
For everybody who doesn't know, Destiny Hope is a two year old girl who lives within our local community and suffers from 11 different disabilities. Some of these include Down syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, Epilepsy, Reflux and aspirates. The students from Bellarine Secondary College wish to purchase Destiny a special bath seat. This bath will be covered in mesh, with a head harness to protect her head and also lower straps to strap her in. It can also fold down so she will be able to lay down in the bath as well at sit up.



Destiny only gets a certain amount of funding off the government for her bathroom accessories. This funding is usually around \$500 and with the bath seat that Destiny needs costing \$2000; they need to get the other \$1500 from somewhere. This is where the Bellarine Secondary VCAL students stepped in and made it their goal to raise money for Destiny throughout the year.

It was a cold and rainy morning and afternoon but that didn't stop them from selling over 22 kilos of sausages throughout the day. Many familiar faces came to Safeway to buy a sausage and some very generous people even just donated a few dollars. Handel's Messiah Comes To Portarlington

St. Andrews Uniting Church Portarlington is bringing a quality performance of the Messiah to Portarlington on Sunday 18 November, 2012, in Parks Hall, commencing at 2.30pm.

Secretary of the Uniting Church, Barry Ruler, said that through their long association with the renowned Essendon Choral Society, the opportunity arose for the Church to have the Messiah performed in Portarlington.

The Essendon Choral Society will perform the choral music and Melbourne Opera will provide a 15 piece orchestra and four quality soloists for the performance. Cost of staging the performance will be substantial but with some sponsorship from the Bendigo Community Bank, the ticket price has been kept to a minimum to encourage local residents to attend what will be a great performance. It is many years since the Messiah has been presented anywhere on the Bellarine.

Tickets have been priced at a very reasonable \$25 per head, way below what similar performances would cost in either Melbourne or Geelong.

Tickets would be best pre-purchased and will be available from the 1 October from Barry on (03) 5259 3304 or from Lorraine or David on (03) 5259 2364.

We suggest early purchase to avoid disappointment.



DCSCA's 2012 AGM

On 17 October 2012 at 7pm, DCSCA will hold its Annual General Meeting (AGM) at SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre. The AGM is DCSCA's most important event of the year. At its AGM, the DCSCA Committee reports to the members on the work that it has done in the year and invites their responses.

In the past year, DCSCA has been very active on a number of issues, including upgrading the Lookout at The Dell, campaigning against the bridge in Bayshore Avenue and pressing for improvements for walkers and cyclists in Jetty Road. We've seen success in our years-long campaign to improve access to Lake Lorne; we've been involved in discussions about the future of Beacon Point, McLeod's Waterholes and Drysdale town centre; and, of course, we've launched a campaign for a Drysdale bypass. We've worked with Ryan Court residents to get their road restored after the council dug it up to collect storm water; and we've helped Central Road residents to resist being charged thousands of dollars by the council to pay for a developer's drains.

DCSCA's AGM is also the time when the members elect a new Committee to run the association for the next twelve months. The DCSCA Committee consists of four officers (President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary/Public Officer) and up to ten Committee members.

That range of positions means that you can get just as involved as you want in DCSCA's work. As a committee member, you can be part of the discussions about local events and issues at the Committee's monthly meetings and you can also be part of DCSCA's various programs and projects - Local Economic Development and From Streetwork to Artwork (each in collaboration with SpringDale), Open Spaces Network, Going Green on the Bellarine and, of course, the Festival of Glass. As an officer of DCSCA, you can take a leading role in one or more of those programs and projects.

Anyone is welcome to attend the AGM, but only DCSCA members can vote. DCSCA members will receive formal notification and invitation to the AGM closer to the date.




Geoff Pretty

Scam Alert: Westpac Bank **Payment Network**

Watch out for hoax emails using the subject line "Westpac Bank Payment Network". Delete it immediately. Remember, Westpac will never ask you to update, verify or correct your Online banking details directly into an email reply. It's good practice to familiarize yourself with the latest email scams. There are 3 simple questions you should ask to help spot a scam:

- Does it instruct you to click on a link, open an attachment or call a number?
- Does it ask for account information?
- Does the email have poor grammar and punctuation?

If you answered yes to any one of these questions be aware it may be a scam. Do not respond directly without verifying the legitimacy of the request either by checking the information on th NHW website www.nhw.com.au or calling 132 032.

Sea-level rise and us

The sea: beautiful, untameable - and rising

For many people, and for me personally, a house with a sea view is a dream come true. Why are we so attracted to a life by

Perhaps it's the diverse leisure opportunities, from an early morning walk on the beach to splashing around in the surf on a summer afternoon, from fishing to surfing or sailing.

Then there's the ever-changing variety. No two days by the sea are the same. The sea is always rearranging the land: nibbling at its edges, reshaping sandbars, washing up fascinating objects or carrying things away. Its character can change by the day or even by the hour, from serene to boisterous - or sometimes to awe-inspiringly violent.

A life by the sea is a reminder that we 21st century hi-tech humans still live in nature, and her power is still untameable.

We can't control the sea's power - but 7 billion humans can unleash it, by releasing billions of tonnes of CO2 into the atmosphere each year. We are on track to warm our planet by around 3 degrees this century, and that will mean rising sea levels.

In fact, sea level has been rising around Australia's coasts since accurate measurements began. The current rate of rise is 3mm per year, or 3cm per

That sounds trivial, doesn't it? Yet that tiny 3cm of rise can equate to 3 metres of beach lost each decade.2

Conservative scientific estimates of the sea-level rise in store for us this century vary between 20-80 cm,3 but larger rises of two metres or more are considered possible.4 This much is certain: our coastline will change significantly during the lifetimes of the younger people reading this article.

If you're interested in the implications, then come along to SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre on Sunday, 7 October at 2.30 pm. Melbourne author and climate activist David Spratt (Climate Code Red www.climatecodered.org) will give a presentation on 'Sea-Level Rise and the Bellarine Peninsula', followed by a question-and-answer session. Admission is free.

The citrus flav<mark>o</mark>ur is v<mark>e</mark>ry tangy and delicious. Makes a quick dessert served with orange segments and cream.

2 cups plain flour 4 tspns baking powder

1/4 cup sugar

grated rind of 2 oranges (keep fruit for juicing)

75gms butter

1/4 cup honey

1 egg

3/4 cup orange juice/milk

Combine flour, baking powder, sugar and orange rind into a large bowl. Fork lightly to combine thoroughly.

In another container melt butter. Add the honey and heat again, but use as little heat as necessary.

Squeeze the oranges, mix the juice with the milk to make 3/4 cup of liquid. Add egg to the milk/orange juice and beat well. Add honey/butter to the liquids then all to the flour mixture, mix well to combine, stopping as soon as there is no more mixture to combine. Place mixture evenly into 12 muffin tins lined with muffin patty papers. Top with a walnut or Pecan.

Cook in a 200°C pre-heated oven for 10-12 minutes. Turn out onto a cooling tray and when cool dust with little icing sugar and cream for a delicious and tasty treat.

Enjoy! They are very tasty.

These savoury muffins are a winner with a BBQ or just as a quick luncheon.

250gm packet frozen chopped spinach - thawed 2 cups SR flour 1 tspn baking powder 1 tspn nutmeg 90gms crumbled feta cheese 50gms shredded Parmesan 2 eggs lightly beatern

1 cup milk

60gms melted butter

Preheat oven 200°C, prepare muffin trays with muffin patty papers. Use your hands to squeeze out the excess moisture from the spinach.

In a large mixing bowl, sift together SR flour, baking powder and nutmeg. Stir through the feta and Parmesan. Make a well in the centre of this mixture.

In a small bowl combine eggs, milk, butter and spinach. Add all at once to the flour mixture and stir till just moistened and the batter should be lumpy. Spoon batter into the prepared muffin tins and bake 15-20 minutes till golden brown.

Turn out onto a cooling tray and serve warm.





Support your tomatoes

Looking at my tiny tomato seedlings in their pots, it's difficult to imagine that they will be 2-metre-high monsters by January and (hopefully) laden with 10 kg or more of fruit by March.

I choose heirloom varieties - this year it's **Amish Paste, Periforme and Tommy** Toe - which are strong and robust growers. These tall-growing tomatoes are called *indeterminate* because they'll keep growing to an indeterminate size.

The alternative are bush tomatoes like Roma which will remain fairly compact.

With a plant this vigorous, lots of support is needed. Don't kid yourself: a few spindly bamboos aren't going to do the job. You could just let your tomatoes ramble, of course. But then you may lose a lot to mice, snails, harlequin bugs and other critters. (My mum's dog loves tomatoes.) Or you may miss a lovely ripe cluster of fruit until it's overripe and mushy.

For the last three years I've used the same trellis system for my tomatoes. It consists of a sturdy framework of plastic-coated metal poles secured by cable ties. The poles will last for many years and the structure can be dismantled easily at the end of the season and moved around the garden to follow my rotation scheme.

Lengths of elasticated tree tie are hung from the top bar and tied loosely to the bottom bar. As the tomato vines grow. I twirl them around the ties. It's easy, secure and takes only seconds per vine.

To prune or not to prune? Some gardeners let their tomatoes go unpruned, others prune them rigorously to one leader and strip off the lower foliage. I tend to steer a middle path, allowing four or five leaders per plant. That keeps them sufficiently under control and retains enough foliage to prevent sunburnt fruit. When the leaders get to the top of the trellis, I just let them ramble at will.

If you're new to growing tomatoes, you're probably wondering what a leader is. A leader is one of the strong, main shoots. Leafy side branches grow out at right angles from the leaders. In the angle ('armpit') between the two, little leafy shoots emerge: left alone, these will grow into subsidiary leaders.

I pinch most of them out – when they're small, you can just use your fingernails for this. Make sure you can distinguish them from flower trusses, which tend to grow out of the main stem at intervals between the leafy branches, and in the growing tip of the leader.

Don't pinch those out, or you'll have no fruit!

Kel tells me that in his family tree some of his family has been credited with bringing the first Clydesdales to Victoria. Horses have always played a big role in Kel's life and he decided that we should have a chat to Margaret Filbay and her family, who have been involved in breeding Clydesdales for 60 vears. Kel and I spent a lovely

afternoon chatting to Margaret and two of her daughters, Shirley and Roslyn at their farm the other Saturday afternoon.

To hear Margaret and Kel reminisce over the years shared at Drysdale Primary School which ended up revolving around corporal punishment which was handed out by so many teachers during those days. The conversation then wound around various tricks that were carried out on various people in the community, like the "stink bomb trees" and how they used to collect the seeds, crush them and put water on them to stink the school room out. Of course Margaret and Kel spoke of riding horses to school and how Margaret would ride her horse into the park near the school and left the horse for the day. Kel says that there were quite a lot of horses in the paddock each day. Some children would ride to Drysdale from farms, on the outskirts of Drysdale because parents didn't have time to transport them to school due to work commitments.





Kel asked Margaret about whether Clydesdales can be founded. Both Margaret and Shirley guickly said "Yes they can like any horse but if they are being well treated they should never end up founded". Kel said that a Clydesdale would have a kerosene tin of chaff in the morning before starting work and then at midday you'd place another kerosene tin of chaff in a nosebag and once the horses had eaten that they could work for the rest of the day.

Margaret and her husband, Syd ran horsemanship and harnessing classes at Glenormiston and Marcus Oldham College for 18 years. Margaret's family continue to breed Clydesdales and have sold them all around Victoria, NSW, South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania. They didn't breed horses during the drought as it was hard enough keeping the horses alive. Some horses can be 900kg and their hair needs to be silky so the water runs off.

Kel asked Margaret "How long it would take to plough a field with a Clydesdale?" Margaret and Kel agreed that it would probably take a full day to plough an acre with a horse and a single furrow plough. Many houses were moved to Drysdale by Clydesdale teams that pulled a big float with iron wheels and the house on top. Near everything was pulled by Clydesdales in those days. Teams of 8 Clydesdales helped to double furrow plough the black hills up Murradoc Road.

The stories kept coming. By the end of the afternoon we had shared three lovely hours, Thank you to Margaret and Kel for sharing these stories and their time with

Local bead glass artisan gains award in an International Beading Contest

Local bead glass artisan Glenda Mac Naughton - *Dax Bead Art* - was thrilled to be awarded 2nd prize in the Advanced Beader, Wearable Art in the

2012 International Treasures of Toho contest in the USA for her necklace Hedron Rising (pictured right). The contest attracts a large pool of international bead artisans whose work passes through two rounds of judging nationally and internationally before the final judging in the USA at the biggest consumer bead show in the World (the Bead and Button Show) and it was featured on the cover recently of the Bead Society of Victoria's magazine, Connect.

Hedron Rising is made using needle and thread techniques called beadweaving to weave tiny glass beads (seed beads) into the 27 graded hedron (six-sided) shapes that Glenda designed that form the necklace. Over 10,000 Japanese Toho seed beads were used to create the

necklace as a requirement of the contest is that the piece must use 90% Toho beads.


The project continues to provoke many conversations about art in Drysdale, Clifton Springs and across the Bellarine.

The Book Club

The Gathering - Anne Enright

On Monday September 3, the Book Group met to discuss The Gathering by Anne Enright.

Written in 2006, this novel won the Man Booker Prize in 2007 and was short-listed for the Irish Novel of the Year and the Independent Booksellers' Prize the following year. In 2010 it was shortlisted for Irish Book of the Decade. Despite the awards and enthusiastic reviews on the back cover, members of our group who had been anticipating an interesting book were disappointed.

The tale is told by Veronica, one of twelve siblings, who has the responsibility of bringing the body of her brother home from England and breaking the news to their mother. Liam has committed suicide by walking into the sea. We never discover why but it seems that every surviving child of the 12 has personal issues and that in this big family there is always something simmering under the surface. Liam's death seems to precipitate Veronica's impending mid-life crisis. She has spent all of her adult life trying to avoid becoming like her mother. She has memories of their childhood which she admits may be figments of her vivid imagination.

Quite some time was spent with their grandparents Ada and Charlie, possibly when 'Mammy' was producing another baby or recovering from one of her seven miscarriages. It is during this period that Veronica thinks perhaps an incident occurred that lies at the root of Liam's problems.

The opening sentences were crisp and well written in the style which earns awards but which we rather unkindly refer to as 'clever writing'. The promising start was followed by seven tedious pages describing how Veronica's grandmother met a man in a hotel foyer and later married his friend. The story is rather sexually explicit and Veronica leaps about in time making it rather disjointed. We found the characters not likeable and not even interesting.

Would we recommend this book to a friend? No, but as Enright has four other novels, also well recognised by her literary peers, perhaps it would be fair to read another of her books. She began her writing career in 1991 with the Portable Virgin, a collection of short stories, which was awarded the Rooney Prize for Irish literature. We were unable to give this book a rating out of ten.

Then there's a Millers Fashion Parade including Devonshire Tea on Wednesday 17 October at 1.30pm in St James' Church Hall, a joint venture with the National Seniors (Bellarine).
