An extension and upgrade of the club rooms is about to recommence in anticipation of completion for your local football and netball competition starting dates.

After years of drought the playing surface has been unfit for cricket and football,

postponing the seasons start and the finals having to be played on alternative grounds. The impact on the cricket, football and netball clubs financial position has been dramatic.



### From Lisa Neville's desk

### DRYSDALE SES OPENING

It was a great pleasure to be invited to officially open the new facility extension to the Bellarine Headquarters of the State Emergency Service, in Drysdale.The SES response area encompasses the towns of Leopold, Drysdale, Portarlington, St Leonards, Indented Head, Queenscliff, Point Lonsdale, Ocean Grove and several rural communities.

As a community, we rely on the SES in crisis situations whether through their Road Crash Rescue, Storm and Flood Damage work, Land Search, Urban Search and Rescue, Flood Boat rescue, or their work in supporting the CFA and Victoria Police. Funding of \$27,000 was provided by the Victorian State Government's Community Safety **Emergency Support Program and local** volunteer groups around the Bellarine Peninsula raised \$13,000. The Bellarine SES has a proud history dating back to 1977 and the new extension will ensure they can continue to help our local community well into the future.

### BELLARINE SEAFOOD, WINE AND FARM GATE TRAIL

It was great to visit the Bellarine Estate Winery recently to announce a grant of \$29,500 to assist Bellarine Tourism in establishing a new 'Bellarine Seafood, Wine and Farm Gate Trail' to promote the region's food and wine products. Wine and food producers are joining forces and the project will help producers across the Bellarine Peninsula to promote our growing local wine and food industry. It will also help attract more day and overnight visitors to the area which will boost local tourism and create new jobs.

The project includes: establishing base criteria for businesses to become involved in the trail, including making sure participating wineries produce wine that consists of 85% local fruit, a marketing plan, a map and photo library and conducting networking workshops to ensure that members of the trail are aware of other businesses in the area.

An increase in visitors will boost sales for local businesses that participate and encourage operators to increase the number of days they are open,



which will generate employment opportunities for Bellarine.

### MOSQUITOS

I'm sure that many readers are only too aware of the increase in mosquitos recently. The City of Greater Geelong's control program has involved aerial and ground spraying on a regular basis, and I was able to announce that the State Government has contributed an extra \$45,000 to assist with this procedure. However, we will all need to be vigilant about cleaning up pools of stagnant water around our homes, and covering up and using repellent when outside.

### WELCOME TO SCHOOL

Many families will have spent part of this holiday season preparing their children for school, and I am pleased to announce a publication which may provide assistance. It is the Welcome to School- A Parent's Guide to Victorian Government Schools which provides a range of useful information for parents of children who are entering prep in 2008. The City of Greater Geelong adopted a Graffiti policy in 2001 and since that time the level of graffiti has been reduced.



### I'll have the works thanks!

Maltese, Pomeranians, Chinchilla, Persians and so many more 'hairy' breeds can look beautiful if they are groomed and kept well brushed on a regular basis. Sometimes though, this just is not possible. Not only can time be an issue but sometimes the little critters just don't like to be groomed. They see the brush coming and the teeth are barred, claws are ready and the whole experience is put on the back burner.

That's where a groomer is needed! It is recommended that fluffy pets are clipped and tidied up a few times a year, especially before the hotter months approach. Grass seeds and the heat can cause problems for these breeds and keeping their coats short will definitely help.

Brushes and shampoos are items that come with owning a long haired breed. There are many types of brushes that are suited for different breeds. For example, husky's have an extremely thick coat and require a brush that actually striped out the loose fur. If you are unsure of what brush is best suited for your pet, please have a chat to your local veterinary clinic. A shampoo/conditioner that we use in our clinic is 'Dermcare's Aloveen'.

These products are formulated with extracts of oatmeal in an Aloe Vera gel base. It does not contain any irritating soaps and is pH balanced. Aloveen's soothing properties are derived from the anti-itch effects of oatmeal.

The conditioner can be used in 3 different ways.

- 1 After using shampoo, apply conditioner sparingly and lightly rinse off.
- 2 Apply a 20c size dollop of conditioner to your palms and work through a dry or damp coat. Do not rinse off.
- 3 Dilute a small amount of conditioner to a water spray bottle and use on the coat daily or when required.

By having a variety of ways to use the conditioner, it then reduces the amount of baths your pets may need. Dogs are bathed a lot more than required and ideally should be bathed no more than once a month – even one every 2 months if possible. Dogs often smell 'doggy' no matter what you bath them in and regular brushing will keep their coats clean by stripping the dirt. If animals are flea'd with an effective treatment, bathing them for 'de-fleaing' purposes is not required. Over bathing can take the natural oils out of the animal's coat and cause dryness and itching.


If your dog is a tad smelly, using the conditioner as a leave in or spray, keeps the coat shiny and best of all – it smells WONDERFUL!

### Will 2008 make you or will you make 2008?



On behalf of your local police at Drysdale, we hope that you all enjoyed a great Christmas and all the very best for a safe, happy and prosperous 2008.

The holiday season is now winding down and you will have noticed the increased traffic, both pedestrian and vehicular, in and around the town. This holiday build up can often lead to frustration, impatience and sometimes even physical confrontation on roads, footpaths, shops and other places. If everyone can try to be a little bit more patient, take a deep breath and relax, it will make these situations much easier to cope with and avoid any associated stress.

There have been numerous reports in relation to people using what are now called 'Monkey' Bikes and other unregistered two wheeled vehicles on our roads, footpaths and reserve areas. Our annual auction is enjoyed by hundreds of people who come to the Bunyip Festival to buy car service







### PIETER SPRUIT – WHEELWRIGHT Recreating history in a small way

On visiting Pieter Spruit in his workshop, the tools of his trade are various woodworking tools where one is adapted with foot control operation so he is able to use his hands fully to control the fine work he needs to do. His passion was evident with the progress of his latest model. There were minute metal pieces of a wagon that Pieter has painstakingly fashioned all by hand.

Pieter Spruit commenced his working life in Holland, apprenticed to a blacksmith at the age of 15 for about 8 years. This entailed a lot more than just making horseshoes. One of his tasks was to assist the wheelwright with shrinking on the steel tyres. The wheelwright was a master craftsman and Pieter thought he might like to do that type of work one day.

Pieter migrated to Australia in 1955 and for a few weeks was employed at the Corpus Christi training college in Werribee as maintenance man. He then settled in Dandenong and it wasn't long before he commenced his own general engineering business which he operated for 21 years. After retiring and traveling around Australia, he then moved to Drysdale in 1986. His work become his hobby and one area in which he was able to put his skills to good use was working voluntarily for Landcare where he made hand seeders and other productive





small tools to help with the planting and seeding.

Over the past few years Pieter changed from performing heavy duties to making wooden models, which also required engineering knowledge. The first model was a Dutch watermill, complete in every detail.

Pieter donated this to Van Loons Garden Centre. The next model was a wind driven flour mill, operated by a water wheel, and this model may be viewed at the Old Mill in Portarlington.

Pieter decided he would fulfill his ambition of becoming a wheelwright.



After much trial and error he succeeded in shrinking steel tyres onto small authentic, wooden wagon wheels. To put the wheels to good use he started making models wagons. He derives his ideas from a beautiful book called 'Australian Horse Drawn Wagons' by Michael Skinner that depicts an endless variety of wagons, from which Pieter is able to draw up his plans to scale.

### Berries - Raspberries, Blueberries, Strawberries


Raspberries

They say that the mosquitoes in the Northern Territory are as big as helicopters. They could not be more numerous or more savage than the Bellarine mozzies were in early Summer. Those pesky blood-suckers can even bite through clothing and they make trying to work in the garden at any time of day, a real pain. Here's hoping that the spraying will do the trick soon.

The trials of being a gardener will be understood by all dedicated gardeners. But keep on, keeping on, with spraying, watering, mulching and admiring your flowers.

Something for you to do this Summer. Visit one of the berry farms. Raspberries and strawberries should be plentiful till the end of the month and you may also find less common berries like American brambleberries, boysenberries, youngberries and jostaberries. It's a good practice to call the farm the morning of your visit to check what fruit is available for picking that day. Remember rain (what is that?) can ruin fruit, so keep an eye on the weather.

### SpringDale starts to go Green... the Bokashi initiative



'Bokashi' being used to prepare a garden bed.

Bokashi is a new word in my vocabulary. It was introduced to me by a Japanese microbiologist, Dr Tony Oh-Ishi about 6 months ago. Bokashi means to me, the recycling of my kitchen scraps into a special bucket, which sits in my pantry and creates a pleasant smelling 'pickled' product that can be used to fertilize the garden.

I have been using a Bokashi bucket for about 4 months now and Tony and I have established a vegetable patch using Bokashi to enhance the soil. I am very happy to present the results of our experiment so far.

We started to dig the garden bed on 18 November 2007, luckily Ron van Loenen from Dig'em Bobcat

Services helped us the next day and made the task of digging 2 garden beds 1.5m x 10m and 60cm deep look very easy.

We planted tomatoes and strawberries on 5 December and the rest of the plants on 23 December.

We have invested the time and energy in building this garden to show case the benefits of using the results of the bokashi bucket. I am truly impressed by

> the results that I see daily. I am happy that I no longer place food scraps in the garbage and thus reduce my garbage output. I am happy that I can go near the food scraps as they convert to a very useful product and happy that it is conveniently kept in the pantry.

Apart from the benefits already outlined, I understand, that a very diluted solution of the

bokashi liquid 1:1000 can be applied to ovals/greens/lawns to increase the organic composition of the top soil and eventually the top soil will be able to capture and hold the night dew which will be enough to enable the grasses to survive and thus completely drought proof our ovals. I believe this is possible if we can convince enough people to create bokashi and collect the liquid for the good of the community.






The Bokashi bucket makes disposing of food scraps so much easier to maintain. Purchase your bucket from the SpringDale Centre.

We are hoping to work with Barwon Waste Management Services early this year to enable buckets to be trialed and people to witness the results for themselves. We encourage people to let us know if they would like to participate and we will be writing to organizations inviting them to suggest a representative to trial the buckets for them. We already have the buckets available at SpringDale for \$100 each. Many people have said that they would like to use the buckets as presents others see them as an extension of their "going greener" philosophy.



#### What can it treat?

Acupuncture can be effective for conditions such as headaches, insomnia,

pain of muscles or joints, anxiety or other emotional trouble, lowered immunity or post-viral conditions, digestive, respiratory or circulatory disorders. It can enhance overall wellness - energy levels, memory and concentration, or facilitate change in an individual's life. Acupuncture is great for pregnant women (given by a professional) as it can safely treat morning sickness. sciatica, hayfever or stress without any drugs to affect the child. It can even be used to facilitate labour and

What does it feel like? A normal treatment involves taking a history and checking the pulse and tongue for information about the state of the body. The practitioner will probably ask strange questions that seem unrelated to the problem. This is because the person is seen as a whole, not just a body part. Then, about 10-15 very fine, disposable needles are inserted into the acupuncture points. Usually this is felt as a mild prick, then no pain. Tingling, numbness, heaviness or a moving sensation are often felt. and are quite normal. Needles are left in about 15 minutes. You wouldn't expect lying there with needles in you to be very relaxing, but it generally is, as the body lets go of tension, and systems rebalance.





### Mosquitoes at low levels

There has been a significant drop in the number of mosquitoes recorded in monitoring traps at the start of January. The traps have recorded a huge 89% drop which is a great result considering the very heavy rainfall events in November and December. Treatments have included extensive helicopter spraying of inaccessible wetlands and the manual application to breeding sites in drains and other areas. This season's mosquito control program has been the most active and extensive ever conducted by the City with the volume of mosquito repellent used in December exceeding the usual amount used over a full year. You can help us by destroying sites on your own land that are caused by water standing in containers. Even a small amount of water in the bottom of a plant pot or pot saucer can provide a breeding site. So please be vigilant and check your pot plants and other water storage areas.

#### Residents can also check:

- Screening of water tank openings
- Checking for water retained in gutters or down pipes
- Screening of any openings to septic tanks in rural areas
- Buckets, empty containers or rubbish that may retain water

As you are aware, we are unable to build the full size Kaolin Sand Structure, however the likely scenario will be as follows;

Do a full excavation of the area (60mts x 80mts) as discussed as a priority.

Cover as much of the excavated area as possible to finished levels, with the Kaolin Sand as budget allows. All other components ie, shaping spoon drain and re instatement works as discussed. I believe the thinking



here is sensible. At least prepare a full size area (60mts x 80mts ) so that the main arena base is completed.

A full completion may be budgeted for down the track, so we are looking at a staged construction.

#### Public Transport / road safety and general community issues

#### Cleaning

There are valid concerns as to where general litter is left at the central City bus stops, prior being collected by the mechanical sweepers.

We are instructing staff to note your concerns and where possible to find a suitable location on the departure side of the bus stop, so as to minimise any impact on service users or the bus drivers. With the initial early clean, timing is crucial to avoid delivery trucks and buses parking over set-up litter which, must be collected at a later time by cleaners once the vehicles move on.

To overcome this, we have introduced a second mechanical sweeper into the city/waterfront area.

#### **Bus Shelters**

As part of the Bellarine upgrade program, the review of Drysdale and surrounding area bus shelters last year have been followed up with a further on-site review mid January. The aim of this review is to provide shelters that are appropriately located, meet high standards of user comfort for size, weather proofing, and appearance, and have a low maintenance requirement.

Passenger and public transport -

- The unsafe and challenging issues due to inadequate slip lanes for major roadside tourist and residential developments;
- iii) Inadequate run-offs and returns (bus bays) for busses and in turn the inconvenience to general traffic and also disabled passengers;
- iii) Insufficient room for stationary vehicles adjacent to the main traffic strips eg. Grubb Road between Swan Bay Road and Bellarine Highway.

#### Township safety issues -

- Pedestrian crossings, manned and / or unmanned, for both schools and general pedestrian traffic;
- After-hours lighting conditions along the main arterials through the townships;
- iii) Appropriate roundabout treatments to reduce the continual traffic bank-ups, especially during school start / finish times eg. Grubb Road / Portarlington Road / Jetty Road roundabout.

#### c) Main arterial safety issues -

 Deteriorated and dangerous condition of Murradoc / Portarlington / Grubb / Portarlington to Lonsdale roads due to the increased heavy commercial and industrial traffic along with the variable speed zones.

#### e) Cyclists -

 Inappropriate and poorly designated and maintained road shoulder pathways eg. Murradoc Road, from the Becks Road junction running west towards Drysdale to bottom of the hill, on both sides.

#### f) Additional key items -

The need to look seriously to the future before the Queenscliff and Portarlington Harbours are in full flight; before the Jetty Road and Arlington Rise developments have started; before the constantly increasing influx of tourists reaches a critical stage (whatever and whenever); before the ever increasing number of school children on public & private transport brings additional pressures; and before the heavy commercial sand, stone, waste and horse transport traffic movements reach a major crisis point.

#### Drysdale Library / Geelong Regional Library Corporation

Discussions are continuing with the Geelong Regional Library Corporation and interested community support



groups relating to strategy and plans to upgrade facilities in Drysdale – more as a community hub to serve all ages and abilities.

As previously reported, the concept is to increase size, make it more readily accessible, and upgrade the content and range of services to include youth spaces, homework help areas, community gathering and meeting places, as well as the range of print and electronic collections.

#### Planning - Municipal Strategic Statement

The first public presentation to approx 80 community at SpringDale covered current matters relating to the Rural Strategy, Housing Density Strategy, Portarlington-Indented Head Structure Plan and the coming Drysdale / Clifton Springs Structure Plan.
