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Its here - a safer place for children to cross High Street in the morning and in the afternoon on their way to and from school - on the designated bike path. Youth members have already been spotted using it. This is the culmination of many years and hundreds of hours of effort. Liaising with Lisa Neville, VicRoads, City of Greater Geelong and finally Tom O'Connor took up the cause and achieved an outcome for our town and our residents. I am sure anyone who has tried to cross High Street to get from the Drysdale Railway Station to the continuation of the railtrail, during the Christmas holiday season, will also make good use of the "refuge".

Congratualtions to everyone who had a hand in making this simple solution a positive outcome for our town. Thanks Tom O'Connor for your interest and for helping to make this a reality.





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Clifton Springs Primary School

Our Grade 3 /4 children visited the Western Treatment Plant in Werribee to support last semester's curriculum, and the Grade Prep -2 students went to a performance by a visiting Fairytale Puppet Theatre

Student Recounts from the Western Treatment Plant

On Friday May 19th, the Grade 3/4's went on an excursion to the Western Treatment Plant, (Sewerage Factory), in Werribee. The place where it gets cleaned there is a tower where it burns the methane out of it which helps clear the sewerage. A lot of the sewerage goes into a place where there are giant

stirrers. There was a big model that showed us the water cycle, how the water gets to our homes and where it goes to after its been used. A lot of things can dissolve but a lot of rubbish takes a long while. That is why rubbish such as plastic bags and cigarettes are passed on through to the sea and a lot of animals die.

Then we went to the frog centre. There were about 7 different frogs that were extinct. One of the species was extinct in 1966 and the last one died in the man's hand. The Growling Grass Frog lives near Clifton Springs. The brown coloured frogs are the ones that live near Clifton Springs and dig under ground. Frogs, unlike humans can stay under ground for 6 years without food or water. A lot of the time they are under ground they are asleep. When they come up they wouldn't by dying of thirst or really needing some food. Frogs can live in different habitats. Childcare & Kinder Funding

I was very pleased to be able to announce recently that the following Childcare centres and Kinders in Drysdale and Clifton Springs received funding through the Government's minor capital grants program:

- City Learning & Care, Drysdale
- Drysdale Preschool
- Drysdale Primary School OSHC
- Clifton Springs Pre-School
- Clifton Springs Primary School OSHC
- Beacon Point Pre-School, Clifton Springs

Services will receive individual grants of up to \$5,000 for things like new sporting equipment, digital cameras and new fridges, or to brighten a room with new carpet or furniture.

I know how important good quality services are for families and the role that Kinders and Childcare centres play is central to the lives of those with young children. This funding is one way in which the Government can support the work of these vital services and assist them to be accessible and to meet the needs of local families.

Record Funding for Neighbourhood Houses

As many of you know, I have a particular interest in the work of our neighbourhood houses in Bellarine, having worked at SpringDale before being elected to Parliament.

So it was a great pleasure to be able to let them all know about the \$27.8 million funding, over four years, that has been allocated to neighbourhood houses. SpringDale will be one of the houses eligible to apply for funding for extended hours and I will work with them to achieve this.

The increased funding reflects the Government's commitment to building stronger communities and the recognition of the vital role neighbourhood houses play in that process. Staff and volunteers at SpringDale certainly fulfil that role, connecting people and providing opportunities to develop friendships, have fun, learn new skills, and be part of the community.

School Start Bonus & Apprentice/Trainee Allowance

This year's budget provides for a \$300 School Start Bonus for all parents with students commencing in Prep and Year 7.

Families with students who started in Prep and Year 7 this year will receive \$150 payment to be made at the start of Term 3.

This acknowledges the additional costs for families when their children start in Primary School and High School and this will assist in meeting those costs.

To encourage young people to continue with their apprenticeships and traineeships and offset some of their costs, all first year apprentices and trainees will receive a \$500 Apprentice/Trainee Trade Bonus.

In addition there has been an increase of the Apprentice/Trainee Accommodation Allowance from \$9 to \$25.

Parents Returning to Work

Under the recently announced Parents Returning to Work program, up to 1700 parents will receive \$1000 work training grants. The grant can be used for training courses at universities, neighbourhood houses, TAFE institutions and private registered training organisations. It also includes childcare, books, and first-year HECS fees.

To be eligible, parents must have been out of the paid workforce for two years or more and be caring for children 12 and younger.

Each year the Open Day attracts in excess of 5,000 people and is a great opportunity to visit the Parliament and tour areas not usually open to the general public.


The theme of this year's Open Day is the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the Parliament of Victoria and 150 years of democracy in our State.

Commendable Community Contribution

Congratulations to Anne Brackley on her 30 years as a Guide Leader. Anne is an inspirational community member, who gives her time and knowledge selflessly. We wish, on this special occasion to acknowledge and honour her incredible contribution to the Australian Guiding community.

Anne's Guiding journey started at the tender age of seven. As a Brownie she worked hard to achieve the prestigious Golden Hand Badge. In awe of the much bigger and scarier Guides, Anne was reluctant to move up into the senior age bracket. Luckily for the Guiding family, after some encouragement, from her supportive mother, Anne flew up to Guides on a pink cloud. Unfortunately, the Drysdale unit was disbanded when Anne was 14. This did not deter her, who at that time was working towards the Queens Guide Badge. Through sheer luck, Anne was invited to join the Portarlington Unit where she finished her Queens Guide and went on to become one of the finest leaders Guides has ever seen.

30 years later, Anne actively works to impart the timeless Guiding values on young women in the Drysdale district. After reflecting on all the changes she has seen throughout her expansive Guiding experiences, Anne believes the lessons Guides teaches are the same today, as they were when the founder of Guides and Scouts, Lord Baden-Powell, first conceived them. Uniforms have changed, badge systems have been altered, but Anne teaches young women how to be contributing members of society, show compassion, have loyalty, be trustworthy, promote ever lasting friendships, impart valuable time management skills and most importantly encourage the desire to help others.

Anne is my personal Guiding role model, and I am sure any girl who has ever had the privilege of being led by Anne would emulate my praise of her. In her modest re-telling of her early years, she recounts her own Guiding role models. Mrs Bigmore, Anne's Brownie leader taught her patience, a virtue which Anne displays in limitless quantities. Mrs Deeath always encouraged all her girls to give it a go, and instilled the belief that nothing is impossible if we only try. Also, Betty Quirk, another of Anne's influential leaders, was responsible for shaping Anne's ideas of leading from the front, and not asking of girls what she could not do herself. It was from Betty that Anne's love of the outdoors came. As well as being inspired by others, Anne has been, and will continue to be, a Guiding inspiration to many.

Guides has taken Anne to many places and in numerous capacities. Anne has been a Treasurer of the Australian International Committee of Guides Australia, a trainer for 25 years and a district leader for almost 10 years. She visited Bangladesh twice as part of the Australia Bangladesh Child Health

Project. Her mission while there was to promote awareness of problems such as sanitation, clean drinking water, immunization and other child health issues, as well as working to instill long term commitment of local leaders to deal with such problems. When I spoke to Anne about this project, it was obvious that it had a significant impact upon her life. The experience simply fueled her desire to help, an attribute Anne has passed on to countless others. Anne also visited one of the four Guiding world centers, 'Our Cabana` in Mexico, as a part of the 'Fiesta' of ideas. Anne does not consider these incredible journeys as her most rewarding Guiding experience. Instead, she believes that watching girls grow into community minded young women, who take pleasure in contributing to society and humanity is the most reward she could receive as a Guide Leader.

Anne is grateful to her family and her past leaders, for their assistance and tolerance over all these years. Contributions as large as those made by Anne, not just to Guiding, but the wider community, require extensive support. However, it is the community, especially the Guiding community, who have been blessed with Anne, and it is her we all thank for her support. No, it's not a misprint! The railway has shortened its trading name from Bellarine Peninsula Railway.

This is for a couple of reasons. Primarily to 'tie in' with the overall marketing name for our region 'The Bellarine', it's less of a mouthful & our rubber stamp can be smaller!

Recent happenings - Our very nice tank engine 'Klondyke' was returned to service after an overhaul. She looks and sounds a million bucks! Many people ask why she sounds different to our other loco's. This is because she burns recycled waste oil, not coal. Which of course makes Klondyke a very useful engine indeed (and economical). Klondyke has an interesting history. Built in Adelaide in 1927, she was put to work helping to build the city of Canberra. Later she worked in Queensland & then New South Wales before being acquired for service on our railway. A couple of years ago, we loaned her to the famous 'ABT Wilderness

Railway' in Queenstown, Tasmania where she ran the very first service on that incredible railway. She has hauled everything from sugar cane to sewer pipe, transmission lines to tourists. So Klondyke is arguably Australia's most travelled locomotive!

Speaking of 'very useful engines' THOMAS THE TANK ENGINE is coming to Drysdale! Yes, Thomas, Sir Topham Hatt & some of the other characters will be making some very special appearances later this year! Watch this space or drop in to the station for more details as they come to hand. We hope our engines won't become too 'star struck' when Thomas & the mob from the Island of Sodor get here!

The railway is continuing to work closely with the CoGG & Friends of the Bellarine Rail Trail in order to enhance the facilities along the trail & railway. We were very proud to see that Fred Cook was recently nominated for the OAM. Fred is one of the tireless Friends of the Rail Trail volunteers & his group has achieved great things. Good on ya Fred!



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Baby massage

Being left holding the baby is a wonderful experience for parents. Baby Massage can enrich the relationship between parents and their baby.

Baby massage can better support the relationship between mothers and their babies. It can help the parents bond early with their newborn.

Learning baby massage, parents are also learning to understand their baby's language; they are developing skills to help calm and connect with their child and developing the confidence in their own skills as parents

Skills in baby massage offer many benefits such as improving the digestive, immune, circulatory and lymphatic systems. It also helps the quality of sleep, raises infant's stimulation threshold, conditions their relaxation response, reduces muscle tension, strengthens the nervous system, aids neurological development and encourages flexibility co-ordination.

Mothers who enjoy the support of classes are also being helped to adapt to their new role and, according to research, will be less likely to develop postnatal depression - imagine, several weeks of social interaction and feedback, compared to isolation and self doubt. For dads it's a special way to gain added confidence in their skills and to participate in their child's development.

Over four one and half hour sessions, parents on their own or with their partner, are taught the techniques of baby massage by an accredited baby massage instructor. Each session addresses specific demonstrated techniques supported by practice, discussion and learning material.

We encourage parents of babies of 4 – 6 weeks to crawling to participate. No pre-requisities required.

Mary Wilson is a registered Midwife, Baby Massage Instructor; Lactation Consultant will deliver the four week course at the SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre.

The course commences on 12th July 2006 and will complete on 2nd August 2006.


