News from the Friends of the Bellarine Rail Trail

News Flash:

Announcing that the Friends of the BRT have been successful in gaining an Envirofund Grant approved by the Federal Government's Environment and Heritage Department

This very welcomed funding boost for the rail trail – to be spent during 2007/08 will mean: 5000 more native trees, shrubs and understory plants plus 3000 extra native grasses, with more bird & animal nesting boxes to be constructed and installed at various locations.

Our achievements to date in 2006 on the rail trail are:

The group has approx. 2000 trees in credit at the Landcare Nursery through it's volunteer work. 4512 plants were installed this year & the number of volunteers hours spent on the trail was 1398.

Of the 4512 plants that have been planted out, 2172 have been grown by

Friends member Fred Cook. This is a wonderful effort and a big cost savings to our environment group!

48 different plant species have been planted on the trail. Eleven of those species are new this year!

Operationally: Due to the dry conditions, watering and mulching of the plantations is proving very essential. With the Stage 3 water restrictions in force our members are supplied with 25 litre plastic containers so that they can collect their domestic recycled and tank water. This water will be used keeping our new plantings alive over the coming predicted long hot summer.

Can you help in this regard? If you have any (approx) 15 litre clean plastic containers, with a screw top lid, and you don't want it any more – please call Fred Cook on 52 50 2719 to arrange pick up.

In another development we have produced a small Information Brochure for those people interested in our activities. Thanks to our Editor Tim Rowley for his layout and proof-reading effort on the brochure.

Finally, next year you will have a new Scribe bringing you the Friends news – a move designed to give our readers a varied, interesting and informative article always. Of course the best way to see what is happening on the trail is to enjoy a stroll or perhaps take a bike ride every other day, either way you will no doubt enjoy the outing! Make sure also that you have a safe and happy Christmas with your families and with a prosperous New Year thrown in as well!

From the Garden Gate

Gardens are good for your health. Gardening is good for your health. What could be better than being out in the fresh air and getting some exercise, at your own pace? The by-product is the satisfaction and joy you experience, especially in Spring when a plant which you have nurtured rewards you with flowers.

Some Retirement Villages and Hostels encourage residents to have a small garden or a few pots, just as they have found it helpful to have a couple of pets around the place. We are in for a torrid time this Summer and it is going to be hard to sit by and watch our precious gardens wither. But the bottom line is, we must have drinking water ourselves.

Garden Club members and others of the "Bucket Brigade" who save water at every chance, are to be commended. They catch water in the shower while the 'hot' is 'heating up' and wash hands in a half bucket of water, then throw it on the garden. Even the teapot of cold tea, helps!

Inspiration can be gained by visiting special gardens, which maybe have access to bore water. In January you may like to visit these:

* January 20-21 10am- 4 pm "Red Gums", 30 Drakes Road. Drysdale. (Featured on TV not so long ago)

*Daylesford district. January 27-28 "Paradiso" 1089 Telegraph Road, Sailor's Falls.

In the garden now;

Watch out for sap sucking insects which become active in warmer months. Mites cause mottling on leaves, so remember to spray under the leaves as well as on top. Use pest oil or general pesticide that control mites. Also, be on the lookout for aphids on roses.

Group your pots together if you are going away, to make it easier for watering.

Feed tomatoes and other vegetables with a complete plant food.

Dead-head annuals such as petunias and perennials, to keep the flowers coming. Lightly trim spring flowering shrubs including natives and perennials such as geraniums.

Lift, store summer dormant bulbs.

Net fruit trees to stop birds eating everything.

Set your mower blades higher so as not to scalp the lawn.

Avoid gardening in heat of day.

Home and Community Care (HACC) Growth Funds 2006 - 2007

In addition, there is \$229,000 in one off grants for minor capital works and equipment to the HACC services.

Bellarine Peninsula Railway

It was good to join Rob Hulls, the Minister for Planning, in Queenscliff recently to announce funding of \$250,000 to the Borough of Queenscliffe for the ever popular Bellarine Peninsula Railway. The grant will go towards the \$901,268 Bellarine Peninsula Railway (BPR) Development project.

As many of you will know, the BPR has successfully operated the 16.5-kilometre heritage railway for 28 years, including maintaining the railway infrastructure and a fleet of 13 locomotives, 18 carriages and another 60 vehicles.

The development project will include:

- Upgrading station platform surfacing and lighting at Drysdale, Lakers Siding and Suma Park to provide better facilities for charter businesses.
- Connecting a rolling stock turntable at Drysdale to turnaround passengers quicker on the Queenscliff to Drysdale return trip.
- Landscaping works at Drysdale to beautify the turntable and station area.
- Building a storage shed at Lakers Siding to reduce maintenance on rolling stock from a two to five-year cycle.

- Constructing a platform at the Marine Discovery Centre for school excursions.
- Security fencing and landscaping at Lakers Siding.

The BPR is recognised, not only a popular tourist attraction but also for its role in supporting local events, including the Queenscliff Music Festival, the Blues Train program and the community markets. Congratulations to Andrew Bridger and all those dedicated volunteers and best wishes with the project.

HMAS Canberra

I was very pleased with the recent announcement by John Pandazopoulos, the Minister for Tourism, that Victoria has won the bid to secure the former Royal Australian Navy Guided Missile Frigate, ex-HMAS Canberra, as a new artificial dive attraction. The Canberra is a large frigate 138 meters in length and requires complete stripping and decontamination before dives can occur. The Bracks Government has allocated \$500,000 and the Federal Government has also contributed funding toward the costs. A proposed site has been found at The Ships Graveyard, three kilometres south of Barwon Heads. Extensive environmental and navigational survey work has been undertaken to select the site. This will position Victoria and the Bellarine Peninsula as a nationally significant temperate dive destination.



Local Bees Local Honey - Part 5

Last month we ended with the bee equivalent of the riddle of life. The answer was in the last paragraph and if it did not make sense you will not be alone, but as promised the answer is here. The drone bee is breed from unfertilised egg and in doing so they have no father only a mother and grandfather. The drone only processes half the normal number of chromosomes of a female bee.

Having mated and started laying eggs the colony now continues in the old hive site. In feral hives the swarming may happen several times over the spring and into summer this has the effect of weakening the hive and the swarms are weak and small compared to the first swarm of the spring. In commercial hives or hobby hives that people keep in their suburban back yards we take steps to prevent swarming.

Last September you may have noticed that we had a lot of fields with canola. If you are unsure what it looks like it was that bright yellow crop that can be seen for miles. In mid September we moved the hives to a new site on the edge of 200 acres of canola. Moving bees is a job to be done with caution as when something goes wrong there is a lot of stinging. When moving my hives I use the open hive method which means the bees are not shut into the

hive. I usually like to start at dusk and spend time planning the move and how I will load the trailer for ease of loading and unloading. At this stage I find my smoker of little use and while it is on the front of the trailer I don't usually light it. With the ramps in place I start loading the hives. Once I begin there is no stopping the bees will become a little agitated with the movement but as it is dark they tend not to fly but if you are close enough to the entrance they will take a walk up your body. Also I work in the dark as well any light will cause bees to fly and they will gather around the light. The vehicle is kept running while your loading as the vibration of the trailer from the engine will make the bees cluster in the hive. Once loaded and tied down we head to the new site. Unloaded at the new site the bees will now settle till dawn.

Canola produces huge amounts of nectar and pollen. The nectar while being excellent for the bees coming out of winter, the honey it produces is light and very sweet taste. The pollen while not ideal is plentiful and tends to make the bees aggressive. With these 2 items coming into the hive in large amounts the queen starts to lay as fast as possible to create more workers to cope with the large crop. This then creates

the problem of a population explosion in the hive and if not managed correctly they the hives will start to swam. Once the hive is in swarming mode there is little can be done to prevent it? The way I coped with the problem was to split the hives. Within 10 days of sitting hives on canola we started splitting. Splitting the hives creating 2 hives from one. Placing a new hive next to the old hive I open the old hive and take half the frames from the brood nest making sure they have brood of different ages including eggs and day old grubs. I replace the frames in the old hive with new frames, at this stage the queen is not important she will end up in one box or the other. Closing up the hive we now have 2 hives. The queen less hive will begin to create a new queen and the hive with the old queen will not swarm as she now has lots of room and new laying areas.
