News from Lisa Neville MP Member for Bellarine

Drysdale Sports Precinct a Step Closer

Recently I was pleased to turn the first sod to mark construction of the Drysdale Sports Precinct fulfilling an election commitment of \$3.5 million.

Clubs like the Drysdale Soccer Club, Drysdale Football Netball Club and Drysdale Cricket Club are growing at rapid rates and they need a first-class precinct.

The precinct will have a football and cricket ground, new multi-purpose fields for soccer and other sporting codes, and added space for community events. Lighting, cricket nets, car parking and pavilion are also planned.

The Drysdale Sports Precinct is being funded in partnership with the City of Greater Geelong.

Recruitment of 406 Extra Police Bought Forward

As I have written in previous editions of the Messenger, community safety and policing is important to me, as it is to all on the Bellarine Peninsula.

That's why as local member, and also in my role of Police Minister, I have taken direct steps to ensure crime is targeted and police are well resourced.

Locally the State Government has reopened the police stations at Drysdale, Portarlington and Queenscliff that had been closed in 2014 by the previous Government. And 15 extra police have been recruited to the region to assist in staffing those stations.

Of course community safety is an issue across the State and as such the State Government has fast tracked the recruitment of 406 extra police.

This means these extra police officers will all be sworn in by the end of June 2017, rather than the planned June 2018, with the first officers hitting the beat in early 2017

These new police are in addition to the hundreds of police trained over the course of the year to cover those leaving the force by way of retirement etc.

And the Government continues to give Victoria Police the resources and powers it needs to fight crime,



technology and specialist equipment and the introduction of new laws to target offenders who commit home invasions and car jackings.

As I have said, community safety is of paramount importance to me and I will continue to work hard in tackling crime on the Bellarine.



Christmas



for Kinship Carers




We are a group who enjoy singing in a non-performing choir and would welcome any newcomers who love to sing, whether you can read music or not.





Do your fruit trees sometimes fail to fruit and your pumpkins fail to pump? Then maybe you need more bees in your garden.

Lots of bee activity should gladden the heart of any gardener. It is a sign of a healthy, biodiverse garden. If there is enough pollen and nectar in your garden to attract bees, then there will be other beneficial insects as well: butterflies, hoverflies, ladybirds, predatory beetles, native wasps and of course, native bees. These insects help with pollination, pest control – or both.

The European honeybee is, as its name suggests, an introduced species. We have something like 1,600 native species of bee in Australia, but most of them are solitary or live in small colonies. The European honeybee, on the other hand, lives in colonies as large as 100,000 insects. That means a lot of pollination, and a lot of honey.

My wife Susan and I have been beekeepers for four years now, and we never cease to be amazed by the industry of the bees in our hives. If you look at the little girl in the

photo





(all worker bees are female), you can see that her wings are frayed and worn. She is literally working herself to death, flying kilometres every day.

Bees are not mindless robots: within that tiny brain, smaller than a sesame seed, there is enough intelligence to learn complex tasks. Every flower species requires a slightly different technique, so a bee has to learn to 'work' the flower and will often specialise in one species.

Even if you don't want to keep bees, it's still a good idea to attract them to your garden.

Have lots of flowers, year round. You can't expect bees to turn up for the two weeks that your almond trees are flowering, if there's nothing for them to live on for the other 50 weeks of the year. The best nectar sources

are eucalypts, lavender, other flowering herbs such as borage and rosemary, brassicas and other vegetables that have been allowed to flower, and many oldfashioned 'cottage garden' type flowers.

Seriously consider going organic. Systemic pesticides such as Confidor are deadly to bees, as are many fungicides. Even homemade pesticides such as chili spray and vegetable oil and soap sprays may harm bees, so never spray them on or near flowering plants when bees are active.

Provide a shallow water source. Bees don't actually drink water, but they need it to cool the hive in summer and to dilute solidified honey for consumption in winter and spring. Floating water plants enable the bees to take water without falling in and drowning.

SpringDale Community Garden

We are delighted to report that we have been successful in obtaining a 2016 Grant from the Foundation of the Bendigo Community Bank. The Grant will allow us to achieve two important aims.

First, to purchase a 10000 litre water tank to be integrated into our present storage system, and which will minimise the necessity to draw water from the Church, as we needed to do last Summer to save our precious vegetables from cooking prematurely in the sun's heat.

Second, we will be able to add a further 4 purpose-built steel and timber compost bins, to complement the current system of bins built from recycled timber pallets standing on their ends. Our "Compost-Master" Denis will then be able to give full rein to his creative abilities with such compostibles as coffee grounds, shredded paper and cardboard, old

boots, dead cats, weeds, and various types of animal manures. We're joking about the dead cats.

Our plans to erect an under-cover shade area in our present "No-Grow" section of the garden are also proceeding, with the builder arranging for a Council Permit prior to starting construction. Thanks again to the wonderful folks at the Geelong Community Foundation Inc, who have provided the funding to enable this to happen before the heat of Summer is upon us. I worked for Reg Butcher and drove an 11 tonne truck and trailer. There were 12 bags of super to the tonne and 186 lb per bag. I'd cue up at the Pivot and there was a man on a gantry working a conveyor belt to help load the superphosphate bags. He'd stack them on the truck 5 wide across the truck and twelve rows would fit on the tray. The only other place we could get super was from

Cresco near the wheat silos in North Geelong.

The Trailer was unhooked in the paddock as it was too heavy to move on the worked ground - it would bog - we never used the trailer ever only just to carry extra super from Pivot. We would reload the bags onto the main truck. If the ground was very wet we would only put half the load on to move around the paddock slowly.

The Super spreader was Bagsure model, it had a tapered bin on top and a spinner underneath, like a butterfly wheel and as it turned quickly it threw the granulated superphosphate out about 30 yards on each side. I would start on the right and always turn left so i could see the previous mark.

Ces Bennet was a person who used to load the super into the super spreader and the spreader was bolted on behind the truck on the back of the driver's side. There was a dolly wheel under the spreader and it held chain links tight to the wheel of the truck with cogs on it to drive the spreader. As the truck was unloaded the springs would come up and the chain would tighten. You had to be careful and add links when needed so you didn't break the chain.

Spreading super at Spray farm one year - it had been so wet and the mushrooms had grown so well so that when I was trying to turn I went skidding around. We never saw mushrooms like this ever. Ces Bennett got me to bring two banana boxes to pick the mushrooms. Then he would eat two plates of mushrooms for breakfast and hold me up. We never picked mushrooms after that.

When we spread super in parts out of Geelong on the way home Ces would be insistent to stop at the Elephant and Castle for a while. Ces was trying to drum up players that might help Drysdale Football to improve their listing on the ladder. He was successful in getting a few players to come to play for Drysdale.

When we were spreading super at Prue Acton's farm in Avalon, we finished early one day and so decided to have a competition. There was Brian Gallop, Jackie McKiernan and myself. We decided to carry superphosphate bags on our backs. We went round the truck and trailer then it was the next person's turn. Then we tried two bags each one over each shoulder. After two bags, I thought I could carry 3 bags, a quarter of a tonne but I couldn't move my feet - so much for showing off!




