A great night once again, and contact the Potato Shed for more information on future events.

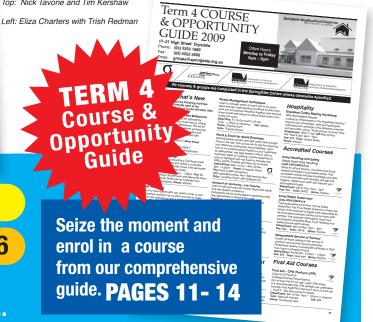

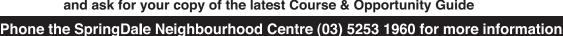

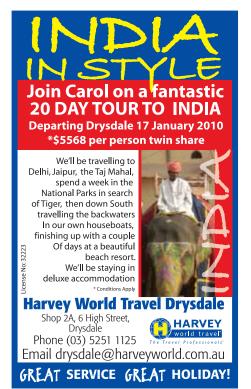

Allocated Pension Drawdown Relief

In a press release on 18 February this year, the Government announced that investors in allocated, account based and term allocated pensions would only be required to draw down half their calculated minimum income requirement for 2008/09. The 2009 Federal Budget has extended this relief for a further 12 months to 30 June 2010.

Due to the financial market downturn, the Government has recognised concerns associated with meeting the minimum draw down amount in 2008-09 and have recognised this pattern to continue for the 2009 -10 financial year. For some, this has meant having to sell investment assets and realise losses in a depressed market. Furthermore the temporary relief also addresses the concern that the minimum draw down requirement was set based on asset values as at 1 July 2008 (or on pension commencement if later) when equity values were higher.

What does this mean? Income payments from allocated pensions, account-based pensions or term allocated pensions for an individual aged under 65 as at 1 July 2009 can exercise their right to reduce their minimum payment from 4% to 2%. For individuals age 65 – 74 years, the minimum payment can be reduced from 5% to 2.5%, age 75 – 79 the reduction will be from 6% to 3%, age 80 – 84 the minimum will drop from 7% to 3.5%, age 85 – 89 the reduction can be from 9% to 4.5%, age 90 – 94 represent a drop from 11% to 5.5% and those age over 95 years can reduce their minimum

from 14% to 7%. And finally, for individuals planning to take their minimum payment as a single payment in June 2010 may now elect that payment to be half of what will be determined as at 1 July 2009.

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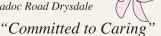

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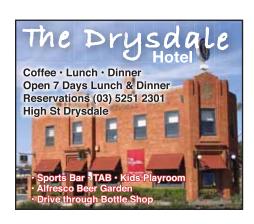

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BOOST TO SENIORS' FITNESS

EX HMAS CANBERRA SET TO BE SCUTTLED

I recently had the pleasure of touring the former Royal Australian Navy warship HMAS Canberra which is being prepared to be scuttled off the shores of Ocean Grove in the coming months. The vessel will become an artificial dive site providing the region with a new diving experience for local and visiting divers alike. The local economy will benefit from visitors to the dive site who will stay in local accommodation, support dive shops in the region, dine at our restaurants and buy local produce.

Decommissioned in late 2005, the ex-HMAS Canberra is a 4,100 tonne, 138 metre long and 30 metre high Adelaide Class guided missile frigate. The vessel was gifted to Victoria by the Commonwealth Government and the State Government is providing \$1.5 million dollars toward the project.

HEALTH SELF HELP PROGRAM GRANTS

Application for grants from the 2009-2010 Health Self Help Program have now

opened. I encourage local health self-help groups to apply for these one-off grants of up to \$5,000 that are in recognition of the key volunteer role self-help community health groups play in helping others.

Eligible groups include those to support people affected by specific illnesses and conditions, including arthritis, strokes, a range of different cancers, mental illness. diabetes and fibromyalgia, and others which provide support to family and friends of people with a range of illnesses. Stark Symbolism

A plain wooden cross, painted white and set in the red soil of Long Tan, Vietnam, is surrounded by a white picket fence. Nothing startling in appearance, it stands from year to year, through heat, monsoon storms and the chilling darkness of long nights.

August 18th 1966, D Company 3 RAR, about 100 men, engaged in a fierce battle against 2,500 North Vietnamese soldiers. It was known as the Battle of Long Tan and took place late afternoon as monsoon rains swept across a rubber tree plantation about 3 football fields in size.

The cross is a symbol of bravery and courage of those 18 Australians who lost their lives that day. It is silent, yet its silence speaks louder than any words that could be said by the most gifted orator.

Visitors stand before this cross, heads bowed, tears lurking, respectful and subdued. They remember those, who, having not reached the prime of life, gave all they had; their lives. Others who survived the Battle of Long Tan carry invisible scars wrapped around minds and hearts.

The visitors come from a variety of backgrounds, yet are bound together with a common interest - the Vietnam War. Some come out of curiosity, others laden with emotional torments. They pause before the cross with hats in hand and, in that secret place of the mind, is locked into their own thoughts.

Would those Aussies who died bravely on that day of 18th August 1966 want some great monument or expensive marble

headstone? I think not. They were ordinary Aussies, going about their business of the day. Yet their business of that day was to fight in a war and die.

The encounter at Long Tan was fierce, Aussies were outnumbered; yet they held their positions and won the battle. Each enemy bullet or rocket fired that found a live target enabling death to swoop in, there were no wails of lament, they would come later. Each man did what he had to

That's the purpose of the cross: standing at its post, doing what it has to do. While we stand, look and remember.

Lighthouse olive oil stars on world stage

Our own Lighthouse Olive Mill has taken on the international giants of the industry – Spain, Italy and France – and emerged with flying colors.

In its first overseas foray, the Mill won a silver and a bronze medal in the 2009 Los Angeles International Extra Virgin Olive Oil Competition decided in June.

This 'coals-to-Newcastle' success complemented two gold medals and Champion of Show at the 2008 Sydney Royal Fine Food Show and a gold medal at this year's Royal Melbourne Show.

Lighthouse Olive Mill Shop manager, Rosie Holder, said the LA silver medal, awarded for their Picual oil, was particularly special, given the strong competition of the Europeans and the fact that the Mill's entry was nearly a year old at the time of judging.

"All olive oils soften and lose some flavor over time, so we may have done even better if the timing had been different," she said.

The LA bronze medal was awarded for Lighthouse's citrus blended oils, which feature in the shop's range of produce

headed by the exclusive prestige labels Picual, Frantoio and Arbequina.

Established in 1997, the 165-acre Lighthouse olive grove produced 7,000 litres of oil last year from 47 tonnes of crushed fruit. Apart from Mill Shop sales, Lighthouse olive oil is distributed to selected retailers and restaurants and is sold at regional markets.

The Mill Shop is located in the heart of the Bellarine Peninsula at 650 Andersons Road, Drysdale (Melway 471-K4) and is open for tastings and sales from 10.30am to 4.00pm Thursdays to Sundays.

In addition to the full range of oils and table olives, the shop stocks local wines, herbs and spices, jams and chutneys, soap and other body care products made with olive oil, and selected giftware.

Christmas Plum Pudding

Be early for this Christmas and make this delicious Plum Pudding that was served at this years Men's Kitchen 'Christmas in July' luncheon.



Christmas Pudding (Serves 8)

Ingredients

2 generous cups mixed fruit
1 cup sugar
125 gm butter
2 cups milk
2 cups self raising flour
2 tsp Bi-Carb Soda
Brandy optional

Pour a good 'slurp' of brandy over fruit and leave to soak overnight.

Prepare basin, grease well and have ready some foil and cloth to cover and tie around.

Method

In a good size saucepan place fruit, sugar and butter and milk and bring to boil. As it boils add Bi-Carb Soda mixed with little of pudding mixture. This will rise up as mixed in. Remove from heat and add sifted flour, stirring in well to prevent lumps. Place mix into prepared basin, cover with foil and cloth and tie. Place in boiler and simmer for 2-4 hours, the longer it simmers, the darker the colour.

Double this mixture for Christmas to make sure there is plenty for seconds, and it keeps very well for future feasts that might require a tasty delicious dessert.

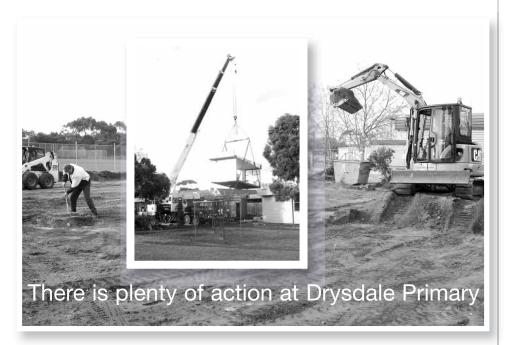

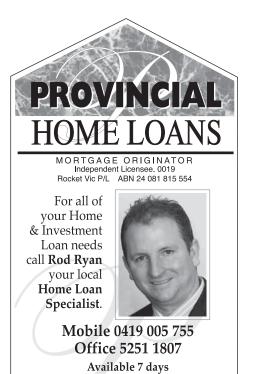

We are having substantial changes to our buildings but we will not change those things at DPS that we value and hold dear. We will still have a happy school where we proactively promote positive behaviours and a community where people respect and care for each other.

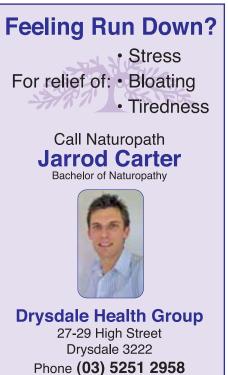

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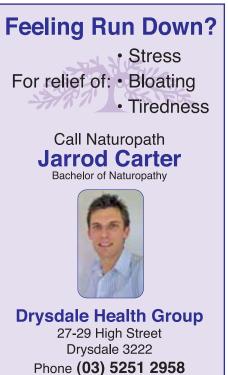
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Clifton Springs Primary School

The Rotary Club of Drysdale, together with the Australian Rotary Health and headspace Barwon will host a public forum on mental health problems affecting young people aged 12 to 25.

- The forum will be held on Mon 7 Sept 2009, at The Potato Shed, Drysdale.
- Doors will be open from 7.00 pm for a 7.30 start.
- · Expected to finish around 9.30 pm.
- Entry is free and tea and coffee will be available.
- Support Groups will have displays staffed before and after the Forum.

Stuart Baker, President of the Drysdale Rotary Club said "the aims of the community forum project are to reduce the negative impact of mental illness on younger people and their families and, by delivering information to local individuals and their families, improve the capacity of individuals to look after themselves."

The problems young people face are many and may include physical and computer bullying, alcohol and drugs, pressure to have sex, pressure with schoolwork and expectation, anxiety, depression, body image and low self esteem. A feeling of not *fitting in*.

The forum will clarify the issues and where to turn for confidential help. Support groups will be in attendance with free information and advice. The format of the forum will be short addresses by keynote speakers, a psychiatrist, a local GP, a young consumer and a carer, followed by questions and an open forum discussion. During refreshments there will be opportunity to mix with host Rotarians, the presenters and representatives from local support and carer groups.

The forum is being supported by headspace Barwon who are planning to open a facility to assist and support young people. This facility will be conveniently located adjacent to the Potato Shed in Drysdale and will serve the youth of the Bellarine Peninsula.

Australian Rotary Health has committed to spending over \$8 million on health issues over the next years. 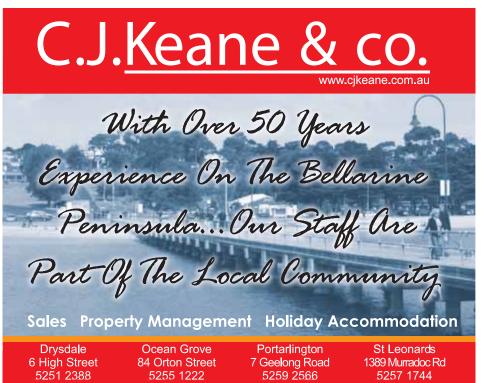

The Book Club - The Book Thief

On Monday August 3, the Book Club met to discuss Marcus Zusak's *The Book Thief.*

The story, set in Germany in WWII, is centred on a very young girl, Liesel Meminger. It opens with Liesel's mother taking her children to a foster

home where it should be safe for her to spend the troubled times. The theft of the first book occurs in the cemetery where they must break their rail journey to bury Liesel's small brother.

An unusually written book in that the narrator is Death who is of course, present at every

passing and witnesses much human frailty from his supposedly impartial angle.

Throughout the war years Death's 'work' keeps him extremely busy but he takes an interest in the lives of Liesel, her foster family, new friends and the Jewish refugee hidden in the basement.

The story is summed up on page 6 "It's just a small story really, about, amongst other things: a girl; some words; an accordionist; some fanatical Germans; a Jewish fist-fighter; and quite a lot of thievery."

It was felt that older readers with memories of wartime Europe may find

this book painful. It was a surprise to Book Club members to learn that *The Book Thief* was written with young readers in mind and had won an Encouragement Award for Children's Literature. This helped to explain the unusual writing style and odd illustrations although most readers felt

that the opening chapters were strange and confronting. The author is now only 34 years old and has been writing for children and young adults since he was sixteen.

Discussion was vigorous and opinions and reactions varied but all were glad that they had read this book (which would not have been a personal choice for most of us) to the point where we rated it nine out of ten.

The Book Club meets at the SpringDale Centre on the first Monday of each month at 7:30pm for about 90 minutes - ending with a cup of tea. On Monday September 7 we will discuss Families: Modern Australian Short Stories edited by Barry Oakley and in October The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society by Mary Ann Shaffer and Annie Barrows. Our meetings are informal and new members are always very welcome.

KG'S corner

Banking in Drysdale during the 1940's

These days we take banking for granted with some of our banks being open from 9am – 5pm Monday to Friday and some on Saturday mornings as well. In the 1940's, the residents of Drysdale relied upon banking services from Portarlington that came to Drysdale 3 afternoons a week.

Lin Knight, the owner of the Mixed Business in Drysdale, and owner of one of the only cars in Drysdale, would drive to Portarlington and collect the Bank Manager. They would then be back in Drysdale for the afternoon session 2pm-3pm on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Kel reminded me that customers would wait outside the National Bank until the previous customer had finished, this was for privacy. I remember standing with Mum while we waited to enter the bank. As Kel said, "Come rain, hail or shine".

At the end of the session, Lin would escort the Manager and the takings back to Portarlington.

Security was provided in the form of a Smith and Wesson revolver carried by the Bank Manager. It was always fully loaded with 6 shots and had the safety switch on. Unfortunately the Bank Manager occasionally forgot to take the gun home.

I was interested to hear that each bank had a residence and the Bank Manager would live at the bank. As the bank didn't operate fulltime the residence was rented out. As we said in the first Kel's Corner, Kel's family lived in the National Bank building. "Many times I found the revolver left in the bank. My mother would hide the gun," said Kel.

"When I found the revolver we'd play cowboys and Indians with Ken Knight, Sylvia Lunn, my brother Keith and Keith Nicholson. If somebody had moved the safety catch it could have been permanent not just count to 50 and then move after you'd been shot."

Sometimes the gun was left in Lin Knight's car. But it was always returned to the Bank Manager.

In a lot of places the footpaths in both towns are conspicuously absent, and in many streets they are desperately required, so we are working towards new paths to make it a safer and more user friendly area to walk. Local residents information is critical, so keep your eyes open for forthcoming meetings

Many people who live locally in Drysdale itself would walk to the shops if there were footpaths available, which saves the car, saves on parking etc. The only point now is to find out what streets deserve to have footpaths constructed on them, and which side, and importantly who pays for them?

The next club meeting is on 14 September when David Hooker from Alzheimer's Australia will give examples of how to keep the brain active. (*Please don't forget this one*).

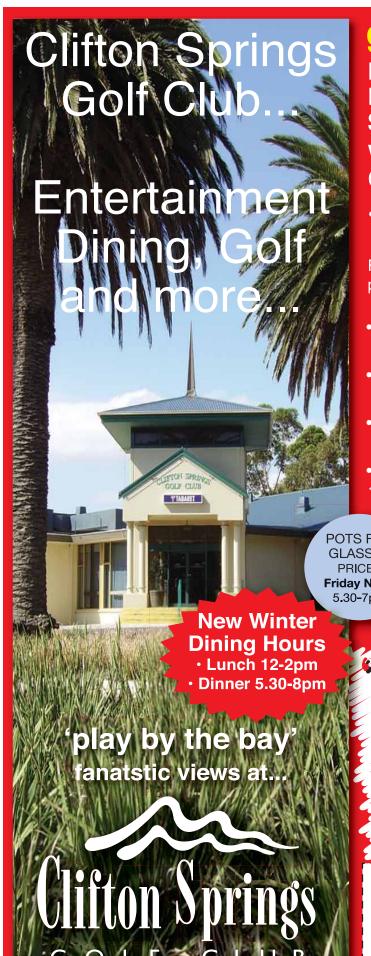
