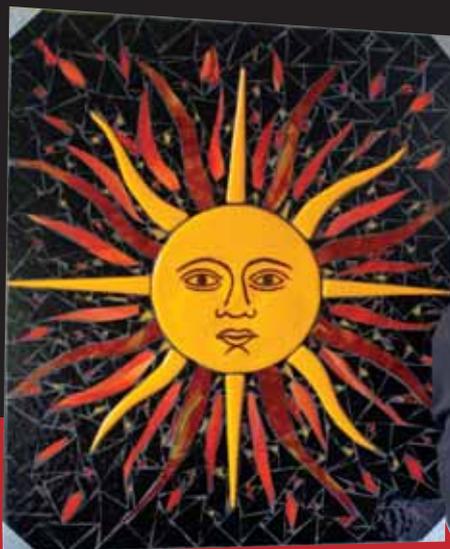
It is an initiative of the **Drysdale & Clifton Springs Community Association (DCSCA)**, supported by the **City of Greater Geelong**.

The Festival is a new and unique showcase that combines artistic creativity and craft with innovative industrial design and manufacturing. Visitors can see exhibitions of glass art, glass sculpture, glass jewellery and glass mosaics. Glass artists and craftspeople will have stalls, as will glass companies and manufacturers.

A series of workshops will introduce visitors to different aspects of the world of glass, such as *Glass in Architecture*, *Glass in the Economy* and *Glass Jewellery*; and at *the Old Glass Roadshow*, two experts will tell you what that old bottle or vase might be worth.

Visitors to the **Festival of Glass** can be assured of a full day out in Drysdale. Local musicians will entertain visitors as they sample the region's food, wines and olive oils; the monthly Drysdale Craft Market is happening nearby on the same day; and the fully restored, historic Bellarine Peninsula Railway runs all day between nearby Drysdale rail station and Queenscliff.

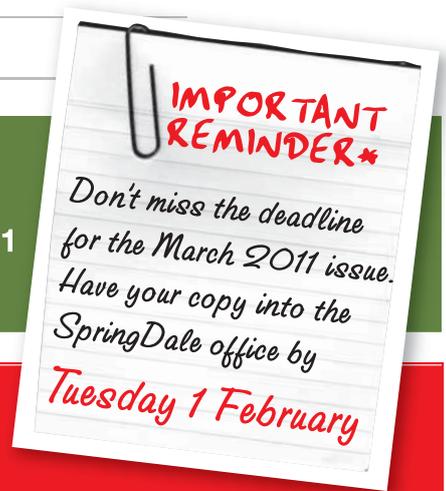

As most of our services kick start for 2011, I would like to welcome everyone back to SpringDale. Please join us for another wonderful year in which we can make history together.

We ask people to renew their membership by February 14 each year. The annual membership charge is still \$5.00, with Business Network membership being \$30, Not-for-Profit group membership being \$30 and whole of life membership being \$100.

All our groups are now back in full swing and all are keen to welcome new members (except Life Drawing that still has a short waiting list). Maybe you'd like to join a new group this year and share your time, energy and skills with like minded people. Please feel free to nominate any other group that you would like to see happening or a similar group on a different day or different time of day.

Our classes are almost ready to begin but there is still time to sign up. Hopefully this year will be a year to learn a new skill or get a new certificate. We try to seek new courses each term to inspire our community but if there is a course that you would like to do at SpringDale please let us know so we can try to get it to happen for you and the others who haven't thought to ask for it yet.

Many new families will be joining Occasional Care this year and we welcome them as part of our SpringDale family. We have already welcomed back our families who participated in the Vacation Care service during January when they had a great deal of fun and learnt lots.

The SpringDale Messenger is in its 20th year of production and it continues to be our best way to inform the community about our services and activities and the best way for other community groups to liaise with our community. Regularly I am reminded that our community members appreciate the standard of the Messenger and would rather read and keep the SpringDale Messenger than any other free weekly or monthly newspaper/letter. **The support of our advertisers helps us to produce a quality magazine 11 times a year, 6500 copies are home and shop delivered monthly.**

**It helps 81 businesses to advertise their products and services, allows 85 groups to inform our community of their activities and services, allows 33 SpringDale Groups and 300 members of these groups to participate fully and welcome other community members to their ranks, allows almost 200 classes to be advertised and more than 1000 participants, allows 60 families to participate in Occasional Care and 40 families to participate in Vacation Care, allows 10 other organisations to regularly use our facilities, 10 other not-for-profits to regularly get their newsletters printed and hundreds of residents to get many documents typed, photocopied, faxed, scanned, emailed and the list goes on and we hope it increases in 2011.**

As one of the suite of services of our not-for-profit organisation the SpringDale Messenger currently costs \$7000 each month to layout, print and deliver plus thousands of dollars of volunteer hours on top of that. ## Bellarine Podiatry

Our feet are often the most neglected and forgotten part of our bodies; they are our main mode of transport and in the average lifespan can walk the equivalent distance of three times around the world! Despite this, people are more likely to have their cars serviced than have their feet checked by a podiatrist.

'My feet are killing me!' is a common complaint, yet only a small percentage of people seek professional help for their foot pain. A common misconception is that sore feet are normal: they are not.

Our feet are generally strong, complex structures, which make possible one of the major characteristics distinguishing humans from other animals – upright walking on two feet (rather than four). However, feet are vulnerable to injury and disease and if you suffer from foot or lower leg pain you should visit a podiatrist.

Podiatrists are university-educated foot health professionals who diagnose and treat foot and lower limb conditions. These may include biomechanical disorders (problems arising from the structure and function of the feet), cutaneous disorders (such as corns, calluses and nail problems), diseases that affect the body as a whole (such as diabetes, arthritis and blood circulatory deficiencies) and infections (such as tinea or plantar warts).

Bellarine Podiatry is committed to providing caring and professional foot health services to the Bellarine Peninsula through our clinics in Drysdale and Ocean Grove. In most cases you do not need a medical doctor's referral to see one of our podiatrists, unless you are being referred through the DVA, EPC Program, TAC or WorkCover.

# Living with Prostate Cancer

The Prostate Support Group of Bellarine was formed in June 2008 and since has met regularly at Ocean Grove Community Health Centre at 7.30pm on the second Thursday in each month. The group has reciprocal rights with the Prostrate Support Group of Geelong which meets at St. John of God Hospital at 10am on the last Friday in each month. This is a much larger group of men and the two groups often organise joint activities.

The most important function of a Prostate Cancer Support Group is to provide hope and support particularly to those who are recently diagnosed and still struggling to come to grips with their situation. Partners are particularly welcome at meetings as they have issues they need to share also. Prostate Cancer is a disease of aging and the question becomes will those tumours become malignant and aggressive at a point in your life when they threaten your ability to reach a normal life expectancy. This is why regular testing between the age of 50 and 70 is so important; if these tumours turn aggressive you need to know about it early before debilitating symptoms appear and corrective treatment can be undertaken.



### The Prostate Support Group consists of several categories of members:

- Those recently diagnosed needing to explore their options and better understand what lies before them.
- Those that are undergoing treatment or recovering from the varying after effects of that treatment.
- Those who have prostate cancer but are on watchful waiting to see if the tumours become sufficiently aggressive as to warrant surgical or oncology response. The waiting can be stressful and some opt not to wait but seek a radical treatment whilst the window of opportunity exists. However much can be achieved by lifestyle changes, diet, exercise, supplements and medication.

Often it is nowhere near as bad and they benefit from the experiences of others in learning to live with these issues.

*Above everything else the Support Group is where friends meet and share and more often than not laugh at the common experiences associated with living with cancer.*

# BOUNTIFUL BURGERS for a tasty BARBEQUE

## TEX MEX BURGERS IN TORTILLAS

## LAMB BURGERS WITH CUCUMBER SAUCE



Lightly spiced and flavoured with dried fruits and pine nuts, these burgers are the perfect choice for a summer barbeque.

Serves 4

### Ingredients for lamb Burgers

- 675g lean minced lamb
- 1 finely chopped small onion
- 8 finely chopped dried apricot halves
- 60ml/4tbsp pine nuts
- 25g fine dried breadcrumbs
- 10ml/2tsp mild curry powder
- 1 egg
- salt & freshly ground black pepper

4 Pita breads, heated and cut in half and serve with mixed green salad

### Cucumber Sauce

- ½ cucumber, peeled and grated
- 300ml natural yogurt
- 30ml chopped fresh mint

### Method

Combine the lamb, onion, apricots, pine nuts, breadcrumbs, curry powder, egg, salt and pepper in a bowl. Mix together well with your hands till thoroughly blended. Divide the mixture into eight portions and shape each portion into a small flat burger. Cover and chill in the fridge for 30 minutes.

Meanwhile, for the sauce, squeeze the grated cucumber in a double thickness of kitchen paper to extract excess water. Mix together the cucumber, natural yogurt and fresh mint. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Preheat the grill. Proceed to cook the burgers to your taste (approx 10 mins) turning halfway through cooking to ensure they are cooked evenly.

Serve with warmed pita breads, accompanied with the green salad and drizzled with Cucumber Sauce.

If you fancy a change from the ordinary burgers, this Tex Mex version will be a winner at your next barbeque.

Serves 4

### Ingredients for Tex Mex Burgers

- 500g lean minced beef
- 1 finely chopped small onion
- 1 small green capsicum seeded and chopped finely
- 1 crushed garlic clove
- oil for brushing
- 4 fresh tortillas
- salt & fresh ground pepper
- garnish with chopped fresh coriander
- serve with mixed salad leaves
- Guacamole Sauce**
- 2 ripe avocados
- 1 crushed garlic clove
- 2 chopped tomatoes
- ½ chopped small green chilli (optional)
- juice of 1 lime or lemon
- ½ tspn chopped coriander

### Pepper & salt

Mix together the mince beef, onion, pepper, garlic and season well with salt and pepper. Shape the mixture into four large round burgers and brush them with oil.

To prepare the **Guacamole Sauce** mash the avocado flesh roughly, then mix in the garlic, tomatoes, lime or lemon juice, chilli and coriander. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Cook the burgers on a medium/hot barbeque or under a preheated grill for 8-10 minutes, turning once until they are brown.

When the burgers are almost cooked, heat the tortillas quickly on the barbeque for about 15 seconds each side and then place a spoonful of guacamole and the burger on each. Wrap the tortilla around the filling. Garnish with coriander and serve with a green leafy salad.

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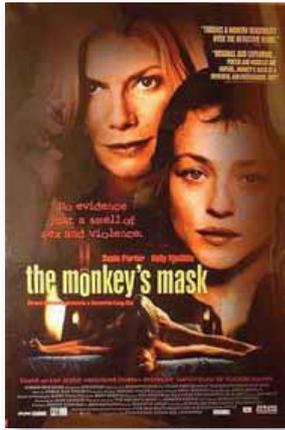

# The Book Club -

## *The Monkey's Mask* by Dorothy Porter

At the December meeting the SpringDale Book Group reviewed the verse novel *The Monkey's Mask* by Dorothy Porter. Dorothy Porter was an Australian writer and poet who died in 2008 at the age of 54.

The story, written in verse, is a crime thriller telling the story of a private detective (Jill, who happens to be a lesbian) who is hired by the parents of a missing university student, Mickey. Jill meets Mickey's poetry professor (Diana) who is married but with whom she eventually has an affair. Mickey's body is found but Mickey's parents want Jill to keep investigating the cause of death due to the police not getting very far. Jill discovers sexually explicit poetry written by Mickey and eventually discovers a link between Diana and Diana's husband to her death. This is the first time the group have review poetry. Opinions were mixed but most agreed that the language and erotic



descriptions were too graphic and gratuitous. One member has read the book four times as each time she discovers new elements to the story. Other comments included the characters being stereotyped and clichéd, eg. the cynical lesbian detective. This verse novel style of writing managed to portray the characters vividly despite so few words used.

Dorothy Porter won several prizes for this book in 1994 including *The Age Poetry Book of the Year* and the *National Book Council for Poetry*.

Unfortunately we forgot to score this book but an estimate would be 6/10.

On 7 February meeting the book for discussion will be *Petite Anglaise* by Katherine Sanderson.

### My place

A new online news site will keep communities informed of crime in their local neighbourhood and policing issues impacting their lives, Victoria Police Chief Commissioner Simon Overland recently announced. He hopes the regular release of crime statistics will make communities aware of what is happening in their local area so they can take preventative measures.

"We know that a majority of people access the internet both at home and at work. Education is very important. If community members can see and learn what types of crimes are being committed in their backyard, they can work with police in preventing these crimes," Mr Overland said. "It also gives people the opportunity to take part in online forums and share their ideas or any concerns with police. In addition to the crime statistics, Victoria Police News includes official traffic updates, witness appeals, CCTV footage of incidents in which police are seeking public assistance and other police news of interest to the community."

Mr Overland said that whilst Victoria Police and the community had achieved significant reductions in crime over the past eight years, the current economic climate presented new challenges. "A lot of crime is both opportunistic and preventable. Small changes to the way you go about your lives can make a huge difference. Removing your GPS or valuables from the car, making sure your doors and windows are locked, asking a neighbour to look after your house whilst you go on holiday and using one way screws on your number plates are all easy steps which will help reduce crime in your local community."

"I hope Victoria Police News will help the community to work with us to address these challenges and share the responsibility of

In each competition, the winning entry will be the people's choice - the one receiving the most voters from visitors. So get your entry in early to ensure that everyone has a chance to vote or it!

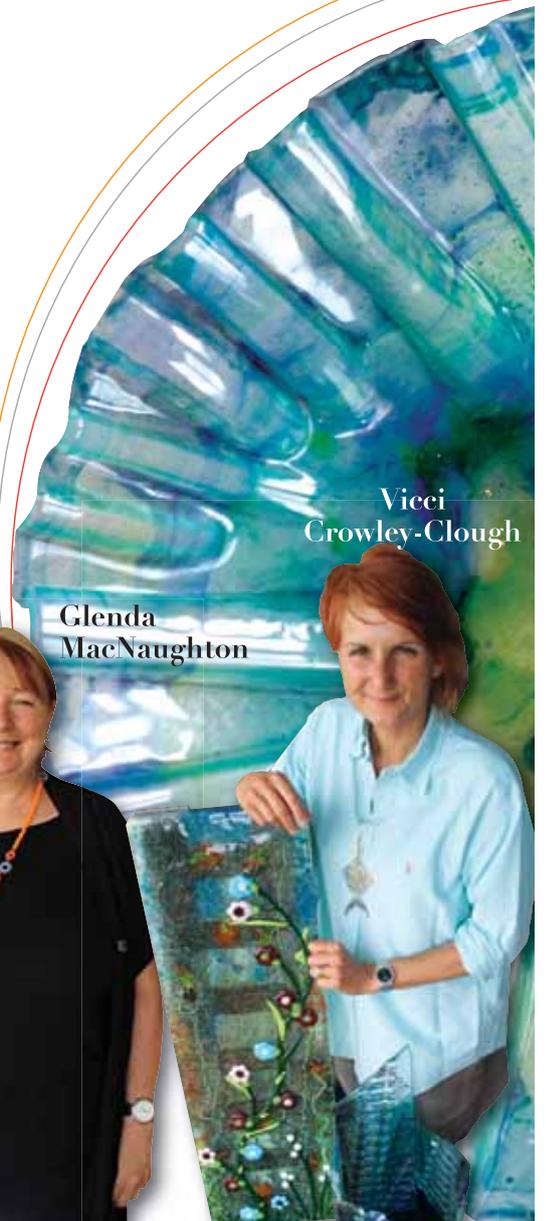

## Make it a Day Out in Drysdale.

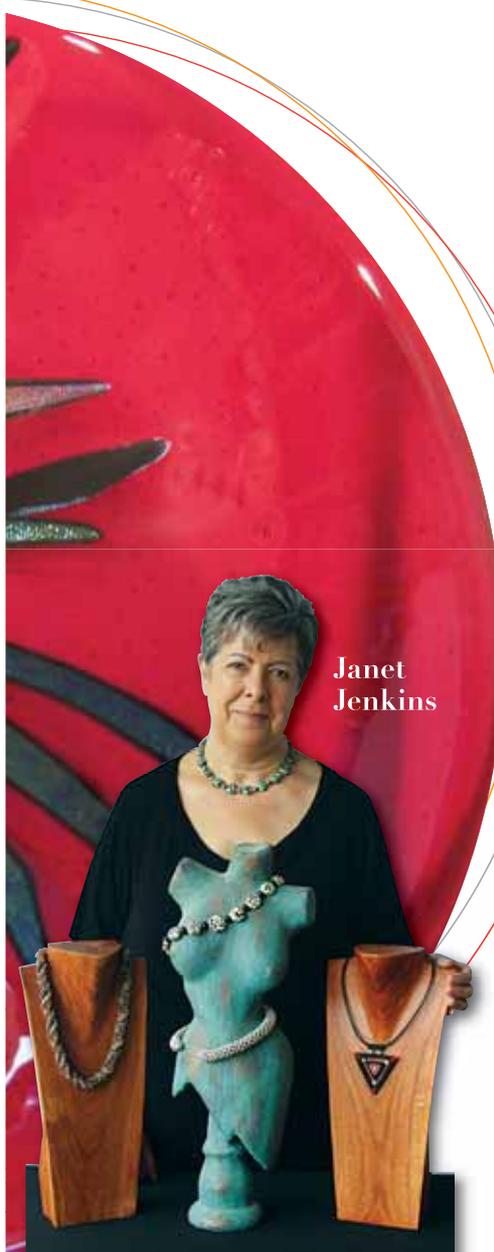

## How did the Festival start?

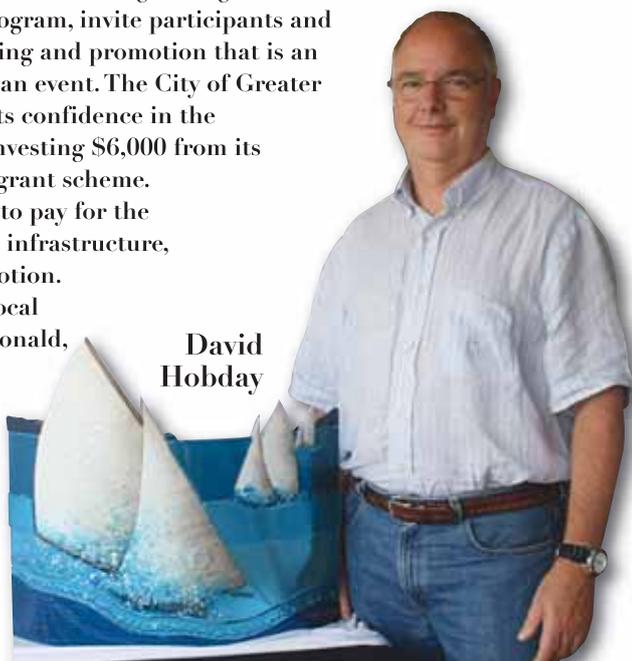

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# Getting Grants



Most groups need money for their organisation, be it community, sports or social but it doesn't have to stay on your wish list for ever – you can do something about it. And the first thing on your list should be to attend a Grant Writing Course. I attended one recently at the SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre and it was really worthwhile.

Imagine you are a grant provider and you have money to give away (what a luxury!). How do you ensure it goes to a worthy cause? If all the requests are worthy, how do you ensure it goes to the most worthy without going round and interviewing all the applicants? Once the money has been allocated, how do you know that it will be wisely used and that the required targets will be met?

Prospective applicants have to put themselves in the grant providers shoes to appreciate what sort of picture to paint and background information to provide. Filling in the application forms should be the last thing on your mind. First you have to understand the group/organisation you need the money for. Does it have a Mission Statement, what are its aims, what facilities does it provide and for which section(s) of the community? If you get a grant, how will you ensure the money is targeted and

provides long and lasting change. All this is explained on the course, plus the opportunity to be with like minded people and bounce ideas around, which can be very beneficial. My experience was so positive and very rewarding – an

application to the Victorian (State) Department of Planning and Community Development was successful and St James' would like to thank Lisa Neville for her support and encouragement during this process. St James' Church Hall has been

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# Hearing Voices Support Group



In the 1980's psychiatrist Marius Romme, from the Netherlands, was treating patients who heard voices or felt things that weren't there. He found that, despite all the medication he put a particular lady on, she never stopped hearing voices; in fact, they got worse. So instead, Marius and his patient began talking to the voices, working out that they were metaphorically referring to something else, and although often sounded destructive, were trying to protect his patient in various ways. From this began the Hearing Voices movement, where groups around the world are sitting down and talking about why they have voices, what triggers them, and what helps them to live a normal life. Some famous voice hearer's include Mozart, Charles Dickens, Sir Isaac Newtown and Sir Anthony Hopkins. People may not necessarily be part of the psychiatric or mental health

system to hear voices, in fact, most are not in this system.

Kardinia Mental Health has been running a hearing voices support group since April last year. The aim is not to get rid of the voices completely, but to share experiences of what it is like to live with voices, and ways to live a successful life while hearing voices.

The group is held every third Wednesday of the month and there is further consultation time available if needed. 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### Love living in Drysdale

"I've always loved living in Drysdale. I used to run amuck. When people drove a horse and buggy to the hotel to have a few drinks (and some had more), while they were inside I'd help unharness the horse and take it to the opposite side of the fence. We'd reattach the horse to the buggy or jinker and wait for the person to come out of the pub and then listen for the language. We'd be hiding, waiting, shivering if it was cold. Another one we used to do and I feel terrible about this now - we'd lie across the footpath and wait for people to come out of the pub. In the poor lighting the men would step on me and leap 6 feet in the air."

Although Kel says he feels terrible, he still does have a little laugh when he remembers these times.

Then another story came to Kel's mind. "I had an old horse called Dolly and I'd put a flank rope on her and get on backwards, tighten the rope and she would buck like hell. People in Drysdale would ask 'Has the sun gone down early?' Others would say 'Don't worry its only Kel Davis, he's been bucked off that high that he's blotted out the sun.'"

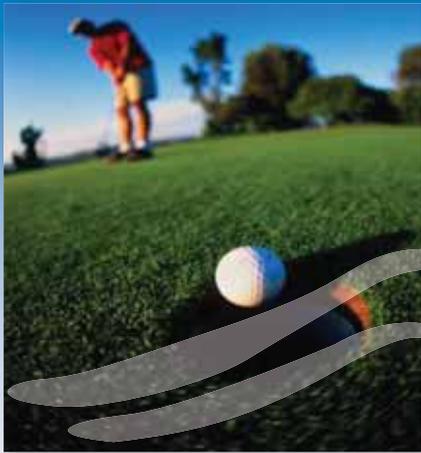

To the lush, verdant gardens of old Forest Glade.*

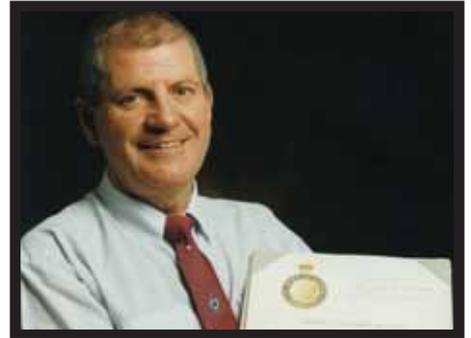
*That Thursday Mount Macedon looked at its finest.

The squidgy got caught in his tongue and wire got stuck in his throat. He brought him home and we took him down to the Bellarine Vet immediately. Being New Years Day the Vet was not open and the emergency vet at Newcomb was not open until 10am. We felt that we could not wait that long so we put our poor boy in the back of the car in a lot of pain and drove him all the way to Werribee Vet Hospital. There our poor boy was anaesthetised and had the squidgy removed from the base of his tongue on the left hand side. It was firmly attached to the tissue in his mouth and had

to be cut out. The wound was stitched using dissolvable suture material and he is now home after spending the entire New Years Day in hospital. We then had to give him medication. I would hate for this to happen to anyone else. I would also ask that anyone fishing down there does not throw away their fishing tackle, that they put it in a bin. If a child swallowed it or it had gone into the stomach of our dog it would have been a lot worse.

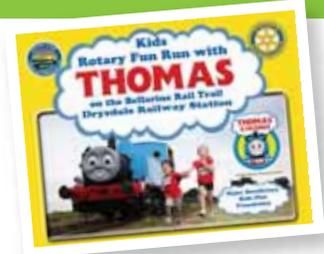
