How can I help?

Separation and divorce?

Separation and divorce do not only affect the adults in the family, but the children as well. When adults are experiencing their own pain and adjustment to the separation or divorce, it is possible for them to be unaware of their children's pain and emotional needs.

How might my separation or divorce affect my child?

Effects on the children may include:

- · stress-related physical illness
- guilt the children may consciously or unconsciously take the blame for the marriage break-up
- · anxiety and depression
- · frequent bargaining that things will return to what they were - fantasy, unreality
- · low self-esteem and indifference to others
- · confusion emotional, identity, gender
- · father hunger
- (Absent Father Syndrome)
- · grandparent confusion and lack
- · resentment and hatred or love/hate for one or both parents
- · schoolwork is affected general performance is much less than average, 70% are more likely to repeat a grade or be expelled, they are less likely to graduate satisfactorily from High Schoolwork
- promiscuity (especially with girls) drug and alcohol experimentation is higher, and addiction alsomany leave home early
- · delinquency and crime is much higher they are more likely to become divorced themselves







· more likely to have problems with trust, intimacy and sexuality

What might my child be feeling or thinking?

Many thoughts may go through children's minds following the divorce or separation of their parents. Typical ones are:

- "It must be because I'm bad"
- "I want everything like it was before"
- "Nobody loves me any more"
- "I'm no good"
- "I'm nobody"

Feelings may include sadness, guilt, anxiety, relief, fear, depression, anger, brokenheartedness, isolation and powerlessness.

What can I do to help my child through this?

Be open to talk and listen to them. Remember that every feeling you face they do also, perhaps even more so because they are powerless in the situation. Recovery from divorce largely involves facing reality, learning to forgive, and restructuring one's life. It will involve helping the child to work through many or all of the following:

- ~ the stages of loss shock, numbness, denial, emotional outbursts, bargaining, anger, fear, panic, guilt, depression, isolation, acceptance, new strengths, new relationships, new patterns, helping others, adjustment
- ~ dealing with resentment & working through forgiveness
- ~ learning how to tell others what they are going through
- ~ accepting changes in their relationships & building relationships in a new way





a Cook's Tale

The sun goes - the rain comes and the Cook fills the larder with tins of golden syrup and jars of treacle. Emulating the warmth and the glow of hot Summer the sweet excites the mind and fills it with fables and tales of long ago. Songs sung around the hearth, the feet in slippers resting on the hob. All we need, thinks the Cook, is an old three legged - pot, its contents oozing and bubbling and singing an old song.

"Tomorrow is my daughter's wedding day, a thousand pounds I have to give away. On second thoughts I think it best, to put it back in the old iron chest"

The Cook chuckles at the old miser's ballad and turns back to stirring golden syrup into the stew of lamb shanks, onions and marrow scraped from the bones. The Cook serves the marrow bone baked, then sent to table wrapped in a napkin and sprinkled with pepper and salt. A side dish of wafer - thin hot toast accompanied this. Gertrude, the Cook's dog then carries off the bones. Following this indulgence into food in the Georgian period the Cook begins to prepare a Winter feast for an ancient French beaux - the affair, not the friend, giggles the Cook – Winter not Christmas, but he wants chestnut soup, oysters, turkey, and of course Buche de Noel. Whilst the Cook waits for the peeled chestnuts to boil energetically for 20 to 30 minutes she stuffs the turkey, to be served with pistachio sausages - nuts freshly shelled mixed with finely chopped coriander and pork shaped into logs then gently poached until shape holds. The Cook thinks how dull it all sounds when ready it makes the most delicious sausages. Shaking and moving the chestnuts the Cook considers the fun that fortune tellers have with their prophetic reading

of roasted chestnuts - the chestnut is named after a suitor - if 'he' jumps from the heat into your lap 'he' will pop the question – if 'he' pops in the fire and burns up love is lost for ever.

CHESTNUT SOUP

Serves 4


Ingredients

1 pound (500 grms) peeled chestnuts (jars of peeled chestnuts can be purchased at most fine grocery stores) 2 to 3 cups beef or vegetable stock 1/2 cup heavy cream

Salt and freshly ground pepper 1 tablespoon unsalted butter

2 tablespoons minced parsley

- 1. Put the peeled chestnuts in a saucepan with 2 cups of stock. Bring to a simmer, uncovered for 40 to 50 minutes, adding more stock, if necessary, to keep the chestnuts covered.
- 2. When the chestnuts are tender, drain, reserving the stock. Puree the chestnuts in a food processor or blender. Return the pureed chestnuts to the reserved stock, stirring, and add in the heavy cream. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Just before serving add the butter and parsley.

Blueberry Pikelets

Mix into your favourite pikelet mixture. Serve topped with a spoonful of cottage cheese and extra blueberries.

Blueberry Salad

Toss with sliced rockmelon, celery, shallots and toasted pecan nuts. Serve on a bed of English spinach leaves. Combine natural yoghurt with some milk until smooth and add some wholegrain mustard. Drizzle over salad with chopped parsley and chives.

Blueberry Tarts

Stir us through sour cream sweetened with honey. Spoon into prepared pastry cases. Decorate with a sprig of mint.

Blueberry Sauce

Heat 1/2 cup water and 1/2 cup sugar, stir constantly until the sugar dissolves. Boil for 3 minutes without stirring. Cool. Puree 250g blueberries with the sugar mixture. Stir in 250g whole berries. Serve chilled over waffles and ice cream.

from the garden gate

Do you ever feel that you could do with a makeover? I know there are times when I could. Our gardens can also do with a bit of sprucing up. It can either be a major overhaul, which can be expensive and also muscle wrenching, or something small. Professional landscapers will do the job for you but, if like me, you will tackle the job yourself.

Small makeovers can be simple but still have the WOW factor. A grouping of pots, always an odd number, looks good planted in a similar colour scheme or you can be adventurous and combine bold contrasting colours. Soft pinks, creams and lavenders give a romantic feel whilst oranges, reds and purples have a feel of Tuscany. Potted fruit trees can be under planted with geraniums or orange and yellow calendulas. A standard topiary can be planted with pansies or over spilling lobelia. A large pot centred in a circular gravel path also adds interest especially if planted with wisteria, or even a grevillea. Let your imagination go wild and have a bit of fun.

A narrow passageway can also be transformed by adding coloured gravel or mulch and by using the same coloured pots and plantings will turn a dull area into a real pleasure. By spray painting the fence, say a smoky blue, this will highlight the green plants. Add a few garden features such as mosaic plaques or wind chimes and if you must even a gnome. A birdbath, in my books is a definite requirement as well as a bird feeder.

Just remember one thing. It is your garden and it only has to please you. It could be a cottage garden, native garden, modern minimalist, vegetable or just a small patio garden. If it gives you pleasure and it makes you happy then that is the most important thing. We are not aiming to win gold medals at Chelsea Flower Show (well done guys!), but aiming to please ourselves.

Guest speaker for May was well known former journalist, radio and television personality Annette Allison who is now Community Relations Manager for the Royal Flying Doctor Service of Australia (RFDS). The first flight of the RFDS took place 80 years ago when John Flynn saw the need for a medical service in the outback. John Flynn was born in Moliagul, Victoria in 1880 but grew up in Sunbury. He went to Melbourne University where he studied to be a minister of religion. His first placement was at Beltana. Many people were dying in that area due to a lack of medication. John Flynn together with Clifford Peel and Alf Tragor formed the Transport and Communication service that later became the Flying Doctor Service. When the Queen visited Australia in 1954 it became, by her command, the Royal Flying Doctor Service. Of special interest to many members of our club was the fact that the RFDS is called the Air Ambulance service in Victoria. 80% of the operating costs are funded by the State and Federal Government, which supplies 47 aircraft. Fund raising covers the remaining costs. The RFDS is known as the "worlds largest waiting room" for people who work, live

and play in Australia. Annette reminded us that many people who travel around Australia are frequently needed by the RFDS.

May marked 80 years of dedicated service from this unique and iconic Australian Service. Thank you Annette, for your valuable and informative talk about this wonderful, free service, which originated in Australia and which supplies medical service to the outback as well as to rural and country areas Australia wide.

Enviro Bike Ride Report

The Bellarine Rail Trail (BRT) Family Fun Day, Enviro Bike Ride was held on Sunday 27th April. The Family Fun Day is a successful program that has been run over a number of years. This year saw an environmental flavor added to the program through the Swan Bay Integrated Catchment Management Committee and Bellarine Landcare Group. The Enviro Bike Ride was led by Kate Lockhart and Matt Crawley who provided interpretation of the BRT environmental values and issues.

The bike ride was fully booked with a total of 30 participants split into two groups. A better than forecast day provided pleasant riding conditions to take in the scenery. The theme of the ride was opportunity.

Some of the current environmental values are still improving, or addressing weed and other issues. There were 17 site stops along the ride, these attempted to identify and add knowledge on various aspects of the trail. Some of the sites included the following.

Site 1 - Heathy Vegetation Type - Remnant Manna Gum

Sandy soils and Bracken Fern are characteristic of Heathy Woodland

vegetation, this site is classified as a remnant woodland. What is lacking at this site is floristic diversity, understorey, herb rich layer probably due to over grazing.

Site 5. The Good, The Bad and The Ugly.

A native species *Melaleuca armillaris* is not local to the Bellarine Peninsula. While this is not necessarily a huge problem, the species does provide perfect harbour / habitat for rabbits. Tree Lucerne is a fodder crop but can also be an environmental weed as well and the Manna Gum, is one of four Eucalypts indigenous to the Bellarine.

Site 8 Native Grasslands – Biodiversity Hotspots.

This site is floristically rich. It contains significant species on the Bellarine including, Chocolate Lillies, Golden Moths, Bulbine Lillies, Leopard Orchid and others.

This site is under risk from slashing and weed infestation from Watsonia. In 2007 the BLG and SBICMC conducted a habitat restoration and information day at this site to learn more about the Grassland values and remove Watsonia.

At Site 8 the participants were provided an extra activity that no one expected, the planting of Chocolate lillies. 30 were left there with holes pre dug so the riders just had to place them in the ground, unexpected yes but this provided each rider with more connection to the site.

The diverse group of riders added so much to the ride. We had local landholders such as Jim and Lynne Mason who discussed the revegetation that they had been doing along Yarram Creek. This was clearly visible from the BRT and provided a tangible link about what was being achieved for the participants.

Suma Park station saw about half of the riders catch the train back to Drysdale, while the remainder continued on with Matt to learn more about Swan Bay, finishing with a well earned cuppa in Queenscliff. After a positive turnout and post response, it is hoped that the ride will take place again next year.



















Cleaning Windows Austrian Style!




