

St.Leonards - Celebrating 150 years

The Bellarine town of St. Leonards is planning to commemorate its founding 150 years ago by Captain George Ward Cole, on the Melbourne Cup long weekend.

A Community Festival will be held on Saturday, 3 November in the main street, which will be closed to traffic, from 11am

The festivities will climax with a free, giant barbecue and entertainment on the foreshore on Saturday evening.

Mark Holden, star of 'Australian Idol', will be a special celebrity guest at the festival.

Mark is a descendant of local pioneer, William Holden, and the Holden Circus family which was an attraction for day trippers from Melbourne in the early days

A display of old photographs from the towns early history will include Holden's Circus and Coffee Palace as well as other interesting buildings and people associated with early days of St. Leonards.

A foreshore market, local musicians and performers, displays by community groups, woodturning and children's entertainment will feature on the day.

At 1.30pm a re-enactment of the first land auction in 1857 will take place followed by the unveiling of a memorial to George Ward Cole at 2pm.

A commemorative wine has been produced by a local vineyard and will be on sale during the festival.

A feature of these celebrations will be the Bellarine Art and Food Festival which will be opened on Friday, 2 November by the Member for Bellarine, Lisa Neville MP at 8pm.

The Art and Food Festival is an established event on the Geelong Arts calendar and promotes local artists and primary

The Art Show and Food Festival is held at the St. Leonards Yacht Club and will be open Friday, Saturday and Sunday of the Melbourne Cup weekend.



Dear Friends

I would like to take you on a tour of our local Recreational Reserve in Drysdale. Although I have lived in Drysdale for most of my life and have been in the Recreational Reserve many times, I don't think I have ever truly appreciated it before. I had occasion to look for a group of people in there the other day. I approached from the open space off Wyndham Street. As I neared the top of the hill overlooking the Fire Brigade running track / Netball courts, the vista unfolded. The colours of all the different trees, McLeods Waterholes in the distance, the playsground area and so many small family groups enjoying all the different aspects of our park.

So many organised groups use the Recreational Reserve for sporting activities and for the seasonal monthly market, but there are so many other people who use it for pleasure. My family has visited many celebrated parks in our travels but I had not realised that we were so fortunate to have one of the best laid out reserves in Victoria in our midst. I encourage you to visit our Recreational Reserve and walk some of the 200 acres that it comprises.

Take a look at McLeods Waterholes, an area I understand, where Koories would always find water on their visits to the area. Have a look at the Pine Plantation that was planted in the early 1950's after the Second World War. My grandfather was Principal of Drysdale Primary School and he thought it would be an asset for the town to have a pine plantation for paper making and my mother remembers helping to plant the trees.

I remember when there were caravan sites in the Recreation Reserve and helping my other grandfather to collect rent and pick up drink bottles which were recycled to help to raise money for the Drysdale Preschool that my parents were working to build.

Maybe we should have a 'Celebrate the Recreation Reserve Day' or maybe we should keep it as a local secret. I'd like to know if there are others in our community who are interested in maybe becoming Friends of the Recreation Reserve.

Now what's happening at SpringDale - after our very successful evening for Adult Learners' Week in September we are holding a Japanese night on Friday 9th November from 5.30pm. Come and learn to make your own Sushi roll

(and eat it) or maybe even 2 and there will be Japanese noodles to learn to cook and taste. Please feel free to bring anything from Japan to share, wear or show and I'm sure we'll all have a fun night. The cost of the night is \$10 to help cover costs. Please bring your own bamboo mat to roll your sushi roll on – they are available at the supermarket for about \$2.00. Please book in at SpringDale – there will be limited places available. Lynette was one of the founders of this wonderful and needy service and has spent many hours consolidating its existence The Powercor Children's Helicopter retrieves critically ill and/or injured newborn babies and children from throughout Victoria, including the most far reaching rural areas.

The Powercor Children's Helicopter is the conduit which rapidly delivers the skills of the Newborn Emergency Transport Unit (NETS) throughout Victoria. This life saving service is on standby every day to transport these medical specialists anywhere in Victoria to stabilize critically ill and/or injured children and transport them back to newborn and Paediatric Intensive Care Units in Melbourne. Effectively providing a flying intensive care unit anywhere in Victoria ... saving valuable time by rushing the hospital to the child instead of the child to the hospital.

The Powercor Children's Helicopter Service's is a charity 'LifeFlight' which is sponsored by Powercor. The helicopter operates independently from the Royal Children's Hospital and do not currently benefit from the \$10 million raised from the Good Friday Appeal. The service does not receive any of these funds, but raise funds from their own fund\ raising efforts.

This year their International Project has been through fundraising paying the school fees and other associated costs to ensure that Dewa, a Balinese boy, attend Senior school.

As Director of New Generations it has been rewarding to see each year a group of students meet on a weekly basis and set their goals.

It reassures me that the future of our community is in very safe and capable hands.

We have just built four new Carriages to accommodate extra Rides for our Family Fun Days, New Years Eve Children's night and large Group Bookings. This was funded by a local Grant and Train Funds. We are currently seeking a Grant to cover the cost of completing another carriage designed for disabled people.

Over the past two years we have obtained two Electric Locomotives, one belongs to us and the other is on loan.

We are working towards laying our second track to take in the undulating and scenic bank of the swamp land. The cost of this project will be about \$42,000 and we will be seeking Grants and Donations to fund this work.

Our guest speaker for September was Cathy Roth. Cathy was the District Governor 2004 - 2005 for Rotary Club of Geelong Central. Cathy and her husband John were asked by Rotary International District 9780 - Australia to attend a convention at Salt Lake City Centre.

The group of 11 flew to Anchorage then travelled by train up through the Denali National Park and on to Fairbanks. They then flew on to the northern most point of Barrow. Barrow is an amazing place and a major town for the whole area. They were accompanied by President Pete who showed them around detailing the area to the visitors. Cathy explained that there are no roads in Barrow and that everything has to be shipped in by rail. Trees are metal structures as nothing grows there and that the log cabin houses are made by huge cranes lifting logs on to

each other. A concrete slab is laid first with wiring for underground heating. When the ice melts the heating in the house remains stable.

Due to Global warming, ice packs that would normally cover 20 kms out from the shore line are melting, forcing the polar bears to swim much further to reach food. Inuit guides are documenting the movement of the polar bears. The group also went aboard the Greenpeace vessel where they spoke to young people who are passionate about their world. Cathy, with the use of a power point presentation explained much more about life in these wonderful far away placess.

She concluded her stimulating presentation by saying that 'across the world we are all the same'.

A well attended Meeting was held in the Fire Brigade Rooms on the 18 September.

Extracts - President Wayne Elliot's Report.

Though the name and work of the Drysdale/Clifton Springs Community Association does not spring readily to mind throughout the local population, it none the less plays a vital role as the only organisation whose sole reason for existence is to represent the broad range of Community preferences and choices. This was clearly displayed in the Bellarine Strategic Plan and hopefully extensively in the review of The Drysdale/Clifton Springs Structure Plan, including the long needed traffic study.

Your committee has worked hard this year. Issues that have occupied attention include the State Government's Coastal Spaces project, the Foreshore redevelopment, especially welcoming the \$500,000 promised by Lisa Neville. The City of Geelong Waste Managementfuture Directions Strategy and The Environment Strategy both of which will greatly affect the future of the Drysdale Landfill site and the access of heavy traffic to this site. An extremely important issue for the Town, unfortunately there is little real progress in this area.

The planned development west of Jetty Rd. has also taken much time and effort. However, we are delighted with the extensive improvements and repairs in the Jetty Rd./ Wyndham St. area. Also welcome is the 50 klm. Speed Limit through the Drysdale Town Centre bringing it into line with other town centres in the City of Geelong.





David Eakins and his late wife Margaret moved from Upper Beaconsfield to Clifton Springs in 1994. The block was a blank canvas covered only with pasture grass. They built a beautiful home and then was time to establish their garden. Their Upper 'Beac' property was established in 1983 after the terrible 'Ash Wednesday' fires. They planted an extensive orchard with apples, peaches, apricots and cherries. Whilst enjoying the beauty of the blossom, the birdlife took its toll upon the fruit, so Clifton Springs garden was to have blossom and no fruit and was to be of a residential design. Having lived so close to Flemmings Monbulk Nursery, they were able to attain blossom varieties and then discovered



there was a continuous and progressive pattern of three months blossom in the selection of the right trees.

That has since been achieved and enjoyed over many years. The first week of blossom is given by the Plum (*prunus mume*) right through to the 12th week where Laburnum '*Vossi*' and the Crabapple loensis '*Plena*' display their blossoms.

Initially the shape of the ground determined the general plan of the garden. Planting of larger trees especially around the perimeter of the property was a priority due to the winds from the bay. Protection was now in place to plant the inner parts of the garden. Water rationing had then come in so irrigation and watering systems were thought about and implemented.

Coming into 2008, David's garden is beautiful and well established with splendid colour throughout and the view of the bay is framed by trees of all shapes and sizes, leafed textures and is a wonderful tribute to the effort that has been placed into it. David has had assistance from gardener Doug Suares and team since late 1998 and they have maintained the theme and integrity of this beautiful one acre property together. David has recently spent time in hospital after suffering a stroke, but he still maintains his input into his beloved garden that he and his 'Lady Margaret' started so many years ago.



Saint Nicholas and the Gingerbread Fair

Tell me what part of the gingerbread you eat first and I will tell you your nature, and therefore, your destiny.

Will you eat the head first, or the legs, or the body, or will you, like Gertrude our dog, eat the whole gingerbread man in one rapid swallow?

If you have read the fairytale of the gingerbread man who runs and runs and runs you will most probably eat the legs first. This links you to an ancient worldwide ritual. What ever the gingerbread is called, Prjaniki in Russia, Pain d'epici in France, Speculos in Belgium, it is a sweet cake or bread enjoyed always, but particularly at Christmas on Saint Nicholas Day.

Gingerbread is eaten on holidays, Christenings, Saints days, name days, and funerals, but it is most enjoyed on the day of Saint Nicholas; 6 December, on this day "stockings are filled with hay, oats and bread for the Saint's donkeys." Children are given chocolates, aniseed biscuits and gingerbreads.

(in England) was not so much a cake as a solid block of honey baked with flour, ginger, and spices, which was then decorated to resemble a piece of tooled leather". (Fitzgibbon) The gingerbreads are frosted with white

"The earliest form of gingerbread

icing, or gilded. The final touch are cloves painted to resemble gold studs, decorated then with Star-anise and sprinkled with candied orange peel.



Ingredients

Eggs 5

Ground Ginger - 2 ozs (60gms) Treacle - 1 1/4 lb (625gms) Pale Brown Sugar - 60Z (185gms)

Plain Flour - 1 lb (500gms) Butter - 6 oz (not margarine)(185gms)

Lemons: grated rind of 2

Method

- 1. Beat Eggs well.
- 2. Add warmed syrup gradually. beating all the time.
- 3. Add sugar in same manner.
- 4. Add butter, which must be warm but not hot.
- 5. Add the **ginger** to the **flour** and sift the two together. Add to the egg mixture.
- 6. Beat till bubbles appear in batter, then add flavouring.
- 7. Bake in greased shallow tin in slow oven . Bake up to two hours (100°C).

The following is an update on the status of major projects and issues.

Drysdale Recreation Reserve

Access roads within the reserve have just been graded, following recent rainfall, as part of an overall upgrade and general tidy-up of the whole reserve.

Work undertaken to improve the ground condition and hopefully have it in a playable condition for the coming **Cricket** season – all this being subject to availability of suitable water.

Discussions are underway with Springdale for a community Park Appreciation Day and all volunteers are welcome to assist with the preparation work – for further details contact either Anne Brackley or myself.

Netball

 As reported in last month's Messenger, discussions with Netball Victoria re additional courts and alterations to the runoffs on the north side have taken place and are now to be completed next week with the local netball groups.

Football

 works have commenced for changes to the entry and canteen and upgrade to the existing kitchen & bar facilities. Scheduled for completion mid February 2008.

Mossie Control

Current reports are that the mossies are of concern closer to the large expanses of coastal waters and most especially following the recent rains.

Current information is available on the CoGG website with fortnightly data updates along with the monitoring plan for the whole season.

As previously mentioned, the 'Community Information' sheet is up and running and distributed on a monthly basis detailing the following -

- results of monitoring and treatments around the main townships using both text and graphs/charts
- information on larvae and mosquito numbers in particular areas
- predictions of potential nuisance levels for the forthcoming month for those areas

Again, should any community groups require further early detail, please contact the Drysdale Customer Centre by either phone or email to make arrangements.

Drysdale / Clifton Springs Structure Plan

Issues to be addressed are to cover township boundaries and relationship to the Rural Strategy / traffic – in and adjacent to the township including pedestrian, passenger and heavy traffic / potential commercial and industrial re-zoning / open space and recreation requirements / Jetty Road Urban Growth Plan / public transport and community service facilities.

The timescale and full details for the plan will shortly will be displayed at the various notice boards in the Customer Service Centre / Springdale / High Street and the supermarket as well as the local papers.

Drysdale Library/Geelong Regional Library Corporation

Discussions are underway with the Geelong Regional Library Corporation relating to their strategy and the plan to upgrade facilities here in Drysdale.

The concept is to increase the size, make it more readily accessible, and upgrade the content and range of services to include youth spaces, homework help areas, community gathering and meeting places, as well as the range of print and electronic collections.

The thinking is that it will be a community hub that serves all ages and abilities and will be a significant component of the Structure Plan work.

Water issues

As covered in the previous issue, discussions with local State Government representatives are continuing whilst the availability of water continues to be addressed through the CoGG Water Task Force group, in conjunction with Barwon Water, CCMA and Southern Rural Water bodies.

Key areas are supply to the rural and recreational parks and gardens with an emphasis on recycled water and future capacity at the Portarlington Treatment facility.

Clifton Springs Skate Park

Upgrade works on the skate park are now completed with further works under review.

Clifton Springs Coastal Management Plan and Jetty Road Urban Growth Plan

Public Transport, Road Safety and General Community Issues

As reported in last month's Messenger, 31 key issues within and around the townships are under investigation with CoGG Engineering.

Some of the more critical issues noted as requiring urgent attention are –

1. Murradoc Road

 further discussions with VicRoads for urgent improvements to the section between Drysdale and the Port / Point Lonsdale Road and especially adjacent to the Waste Receival facility in Becks Road.



2. Princess Street/Andersons Road

intersection – installation of STOP signs on the Andersons Road sides to hopefully slow down traffic crossing Princess Street and eliminate the potential for further accidents.

3. De Burgh Road/High Street intersection

 with significant traffic, pedestrian/cycle /passenger and heavy traffic, this intersection has become a serious hazard and is to be reviewed in conjunction with VicRoads engineers.

4. Jetty Road / Wyndham Street

improvements to both pedestrian and traffic conditions.

5. Parking

 this is also being further investigated and the outcomes will assist the coming Structure Plan.

6. Bus timetabling/shelters

 review of the 83 Bellarine bus shelters involving size, locations and design with the local secondary Colleges, in conjunction with the Drysdale Rotary club /Interact group, is well underway.


from the garden gate

I am being very careful not to ridicule someone's beliefs, but I did find it hard to agree with the lady who bought our farm a few years ago. She knew all about the right time for planting and the right time to put the bull in with the cows. It was when the Moon was in a certain Quarter. So she let the bull in the paddock at the right time, which lasted a few days, and unsurprisingly, no new calves were born afterwards.

The Moon Planting Guide advises when the moon is right to plant or propagate root crops or perennials. If you garden by the Moon's time it gives you a rest as well as the garden. The guru continued, "By working with, rather than against the natural rhythm of our Earth is a simple way to give your plants a good start. If you use each of the phases of the Moon for a different crop and plan to sow during the most fertile times of the week; eg during a water sign, your crops should do well".

I once saw on television, how to plant cows' horns filled with manure and facing a certain direction. Planting in the Full Moon improved results. Maybe we could still learn something from the Middle Ages.

Plant seeds of ageratum, alyssum, amaranth (drought tolerant), aster, nasturtium, pansy, petunia, phlox, snapdragon, sunflower. Vegies - lettuce, celery, tomatoes, marrow, pumpkin, silverbeet, zucchini. Apply pre-summer fertiliser to plants, lawns and vegetables.





BOWEN THERAPY

Many people in the Geelong area have heard of, or will remember Tom Bowen. Born in 1916, Tom Bowen died in 1982.

He developed a form of bodywork that was simple, non invasive and effective that is now known as Bowen Therapy or Bowen Technique.

This method is now practiced widely in Australia and overseas.

Interpretations of his work are taught by various schools, which all use the basic 'Bowen move'; which is a rolling movement over a specific point (or points) on the body.

Bowen Therapy is gentle enough to be used on babies and the elderly and can treat a wide range of problems, such as headache, back problems, shoulder pain, leg and knee pain, sciatica and asthma. After a treatment it is common for a patient to state that they feel more relaxed and 'lighter'.

The patient usually lies on a massage table, but the treatment can be performed on seated patients, such as pregnant women or people in

Bowen Therapy is a soft-tissue treatment only (myofascial therapy); no manipulation of joints is involved. The therapy may increase blood and lymphatic circulation and lead to a greater sense of well-being. Treatment times can range from half an hour to one hour, depending on the patient's problem and the practitioner! Moves are completed and the patients left to rest for a minute or so. This wait is to allow the muscles to relax. Sometimes a practitioner will leave the room during these 'waits'.

We are fortunate in the Geelong region to have a large number of Bowen Therapists. Consult the Yellow Pages for the practitioner in your area.

The Walking School **Bus Program**

Each weekday in Geelong, 8,000 primary school children leave a box (home), get into a box on wheels (car), and are driven to another box (school).

What is a WALKING SCHOOL BUS?

The Walking School Bus is a group of school children who walk to and from school along a safe and enjoyable set route. There is an adult 'Driver' (Volunteer) at the front and, if the bus has more than 8 passengers, a 'Conductor' at the rear. To become a Volunteer 'bus driver' you need to obtain a Working with Children Check. You also need to attend a brief 'road safety' training session (about 1 hour) at the City of Greater Geelong.

Drysdale Primary commenced the Walking School Bus Program in October 2006. It currently has 3 'bus routes' operating which involves 41 children and 8 adult volunteers.

There are more children registered but cannot walk due to lack of volunteers so if you would like to 'come on board' to help some children walk to school please leave your details at the school office. To walk just one morning or afternoon a week would be helpful.

So, while many children are driven to school, children on the Walking School Bus are having fun walking and chatting with friends, learning road safety skills and getting to know their neighbourhood.
