

Dear Friends

I believe and long for life-long learning and I was lucky enough to be a guinea pig for two different classes recently. I was a model for the Digital Photography class and had about 300 photos taken, and I was a participant in the Ortho Bionomy session and learnt about the gentle approach that this type of life energy assistance can give to help with back care; these were fun and rewarding in which to be involved. Both the people who ran these sessions are extremely knowledgeable in their fields and are both so humble in their roles and the way they share their skills with our community is heart warming. Because there was only a couple of people in the session Allison had time to work on my finger, that had been unhappy since I'd fallen in late January. After one very short session my knuckle started to go back to normal (without the surgery that everyone kept advising me to have). My impression of the theory of Ortho Bionomy instructs us to listen to our body and support painful sites and place those sites in the most comfortable positions. I love its gentle approach and it resonates with the way I love to live life.

We may need to run a few more back care sessions and encourage people to come as family units to help each other, which is the way Allison would love this practice to spread through the community. Please let the office know if you are interested and maybe a session could be on a Saturday afternoon.

Last year I was lucky enough to do a **Diploma in Community Business** Management and this year I'm working towards the formal gualification in Training and Assessment. Although I have been a trainer of adults for the last 30 years and have undergone many train the trainer sessions, they have mostly been in my role as a Guide leader trainer.

Every day I love to learn something new and love to have the chance to use it.

Grant writing sessions for Community and Sporting groups is coming up this month. We picked Sunday afternoon so hopefully many groups can be represented. Our trainer, Helen, ran these sessions in NSW for a local government. Helen has written successful grant applications and has also awarded grants in a previous position so knows what a good grants look like from both sides. It will be a two session course Sunday 8 and 22 August 1pm-4pm at SpringDale.

Our small bus trips are going extremely well. I have a number of names ready to go to Scienceworks and Point Cook and have scheduled this for Sunday 12 September. We still have a couple of seats left if you'd like to come. We'll spend the morning at Scienceworks and have the afternoon at Point Cook, when there's a flying display at 1pm, weather permitting.

Lastly, our Annual General Meeting will be held on Friday 27 August at 5pm. Honourable Lisa Neville MP will be our guest speaker and she will present the first Ted Chidzev Youth Encouragement award. Following on from the AGM at 7.30pm we will present an evening with international author Donna Williams, a lady who has lived with autism and it should prove a good night. All are welcome by a gold coin admission.


Alice Will be in Drysdale

From the SpringDale Committee

Last year we conducted a strategic review of SpringDale Neighborhood Centre and set out our goals for the next three years. We are now one year in, and are very pleased with what we have achieved so far. Specifically this is;

- Spreading Great Community Messages - Improving communication across the North Bellarine.
- a. The SpringDale Messenger circulation has increased from 5000 to 6.500 copies with many more coloured pages, and is a very professional looking magazine.
- b. Our website has recently had many more features added eg the Business Directory, and past Messenger articles.
- c. Our new sign and door into the West meeting room have been completed.
- 2. Our diverse community understanding and supporting key community groups.
- a. Increased group activities like more bus excursions and three new cooking groups.
- b. A new homework group that meets once a week – so as well as helping students with school homework, this has the added benefit of getting more local youth involved in SpringDale.
- c. Implementation of new Ted Chidzey Award for Youth Encouragement.
- d. An increased number of welcoming morning teas for new residents.
- e. A revamped *Welcome Kit* for new residents.
- **3.** Training for a positive future meeting employment preparation and adjustment needs.
- a. We continue the process of regaining our Registered Training Organisation status.
- b. Continue to collaborate with specialist agencies to address the changing needs of people who are seeking to increase work options through training.



- 4. Maintaining social connections and keeping people connected with each other.
 - a. With the use of both the Messenger and our website we list a diary of upcoming events and give people options for keeping connected.
- b. We are regularly undertaking surveys of the community in an effort to find ways in which we can implement new services for the local community.
- 5. Room for our Centre to grow enabling the Centre to meet future needs.
- a. We now utilise the Senior Citizens rooms and are constantly on the lookout for other appropriate spaces
- b. We are working closely with Paul Jamison of the CoGG, keeping him abreast of our growing space needs.
- 6. Going even greener building on our sustainable foundations.
- a. We have implemented a rain water tank in the childcare area.
- b. Bokashi kits are in constant demand.
- c. We support the Harvest Basket Group and its markets held at SpringDale every month.
- Getting Governance and management right – Continuously improving our capacity to operate a great Centre for our Community.
- a. We have implemented separate feedback forms for each SpringDale use, in an effort to better know and serve the needs of our users, and our non-users.
- b. With reduced government funding, and its availability being increasingly harder to obtain, we are constantly on the lookout for services that are self-funding, like our Vacation Care program, and many of our training courses.
- c. While keeping our eye constantly on the financial cogs to make sure we have appropriate resources to meet our commitments.

In summary, this year has seen the introduction of several new services as well as the provision of existing services to many more people in the community, and, this has been done without making a loss, and keeping within our operational budget.

I invite you to attend the SpringDale AGM on Friday, 27 August where I will outline how we intend to progress these goals even further in the next 12 months.

Students help with Revegetation

Bellarine Secondary College

20 senior students from Bellarine Secondary College, accompanied by teacher Leeanne Hearn, took part in a working bee with the Friends group on Wednesday 23 June, assisting with the development of further new plantations on the section of the trail close to Jetty Road, Clifton Springs.

Considerable revegetation work has taken place along this section in the last three years, now added to by a further 250 new plantings of a wide range of indigenous shrubs and trees as a result of the student's efforts. This area is gradually being transformed as these plantings develop and grow despite some losses due to drought conditions.

Fred Cook - Volunteer Queen's Birthday Honours List 2010

Fred Cook, a Leopold resident for many years, has been recognised for his tremendous voluntary contribution as Works Co-ordinator for the Friends of the Bellarine Rail Trail, with a place on the Queen's Birthday Honours list for 2010. Fred was awarded a Medal in the Order of Australia (OAM) for leading our volunteer group in the revegetation work along the trail. Since its beginnings in 2002, he has given many hours of his time leading the group in the planting of more than 55,000 indigenous plants along the trail. He has worked in close collaboration with the trail manager, The City of Greater Geelong, to ensure that these plantings have been carefully chosen to restore and enhance the natural vegetation which once flourished.



The work goes on, but the trail has already been substantially transformed under Fred's supervision, with his constant planning, arranging of plant acquisitions, organising volunteer working bees and providing tools, water and mulch as required. Fred also represents the organisation on the Bellarine Rail Trail Advisory Committee, and is its representative on the Swan Bay Integrated Catchment Management Committee and the Bellarine Catchment Authority. His enthusiasm provides the essential motivation for the team of volunteers to continue the work despite cold or hot weather conditions, and to overcome the difficulties brought on by drought, so as to achieve a remarkably high retention rate for new plantings.

Joy McKean, wife of the late Slim Dusty and Peter Nosow of Lansdale Roses



The Slim Dusty Rose is a rich golden orange colour with copper bronze tonings that blend with the outback colours of Slim's beloved Australian bush. "I've had an interesting time

just lately. Landsdale Roses from Perth launched the Slim Dusty Rose at the Melbourne International Garden and Flower Show recently. I was there for the launch. It was the first time I had seen the rose *in person* as we say, and it is lovely. The colour is such a deep, almost copper golden colour and the perfume is strong and stays with the rose the length of its life in a vase. In the photo you will see the colour of the rose but photos never capture the depth of colour really."

- 6 tbspns castor sugar
- 8 tbspns SR flour
- 2 large eggs
- 125g butter
- 4 green apples, peeled, cored and

- 4 drops vanilla essence
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup slivered almonds

cinnamon

Method:

Melt butter then add the sugar and the rest of the ingredients. Mix well. Place in a greased tin.

Sprinkle with extra sugar, cinnamon and slivered almonds.

Bake 200°C for approximately 30 minutes.

Allow to cool before cutting.

Combine all ingredients in a large bowl then knead well. Divide mixture into 16 portions and roll them into small balls with wet hands then press and flatten into pattie shapes.

Place the patties on a lightly oiled baking paper and place them in a moderately hot oven.



Bake until the patties dry out and darken slightly. Refrigerate or freeze until needed. When you are ready to have them for your meal, pan-fry in olive oil until hot.

Personal Safety Tips

Personal Safety is very much in the news at the moment and the following tips are worth considering:

When Travelling, tell people where you are going and what time you will return.

When Driving, make sure you have enough fuel to reach your destination. Keep property, such as coins, sunglasses, laptops, ipods and mobile phones out of view. Park in well lit areas. If you think you are being followed, drive to a place where you can get help and attract attention such as a service (petrol) station or convenience store and drive with your doors locked.

On Public Transport, where possible, travel in numbers or sit in the company of people rather than on your own. If a long wait is unavoidable, stay in well-lit areas or wait near local shops or public venues. Travel in the front carriage and sit close to the guard or driver. The driver has a radio and can call for emergency assistance if required. If you are harassed, complain loudly and draw attention to yourself to advise others of your situation. If catching a taxi, where possible, sit in the back and take note of the driver's details. Where possible pre-order a taxi over the phone as the driver's details will then be recorded.

On the Street, bags and handbags should be carried close to you. If your bag is grabbed, release it and, if possible, empty the contents on the ground. Be wary of people asking for your help/advice, assistance or money. Don't leave your handbag or purse on top of a shopping trolley, counter or hanging on the back of a seat in a restaurant. In restaurants, put your bag on the floor between your feet. Put your foot on or through the strap so that you can feel if the bag is moved (but don't let it trip you when you get up).

When using an ATM, shield the keypad when you enter your PIN. Don't count your money in full view of strangers. Always put money and card away before leaving the ATM and don't keep your PIN in your wallet or purse.

Think ahead and travel safely.

As you may have read elsewhere, the future direction of Neighbourhood Watch is being reviewed. Sooty and Jackie trusted everyone and so to keep them safe I had to put them in a cage overnight."

I can picture Kel on the bike with the birds, riding on our unmade roads, and I'm sure you can too.



How much super is really enough?

With the recent market volatility in the share market many prospective retirees have put their retirement plans on hold. The most common question that I am asked from these same prospective retirees is "how much super is really enough?" Our super will provide the basis for our income in retirement and it is important we understand how much we will need to provide for a comfortable retirement.

Even if our retirement is many years away or just around the corner, doing some retirement planning now could make a real difference to the amount of retirement savings we have when we stop working. Statistically we are living longer, which means we will need more to fund our retirement. Do we have enough for the retirement we would like? How do we know how much is enough?

The costs for a couple living comfortably in retirement have risen in recent times with the latest Westpac/Association of Superannuation Funds of Australia (ASFA) Retirement Standard research report supporting this fact. National figures for the 2010 March quarter revealed that a married couple looking to achieve a comfortable retirement lifestyle needed to spend approximately \$53,565 a year, while those seeking a modest retirement lifestyle needed to spend \$30,399 a year. These figures represent an increase of 3.3% and 4.1% respectively compared to the previous quarter.





At the same time, a single person wanting to achieve a comfortable retirement lifestyle needed income of \$39,159, while a single person wanting to achieve a modest retirement lifestyle needed income of \$20,981.

This represents an increase of 3% and 7.3% respectively to the previous quarter. So what is the difference between a modest and comfortable lifestyle? A *modest* lifestyle is better than that provided by the pension but limited to basic activities. A *comfortable* retirement on the other hand is one that affords such things as regular overseas holidays or home renovations (updating the kitchen or the bathroom at some stage), being able to eat out from time to time and entertain friends and family, top cover private health insurance or a better car to name a few.

Different strategies suit different people so it is important to speak to your financial planner to give you the most appropriate advice that relates to your own specific circumstance.

Vietnam Veterans Memorial Day

Late afternoon on the 18 August, 1966, sleeting monsoon rains fell on a rubber plantation the size of three football fields. One hundred and twenty soldiers of D Company, 6RAR were fighting for their lives against a battalion strength of North Vietnamese soldiers who signalled their attack by bugle blowing orders.

Young Aussie soldiers, some not even 21 years of age, stood their ground. Their ammunition was almost expended when the Royal Australian Air Force managed to drop by helicopter replenishments right on target and so helped save their lives. It was a bloody battle and 17

of our young men died, with 23 injured. The Viet Cong lost over 250 and the blood stains later revealed many more had been injured or killed.

This battle was known as the battle of Long Tan. This was just one battle that caused the Vietnamese Government when it came into power, to wipe the province of Phuoc Tuy off its maps – to save 'face.' Phuoc Tuy was the area that the Australians guarded and maintained while they were in South Vietnam. Our former enemy came to respect and honour the Aussie soldier because of their tenacity and fighting spirit.

August 18 is our national Vietnam Veterans Memorial Day. With other wars continuing, with wars that are history, let

> us not forgot those young men who fought and died in Vietnam. They came home not to a heroes welcome, but to have red paint thrown on them, accused of being baby killers and rejected by RSL's. They have lived with the results of chemical warfare. Agent

Orange with its debilitating birth defects in their children. They fought hard for pensions and help from DVA. The fighting soldier of today can thank them for the clinics that acknowledge and treat Post Traumatic Stress, formerly known as Shell Shock.

DCSCA is a member of the Affiliation of **Bellarine Community Associations** (ABCA) and on June 18 we attended the first meeting between the ABCA and Stephen Griffin, Chief Executive Officer of the City of Greater Geelong (CoGG). Four Bellarine-wide issues were discussed. The first was the widespread feeling that CoGG's public consultations appear to have no effect on subsequent CoGG policies and we'll meet again to discuss a new CoGG consultation policy drafted by the ABCA. Next was 'Infrastructure on the Bellarine', based on ABCA's comprehensive list of items needing attention, including appointing a designated CoGG 'officer for the Bellarine'. This led into ABCA's concern that CoGG sees the Bellarine as the 'poor cousin' to developing areas such as Armstrong Creek. Stephen Griffin said that CoGG would involve ABCA - as the peak community body on the Bellarine - in the mid-term review in 2011 of CoGG's

Bellarine Strategic Plan. Finally, ABCA called for CoGG, Surf Coast Shire and other relevant agencies to develop integrated and collaborative policies concerning the effects of climate change, not the present piecemeal approach.

DCSCA's inaugural Festival of Glass now has a confirmed date: Sunday 20 February 2011, 10am - 5pm at Drysdale's Potato Shed. There will be a pre-Festival event on Saturday 19 February, also at the Potato Shed. The Festival Committee is receiving inquiries from people and organisations interested in participating. These have included a glass artisan currently overseas who's coming home next year and a glass factory in China that hopes we can have a nice relationship! 
