The SpringDale 'From Streetscape to Artscape' Project

What does the project title From Streetscape to Artscape conjure up? Over the last few years many of us have spoken about the types of art we would love to see in our streets. In many towns and cities there are pieces of art in the street and in parks which are great to visit and investigate, great to view and inspire, great to encourage and entertain. I have shared my vision of having statues of Anne Drysdale, Caroline Newcomb and some sheep in Pioneer Women's park across the road from SpringDale. I see these as being strong robust pieces as the ladies were in real life. I feel that we should celebrate the fact that Anne Drysdale was the first woman in Australia to have the vote as she was a land owner

(but she didn't get to keep her vote for very long). Anne's birthday is 26 August and this year marks 220 years since her birth.

Many people have spoken to me about having a Bunyip statue at Lake Lorne to celebrate the story of how the Bunyip leaves the lake each year to travel to the schools for the Bunyip Festival. What other conversations have you had with other people - what would you like to see in encapsulated in a piece of art?

The project has started. We held a session in which we had the pleasure of meeting David Fitzsimmons, City of Greater Geelong Arts Officer and David showed us a display of art pieces in the City of Greater Geelong environs as well as pieces that he has had involvement with in other parts of Australia. David invited two artists Mark Strachan and Glen Smith, who have created many pieces in the Geelong area and are currently working on some pieces for the new developments off Jetty road.

Some members of the Festival of Glass Committee met with representatives from Wathaurang and artists to investigate a piece of art that the Festival could sponsor.



If you would like to be part of this discussion and help to develop a plan for art pieces in our community, which will involve the stories we would like to celebrate as a piece of art and the positions where pieces could/should be placed. This plan will enable us to seek funding for specific pieces of art and match opportunities with ideas. I am so excited about this.



Bellarine Fire Brigades

Congratulations to the Bellarine Fire Brigades group who celebrated their 50th anniversary recently along with the launch of the book 'All Fired Up' about the history of the group. The Bellarine Fire Brigades group have over 600 years of service across the nine brigades, coordinating emergency responses as well as providing training and support. They play a vital role that is greatly appreciated by the community. I was pleased to attend the celebration dinner and have the opportunity to acknowledge the great work that our local CFA volunteers do each year to keep our community safe.

Drysdale Rotary

It was great to attend the Drysdale Rotary meeting recently and catch up with the local members and hear about the projects they are currently working on in the area. Drysdale Rotary does a fantastic job and the members should be very proud of their contribution to the community including the very successful Easter Art Show (this year held for the

first time at the new Christian College Bellarine Centre for Sport and Performing Arts), the Miniature Railway at Point Richards and the BBQ they host regularly at the Sunday market. They are to be commended for their hard work and volunteer contribution to the community and I was pleased to be present at their meeting and acknowledge their efforts.

Tafe Funding

As the Member for Bellarine, I am very concerned about the State Government's decision to make substantial funding cuts to TAFE, particularly in this time of unemployment and job losses. As I understand it, the Gordon Institute of TAFE are facing a cut of about \$14 million next year. The 20% funding cut will see some courses go all together and many others facing large increases in fees that would need to be paid by students. Further details of the impact on the courses and staffing at the Gordon TAFE will be decided soon.

I have raised some of these concerns on three occasions now in Parliament.



I, and the whole Labor Opposition, intend to continue to raise these issues and to fight to have this decision overturned. In fact it will be one of the key issues that we are committed to pushing for over coming months.

Review of Crime Trends

Thefts from cars continue unabated, whether parked in driveways, on street, on nature strips or in front vards. And SO many thefts have occurred from unlocked cars. The message is clear: Remove ALL valuables from cars and LOCK them when unattended. Also, residential burglary indicates a 24% increase on last year's figures.



Residents should ensure they make every effort to prevent burglary of their home.

Road trauma is of concern within the Geelong and Surf Coast Police Service Areas. Driver distraction is seen as the main cause of much of the road trauma being experienced. Every driver on Victoria's roads has the responsibility to themselves, to their own families and to other road users to drive safely by sticking to the speed limit and obeying the road rules. It is not OK to use a mobile phone while driving. It is not OK to speed. And it is not OK to be "a little bit over" the alcohol limit. Victoria Police: Eyewatch Pilot Project

Eyewatch is a social media initiative, which creates opportunities for local communities to be actively engaged with police and to participate in crime prevention and safety activities using Facebook®. The objectives of Eyewatch are to:

- · Enhance interaction between police and communities in order to promote community safety and build confidence in policing services;
- · Create ownership within the community to encourage active involvement in the reduction of crime and perception of crime within local areas; and
- Support the revitalisation of the Neighbourhood Watch program within Victoria through social media.

SES needs your help

If you want to help your community in a crisis, then the Bellarine Unit of the State Emergency Service (SES) wants to hear from you. The unit is looking for someone to step up and volunteer for the role of Duty Officer. The group includes 33 volunteers who help their community in times of emergency, including floods, storms and road crashes.

The Duty Officer will not be required to head out in the field but will play a vital role at the unit's headquarters. When the SES receives calls for help, the Duty Officer will coordinate their efforts via radio and telephone, ensuring jobs are answered, equipment is assigned and members are kept informed. While emergency management or radio experience would be a benefit, all training for the role will be provided and everyone is welcome to lend a hand.

Deputy controller of the Bellarine Unit, Rachel Vella, said operational members were currently filling the role of Duty Officer, tying up those who could be helping on the ground.

"The position can have some pressure, especially when it is a road rescue, as they can be time critical," Ms Vella said.

Worried About Someone?

The Bellarine Youth Development Network is pleased to release the Worried About Someone? brochures. The brochures are designed to give parents and carers information about ways they can help someone that might be going through a rough time. The members of the Bellarine Youth Development Network want to provide useful information to the parents and carers in our local community.

Mel Taylor, the School Focused Youth Service Coordinator with BATForce said "Young people tell us that their family is the most important source of support and advice. Young people will turn to their friends and family members to talk about what they're going through."

"Sometimes we just get stuck, we don't know what to say or do. This brochure is a guide to get the conversation started and to offer some suggestions about where to seek professional help." Mel said.

In the 2011 National Survey of Young Australian's young people identified a number of issues that they are concerned about. Most commonly young people identified that they are concerned about coping with stress, worried about body image, and are experiencing problems with school or study. A greater number of young people are also experiencing bullying.

These brochures will be distributed to families on the Bellarine Peninsula through local Secondary Schools. The brochures will also be available at Bellarine Community Health and headspace centres.




New President for Port Lions

On Monday 2 July, the Book Club met to discuss The Troubled Man by Henning Mankell.



Fabrulous Fennel

The word fennel developed from the Middle English fennel or fenyl, and is pronounced finnochio in Italian. The Latin word for the plant means "hay". Historical notes indicate the word fennel is the origin of the place name Marathon (meaning "place of fennel"), site of the Battle of Marathon in 490 BC; however, there is not recorded history that fennel was seen or grown there now.

Fennel is a perennial herb. It is erect, green, and grows to heights of up to 1 metre, with hollow stems. Its leaves are similar to those of dill, but thinner and the flowers are tiny and yellow.



Fennel Gratin



Ingredients

1kilo fennel bulbs - about 3-4 bulbs Salt

3-4 tbsps olive oil

½ cup grated parmesan cheese

½ cup bread crumbs (herbed or plain)

2 tsps fresh thyme

½ cup shredded mozzarella cheese Chopped fennel fronds, for garnish

Cut off the fronds and stems of the fennel and save them for another dish; they are a great addition to stocks and broths.

Cut the bulbs in quarters, then 2-4cm pieces and discard the woody cores.

Grease a casserole pan or gratin pan with 1 tablespoon olive oil and preheat the oven to

Boil the fennel in a medium pot of salty water for 5-6 minutes, or until the fennel is just about tender.

Drain well and toss with a tablespoon of olive oil.

Mix the parmesan, thyme and bread crumbs, then mix half of that mixture with the fennel. Add the fennel to the casserole in an even layer. Top with the mozzarella cheese, then the rest of the parmesan-bread crumb mixture. Drizzle 1-2 tablespoons of olive oil over the top.

Cover the casserole and bake for 20 minutes. Take the cover off and bake until the cheese is well browned, about 15 more minutes. Let the gratin rest for 5 minutes before serving. Garnish with chopped fresh fennel fronds.

Serve 6-8 as a side dish.

Roasted Fennel



Ingredients

2 fennel bulbs (thick base of stalk), stalks cut off, bulbs halved lengthwise, then cut lengthwise in 20mm thick pieces Olive oil

Method

Preheat oven to 200°C.

Balsamic vinegar

Rub just enough olive oil over the fennel to coat. Sprinkle on some balsamic vinegar, also to coat. Line baking dish with aluminum foil. Lav out the pieces of fennel and roast for 30-40 minutes, or until the fennel is cooked through and beginning to caramelize.

Busy bees in our red flowering gum

The more I find out about honey bees, the more amazing I find them. There can be 60,000 bees in a hive, most of them female workers. The males (drones) just hang out at the hive, then fly off around lunchtime looking for sex. The one drawback to being a bee bloke is that sex is fatal. Each worker may carry out 15 or more different tasks in her short lifetime. Older workers leave the hive to look for nectar or pollen.

TIMBER AND HARDWARE

They may fly three kilometres or more for food and clock up 60 kilometres a day. A worker navigates by the sun, by the Earth's magnetic field, by landmarks and by scent. When she returns home, she can communicate the distance, direction and quality of a food source to her sisters.

The honey bee is an imported species. We have many native bees such as the blue banded bee, but none in Victoria live in large colonies.

Of course, we gardeners are mostly interested in bees for their pollination services: 30% of our fruit and veg are pollinated by honey bees. The wise gardener wants to see a garden full of happy, busy bees. So how can we give the bees a helping hand?

Bee Tucker

Bees get all of their nutrition from flower nectar and pollen. They need huge quantities of nectar, which they mostly get from flowering shrubs and trees and store as honey. When it comes to pollen, it's more a question of variety than quantity. Bees will collect different kinds of pollen and feed it to their young, so a flower-filled suburban garden is bee heaven. Simple, oldfashioned flowers are generally more useful to bees than fancy, double-flowered hybrids. To keep the bees coming back to your vegie garden, plant long-flowering ornamentals such as salvias and lavender around your vegies, and allow some vegies to go to seed. Bees love brassica flowers, for example.

Bee-Friendly Practices

Avoid spraying when bees are about, as many common pesticides such as pyrethrum are deadly to bees. Systemic insecticides such as Confidor™ are of particular concern, as they spread through the entire plant and into its pollen. They have no place in an organic garden.

> Perhaps the worst danger arises when feral colonies in buildings are poisoned: if the poisoned honevcomb is not removed, bees from other hives may plunder it, taking the poison back home to destroy their colonies also.

Finally, if you see a swarm of bees, don't panic! Swarming bees may look scary, but bees are at their least aggressive when they swarm. All they want is to be left alone to find a new home.

Helping Vietnam veterans and their families


Over the last few years we have been lucky enough to have printed a few articles written by Carla but I have only just recently learned of the books that she has written over the last 20 years.

Her first book. Trauma. Tears and Time was written by a stay at home mum that had never written anything before. This book was based on interviews from a veterans radio program. Carla interviewed 6 veterans for a radio program called "Andy we salute you". This program won a BASF National Community Radio station award with excellence. This program helped so many Vietnam veterans and their families Subsequent to the broadcast Carla was requested by so many people to preserve the information in print and thus Trauma, Tears and Time was born. This book like many of her books have been reprinted twice.

The next request for a book was from veterans from the Navy who wanted their stories told. "We were there too" they said. Carla spent 3 days in naval exercises on HMAS Perth (now scuttled) interviewing and experiencing naval life in a small way. During this period Mostly Sailors was penned.

Carla was then approached by the RAAF who said "We were there too" and so Carla researched and wrote Wings of Support. (About to be reprinted). All Carla's books are based on her passion for the truth and preserving history and she feels so honoured to have been trusted with these stories. These books have been used in a variety of ways to assist in recovery at repat hospitals and for family rehabilitation. Serving those who served is a book that captures and records Carla's endeavours to preserve the stories that have been shared with her over the last 20 years.



Bellarine Rail Trail Run




