### SpringDale Groups are growing

One of SpringDale's core service areas is SpringDale Groups and I'm happy to announce our 40th Group has just started at SpringDale. This means that there are 40 different groups of people in our community who have a common interest that they wish to share. Some groups meet monthly like our Jigsaw Group, our Book Group, Coffee Club, German Speaking Group, Harvest Basket and our Raw Foods Group. Some groups meet every two weeks like our Bellarine Camera Club, our fairly new Scrapbooking Group, our Card Making Group, our Springers Quilting Group and our newest Writers Group.

Most of our groups meet weekly. Our Singers Group that has met weekly for almost 20 years, Bellarine Community Choir, Badminton and Volley Ball Groups, Line Dancing, Scrabble, Mah-jong and Card Groups, Life Drawing and SpringDale Artists Groups, our Textile and Craft Group, our Spinning Group, our Computer Users Help Group, our Homework Group, Drysdale and Portarlington Toy Libraries, our Pole Walking Group and our new Cycling Group, all our Kitchen Groups,

St Leonards Community Space (which has groups of their own) and Sea Change Men's Shed Group, our Wellness Group and Reality Group. Finally, our Cheese Making Group, which has grown out of our successful Cheese Making Classes from the last twelve months, meets every couple of months to enable like minded people to make cheese together, share costs of cultures, share ideas, time and energy and share cheeses at the end of the session.

What does it mean to be a group of SpringDale? It means that SpringDale provides the infrastructure for each group. The one annual SpringDale \$5 membership fee will enable people to become part of any of these groups, dependent upon space in the group being available. Most of our groups have attendance fees of \$2 per session but some that have more costs pay up to \$11 per session. All groups pay \$1 per person to SpringDale to help with our running costs - electricity, gas, tea, coffee, cleaning etc and in our Annual Report you'll see that \$7,554 was attributed to Groups -Operational Share equates to 7,554 people who attended our groups over the year.

Each group accesses insurance via SpringDale insurance policies, our banking, our auditing, our premise and our storage, SpringDale's Committee of Management and the list goes on. We do ask each group to participate in whole of SpringDale activities if they can, our special weeks such as Neighbourhood House and Adult Learners' weeks. Each group is asked to write a couple of paragraphs for our Annual Report and to ensure that their activities are recorded. The part I only realised recently was the saving to the community in the form all of these groups not having to have their own Presidents, Secretaries, Treasurers etc. but each group may have positions of responsibility that relate to their true purpose ie. activity related rather than administration related. The saving in hours and responsibilities and costs, to our community, is huge.

If each of the 40 groups were incorporated in their own right it would cost \$42.80 to submit an annual return to Consumer Affairs, say \$40 for a gift to the auditor, \$650 for Public Liability to name a few. This equals \$732.80, multiply this by 40 groups equals \$29,312 and doesn't include any time, stationary, meeting place costs for the administration meeting etc. I honestly had never thought about the extent of savings to our community.

I'd love to call your attention to our Wellness Day on Monday 10 October, our Aboriginal Culture evening on Friday 14 October and our Carbon Awareness evening on 21 October.

Lastly I have been asked to make a plea to our community - a very loved dog is missing from our community – Pickles – a fox terrier, that was released from his yard when a meter reader opened the gate. Pickles was seen being picked up by a lady near the corner of High and Eversley Streets in the centre of Drysdale. If you have any information about Pickles please ring SpringDale so we can pass it on. Please let us reunite this family. I have learned so much since finding out about Pickles' disappearance, puppy farms and all sorts of despicable things that I'd never heard of before. Please let us help this very hopeful member of our community.

Looking forward to the opportunities that this month will bring – hope you are too.

### **Sports Precinct Funding**

Recently in Parliament, I called on the State Government to commit to partnering with the City of Greater Geelong to fund the Drysdale-Clifton Springs subregional sports precinct. The CoGG has adopted a master plan for the sports precinct following substantial consultation and discussion with sporting groups and the local community. With the

population of Drysdale and Clifton Springs expected to increase significantly, community infrastructure needs to be planned and developed now to meet both the current and future needs of residents. Sporting clubs are at the heart of our communities, particularly regional and rural communities.

Although the master plan is to be delivered over a number of years, the first stage has been identified as a priority. The \$3 million first stage includes a playing field with lights, a multi-use rectangular playing and training field and stage 1 of a new main pavilion. The precinct will be a multipurpose sports facility.

I will continue to push for the State Government to commit to this worthwhile and much-needed project.

# What's the future of Beacon Point?

Beacon Point's future will be discussed at a public meeting on Wednesday, 5 October 2011 at 7pm at the SpringDale Hall. The Drysdale and Clifton Springs Community Association Inc. (DCSCA) is holding the meeting to give local people a chance to say how they see the future of this major piece of open space. The City of Greater Geelong owns Beacon Point. Local Councillor John Doull has told DCSCA that a Masterplan for the land's future will be developed by the end of 2011 and that he will seek funds from the council's 2012/13 budget to implement the Masterplan.

### Opposing a 'rogue bridge'

The City of Greater Geelong (CoGG) has approved an 'unlimited load' bridge from Bayshore Avenue across Griggs Creek, allowing heavy construction machines to travel along narrow suburban streets into the northern end of the Jetty Road Urban Growth Area. CoGG's decision to approve this rogue bridge has evaded public scrutiny and contradicts earlier assurances to local people - via the formal planning process - that a bridge here will have minimal impact on their lives.

DCSCA is supporting local residents' opposition to the rogue bridge, arguing that it would take a heavy toll on their way of life, on their safety and on their fragile environment and cultural heritage. Further, the bridge will be the only point of access by police, fire brigade and

At present there are no signs that local people will be invited to participate in creating the Masterplan, so DCSCA is getting on the front foot and holding this public meeting so that the community can have its say on what should happen at Beacon Point. DCSCA will then present this information to the City of Greater Geelong. The meeting will also review the council's 2006-2016 Bellarine Strategic Plan. We're now halfway through the Plan's life, so it's a good time to assess how well the plan is meeting the needs of people in Drysdale and Clifton Springs.

Talking to Kel about Lake Lorne and the new Masterplan, that is being developed for the site, he remembered a tragedy that happened in 1953. "Lots of people would not have a clue about this. People have been surprised when I've told them about the lake being over full, flooding over onto the bitumen road. The lake was about 16 feet deep in the centre."

Kel's father, Franny, had a timber boat, called a clinker, down at Lake Lorne ready for the start of Duck Season. Prior to dawn, on the Opening Day, Kel's father went down to go duck shooting with Frank Sanderson. When they got there they saw the boat was missing. They looked around and thought they could see a boat on the lake and they called

out "Have you got our boat out there?" Joe Butcher replied "No I haven't got your boat but there is a boat out here turned upside down."

Joe rowed his boat into the shore to pickup Franny and Frank. By this time dawn was breaking and they started looking around.

> the lake, where they presumed Neil might be. Joe Butcher (first cousin of Barry and Neil), Vin Capon and Kel were on the boat and they eventually found Neil clasping his new false teeth in his hands. Neither Barry nor Neil could swim and Neil was

found with his waders still on.

The town was devastated to have lost two young men. Barry was about 18 and Neil a bit younger, they lived next to each other in High Street and their fathers, Ernie and Arthur, didn't speak to each other. On the day of the funerals, the 2 coffins left the 2 homes at the same time.

Unfortunately the boys weren't allowed to be buried together. Barry was buried in the Methodist

area and Neil in the Catholic area of the Drysdale Cemetery . This tragedy affected many lives in Drysdale and it might be fitting to have a plaque at the lake to signify this event.

# Recipes from an Ex-Convict, Bessie Baldwin

Cook to Sir John and Lady Franklin at Government House, Tasmania 1842 - 1849

When Bessie Baldwin came to London in 1837 she was 19. Nothing is know about her parents or early childhood, but it known that she came from Kent, so it is probable that she was born and raised on a farm. Because of her farm upbringing, she was fortunate enough to find employment with pastrycook and baker Thos. Edenwell, who, it seems, had his bakery hired by the House of Commons in Westminster, and was a self styled 'Pastrycook to the Honourable Members'. In October 1839, Bessie Baldwin was charged in the Old Bailey with 'Riotious behaviour'. According to the evidence it would seem that she was one of the early womens' liberationalists. She had demanded a pay rise of a penny a week from her employers to bring her wages up to fivepence a week. Edenwell, who seems to have been a cheapskate of considerable note, refused the modest request. Bessie Baldwin set about wrecking his shop including, to quote from the evidence, 'assaulting the said Thos. Edenwell by striking him with a rabbit pie, then beating him around the head with the pie dish'. For this little escapade she was sentenced to transportation to the Colony of Van Dieman's Land for seven years. Quite a life Bessie had in being established at the settlement. Sir John Franklin employed her as a cook/pastry cook at Government House after an exhaustive search among the female convicts. When she took the position it was noted she became a "model of obedient womanly virtue'. Such was her virtue in the culinary field that before Sir John relinquished his post in the Colony,

he granted her a pardon. Now comes the mystery. Bessie Baldwin never married in the Colony, and all that is known is that she left Tasmania in 1849 for New South Wales, and nothing was heard of her then or since. What remains are her recipes. These were recorded by a Governess to a landed family, and they have come down as some of the finest Colonial recipes ever.

Here are two recipes from the Colony. (The Tasmanian Convict Recipe Book). How things have changed in preparation and knowledge of good food practices.

### **Bacon Dish**

Lay slices of bacon between slices of bread; cut to the same size, press together and dip in a batter made of egg, milk, and a little flour to thicken. Fry for 10 minutes and serve hot.

### **Tomato Hash**

Butter a dish well, put in a layer of sliced tomatoes, a layer of cold meat sliced thin, then a layer of bread and butter, and so on until the dish is full. Season with pepper and salt, beat 2 eggs and pour over the top. Bake brown.

# **Beautiful Apple Recipes from** *The Australian Apple Recipe Book*

### Caramel Apple Ring

½ tspn salt2 tbspns butter1 tbspn butter227g SR flour1 dspn sugarextra 2 tbspns brown sugar¾ cup milk½ tspn cinnamon1 ½ cups cooked apples½ tspn grated lemon rind4 tbspns brown sugar

Cream butter and brown sugar, spread over base and sides of 20cm ring tin. Sift flour, salt and sugar into basin and rub in the butter. Mix to a soft dough with milk. Roll to oblong shape 6mm thick. Spread with apple pulp mixed with brown sugar, lemon rind and cinnamon. Roll up to 50mm thick slices. Place cut side down in ring tin. Bake 25 mins in hot oven.

### Apple Cake with Crumble top

1 egg ½ cup sugar 2 cups SR flour ½ cup milk stewed apples 1½ tbspns butter

Cream butter and sugar, add beaten egg and milk. Add flour to form a stiff dough. Divide into 2 parts. Roll very thinly. Place half in tin and cover with stewed apple (rather dry). Sprinkle with cinnamon and cover with the second half of mixture.

### Topping

Mix together 1 cup SR flour, ½ cup sugar, ½ cup butter. Rub together to form crumble. Spread evenly on top. Bake in a moderate oven for 20-30 minutes.

Unfortunately, all this tender greenery signals 'free lunch' to aphids, caterpillars, slugs, snails and a host of other unwanted, greedy guests. We're tempted to reach for the pest spray and teach those critters a lesson. Take your finger off the trigger for

a moment, though!

You can have a productive vegie garden without 'nuking' every bug in sight. *Here are some alternatives to pesticides:* 

### Use camouflage

Instead of planting your vegies in nice, straight rows, mix them up. Maybe grow a few chives or onions around your cabbages to confuse the pests. Stronglyscented plants such as rosemary, sage and many other herbs around your vegie garden can hide your tasty vegies from pests.

### **Pick your battles**

Tolerate a few aphids on your roses, and a few holes in your broccoli leaves. A small and carefully monitored pest population provides food for predators such as hoverflies and lacewings. They will make your garden more resilient to major attack. It's actually the larvae of hoverflies that are voracious aphid eaters, so you need to get a breeding cycle going.

### **Recruit some allies**

Flowers such as daisies, alyssum and marigolds are great for attracting predatory insects such as hoverflies and ladybirds. So too are coriander, dill, fennel and parsley if you allow them to flower.

### As a last resort

Use organic-approved pesticides which have low toxicity and/or which target a specific pest. Examples are horticultural soap sprays for aphids and biological caterpillar control based on the bacillus thuringiensis bacterium.

For slug and snail control, use the ironphosphate pellets like MultiGuard which break down into plant food. They will control slaters as well. Avoid metaldehyde pellets (typically coloured blue-green), which are toxic to dogs, cats and your garden allies such as lizards and frogs. They won't do you much good, either.

A word about home remedies: some of these work fine, but don't assume that they are harmless. Over enthusiastic use of a pure soap spray can seriously damage your soil, and chilli spray may kill bees. More gardening info in our Drysdale Harvest Basket blog. Go to www.drysdaleharvestbasket.org

On Monday, September 5, the Book Club met to discuss Australian writer, Joy Dettman. Born in Echuca, one of seven children, her father was a bush poet but a hard man living and working through harsh times. Joy Dettman's own family consists of four adult children with two of her daughters having been born deaf.

Dettman's stories are set in small country towns in northern Victoria and there are many recurring themes thoughout each of her books which seem to be drawn from her experiences of living in small country towns and listening to the tales of older relatives, yarn spinners and town gossips.

Her first novel, *Mallawindy*, was drafted in 1987 but not published until several years later after she had completed a writing course at TAFE and won prizes for her short stories. Dettman's work cannot be classified into a particular genre but she has the ability to capture the era and transport the reader back to the times about which she writes – mostly between the world wars or shortly afterwards.

She tells of extreme poverty and poor living conditions, there are dysfunctional families, cruel, abusive men and long-suffering wives



who are constantly pregnant. People die in the type of accidents common to those times, children are born to victims of rape and every family harbours dark secrets. With more than ten novels, reviewers have been rather kind to Joy Dettman, describing her work as addictive and riveting.

Our group was mixed in their reactions as none of us had read anything by this writer previously. It was felt that her ability to write short stories was unquestionable and *Diamonds in the Mud* contained excellent examples of this and managed to provide the reader with greatly varied stories, which is often difficult in an anthology.

We had a lively discussion but all agreed that Joy Dettman provides pure escapism and her books can be hard to put down. Her latest novel *Moth to the Flame* is the third in the 'Woody Creek series' and fans of Dettman will be pleased to know that a fourth book, *Wind in the Wires* is on the way.

New members are always welcome at our informal book group meetings which are held at SpringDale on the first Monday of each month at 7.30pm.

The book club review title for the October meeting is *Good to a fault* by Marina Endicott.

# Fix Our Streets

This is an opportunity for ALL residents to get involved and undertake an audit of the street where they live. Don't assume someone else has reported these matters to the relevant authority – do it yourself and take some ownership of your neighbourhood. It takes just a few minutes of your time to take a look along your street. Typical issues we encourage you to report are:

Abandoned Vehicles on public land, Cycle Paths, Bike Lanes - damaged pavement or obstructions on cycle ways or onroad bicycle lanes, cracked, lifting or missing pavement, issues with garbage or recycling bin collections, or damaged or stolen bins, illegal graffiti, overgrown grass or weeds on public land, Litter and Illegal Dumping - the location and nature of rubbish and debris dumped on public land, nature strip concerns such as line of sight, pedestrian or traffic hazards and unapproved structures, poor road conditions or potholes needing repair, feedback on road safety concerns in your street or neighbourhood, damaged, faded or missing street signs, used needles and other medical waste found on public land, dumped or abandoned shopping trolleys, damaged and hazardous trees, equipment or other infrastructure in suburban parks and playgrounds, feedback about volume of traffic concerns in your street or neighbourhood, trees and shrubs located on Council land that require maintenance or that pose an immediate threat to public safety.
