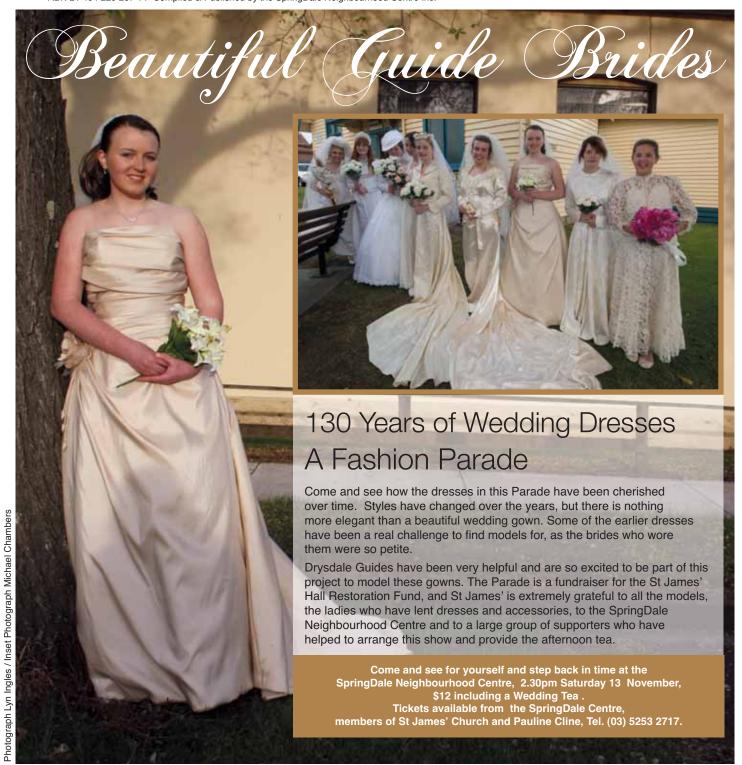

Hi everyone

It's a great time for us to thank the bodies that fund us. People often ask where our money to fund such great programs comes from - about 33% is from grants. So let us take the time to thank the State Government for a quarterly grant to help us carry out community development, thank you to the Adult Community Further Education who help to subsidise education for those who have achieved only up to level 10 or form 4 and thank you to the City of Greater Geelong who provide a grant to help us deliver specific parts of programs.

Thank you to Department of Education and Early Childhood Development who give us a small grant to help us provide Occasional Care at a reasonable rate and they also help people have subsidized Occasional Care if they are attending an Adult Community Further Education subsidized class, lastly Department of Education and Workplace Relations who subsidize Vacation Care and allow us to keep fees reasonable.

The other two thirds of our funds come from fees we charge for services, classes, advertising in the Messenger, Occasional Care and Vacation Care fees, money our groups pay to help us keep the doors open and fees from photocopying and hall hire.

Thank you to everyone who helps us continue to grow and support a wider range of services each year. Last year our turn over was \$385,000 this is a 100% increase in the last 6 years.

The SpringDale artists recently held a very successful art show. In our preparations for the event, I learnt that approximately 60 have to come to an art show for a painting to be sold and if 10% of displayed works sell, then it is a successful show. Our Art show sold approximately 50% of works displayed. Well done everyone for all your efforts and congratulations for all your success.

Another Art show has been scheduled for the last weekend in November. This time it will showcase the works of Wayne Elliott, a strong supporter of SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre. Wayne's businesses have always been advertised on the front of the Messenger since it commenced almost 20 years ago. Wayne has led a number of SpringDale groups including being the President of the Drysdale Clifton Springs Community Association, when it was auspiced by SpringDale.

I would like to thank Pierce and a new volunteer Grace who have put hundreds of hours into improving our website and Liam Way who has recently created a DVD about SpringDale. I love all the things that all our people achieve every week.

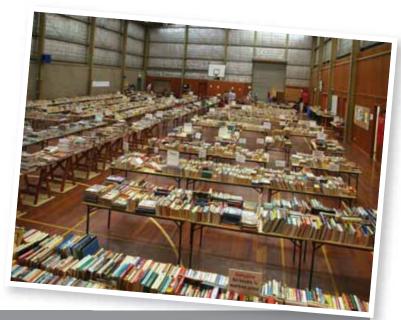

Drysdale Ladies Probus visit the Queenscliff Fort

Several members of the Drysdale Ladies Probus Club visited and took a very historical, enlightening and interesting guided tour of the Fort Queenscliff Museum. At the time we were there, this iconic landmark was celebrating the 150th anniversary of a military presence at Shortland Bluff. The photo of the group is taken beside an 8 inch Armstrong Disappearing Gun, mounted on a hydro pneumatic carriage. Shells were loaded in the breach in the lowered position and the gun was raised hydraulically to fire.

Fort Queenscliff dates from 1860 when an open battery was constructed to defend the entrance to Port Phillip Bay. The fort is still used today by the military. A trip well worth taking to a place full of history not to be forgotten by Australians.

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Term 4 a busy time at Clifton Springs Primary School





Term 4 is a busy and productive term, with our whole school participating in the swimming program, bike education program for Grade 4 students and the transition of our Grade 6 students into Secondary College and the Kinder children into Prep will begin.

Our 2011 Prep Orientation program will take place over 3 days this term; Tuesday November 16, Thursday November 25 and Tuesday December 7. The circus in Drysdale

Holden Brothers or Perry Brothers circus would often come to Drysdale and set up on the common on the corner of Princess and Eversley Streets. During the show they'd ask for someone to come and ride the mule, wild horse or donkey. Guess who was the first to be nominated? "Get Kel Davis" was the call.

"The animals were bare backed and a donkey or mule doesn't have much wither to hang on to. They'd hold the animal while you got on, then they'd let it go and you'd race flat chat across the arena. The animal would put its head down once it got to the other side of the arena and give a buck and you'd go flying through the air," said Kel.

"Sometimes you'd do a double somersault in the air and land thinking that you'd broken every bone in your body. People would be roaring and clapping and carrying on while I limped off slowly waving to the crowd to get my prize – guess what it was – a granny smith apple. I'd suffer for weeks afterwards," said Kel.

Kel tells me that sometimes he'd get on backwards "wrap my arms around its flanks and scissor my legs around his neck so I could hang on and not get hurt. If the circus had camels, we'd find out the word to get them to sit and stand and exercise the camel until it had enough" Kel stated. What will he tell us next.

In the vicinity of the Clifton Springs military convalescent home, Mrs. Hammond, a widow, has a farm. Her two sons are on active service and the crop was lying in the fields unharvested. The men at the home heard of the circumstances and Sergeant Stewart organised a workingbee. Twenty five of the convalescent soldiers visited the farm on Monday and Tuesday and as the result of their labours the harvesting has been completed. They carted and stacked 100 tons of hay in two days.

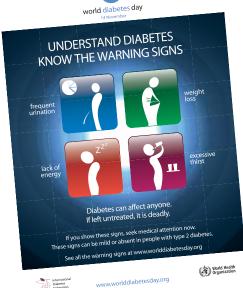

In Australia, nearly two thirds of men and half of women are overweight. This is a key factor in the alarming rise of type 2 diabetes.

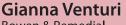

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Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil plus a knob of butter 3-4 cloves crushed garlic 1 red onion, halved lengthways

40gm grated fresh ginger

1 red chilli, sliced and deseeded

2 teaspoons coriander

2 cinnamon sticks

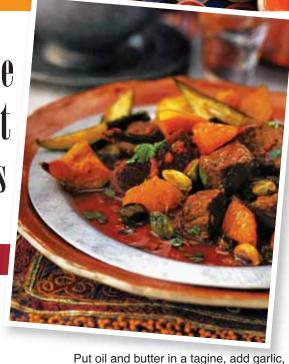
3-4 beetroot, peeled and quartered 500gm lean beef cut into cubes 2 thin skinned oranges cut into segments

1 tablespoon dark runny honey knob of butter

2-3 tablespoons pistachios parsley

salt

pepper



Put oil and butter in a tagine, add garlic, onion, ginger and stir until they begin to colour. Add chilli, coriander, cinnamon sticks and beetroot and sauté for 2-3 minutes. Place in beef and sauté for 1 minute. Add water to cover and bring to boil. Reduce the heat, cover with lid and simmer for 1 hour until meat is tender. Add orange segments, honey and season with salt and pepper. Cover with lid and cook for further 15 minutes. Melt butter in saucepan, add pistachios stirring over medium heat until golden brown. Sprinkle over the tagine together with parsley. Serve immediately with couscous.

mysterious middle eastern

Ingredients

1 cup dried chickpeas

% cup tahini
% cup lemon juice
3 tablespoons olive oil,
plus extra for drizzling
2 cloves chopped garlic
1 teaspoon cumin
salt
sweet paprika for garnish



Place chickpeas in a large bowl, cover with water and soak overnight. Drain chickpeas and place in a large saucepan with enough water to cover by 5cm. Bring to boil over high heat, then reduce to a simmer and cook for an hour or until chickpeas are tender. Drain, reserving 1 tablespoon of whole chickpeas and ¼ cup of cooking liquid. Place chickpeas, reserved cooking water, tahini, lemon juice, oil, garlic and cumin in food processor and blend until smooth. Season with salt. Spoon hummus into a shallow bowl, scatter with the reserved chickpeas, then drizzle with extra oil and sprinkle with paprika. Serve warm or at room temperature.

Chickpeas can help lower cholesterol and improve blood sugar levels. You can use 2 x 400gm cans of drained chickpeas instead of dried ones

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around the garden

aylight savings is good or gardeners

Spring is well and truly upon us and daylight savings allows us extra time to spend in our gardens. Following the recent heavy rain now is the time to mulch the garden. This reduces water loss and weeds and also keeps the soil temperature down. It also makes for happy worms. In between showers fertilise everything. Citrus are extremely hungry, and will benefit from cow or sheep manure being spread around the drip line and then mulched.

Fertilise the vegie garden with blood and bone and potash. Plant sweet corn, tomatoes (try heirloom varieties for flavour), cucumbers, zucchinis, celery, capsicum, beetroot, eggplant and any other salad vegies.

Sprinkle potash around tomatoes to improve fruit size. Plant basil, marigolds, and parsley throughout the vegie patch.

Basil is said to improve flavour, and parsley will be a home for ladybirds whilst marigolds deter nematodes in the soil. Traditionally, Melbourne Cup day is tomato planting time. For dessert crops, plant watermelon, rockmelon, honeydew and strawberries.

Provide a thick mulch of pine needles under strawberry plants. Cover plants with a cloche made from onion bag netting, this protects the fruit from blackbird attack.

Old CD's hung around the vegie patch and in fruit trees will also deter birds. Start a Christmas pot. This could be a planting of herbs, or cherry tomato with basil and lettuce, or colourful petunias or brilliant marigolds. Potted up now and they will be ready for a Christmas Day display.

We tend to overlook the simple flowers in favour of the newest trendy ones. Take good old nasturtiums for instance. Considered as a weed by some gardeners this little plant really is a giant in the plant world. Plant it under apple trees to deter codling moth, add leaves and flowers to a salad. Use seeds as capers or let dry and grind for a mild peppery taste. They are high in Vitamin C. Lastly, chop a cup of leaves, add to 3 cups of hot water, a dash of soap flakes and bingo, you have an organic spray for aphids. Nigella or Love in the Mist seeds can be used instead of poppy seeds. Marigold petals can be used in salads.

Rose petals and Lavender heads can be used in potpourri. As you can see, flowers have many uses, arranging them in a vase is just one option.

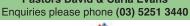

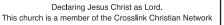

Growing the local economy was the subject of DCSCA's public meeting on 22 September. Speakers discussed the employment implications of a range of developments, including the proposed ferry service between Portarlington and Port Melbourne and a proposed indoor horse training facility. Other people spoke about losing farming land to housing estates and about the area's growing population having to commute to Geelong and Melbourne for work.

The discussion about the local economy was part of DCSCA's 2010 Annual General Meeting, which also featured performances by local acoustic trio *Steer* plus displays by the Bellarine Historical Society, the Festival of Glass committee, the Corangamite Catchment Management Authority, Youth Foundations Victoria and the MISSION board and three door prizes.

Advocacy at work

DCSCA has seen inadequacies in the Council's public consultations so often that, backed by the Affiliation of Bellarine Community Associations, we submitted a draft consultation policy to the Council. We were, therefore, pleased to learn of an

internal review by the Council of its consultation policy and we have offered our assistance.

Local action on climate change

DCSCA is trying to act locally on climate change. We've called for a proposed trial in Geelong of an electric car system to include Clifton Springs; we're pressing the RACV and the Environment Protection Authority - organisers of a test-drive of low emission vehicles (LEVs) in Melbourne in October - to repeat it on the Bellarine; and we're exploring how local people can benefit from the Victorian Government's five-year Electric Vehicle Trial.

And finally

More than thirteen weeks after DCSCA members and friends in the Save Our Springs Street Open Space (SOSOS) group asked councillors to discuss The Community Plan for the Springs Street Reserve with them, they still have no answer. We'll continue to press for a satisfactory response.

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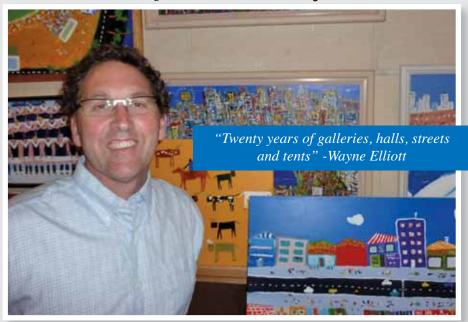

Like most story telling artists Wayne has painted stories about things that have interested him throughout life. Many of these intersests relate to country communities, landscape and pastimes especially sport. His rawness, the primary colours and simple style have attracted many people to his art. Stephen Naylor (Lecturer in Art Theory at James Cook University) described his exhibition at Mildura City Art Gallery as a celebration of the country. Wayne Elliott's raw expressions of life in rural regions of Victoria and NSW document the noise, sounds and energy of places where they are set. Much of Elliott's work has a chaotic dynamism; many of the works use central/circular compositions that radiate the energy from the event outward to the perimeter of the work. This system is a common feature in the works of Rubens, El Greco, Delacroix and Gericault and one quite difficult to achieve with such consistency. REMEMBRANCE DAY 2010

November 11th, 11am 1918 and the guns of the 1st World War ceased. So many lives lost, so many families shattered, so many men injured. 1945 and once more the sirens heralded the end of another war. Percy Herbert Cherry VC, MC

Percy Herbert Cherry VC, MC (4 June 1895 - 27 March 1917) received the Victoria Cross, the highest military decoration awarded for valour in the face of the enemy. Cherry was born at Drysdale and at the age of seven his family moved to Tasmania and bought an apple orchard. In 1913, Cherry was commissioned as a second lieutenant

and enlisted in March 1915 and served at Gallipoli before transferring to the Western Front. In early March 1917, Cherry was decorated with the Military Cross following an attack on Malt Trench. He was awarded the Victoria Cross posthumously for his actions during an attack on the French village of Lagnicourt.

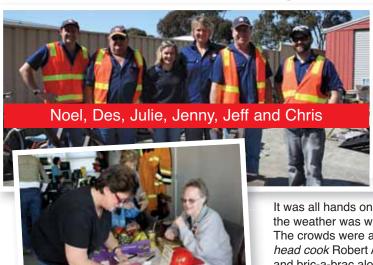

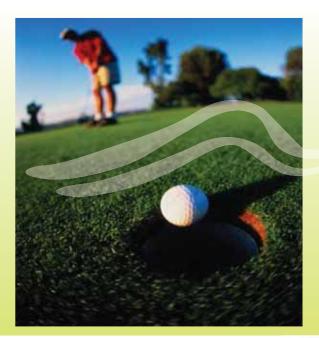
