#### Dear Friends and soon to be friends

Over the last few weeks, I have been very interested in the mental health programs and activities. So many sad stories but so many fantastic outcomes were also highlights after interventions. This led me to think about activities and reactions around SpringDale and our community.

In my experience, I have witnessed the impact that one person showing interest in another can have in the second person's life, maybe in both lives. Just imagine a community where people care just that little bit more for another.

During the months when my husband was in hospital and during his recovery, we had a close circle of friends that I was in contact with daily or almost daily, via telephone texts. The response texts kept me supported and helped me to continue to support Ken. We had a wider circle of people who helped or were concerned and if I didn't receive the support I needed from the inner circle, I would broadcast a message to the wider group and always received supportive comments in return.

In the wider community, people would ask about Ken, if I was in Drysdale long enough for anyone to see me. All this support allowed us to remain positive. People who looked after us in other ways also helped us to survive in very practical ways.

The only reason that I write this is to show that I have extreme experience of support and how much it helped our whole family. Ken continues to recover and knows that he was so lucky to survive the accident. So many have pointed out Ken photos in the Messenger over the last 6 months as he now attends more activities and tries to give back to our community in so many ways.

I know that I have a great deal of kindness and service to give back to our community to balance the kindness ledger. I will continue to try to find innovative and practical ways to give back to our community to meet needs as they present or are perceived.

Please have a think about a person that you might be able to get to know and perhaps share a kind word with. Please think about how you might help someone in a small way that you know or perhaps bring a non perishable food item to SpringDale for the food bank or some dog or cat food for Geelong Animal Rescue. The residents who have participated in bringing these items to SpringDale, have supplied many bags of goodies for these two programs.

Thanks for this opportunity to share. As people who have been reading this column over the last 12 years would know, I have never written about my family before but I believed it was important to demonstrate the way that community support can make a difference and also say thank you.

#### Congratulations Drysdale Football and Netball Club

With the 2015 season now well behind us, I take this opportunity to congratulate the Drysdale Football and Netball Club on their season. Although the clubs senior sides were not involved in this year's finals I can assure readers that the success of a club in my eyes is far from measured on scoreboard results alone.

The Drysdale Club is an integral part of the community and provides a game of football and netball to hundreds of players. Importantly this includes more than 200 junior footballers, both boys and girls, and netball has more than 10 junior sides.

Grassroots clubs, like Drysdale, are an integral part of any community, especially in regional and rural towns like those on the Bellarine Peninsula. Importantly they introduce kids to sport and an active lifestyle. They also provide a social connection and outlet for locals and in doing that contribute significantly to creating the sense of community that is so vital to the cohesion of a town. So I again congratulate the club for its efforts in 2015, especially those people who make it happen, from those on the committees, to the coaches and all the other volunteers who are so important to the lifeblood of any club.

#### Call for Tenders to Transform Portarlington Harbour

I know many Drysdale *locals* are interested in the ongoing development of the harbour at Portarlington. So I am pleased to report that the State Government has now called for tenders to deliver the next component of the \$15 million development.

This next stage of the harbour will include the construction of two rock breakwaters, a new finger jetty, pier improvements and a number of marine industry access upgrades for the pier and harbour. The first stage of the



project, which involved the construction of the new 175 metre section of Portarlington's pier, was completed earlier this year.

This next phase of the development will transform the harbour over the next two years, delivering better facilities for the aquaculture industry and providing infrastructure for a future ferry. Importantly Parks Victoria will be maintaining a functioning harbour during the works and limiting the impacts on Portarlington.

## Voice Artists Wanted for Local Film

The local experimental short sci-fi feature film EXIT is almost finished with only three shots remaining to completion of principal photography.

Writer-Director David King is now seeking two men aged between 35 and 65 to do the film's voice over.

EXIT was produced with the assistance of local volunteer talent sourced through articles in the Geelong Advertiser and the Bellarine Peninsula's SpringDale Messenger.

More than 15 people from Geelong and the Bellarine Peninsula took a variety of roles

from acting, camera operation and lighting to makeup, transport, production management, catering, green screen compositing and visual effects editing.

Locations included Geelong, St. Leonards, Indented Head, Portarlington, Ocean Grove and Barrabool Hills, with Drysdale's Potato Shed providing a studio environment.

King said he was surprised by the breadth and depth of filmmaking enthusiasm in the Geelong and District and Bellarine Peninsula regions.

"Last time I made a film like this down here was in the mid-1970's. I wasn't sure if it was possible to find people interested in this kind of thing anymore," he said.

Using a deconstructed narrative and a variety of unusual techniques, EXIT follows a character called Y who believes he is immortal and living in paradise. When paradise starts coming apart and he begins receiving messages from his dead wife, he realises he's either losing his mind or nothing is what it seems.

King said the only requirements for the voice over artists were a reasonable speaking voice and an ability to read from a script.





"The film contains a suggestion of schizophrenia, starting with two voices from the same character and ending with four voices," he said. "It will take about an hourand-a-half to record."

On completion, EXIT will be sent to several European film festivals, released as a DVD and via online streaming.

Unfortunately our bid to prevent the building of a Service Station on the outskirts of our town has failed and VCAT has ordered DCSCA to pay Milemaker Petroleum \$5500 by 7 December. We have written to Milemaker asking them to waive the costs as a matter of goodwill to us, and to the community generally; however we are yet to receive a reply. We have had wonderful support from our residents, local politicians, and other community groups, but we know deep down that we will probably have to pay this account. \$5500 will have an impact on our ability to fully function as a true community association.

Many people are pledging support of \$55.00 which means if we get 100 of those then we can pay this imposed order. Others have offered lesser amounts, which we also gratefully accept.

## Safe School Route

It's a hot topic – do you let your children walk or ride to school? Often the answer is no. Some of the many barriers parents face is the lack of safe routes to get to school and living too far away from the school to walk or ride.

It's a hurdle that Healthy Together Geelong and the City of Greater Geelong's Engineering Services (Traffic Unit) are determined to overcome. They're working closely with school staff, students, parents and other community organisations across Geelong to identify active travel routes for children to safely walk or ride to school.

Designated safe active travel routes are generally between 500m and 1.5km in length and have safe pick-up/drop-off points where families can park their cars and let their children safely walk or ride the rest of the way.

Active travel routes help children become more physically active on a daily basis, and help reduce traffic and parking congestion around school gates. Fewer cars at school pick-up and drop-off times ultimately creates a safer environment for children. It also helps kids learn essential road safety skills, and become more familiar and connected with their community through regular social activity.

St Thomas Primary School, St Ignatius Secondary College and Bellarine Secondary College are now encouraging their school communities to drop off and pick up their children from Drysdale Railway Station, Reserve Road or Andersons Road. Students and families can walk and ride the remainder of the way to school along the Lake Lorne shared path. It is hoped that this will not only help students, staff and families to be more active, but will reduce the large amounts of traffic and parking congestion along Peninsula Drive at pick up and drop off times.

## HANDOVER STAGE Pre-Completion Inspection

This is the final inspection that takes place before the final payment is made to the builder –normally the remaining 10% of the contract value. The purpose behind this part of the process is to inspect the property and make sure you are satisfied with the quality, scope and standard of the work carried out. During this inspection a list of items which require attention and rectification by the builder is compiled and is to be completed by the builder before you make the final payment.

This is also referred to as the Handover defects Report/List or Punch List items. It is essential that you confirm that these items have been rectified to an an acceptable standard as agreed, before you make the final payment.

This requires visiting the property and checking through all items as a final confirmation. You may wish to engage a professional building inspection company to conduct this inspection on your behalf. As with most things, there is expertise, experience and knowledge that comes into play in this process and if you lack any of these, you may not be aware of any defects or items that require attention.

#### When we conduct a handover defects inspection, listed is a very brief sample of the items we check:

- 1. Insulation in the roof space is missing, not properly installed, or has been disturbed and requires attention.
- 2. No downlight covers in the roof space to separate the lights from the insulation
- **3.** Building debris in the gutters- potential to encourage surface rust to develop and to block downpipes.
- 4. Power points that are installed, but not connected or wired correctly.

EFG today

It can be difficult to escape your heritage, and part of mine is the English ideal of a productive kitchen garden: orderly straight rows of cabbages, beans, tomatoes, etc., in rectangular beds between neat brick paths.

Studying permaculture has taught me to take a more flexible view of what a productive garden can look like. Although we do still have rectangular raised beds (not quite as neat as they used to be), I've learned to value curves, edible perennials and multilayered gardens with different microclimates and niches. To grow a little of many things rather than half a tonne of broccoli and spuds. To accept some ornamentals in the edible garden rather than resenting the space they take up. I've also learned to accept what comes along rather than imposing a strict order on our garden.

Part of that learning has been our Edible Forest Garden ('EFG'). 'Forest' may be a grand term for a small square of land that has one medium-sized tree on it, but a forest garden is about creating multiple layers: a canopy layer, a shrub layer, a herbaceous layer and creeping groundcovers. I should admit that some of the plants aren't edible: there are 'legacy' plants that existed before the forest garden, including a lavender, a wallflower and a large camellia that my wife Susan wouldn't let me get rid of.

However there are also lots of edible plants: a Hass avocado that bears delicious fruit; Chilean guava bushes that give a harvest of sweet, tangy berries; perpetual spinach, culinary herbs in terracotta pots, a swathe of sorrel and self-sown parsley around the garden bench; silverbeet for the chooks to peck at through the wire of their run, and currently a healthy stand of snow peas that

happily withstood the hot, dry 37°C winds of last weekend.

I started off with the bare bones of a design, on a parched corner of lawn between the chook house and the jacaranda, then let the garden 'design' itself. Some things take, some things don't, but each year the EFG grows in complexity and usefulness, while taking very little work.

### Springdale Community Garden Report WOW! What a month it's been for the SpringDale Community Garden project!

Delighted to advise that we have made enormous progress, our garden is really taking shape, and we have made our first plantings.

Using some of the funds that have been donated by local businesses, (thanks again Bill and others – you know who you are) we purchased 5 new potato boxes that we have earmarked for growing fresh veggies for the Drysdale Community Church's FoodBank project, which already supplies donated tinned, packaged, and frozen foods to over 100 disadvantaged families throughout our region. The boxes have been lined with a heavy black plastic, and will be filled with soil, manure, and mulch at our next working bee. We anticipate that whatever we plant therein will be ready for eating over Summer.

We welcome Linda-Maree Walker to our group – she will be our Liaison with the FoodBank at the Church, and will advise our gardeners on what the FoodBank's needs are, and what we should be growing to provide the maximum assistance. Linda-Maree has had a long association with the Harvest Basket, run at the SpringDale centre on the first Saturday of every month.

We have done the groundwork for harvesting water from the roof of the Church Playgroup building, with the digging of a 30-metre trench, to lay the plastic piping to our first 5000-litre tank, standing ready on its plinth. Thanks Bellarine Hire for a great deal on the

hire of their excavator, and to volunteer operator Chris for a good day's work. It will all be connected up by the time you read this, and then all we need is plenty of rain to fill it!

There will be a special meeting held at 7.30pm on Thursday, 19 November, 2015 at SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre, High Street, Drysdale to officially mark the formation of the group, and to elect our office bearers for the ensuing 12 months. ## Geelong Museum of Motoring + Industry



The Geelong Museum of Motoring + Industry is the home of an impressive collection of 50 motor vehicles and pays tribute to the industry and manufacturing heritage of Geelong. It is run by enthusiasts for everyone to enjoy and is located in an historic industrial precinct in North Geelong, just a short drive from the CBD. Occupying the one-hundred year old Federal Woollen Mills at 13 – 35 Mackey Street North Geelong, the museum building was originally built to manufacture uniforms for the ANZACs in WW1.

In 2014, a group of dedicated local motoring enthusiasts and community leaders made it their mission to salvage the remaining collection from the Ford Discovery Centre, which had closed two years earlier. It was clear that this collection needed a new home that would foster and celebrate Geelong's rich heritage in motoring and manufacturing, and so the Geelong Museum of Motoring + Industry was born. Since then, the Geelong Museum of Motoring + Industry has amassed an impressive display of vehicles and artefacts. The collection includes cars, trucks and motorbikes, interactive displays, rare cut-away cars, photos, memorabilia, models, motoring DVDs, and is updated regularly.

Geelong was once one of the largest manufacturing hubs in Australia and has been the home to major manufacturers such as Ford, International Harvester, Shell, and Alcoa. Geelong has a fascinating history in the automotive and manufacturing industry, but as our city transforms into a thriving tourist destination, we cannot afford to lose the knowledge of where we came from. The Geelong Museum of Motoring + Industry is a community project that's working to preserve Geelong's rich manufacturing heritage for future generations. The museum tells the story of the Geelong region, and why Australia has long been considered a car-centric nation.

The Geelong Museum of Motoring + Industry is open during the year from 10am to 4pm every Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, except for Easter Friday and Sunday. The museum will be open 7 days a week during the Christmas school holidays, except for Christmas Day and Boxing Day. Entry price is \$10 for adults, \$8 for Concession, Students and Groups of 10 or more, \$4 for Children (aged 4 – 16), or \$25 for a family ticket including 2 adults.

## Geoffrey (Geoff) Strachan

In November 1964, the Menzies Government passed the new National Service Act that required all twenty year old males to register for National Service in the year they were to turn twenty.

A ballot was conducted, and if his birthdate was drawn, he was called up and required to serve for a period of two years in the Australian Army.

Geoff was called up in the first intake of the new National Service Scheme, late May 1965.

He had finished his schooling in Horsham, and whilst working for a bank in Belmont, was conscripted into the Army, together with all the Wimmera and Western District lads.

Recruits went through a ten weeks basic training course, after which they were transferred to the Corps where they were to spend the remainder of their two years.

He was posted to Royal Australian Armoured Corps, Puckapunyal, and was trained as a driver/signaller/gunner in the new M113 Armoured Personal Carrier.

The course ran for approximately four weeks, and upon completion, he joined 1 Armoured Personal Carrier Squadron.

In April 1966, he completed a two week Jungle Training course at Canungra, Queensland and in May that year, his unit deployed to South Vietnam, by ship.

Upon arrival, the unit moved to Nui Dat, where the new Australian base was being constructed.

His unit was mainly involved in the transporting and supporting of the Infantry Battalions in the field.

During the *Battle of Long Tan* on the 18 August 1966, his troop was put on standby to assist the 6th Battalion, however did not move into Long Tan until early the next morning.

In March 1967 he was transferred back to Australia and served out the remainder of his time at Central Army Records, Albert Park.

After discharged late May 1967, he returned to the Bank to recommence his Banking career.

After working in Fiji and Papua New Guinea, Geoff returned to Geelong where he worked until retirement. Geoff moved to Drysdale in 1979 and currently holds the position of Treasurer of the Drysdale RSL Sub-Branch.

#### Vegetable Quesadillas

8 multigrain tortillas <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup tomato salsa 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cups grated fat tasty cheese 400g can no-added-salt red kidney beans, drained 1 cup grated carrot 1 cup (30g) baby spinach leaves Olive oil cooking spray 1 avocado, peeled and chopped - optional 1 tbspn lemon juice

Lay 4 tortillas on a clean surface. Spread with tomato salsa and sprinkle with half the grated cheese.

Top each one evenly with kidney beans, grated carrot and spinach leaves. Sprinkle with remaining grated cheese. Cover with the remaining 4 tortillas. Heat a large non-stick frying pan and grease with cooking spray. Add one filled tortilla, cook over a medium heat for about 3 minutes or until golden underneath. Using an egg slide, carefully turn and cook other side until golden. Remove from pan.

Repeat with remaining filled tortillas to make 4 quesadillas. Cool then cut each into 6 wedges.

Mash avocado with lemon juice in a small bowl. Serve with quesadillas if desired.

Recipe can be cooked a day ahead. Keep cooked quesadillas refrigerated in a container until required.

Tip: These tasty quesadillas can also be eaten warm as an after school snack or served as a light dinner with a salad.





#### **Apple and Apricot Pikelets**

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> cup diced dried apricots
1 tbspn honey
2 tbspn hot water
1 cup buttermilk
1 large egg
1 cup self raising flour
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup minute oats
1 small apple, peeled and grated
Combine apricots honey and water

Combine apricots, honey and water in a small bowl. Cool slightly.

Whisk buttermilk and egg together in a jug.

Sift flour into a bowl. Stir in oats and apple. Make a well in the centre. Add apricot mixture and buttermilk. Stir to form a thick batter.

Heat a large non-stick frying pan and grease with cooking spray. Drop tablespoons of batter into hot pan, allowing room for spreading. Cook over a medium heat for about 2 minutes until bubbles start to appear on surface of batter.

Turn pikelets and cook other side for a further 2 minutes or until golden. Remove from pan. Repeat with remaining batter, regreasing pan with cooking spray as required. Serve plain or lightly spread with margarine spread or extra light spreadable cream cheese.





#### Crispy Cod Nuggets with Sweet Potato Wedges

4 pieces skinned cod fillet, cut into chunks 2 tbspn plain flour 1 large egg, beaten 100g fresh wholemeal breadcrumbs 2 tbspn olive oil 2 sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into wedges 1 tbspn honey Sunflower oil, for shallow-frying

Coat each piece of cod in flour then dip in beaten egg and coat in breadcrumbs. Cover and chill in the fridge for 20 minutes. Preheat the oven to 200°C.

Heat the olive oil in a roasting tin for 3-4 minutes then add the sweet potato. Roast for 20 minutes, turning once. Brush with honey and return to the oven for 10 minutes until tender and golden.

Heat the sunflower oil in a heavy-based frying pan and fry the fish nuggets for 2-3 minutes on each side until golden Drain on kitchen paper. Serve with the potato wedges, dip and lemon.

Attendees included Queenscliff Mayor Cr. Helene Cameron, City of Geelong Councillors Lindsay Ellis and Jan Farrell, Superintendent of Geelong Police Daryl Clifton and various representatives from Bellarine community, business and sporting organisations.

A number of broad topics were discussed including local and regional crime data, Bellarine and Geelong police resources, current safety issues and initiatives to address these issues.

The workshop also discussed the future operation and membership structure of the Bellarine Community Safety Group.

As a result of these discussions a permanent group will now be established, ensuring the various Bellarine communities are represented.

I look forward to co-chairing this important group with Assistant Commissioner Walsh and will keep residents informed of our activities via local media such as the Springdale Messenger and other means.

#### Inaugural Meeting – Diabetes Support Group – Thurs 12 Nov 2pm at SpringDale

Type 2 Diabetes is the most common type of diabetes in Australia. It occurs when the blood glucose (sugar) level is too high. Blood glucose is the fuel that the body cells use for energy.

Type 2 diabetes occurs because there is either not enough insulin produced by an organ called the pancreas or because the body is less sensitive to the insulin it produces. Insulin helps the body get the blood glucose into the cells.

Most people who have type 2 diabetes are over the age of 40 and are over-weight.

Diabetes is a complex disease, and it takes time to develop the skills needed to control it. A certified diabetes educator can help. Ask your doctor to refer you to an educator for diabetes education. Weight control, increased physical activity, and, in some cases, diabetes medicine can help improve blood glucose levels.

No doubt there are many people on the Bellarine who have diabetes or are pre-diabetes. If you know someone who is, please let them know this: they are not alone.

A support group may help. There are many people who would like to share their story, tips, ideas and manage diabetes together.

It's not easy. There will be many changes. It's good to have a supporting friend, partner/family - someone to get fit with and share the load with.

## Piggeries of the Bellarine Peninsula

The first one that I knew of was in Leopold down past the lake in the 1800s - big piggery with lots of pigs - disbanded the enterprise because the community complained about offal being discarded into the lake.

Baglands at Wallington - he used to take all the food scraps from the Geelong Hospital in 44 gallon drums on a 4 wheel horse drawn cart. I remember him coming home from Geelong and he'd often be snoozing and the horse knew his way home. Because his cart had metal wheels you could see them on the bitumen road. One day the horse turned off the Bellarine Highway to his farm, went near a low branch of a tree and almost snipped his ear off.

The only building in Grubb Road, where Bellarine Rural is now, was called White Acres Piggery and I remember it being own by Bailleu. It was called White Acres because all the pigs had white skin. Reg Butcher and I used to cart the pigs to the pig market in Myers Street. Percy Hocking was the auctioneer during this time.

In Marcus Hill there was another piggery and where the blue stone quarry used to be on the western side of Portarlington Road not far from the old Bellarine School there was a piggery. There is a fella around here who used to work there and he still speaks to me up at The shopping centre.

Other pigs that were farmed here were saddle backs - white with a black middle.

Every Thursday Brian Gallop and I would cart a semi load of 2 decks of pigs each to Richmond abattoirs and they were the heaviest things that we carted.

In Swan Street Richmond you would see people run out of their shops in response to the pigs squealing to see what the noise was about. They must have thought it was someone getting murdered for sure. **Kel**

#### Children Left Unattended In Cars

It is illegal to leave a child unattended in a vehicle in all states and territories of Australia. In Victoria, it is illegal to leave a child unattended, in a vehicle under the Children, Youth and Families Act (2005). The penalties for leaving a child unattended in a car in Victoria include: A fine (currently \$3,690) or A maximum of 6 months jail. Leaving a child in a car on a hot summer's day could result in serious injury or death. If you notice that a child has been left unattended in a vehicle call 000 and ask for the Fire Brigade. Give your location, the vehicle registration number, the approximate age of the child and the condition of the child. If the car is unlocked, open the doors and shield windows with a blanket etc. and wait for emergency services – or – safely try to remove the child from the vehicle if you are concerned about the child's condition as every second counts! Did you know? The temperature inside a parked car can be 20 -30 degrees C hotter than the outside temperature. For more information, visit www.kidsafevic.com.au



#### **Tax Scammers**

Victorians have been urged to be wary of scammers claiming to be from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO), pressuring them into making payments. Typically, the scammer makes contact by phone, threatening the person who takes the call with arrest, legal action or even imprisonment if they do not make a payment for a 'debt' they owe the ATO. Regional areas have been particularly targeted by this scam.

If you get a call such as this:

- hang up;
- ignore any phone messages and do not return them;
- do not give out personal information, such as credit card details and bank account numbers.
- To check the authenticity of a phone call, hang up and call the ATO switchboard - 132 869.

Discuss this with elderly family members and neighbours who may be targeted by these scammers.

#### **Illegal Fireworks**

Residents in the Curlewis area have reported illegal fireworks being discharged in the area in recent weeks.

In Victoria, fireworks are classified as an explosive substance and it is an indictable offence to possess them without the relevant permits under the Dangerous Goods Act. We encourage residents to report such incidents to Police by calling 000 as soon as they occur. Incidents involving illegal fireworks not only endanger the lives and health of those involved, but cause significant distress to pets and young children.
