Dear Everyone

SpringDale runs on goodwill. The goodwill of our almost 100 volunteers, who invest hundreds of hours a week and perform such a wide range of roles, the goodwill of our tutors to provide the best services for our people under all circumstances, the goodwill of our staff to give far more than expected and the goodwill everyone who attends and shares SpringDale is the main currency of SpringDale.

From the 2010-2011 Annual Report you will see that SpringDale receives \$400,000 income and spends almost the same. But this shows only part of the income and expenditure. The 100 volunteers give approximately 15,000 hours a year which equates to another \$225,000, if we cost a volunteer hour at \$15 per hour. Some of the roles that our volunteers perform are worth so much more than \$15 an hour and so I would suggest that our real total of income is probably nearer to double what our bottom line shows on each side, because our in-kind assistance is spent completely as it is given.

Goodwill promotes a positive attitude, which in turn promotes more goodwill. I love to hear about all the extra opportunities that SpringDale helps to foster outside SpringDale. Many people have commented on the positive energy that they experience when they enter SpringDale. We try our hardest to ensure that the needs of each person is met every time they come to SpringDale and this is much easier if people approach us with an attitude of goodwill

I remember listening on the radio, to a speech given by Frank Costa to the Geelong Cats supporters, in which Frank spoke of people and I paraphrase, getting to know each other builds respect, respect builds trust and trust builds unity. It is this unity of purpose which helps to progress SpringDale and in turn progress the goals and dreams of all those involved. As I listened to Frank's speech, I was overcome by emotion and I understood a little more about how the universe works. This is not something that can achieved quickly and cannot be pressured into becoming a reality. It is a slow steady process. Each interaction reinforces and builds on the last. Every positive experience promotes goodwill and builds trust.

Thank you to everyone who helps to make SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre such a special place to be. It has taken 22 years to build these strong foundations. We continue to build on our foundations safely and surely, with purpose, conviction and with the best interests of all in mind. If you haven't been through the doors please think about making time to visit us. Although our office hours are 9am to 5pm weekdays there is often something happening at SpringDale between 8am to 10pm each day. I see the SpringDale Messenger ran a campaign and illustration in the April 2011 issue and it is exactly that which needs to be posted in all schools. The Lookout

I remember the lookout on top of Murradoc Road Hill, high point was on Hutchinson's property. It was built by the Progress Association and dismantled in 1946 - the view was spectacular and it was close to 360 degrees. It was the greatest view on the Bellarine Peninsula. There was a

beacon on top of the hill and others on the Scotchman's Road Hill top and Knights Road. These three allowed Captains line up the Beacons and to help guide the boats through the channel.

The lookout was used by many people – families would enjoy the view and take visitors up to enjoy the view. People would ride in horse drawn vehicles as very few people had cars.

My aunt and uncle, Cecil Ingles and Anne (nee Carlon) used to come from Soho Road by horse and jinker to visit us at the National Bank. Fred Young used to drive past in a horse and jinker nearly everyday delivering mail.

Thanks to Jocelyn Mannix for supplying the photo of the lookout. Jocelyn is the daughter of Bill Huctinson the owner of the property on which the structure stood.

While we are thinking about ships - S.S. Time ran aground on Corsair Rock off Point Nepean, it was loaded with sugar

which dissolved. The sacks were dried on the railings on the jetty's and on fences around the peninsula and I carted all the empty bags to Drysdale for Leo Cooney and Bill Young etc for their crop harvest.

We look forward to another lookout being available to promote economic development and tourism in our backyard.

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Microchipping at SpringDale

SpringDale Community Centre is the venue for the Microchipping and Registration Roadshow on Wednesday, 23 November from 4.30pm - 7pm. Cost \$15 for microchipping and half priced registration as per the 2012 Application of Registration of Domestic Animals. Blue Pension card applies (not health care card). Animals must be microchipped before being registered (in other words we are unable to "just register" an animal - it must be microchipped as well). If the 2011 registration has not been renewed, a 12 month fee is applicable.

Desexed or sterilisation certificates must be produced to receive reduced fees for desexed animals.

If animals have been microchipped previously, a copy of a microchipping certificate must be produced to enable the animal to be registered. Cats must be contained in some form of enclosed carrying device. Dogs must be on lead and muzzled if not well behaved around other animals. Owners are responsible for cleaning up their pets waste. We will be able to take cash and credit card transactions only and not eftpos on the day. Prepayment may be made at any Customer Service Centre.

MEDIA REPORT: A WHOPPING 1800 Australians signed up to become blood donors in just the seven days during National Blood Donor Week.

New figures released by the Blood Service show that 1800 people booked in for their first blood donation during National Blood Donor Week, 17 to 23 July, smashing the previous week's tally of 1200 new donors.

But with demand for blood and blood products set to double in the next decade, the Blood Service is encouraging more people to join the growing army of lifesavers, even though National Blood Donor Week is over.

Telecross Service Red Cross

Telecross is a service from Australian Red Cross that provides



the elderly and housebound with a daily phone call to ensure they are safe and well. Telecross calls are made by trained volunteers daily at an agreed time and can alert relatives or the emergency services if necessary.

Lunches for kids

Lunchbox

Come lunchtime there is plenty of competition for most kids' attention, so their lunchbox needs to be interesting enough to get them to stop long enough to eat, or to entice them away from a quick hit of fast food. Boring food just won't do it.

The best way to keep kids (and probably everyone else too) interested is to vary the contents of their lunchbox. And remember - ask them what they like and include favourite foods, but also gradulally introduce new foods that they just might enjoy. Think beyond the plain sandwich.

And do let your child help choose their lunchbox (an insulated one is best) - a lunchbox they love may be just enough to encourage them to get it out of their schoolbag.

Things to consider:

Serving sizes. Adjust these to suit your child's appetite. A smaller serve that is eaten is better than a large serve left in the lunchbox. Instead of several sandwiches with the same filling, pack a savoury roll, some dried fruit and nuts, a homemade cookie and a bunch of grapes. Get some nutritional balance and variety into the lunchbox every day.



½ cup grated cheddar cheese
½ cup grated carrot
1 tomato, sliced
½ small red capsicum, chopped

2 pieces wholemeal pita bread salt and freshly ground pepper 1 tablespoon tzatziki

Layer cheese, carrot, tomato and capsicum on half of piece of bread. Season with salt and pepper if desired, and spoon tzatzik over.

Roll up tightly and wrap well.

 Tzatziki is a greek dip of yogurt and cucumber. You can substitute ½ cup cream cheese, combined with ½ teaspoon crushed garlic, if you like. You can add any favourite vegetables to this roll-up - cooked green beans, asparagus spears, grated zucchini are just some of the options.

Makes 2 roll-ups.

Peanut butter double-decker crunch

1 tablespoon crunchy peanut butter 3 slices white or wholemeal bread (or a mix)

½ cup grated carrot (optional) 1 short stick celery, thinly sliced

Spread peanut butter on the bread slices. Layer the first slice with grated carrot (if using) and sliced celery. Top with second slice of bread (peanut butter facing up). Repeat filling layer, then top with final piece of bread (peanut butter facing down).


Press lightly, then cut sandwich in half.

· For a sweet version, omit the carrot and celery and use sliced banana instead, drizzled with a little honey.

Makes 1 sandwich.







Hammy pinwheels

2 slices soft white or wholemeal bread 2 tablespoons light cream cheese 2 thin slices ham pea sprouts (optional)

Cut crusts off bread and lightly press each slice with a rolling pin to flatten.

Spread bread with cream cheese, making sure to spread right to the edges.

Lay a slice of ham on each bread slice, then roll up (as for a Swiss roll) and press lightly to secure. Cut each roll into three pinwheels, and garnish with pea sprouts if desired

· Pita or other flat bread can be used, for a looser roll-up.

Makes 6 pinwheels.


prestigious Certificate of Meritorious Service by the Australian Croquet Association.



If you're eager to boost your body's levels of cancer-fighting antioxidants, look no further than the walnut. Walnuts have twice the antioxidants of any other nut. They are rich in monounsatur.

They are rich in monounsaturated fatty acids, an excellent source of vitamin E and are a rich source of minerals like manganese, copper, potassium, calcium and iron.

The walnut is one of the oldest and most revered nuts on earth - archaeologists in France, more particularly the Dordogne department in Aquitaine (once known as Périgord), discovered petrified shells of nuts that had been roasted during the Neolithic period, more than 8,000 years ago. Whilst both nut and the oil extracted from it have been known since ancient times, it probably disappeared in parts of northern Europe during the glacial period, to be reintroduced by the Greco-Roman conquerors and invading Barbarian hordes. 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In 2009 the Drysdale/Clifton Springs Structure Plan was adopted by City of Greater Geelong. This plan is available on the City of Greater Geelong website and was updated in 2010. This plan highlights Drysdale/Clifton Springs being a growth area for housing, but limits economic





development. In learning about another City of Greater Geelong development, Armstrong Creek, everyone involved in this project is working towards 1 in 3 people being able to live and work in that area. Drysdale/Clifton Springs is likely to experience 25% of the development happening in Armstrong Creek, so I believe that we must strive for 25% of the infrastructure being delivered in order to give us a similar work: life ratio. Whilst attending a G21 planning forum, I have actually fine tuned that desire to a simpler and achievable elsewhere. For each new house there needs to be a new job created in our area.

As SpringDale is working towards being a Registered Training Organisation we have a need to uncover the types of jobs that all our businesses perform and what sort of businesses they are likely to perform into the future and therefore the skills required and therefore the training courses that also might be required to support these jobs and businesses.

We were lucky enough to receive a grant from a part of Victorian State Government and Adult Community Further Education, now also called Learn Local. This \$50,000 grant is enabling us to have the time to interview many of the businesses in Drysdale/Clifton Springs, to speak to community groups and to inform the public, about our plan to become a Registered Training Organisation and also to talk about economic development in Drysdale/Clifton Springs in general.

We have a small group of community people who have been helping to steer this project and reviewing a vast library of documents that may support the future of Drysdale/Clifton Springs and help us to focus and celebrate our point of difference. We have been conducting interviews and building relationships with many businesses and will continue this through November, I would love to have a chat with you, about your business and your aspirations. We have scheduled an evening to showcase these findings and will be updating these arrangements on our website.

One of the questions that is being asked is to highlight the benefits of doing business in Drysdale/Clifton Springs seems to revolve around the friendliness of our people – what a great point of difference. I'm not sure where this research will take us but I think many of us are enjoying the journey, which is the real purpose of Community Development and what SpringDale strives to do everyday at every opportunity.

We currently know of more than 400 businesses in Drysdale/Clifton Springs and I am trying to speak to every business.





almost time for them to get out there and earn their keep. However, there are two further steps I take to give them the best possible start in life. Firstly I harden off the young plants. The garden

is a much harsher place than a cold frame: there are wide temperature variations, harsh sunlight and chilly night breezes. By moving the cold frame to a sunnier part of the garden and leaving the lid open on mild nights I try to acclimatise the seedlings for a week or so before transplanting them. I want my tomatoes to have sturdy stems with a purple tinge at the base, not sappy green ones.

Secondly, I check that the soil in the vegie beds is warm enough. A soil thermometer takes the guesswork out of this. Ideally the soil will be at least 15°C at a depth of 10 cm - right where the root zone of the young plants will be. You can help the soil to warm by stripping off any mulch for a couple of weeks.

When I transplant seedlings into the garden, I usually protect them with clear plastic tree

guards for a couple of weeks, that gives the seedlings additional protection from fierce winds and a little extra warmth and humidity. Transplanted seedlings look tiny in the garden, but it's important to remind yourself that these will be big, vigorous plants that need plenty of room to grow. All of these solanaceae need

support for their heavy fruit and top growth. For tomatoes I build a sturdy frame about 2 metres high. For eggplants and capsicums a much shorter frame will do the job.

Large-seeded veg such as the cucurbitaceae cucumbers, zucchini, pumpkins etc – and bush or French beans can be sown direct at this time. Simply poke them into a compost enriched, moist soil, then water well and off they go. When the seedlings emerge, be sure to protect them against snails and other pests.



The Bellarine Strategic Plan - where should we be now?

The Bellarine Strategic Plan was created in 2006 to guide developments on the Bellarine Peninsula for a decade. The Plan is now halfway through its life and the City of Greater Geelong (CoGG) has employed K2 Planning from Geelong West to conduct a mid-term review during October and November. (K2 Planning is a specialist social planning firm with experience in assessing social impacts, planning for community infrastructure and engaging communities. www.k2planning.com.au) Extensive public consultation marked the Plan's creation, so we can expect that the mid-term review will feature extensive consultation with the people affected most by the Plan, i.e. those who live, work or study on the Bellarine Peninsula.

DCSCA is a member of the Affiliation of Bellarine Community Associations (ABCA),



which looks forward to participating in K2 Planning's review. (The ABCA includes all nine Bellarine community associations and is the democratic 'peak body' for Bellarine community issues.) The ABCA has discussed such a mid-term review with CoGG's senior management team; ABCA members have extensive experience in planning, conducting and evaluation public consultations; and several members have conducted their own 'mini-reviews' of the Plan, looking primarily at issues in their particular communities.

Support grows for 2012 **Festival of Glass**

The CoGG has expressed its confidence in the 2012 Festival of Glass by investing \$6,000 dollars in it. The money is a grant from the council's Arts and Culture Department, which also supported the inaugural Festival, which was held in February 2011. The inaugural Festival attracted around 6,000 visitors to a very crowded Potato Shed and received substantial media coverage. The 2012 Festival of Glass is being held at the nearby Bellarine Basketball Stadium, which is a much larger venue. However, almost forty sites have been booked already and there are still four months to go. More information:



The Book Club -

Good to a Fault by Marina Endicott

On Monday 3 October the Book Club met to discuss Good to a Fault by Marina Endicott.

Clara Purdy is a single woman working in a

mundane insurance job. Having nursed both of her parents until their deaths some years apart and with a brief and distant failed marriage; she sees her life as - "an un-finished sampler, half the letters unstitched, the picture in the middle still vaque." A car accident occurring in her lunch break one day turns her calm and ordinary life upside down. She finds herself responsible for three small children, their aging and ill-tempered grandmother and their mother who is diagnosed with cancer while in the hospital after the accident. The father of the children quickly absents himself from the scene as he cannot cope with his wife's illness.

The book is filled with characters who are all complex, from the children, their parents, a brother of the mother, the vicar and his wife who deserts him, Clara's neighbours and relatives and of course, Clara herself. Clara finds that she is actually a good mother substitute, falls in love with the children but continues to pray for their mother's recovery. There is much soul-searching as to their motives by many of the characters and complete acceptance of themselves with their many faults by others.



Group members had varied opinions of this book, some finding the plot a little implausible, but nevertheless enjoying the story. There were philosophical questions for the thoughtful reader and a glimpse into the Canadian medical system which another member found interesting.

Most of those who thought that the first chapters indicated a predictable plot were surprised by the complexities of the story. All agreed that the large cast of characters and their interactions were easy to follow which is not always the case. Our group enjoyed a spirited discussion.

One reviewer has said "Marina Endicott is really funny, a sweet-natured but sharpeyed and quick-tongued social observer in the Jane Austen-Barbara Pym-Anne Tyler tradition, who can wring love, revulsion, and hilarity from readers in a single page." We tend to agree and rated this book 8 out of 10.

Memorial To Animals In War

Created by artist Steven Holland, the Memorial's main feature is a large bronze horse head, an Australian War Memorial collection item, and the only remaining fragment from the original Desert Mounted Corps memorial, destroyed during the Suez Crisis of 1956.

The RSPCA's National President,
Lynne Bradshaw, said the Memorial
acknowledged the significant contribution
animals have made during times of conflict.
"Pigeons carried urgent messages between
the trenches and military headquarters;
camels, donkeys and horses provided vital
transport for people and equipment; dogs
worked as messengers, trackers and guards;
and cats patrolled navy ships for mice, rats
and other pests.

"Animals not only served man but provided companionship and comfort and their very presence in the darkest of times was treasured by the people they stood beside.



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"This memorial pays tribute to this relationship but also aims to educate the Australian community about the value of animal life. Their service was as perilous as it was varied

and like the people they served, many thousands of animals never returned home." Every Australian community has a war memorial of some sort, honouring those who've given their lives to serve this nation. Many animals have also served Australia

alongside the men and women in our armed forces. Dogs, pigeons, donkeys, camels and of course horses. Until now there's been very little to mark the roles of these animals.

Tumut based stonemason Andrew James and his team, were commissioned to craft a granite monument which has just been unveiled at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra. It's topped with a bronze horse head from the Desert Mounted Corps Memorial in Egypt, commemorating the Australian Light-Horse.

Civic Pride

For a number of years, the state-wide Tidy Town award gave every participating community some sense of civic pride. For some reason, the program was abolished. Rather than lobby the State Government to reinstate the program, I wonder whether it would be better to start a 'ground up' as follows

DCSCA should set up a competition to promote civic pride by finding the tidiest and most attractive street in the local area, with the support of local real estate agents and nurseries, together with the local Garden Club, the Harvest Basket group and, perhaps, SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre. Long streets with more than, say, 50 premises could be sub divided into sections for the competition. If each estate agent contributed \$400, that should cover the costs of promotion and prizes. The competition would improve the area's general amenity and prosperity, so it would be a good business investment.

If the competition succeeds in promoting civic pride, it could be suggested that other towns on the Bellarine and in the broader City of Greater Geelong (CoGG) create their own versions; and in time CoGG could sponsor a version for each suburb and rural community, rather than just a street. From that point, the idea might spread across the state and even across the country.

I have spoken to members of the Bowling Club about how well the club cares for its greens but not the nature strip outside its fence and I think on occasions there has been some improvement. Similarly, their little garden areas associated with the Doctors Surgery and the Solicitor by the roundabout are kept in reasonable condition, but the grounds of the Telstra Telephone Exchange are generally kept in quite an appalling condition. If a competition such as I am suggesting was in place, maybe those premises might get better attention.
