


Celebrating







The first meeting of Drysdale Returned Servicemen and local residents was held in the Assembly Hall, on Monday 24 October 1949. This was to discuss the possibility of erecting or acquiring a building suitable for a Memorial and Recreation Hall, for the use of Drysdale Returned and Active Servicemen. Numerous meetings were then held and an account opened with the National Bank of Portarlington. Funds were raised from various donations within a three mile radius of the township. A decision was made to purchase the building formerly known as the Presbyterian Church in Princess Street for the sum of 450 pounds. It was agreed that all members pay a fee of five shillings per year. Prior to the opening of our own club the

Sub-Branch and the Women's Auxiliary were amalgamated with Portarlington. Members of the Sub-Branch and the Women's Auxiliary and their partners are invited to join us to celebrate this special occasion.

The SpringDale Messenger has been bringing community messages to our community for more than 20 years. The Messenger tries to connect people and ideas, groups and opportunities, and tries to inform our community. Being able to network and point people to answers helps to build the capacity of our community. SpringDale strives to stay informed or at least to know where to find the truth.

One of our community's problems is that we are too happy and too contented until things happen to us. We believe that our world, we have come to know and love will stay the same, but regularly there are things happening to our sphere. We have to stay informed, we have to stay active as the residents in Springs Street did and still are protecting what they found to be important to them.

Much of SpringDale's energy is being devoted to learning about and participating in consultations to ensure we at least have an understanding of what is happening but maybe we aren't feeding the information back to you as well as we should. Last year, we applied for grants and were successful in receiving all we applied for, to help us help the community to plan and jump ahead of other external planners and "do gooders" to ensure that we all get to have our say, not iust a few.

The Master Plan for Lake Lorne has been accepted by the Council and includes a two metre wide, compacted crushed rock, pathway around the lake and a 1.2m high fence to go around the lake at the upper water level. Post and rail parking barriers will also be on the Reserve and Portarlington Road perimeters. The draft Master Plan was on display Feb - Mar 2011 and 18 submissions were received. This is a very low number but this is normal for many things that happen in our part of the world. If you would like to be personally informed of any Master Plan/Community Consultation that is going to happen, please let us know at SpringDale and we will endeavour to ensure that you know and encourage you to participate. It is through this participation that we show our concern and interest and love of the wonderful place that we call

You may recall, in conjunction with Drysdale Clifton Springs Community Association, we are creating an

Economic Development Plan for Drysdale/Clifton Springs and on page 19 you'll find a short survey to help capture your thoughts about what sort of businesses should be here. What sort of businesses would you frequent and support to ensure that they thrive and survive in this tough economic climate that we are living in today. Please complete the form as a resident and over the page there's a survey for

businesses. If you have a business please complete it or feel free to ask a business to complete it and send it back to us. Although this project had a little, hiccup its back on track now and we'd love your input.

Another project coming up is "From Streetscape to Artscape" this project will ask our community to think about what sort of art installations we should have through the area and where should they be. Over the last few weeks I have had the privilege of seeing so many people visit the art works above and near the Dell and stand at the lookout over the bay and enjoy our beautiful vistas. I encourage you to spend a few minutes in reflection there if you have time. Enjoy the beauty of what we share as residents in our own

community. Preparations are in full swing for the Adrian Mannix Community Service Award. The Portarlington/Drysdale Lions Club and the Rotary Club of Drysdale along with SpringDale are currently reviewing at the nominations from this year and those received over the years to select a person to receive the award in May this year. SpringDale also has a youth

Encouragement Award which remains open till 30 June. Nomination forms are available at SpringDale.

SpringDale Card Group



The SpringDale Card Group meets regularly at SpringDale Centre on Mondays commencing anywhere between 12.30pm and 1pm and play continues until approximately 3pm. The group generally play Bolivia, which is a derivative of Canasta and Samba, and is played with three decks of cards, members make up groups of four with two sets of partners playing each other. 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






Remembering our ANZACS

In St. Leonards we have two honour rolls which list the names of 37 men from St. Leonards and Indented Head who did military service in World War I. Like many Australians I have relatives who fought in that terrible conflict so I was interested in the stories of these young men. I discovered that their average age was 23 and 13 of them were still teenagers when they enlisted. Seven of them were killed on active service, most of the others were wounded or gassed and carried the scars of war for the rest of their lives. Some performed incredible feats of bravery others just hung in there and made their contribution in trenches, artillery positions, on horseback or in the air. The Principal of our local Primary School showed me an album of photos of some of these men, which was compiled by the School Committee soon after the War

When I put together their war records, their personal letters and the photos I realised that this heroic band of young men were in a sense a microcosm of the experiences of the 332,000 Australians who took part in the Great War. They had fought on all the major battlefields in Palestine, Gallipoli and Western Europe and had suffered just about every kind of injury and sickness which soldiers endure. They made lasting friendships and a few brought home brides they had met when on leave in England. Each of those 37 names on the honour rolls now has a story. When the survivors returned, some took up their lives again as local farmers and fishermen, as husbands and fathers. Several years later they built a

Memorial Hall in memory of their mates. 'Remembering Our Anzacs' is on sale at SpringDale, at Café Zoo and at Café Ink in St. Leonards and all proceeds go to the Memorial Hall Restoration Fund to repair the memorial which our ANZACS and their friends built over 80 years ago.

The Book Club - Year of Wonders


On Monday 4 March, the Book Club met to discuss Geraldine Brooks' *Year of Wonders*, a novel of the Plague. Geraldine Brooks has researched well to produce this novel. As the story is told in the first person - that of Anna Frith, the maid at the rectory - the language of the day has been used well, adding to the feeling of authenticity.

Brooks says that she based her novel on the true tale of the village of

Eyam in the 1660s and some of the characters actually existed. This is a lead mining village and the description of the surroundings, particularly with the changing seasons, is well written.

There were so many different aspects to this story that the discussion was lively, as always. The characters are well drawn. Many of them are most un-likeable but they seem to be true to what we might imagine the way of life and the superstitions of the place and time.

These were turbulent times in both religion and politics and the villagers seem uncertain as to what they should believe. It was religious fear that enabled a minister to persuade a whole village as to what they should do.




That very minister's loss of faith and the cruel side of him is revealed to Anna only after the death of his wife, their beloved Elinor.

Was the character of Anna believable? The reader must believe that Anna was in a unique position in those times of strict class segregation, but the author needs a voice for her story.

There are murders and savagery, portrayed in the willingness of a superstitious crowd to

turn on "witches". Beatings, bloodshed and violence are taken as the norm. Infants die as a matter of course. Was not Anna told not to love her children until they were at least a year old? Not a book for the faint-hearted, it is a disturbing glimpse into history. Our group rated it 8.5 out of 10.

April's discussion will be about *The Help* by Kathryn Stockett and in May we will discuss *A Visit from the Goon Squad* by Jennifer Egan.





Teenage challenge to an ageing volunteer





This time last year Anne Brackley, coordinator of the SpringDale asked if I would be interested in doing some volunteer work at the Bellarine Secondary College, where she assured me my experience in building would be most useful.

Working with children was not something I had given much thought to at 64, but I thought, I have the time and the knowledge to help in some way and so it was that I met Vala and Steve. They introduced me to 12 young men and women, who for one reason or another found learning in the classroom situation hard. All the children were coming together into a group called Hands on Learning. The purpose of Hands on Learning is "To re-engage young people using practical and creative real activities alongside positive mentors".

On that first day we took them into 2 portable shower blocks which hadn't been cleaned for ages and smelt of rats and rabbits. Over a long BBQ lunch, ideas were thrown up, as to how they would like the end result of their shed. We gutted the inside to provide space and were given a

kitchen and appliances.

The children learnt skills that had not been learned before or were reinforced, predrilling holes for nails, shown how to hang plaster, shown how to make walls that fit, using a tape measure and using a cutoff saw safely. They were shown how to use angle grinders safely, use a Bobcat and in addition to all this students had at different times to cook lunch, be it a BBQ. spaghetti bolognaise, scones or pizza. They sat for and completed a Food Handling Certificate.

So how did the students achieve the set out principals of Hands on Learning? As an outsider of the school system, I would say that looking back over the year, most students changed. One student got himself an apprenticeship in brick laying by the end of third term. A couple of students asked if they could go back to class to do Maths, as they realized they would need Maths to do an electrical apprenticeship. In the 10 months that I was with them I saw them grow, some of the younger ones a little, some others a lot, their self esteem was lifted by the small things that were taught and by the

teachers Steve and Vala who treated students as young individuals, not talking down to them, but explaining things to them that they may have done wrong, in a manner the student understood.

I feel that I learned much about today teenagers, they are still the same as in my day at school, sure they know more about technology and so much has changed in the last 50 years since I was their age, but the humanity of the students is still there. These so called difficult students showed me that they care. Would I volunteer again? Yes, I can only pass on the baton to someone else, knowing that you can get something for nothing with these students of today.

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BSC Mentoring Program

The Master Plan was approved by council in mid 2011. Since that time design has been underway. To date the land has been surveyed and a cut and fill plan done for the whole site. Currently the design for the southern oval area and an access road as well as a concept design for a pavillion is in progress. It should be completed in the next few months. Residents may be aware that the previous state government allocated funds for this project. Over the past year I have been working with local members of the current government to raise this as a priority and I am hopeful that this project will be allocated funds in future budgets.

Lake Lorne Walking Track

Council adopted the Lake Lorne Reserve Master Plan at its meeting on 14 February 2012. The approval of this Master Plan is the culmination of an extended period of time involving stakeholder and public consultation. The resulting plan has addressed all the key issues raised and ensures the important biodiversity values of this wetland will be protected.

Main features

Phase 1: March 2012 to June 2012

- Post and rail fencing on Reserve Road and along part of High Street, as well as an upgrade of the existing post and rail fence along the eastern boundary and opposite the Drysdale Railway Station.
- Vehicle parking barriers along the High Street frontage of the Drysdale Railway Station precinct.
- Construction of a pathway from the eastern end of the Lake, along the south of the reserve, to the rail trail. Preparation of detailed construction plans for the timber boardwalk in the NW corner of the reserve.

Further work is subject to approval through Council's 2012-13 budget process. The plan includes completion of the path and fencing around the lake, construction of the board walk and connection with the western end of the Bellarine Rail Trail.

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The main pests to look out for are as follows:



Slugs and snails. You can control them with Multiguard pellets, whose active ingredient is iron EDTA.* Please don't use the more toxic metaldehyde (blue-green) pellets. Alternatively, beer traps, coffee grounds and picking by hand are totally safe remedies.

Cabbage white caterpillars.

These become less of a problem from April onwards, but it's a good idea to net your seedlings until the danger has passed. Alternatively, spray weekly with Dipel - a bio-insecticide approved by organic associations.

Aphids. These will cluster on the undersides of leaves and on stems as the plants mature. Horticultural soap sprays will control them safely.

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


"I was only young during the war, working for Reg Butcher and although I wasn't driving age, I was given permission to drive if I had an adult with me. We put a hay frame on the back of Reg Butcher's 1942 Ford Lend Lease truck, to be able to carry flax from the paddocks to the mill in View Street, I had 2 Land Army girls helping me cart large loads of flax from Alec Brown's in Bellarine. Thirty Land Army girls arrived from all over Victoria to the Bellarine, where they were billeted to Fizzer Wiffen's in Church Road, there was a matron Miss Varney who looked after all the girls. They did most of the farm work around the district - milking cows, farming onions, peas and garlic, picking fruit, stooking hay and flax, doing many of the jobs that the young men would do, who went to war" said Kel.

To make this story more realistic Kel and I visited Vi Malcolm, who was one of the above mentioned Land Army girls. Vi came from Surrey Hills although she was born in Ouyen. Vi was working in Flinders Street, Melbourne at Bushells Tea, packing tea but she decided that she would rather join the Land Army. Her boss was supportive of the move, she was successful at her interview and was sent to Werribee and was eventually one of the Land Army girls that came to Bellarine. Upon Vi's arrival she was asked to work in the dairy and although she tried to get out of it, as she had never worked a Lister engine before, that's where she worked for 3 years. In between time she picked peas and anything that was wanted. Vi remembered that the night milking was picked up at about 7am, in milk cans and slid onto a tray truck and taken into Polar in Geelong.

Vi remembered some of the funny stories especially when a "city girl" saw a newly born calf and was so scared of the mother she ripped her pants scampering





through the wire fence. Three of the girls married locals and stayed - Vi, Alison Carney and Kath Purden – all the other girls went back to Melbourne. Vi met Jack at a dance and ended up marrying him. Vi kept in touch with some of the girls for a while but as Kel says "they drifted away".

Back to Kel's story of this time, "The flax was weighed at the weighbridge near the Drysdale Station, then it was put in a large stack on the corner of Crimea and High Street just across from the weighbridge. Jack Redden and Les Warren were expert flax stackers. Flax was used for lots of things for the army including webbing, water bags, the seed was used for linseed oil and the husks went as cow feed. At the

end of the war someone put a match to the stacks and they burned for days because of all the linseed in them."

"The flax was moved by Ike Wisbey and taken to a large shed on View Street and there the seed was removed by feeding the sheaves through large rubber rollers. The seed and husks dropped onto a belt and then the sheaves were transported to the paddocks where Peninsula Drive is today."

This is another important part of Drysdale's history which we celebrate.

I love hearing the memories come to life.



Wilma still referees



Wilma Ohlson came to Drysdale to retire, but at the age of 80 she is still refereeing 5-6 junior games per week with the Bellarine Peninsula Basketball Association. Wilma is well known throughout the basketball community and has been involved in the sport since her children were young. She has played with Broadmeadows, Glenroy, A Grade with Albert Park, participated in the Masters Games and thoroughly enjoys the sport and the fellowship it brings. When Wilma moved to Drysdale she was invited to the Bellarine Sports Centre to referee and has been there for seven years and now also coaches the under 10 girls. Wilma travels to Melbourne to help children with a disability and their involvement in basketball for four weeks every season. Basketball is great teamwork for these children and Wilma encourages, supports and helps whenever and wherever possible.

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Drysdale Tennis Club

On the 31 August, 1928, the Drysdale Progress Association Tennis Club started to play their tennis on two courts to the north side of the present day Telstra exchange building and two courts situated at the rear of the Free Library (present day car park). In 1930 the Bellarine Peninsula Tennis

Association was formed from district tennis clubs, Drysdale, Leopold, Moolap, Ocean Grove, Portarlington, St Albans and Wallington. Drysdale won the first premiership in the new competition.

In 1941 the club changed its name to Drysdale Tennis Club playing mainly at the Collins Street venue. The Free Library courts fell into disrepair and the Fire Brigade used them for a running track before 1944. Improvements were made to the Post Office courts namely a shelter shed, kitchen and some conveniences. Electricity was connected in 1950 and in 1960 a third court was added to the complex.

A new club, Drysdale United Tennis Club, was formed in 1969, initially catering for Junior tennis in the Geelong Churches Association, playing on Mortimer's private concrete court. In the early 1970's three tennis courts were constructed adjacent to St James' Church so the Drysdale United club relocated to the new venue. Drysdale and Drysdale United merged to become the present day Drysdale Tennis Club in 1976, playing on both courts behind the Telstra Exchange and the courts adjacent to St James' Church on

tennis boomed in the town. In 1982 lights were installed and competitions were held on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday nights. Three more courts were constructed in the late 1980's.


Today a modern clubhouse, three asphalt courts and three new artificial grass courts costing in excess of \$70.000 fully paid for by the Club cater for 2 Senior teams, 4 Midweek teams, 6 Junior teams and night tennis members.
