the year.

The club meets each month with what is referred to as a rally. There are 11 rallies held a year. Every member is assessed and put into a group of riders who are at a similar level. Each group has a group leader who is in charge of the group and makes sure they are with the right instructor at the right time. When I was there we had 2 morning lessons, then lunch and theory, then 2 more lessons in the afternoon. The day's lessons were very varied and could range from: Dressage, Show Jumping, Cross Country, Polo Crosse, Games, a trail ride or any other riding activity.

The theory lessons were put in place so we could work on our certificates. The PCAV has created certificates at different levels at which you are tested on all aspects of riding and horse knowledge. A teacher/ instructor would help us to go through what we needed to know.

As a typical young Pony Clubber, the rally day was something that was highly anticipated for me. I would wash and groom my horse and gear and make sure everything was just right. The excitement of waking in the morning and riding my pony down to the club grounds, seeing my friends, meeting new people and learning new things was just a few reasons why I loved to be a member of the Pony Club.

New V/Line Ticket

If you are travelling from Geelong to Melbourne, and return, you will now be able to access trams, buses and trains covered by a Metcards in Zone 1 at no extra cost.

Travelling from Geelong to Melbourne on a single ticket will give you an hour's free travel on trams, buses and trains covered by Metcards in Zone 1.

The new V/Line ticket will now indicate which of the three Metcard zones you can travel in -Z1, Z2 or Z3 – and the date for which your ticket is valid. If you want to travel beyond the Zone indicated you'll need to buy a Metcard for the extra Zone.



I don't suppose you considered that every month I had original thoughts to share with you. Well, actually I do most of the time, but this month I am relying on notes from a very nice diary which my beloved gave me last Christmas - "Beauty and Bliss". The notes for June include a word from Peter Cundall.

'Winter is the busiest time for gardeners. It's the safest time for trees and shrubs to be planted or relocated, roses can be planted or pruned, and old perennial clumps lifted and divided to create more plants.

Winter is also the most creative season. Add to this, cool sparkling days, perfect working conditions and the joy of being among the colours and scents of winter flowers. Life in a Winter garden is indeed good.'

Well, thank you, Peter. I had not actually thought of winter like that. To me, I had visions of snuggling up nicely with a book and only venturing out when the weather was *conducive*. Those of us living on the Peninsula know all about biting winds, don't we?

What to do in the garden in June.

Start planting bare rooted roses. They are available in nurseries now. Prune fruit trees and vines.

Lift and divide dahlia tubers. Nip out the sweet peas at around 15 cms tall for a bushier plant with more flowers. Plant liliums. Move deciduous trees that are in the wrong place.

Flowers and vegatable

Calendula, carnation, delphinium, foxgloves, gysophila, lupin, nigelia, poppies.

Asparagus, broad beans, carrot, garlic, leeks, potato, rhubarb.

Making Rain

Doug Palmer on seeking solutions to Australia's changing weather patterns

If nothing is done, Melbourne will be out of water by 2012. Such is the seriousness of the situation outlined in Doug Palmer's well researched paper on the water crisis we are facing in Australia.

There is insufficient space here to do justice to Doug's address, however edited extracts from a report sent to the Federal Government, provides an excellent summary. The report was prepared by a group* concerned with the lack of action on the water crisis. It urges the Federal Coalition Government to immediately investigate the use of Cloud Seeding to create the run off needed to fill our water storage facilities and to return the 30% of rainfall lost over the last 20 years. We have 80% of our storage facilities empty, which has been the case for the last four years. Also many of our domestic reservoirs are critically low.

Large areas of the Wimmera and Mallee are slowly becoming marginal and will not be viable for farming. There is a large amount of scientific evidence stored by the Department of the Environment and Heritage Canberra A.C.T. to prove we have lost 30% of our rainfall over the last 20 years.

There is also very strong evidence that it can be associated with heavy industry, smelters, refineries and power generation using brown coal. Photographs taken by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) show large areas of cloud affected to the point of total suppression proving there is a cloud pollution problem.

Heavy Industry has been built around coastal areas close to shipping and transport in our area. However they are also down wind of our South West Weather Pattern and as a consequence pollute incoming cloud with smoke particles that constipate the clouds and prevent the formation of rain droplets. The solution is to seed the suitable clouds with silver iodide.

There are some 40 countries around the world using seeding, documented evidence from Israel. Texas, Tasmania and the Snow Mountains Hydro Ltd., have all shown rainfall increases of up to 40%. The Federal Member, Mr. John Forest MP did an extensive study tour of the Texas Application and recorded his findings in his booklet "Harvesting the Skies".

World Leading Scientists including Professor Rosenfield of the Laboratory of Rain and Cloud Physics of Jerusalem. and Mr. Aron Gingis MRA, Dip Eng., lecturer in Cloud Physics at Monash University, have carried out research in this field with promising results.


It is estimated that the cost of a seeding programme would be approximately five million dollars per year and would need to be conducted over a period of five years to monitor results.

These costs are minute compared with the \$150 million cost drought relief payment, and also the loss of \$10 million in primary production. *The Group consists of a number of scientists and others concerned by the Government's lack of action to address the water crisis.

The benefits of cloud seeding

Accurate recordings have shown the success of seeding, when Professor Daniel Rosenfield introduced cloud seeding to Israel, some 12 years ago using salt water out of the Black Sea, transforming the harsh environment into a productive food producing State. According to the cloud scientists some 40 countries around the world are using this method to enhance rainfall.

Some of the documented successes include seeding in the Snowy Mountains to produce more snow fall. Using rockets. the last three snow seasons have been the best for years. The cost was about \$3 million. Tasmania successfully introduced seeding because of a water shortage for the Hydro Power generators
