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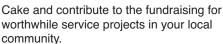

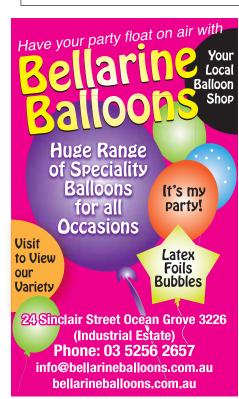

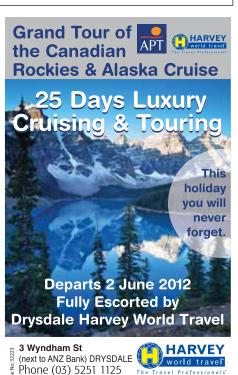
# Years ago

#### Ingredients

2 x 225g redcurrant jelly 170 ml fresh orange juice 600ml cream 250g mascarpone 30g icing sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla essence 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon 250g thin sponge finger biscuits (savoiardi) 75 ml Marsala 400g fresh raspberries 250g large fresh strawberries, hulled and quartered 400g fresh blueberries

#### Method

Melt the redcurrant jelly in a small saucepan over medium heat. Remove from heat, stir in the orange juice and set aside until the mixture reaches room temperature. Put the cream, mascarpone, icing sugar, vanilla essence and cinnamon in a bowl and beat with electric beaters until soft peaks form.

Cut each biscuit in half crossways and dip each piece in the Marsala. Arrange half over the base of a 3.25 litre serving bowl. Sprinkle a third of the combined berries over the biscuits and drizzle with half the

redcurrant sauce. Spoon half the cream mixture over the sauce. Repeat the layering with the remaining half of the dipped biscuits in Marsala, a third of the berries and sauce and remaining cream. Arrange the remaining berries over the cream in a mound in the centre of the bowl. Reserve the final third of the redcurrant sauce. Cover and refrigerate.

Cover the trifle with plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight. Before serving, pour the reserved redcurrant sauce over the berries to glaze.

#### Ingredients

- 1 small fruitcake or left over pudding 3 tbsp liqueur of your choice
- 1 litre vanilla ice-cream or ice-cream of vour choice
- 1 litre vanilla custard Fresh berries or chocolate topping. Cream or extra vanilla custard.

#### Method

Crumble left over pudding or small fruit cake into a bowl, drizzle over 3 tbsp of liqueur, let stand for 10 mins.

Soften 1 litre of ice-cream in a large bowl, stir in half a cup of vanilla custard then stir in pudding or small fruit cake. Gently fold to combine, then spoon into a large plastic lined bowl, airtight container is preferred, if not seal with plastic onto the surface of the ice-cream. Then freeze. Remove from freezer 5 minutes before serving depending on the weather. Slice and serve. Garnish with fresh berries, thickened cream or vanilla custard or drizzle chocolate topping over the top.

NOTE. You may wish to use Kahlua, Frangelico which is a hazelnut liqueur or a traditional Brandy.

## The Book Club - Before I go to Sleep - S.J. Watson

In November the Book Club met to discuss S. J. Watson's, Before I Go To Sleep.

Christine Lucas has a rare form of amnesia that erases her memory each night while she sleeps. Each morning she wakes in a strange bed, in a strange room with a man that she does not recognise. He reminds her daily that he is her husband. It is only when

Dr Nash, a therapist who has taken an interest in her case, suggests that she start to keep a journal that unanswered questions begin to arise. She has written "Don't trust Ben" in the front of her journal but why not? Is her husband lying to her?

Where has she been for all these years? Does she have children? What caused her amnesia? What sort of an accident?

This book is well plotted although it could be a little hard to follow the timelines sometimes. It is cleverly written

and even our most fastidious readers could not fault the author's skills in representing her mind which was totally blank each morning.

Our members varied in their opinions of



the plausibility of some of the events in this book but agreed that it could be a rather disturbing experience for the empathetic reader.

S. J. Watson is an English writer and this is his debut novel which has been published in 37 countries and is currently being made into a film. He worked in the NHS before turning to writing and the success of his first novel

sees him living every writer's dream. Our group rated this book 8/10.

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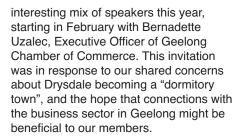
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#### SpringDale Business Network

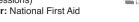

"Motorists should be aware that all other parking conditions will still apply on this day including parking time limits," he said.

The City of Greater Geelong has introduced new electronic parking



machines which provide more flexible options for people to pay for parking.

The machines were programmed earlier this year to physically prevent coins from being inserted so that money cannot be accepted on days when fees are not required.

# Pool Safety

Never take your eyes off children in and around the pool. Active supervision means that the child is consistently watched by an adult within arms reach.

#### **Home Pool Safety**

#### Safety barriers

#### a legal requirement

It is law that swimming pools or spas on private residential properties in Victoria provide safety barriers to restrict access to the pool or spa. Every private swimming pool or spa capable of containing a depth of water exceeding 300mm must have a childproof safety barrier.

A building permit is also required prior to installing the barrier. Safety barriers, even when provided, are no substitute for adult supervision of toddlers and children who are playing in or near swimming pools or spas.

# To ensure that your safety barrier remains effective:

fit and maintain correct safety measures to gates, doors and

windows (e.g. self-closing, self-latching devices, flyscreens)

make sure you remove any items such as chairs, boxes, poolpumps that could be used to climb the barrier to access the pool.

#### **Pool Safety Tips**

- Supervision means constant visual contact, not the occasional glance.
- Even in a supervised public pool never take your eyes off children swimming and if they are under 5 you must be within arms reach.
- If you leave the pool or water area, even for a moment, take the children with you. A swimming pool fence is not a substitute for supervision.
- Display a resuscitation chart on your pool fence.
- Familiarise children with water by taking them to learn to swim lessons, run by accredited AUSTSWIM teachers, at the local pool.
- Empty paddling pools when they are not in use.
- Empty baths, basins, sinks, buckets and troughs, immediately after use.

# BEATING THE HEAT

Whether this summer is a scorcher like 2009 or milder like the last two years, chances are there will be a few days over 40°C in the next couple of months – more than enough heat to frazzle your leafy vegies. Fortunately, most heat damage can be prevented with some planning now.

#### **Temporary relief**

For temporary shade in a heatwave, you can use ordinary shadecloth (shade factor 40%+). If that's too expensive, old sheets will work. Whatever you use, don't leave it in place for more than a few days, or your vegies will be starved of sunlight.

For plants on a frame, such as tomatoes, you can simply drape the shadecloth over the top and peg it down or weigh the edges down with bricks. For free-standing plants, create a temporary frame to hold the shadecloth off the plants. Three wooden stakes (two posts and a cross bar) will do. I use lengths of elasticated cloth tree tie (eg. from Van Loons) as guy ropes, making a good strong shade tent. Get the materials and plan your system now – maybe do a trial run. You can leave the frame in place, then chuck the shadecloth over it when the heat arrives.

#### Set and forget

If you don't want the bother of protecting your vegies every time a heatwave is forecast, consider permanent shade over vulnerable plants. For this, you need horticultural shadecloth or fine netting. You want a shade factor of about 20–30%. Green Harvest (www.greenharvest.com.au) does a great product called Vege-Net with a 17% shade factor. As a cheaper alternative, search the op shops for old net curtains.

#### Location, location

Leafy salad greens will grow fine in dappled shade in the summer, eg. under the shade of a gum tree. If you grow them in large pots, you can get them started in full sun, then move them into shade in the hot weather. At the least, treat your vegies to a good thick mulch of coarse, light material, eg. peastraw. That will protect the root zone from drying out and overheating, and reduce watering needs.

#### REMEMBRANCE DAY

November the 11th was Remembrance Day and at this time we paused to remember the sacrifice made by those who have served our country and in particular those who gave their lives in service to our nation. Services were held across the Bellarine Peninsula and it is always heart-warming to see so many people attend every year to pay their respects to all those men and women, especially those from the Bellarine, whose contribution has helped to make this nation what it is today.

#### **VCAL FUNDING CUTS**

The current State Government's decision to cut coordination funding of nearly \$50 million for the Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning, VCAL, will impact on students in the Bellarine. This could force local schools, like Bellarine Secondary College, Newcomb Secondary College

and Geelong High to cut back on other educational programs or on the VCAL offering.

As many of you know, VCAL is a great alternative to VCE for year 11 and 12 students, and for mature-aged students. It is crucial that students who don't want to go to university have a choice and VCAL is an opportunity to do career-focussed studies that provide real benefits for many young people. A recent report showed that last year 86.9% of VCAL students went on to further education, training or work. VCAL coordinators are vital to the program. They develop curriculum and assessment materials, connect with local employment networks and coordinate student administration.

I will continue to argue strongly on behalf of our students to have this important program maintained and the funding decision reversed.



#### **COMMUNITIES FOR NATURE GRANTS**

Applications are open for the new Communities for Nature Grants program, through the Department of Sustainability and Environment. I encourage Bellarine community groups and organisations to apply for funding for local projects. Small grants up to \$10,000 and large grants between \$10,000 and \$150,000 are available in the first round. Eligible projects include: revegetation; cleaning up waterways; control of weeds and pest animals and threatened species recovery. 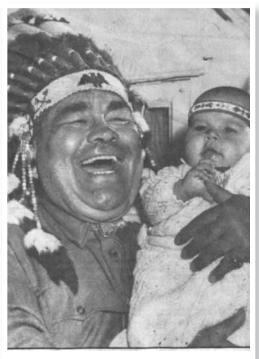

While the Chief had me in the Indian Death Lock, I decided to give him a good bite on the leg to stop the fight. There were arms and legs everywhere and I decided to give it my all. I was so surprised when I realised the leg I was biting was my own.

While in pain, in the wrestling hold I looked down to see the girls missing and tears running down John's face. So I untangled myself quickly and grabbed John and ran to find the girls."

Norma recalls not much else about the day except Kel says he hasn't been right ever since.
