



Launch of "Help Yourself" Camapign

On Friday 10th of March I was pleased to launch a new campaign to drive down thefts of and from vehicles across Geelong including the Bellarine Peninsula.

The "Help Yourself" campaign will raise awareness about how drivers can help prevent thefts and protect their property from being

The City of Greater Geelong and the Bellarine Community Safety Group have collaborated to develop the campaign, with funding of \$16,000 from the Victorian Government.

There has been a significant increase in theft of and from cars on the Bellarine Peninsula recently. Fifty one per cent of these are from unlocked cars.

The Help Yourself campaign will encourage drivers to take simple steps including ensuring valuables are out of sight, cars are parked in well-lit and secure areas and vehicles locked

As part of the campaign, Victoria Police is also partnering with local Men's Sheds and other community groups to hold Safe Plate days throughout 2017, fitting number plates to vehicles using one-way screws, free of charge.

Posters, advertising and signs with crime prevention tips will be rolled out across the region on community noticeboards, shop windows and Neighbourhood Watch material, as well as online.

This will continue to build on the Bellarine Community Safety Group's work, including the recently launched bSafe website, which delivers crime prevention advice and tips to the Bellarine community.

New Jetty at Clifton Springs

I was recently pleased to open the new jetty at Clifton Springs that was built with a \$250,000 contribution from the State Government.

Previously there had been 2 wooden piers at the Clifton Springs boat ramp that were in a state of dis-repair and starting to fall down.

Over a number of years I had been made aware of the poor state of the old piers by local anglers and have been pleased to deliver what was a 2014 election commitment.

The 'all abilities' jetty is 2.9 metres wide and features a larger fishing area at the end to cater for more anglers. The jetty is a modular design so can then be extended into the future as need arises.

Forced to rest a lot I found myself with time on my hands. Television showed me a constant supply of depressing international news about wars, degrading environment, and political bickering. I refer in the book a lot to the parable "The Tragedy of the Commons" that shows with a simple story that the earth is finite. Maybe together we can find ways to pressure people of influence to ensure our grandkids and their grandkids still have a liveable environment.

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75th Anniversary of the Battle of Ambon

As we nearer to ANZAC Day may I make a plea - please remember the bravery and courage of the men who fought and died at the battle of Ambon and those who were captured and tried to live through the horrors of the most brutal POW camps of WW2. We all have knowledge of Tobruk, El Alamein, the Battle of the Coral Sea, the downfall of Singapore, the plight of the HMAS Sydney but Ambon does not instantly fly to mind yet the island's story is a special one, one that needs our thoughts and commemoration on this year, of the 75th anniversary.

"Worst Atrocities in History"

A quote from *Frank Forde* - (Minister for the Army and Deputy Prime Minister as well as member of the War Cabinet 1941-1946) (The Army News on Tuesday 18th of September 1945).

"The death rate on Ambon was far worse than for any Force on the Burma-Thailand Railway"

a quote from **Hank Nelson POW** ('Prisoners of War Australians Under Nipon, ABC Enterprises 1985 p. 96)

"History would record it as one of the worst massacres of the second World War"

quoting Roger Maynard (Ambon, Hachette, Australia 2014)

"Some of the highest casualty rates in military history"
Roger Maynard (prologue xv Ambon, Hachette, Australia 2014)

As you read these quotes there may be some confusion depending on your knowledge.

Have you ever heard of Ambon? Do you know where it is? What occurred to make it such a debacle and what occurred during the years 1942 to 1945 following the battle - what horrors were added to archival material through transcripts of 1946 Ambon War Crimes Trials?

Ambon is a tiny island in the Maluku Group, nearer to New Guinea than Java. In the war years it was part of the Dutch East Indies and strategically placed with a wide protected harbour and an airport. In 1941 the Australian Government sent Gull Force (2/21st battalion of 1100 men) to defend Ambon combining with a Dutch force who had established a base there. These Australians were tradesmen, mainly Victorians and had very little training in jungle war fare. The island was hot, humid and covered with thick jungle. The men had very little chance of defending as they had little backup and they were poorly equipped but they had in their minds that they were defending Australia and were the last line before Darwin and the coast.

It was a doomed case from the beginning. 20,000 battle hardened Japanese invaded the island on the 3rd February 1942 and the Australian and Dutch soldiers were captured. 300 Australians who defended the Laha Airport were massacred. Hands were bound with wire and the men were executed - bayoneted, clubbed or beheaded. Others were herded into a camp named Tan Touy. It is reported that 2,600 men entered Tan Touy being joined in 1943 by British POW from Borneo. The camp was the scene of shocking brutality. In some reports 75% of men perished others say 77%. Starvation, cruelty and denial of elementary medical aid was common.

In 1946 a War Crimes Court was set up in Ambon and 93 Japanese were tried. 36 Japanese were found guilty and 57 acquitted.

My name is Carole O'Neill and I have just returned from Ambon where I attended the ceremony marking 75 years since the Battle of Ambon. I was the only Australian at this ceremony.



Ambon War Cemetery; The story

Ambon Cemetery was not fully established for a length of time as during post war, the Indonesians were fighting their own battle for independence consequently access was denied to all overseas powers, it was not until the sixties when the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) gained permission to complete the cemetery and lay all to rest in the very beautiful site found today. The mammoth task of construction was completed 50 years ago this year. Major Keith Proctor MBE a works officer for the CWGC was sent to the remote island to complete this logistic challenge under great difficulties as described in letters that took months to reach Australia.

He mentioned "a basic diet, the heat and humidity of the equator, little contact with home, no contact with the outside world other than cables, only one other English speaking individual and the non-arrival of supplies and materials which meant longer in the task and a craving for luxuries like milk and butter. Living conditions were certainly uncomfortable. In December 1964, Major Proctor was forced by armed soldiers to leave Ambon and there followed years of negotiation and political discussion between Australian, British, Dutch and Indonesian governments. It wasn't until 1967 the work on Ambon could commence again still with many hardships." Once again due to the remoteness, this meant months away from family and a comfortable life style. There weren't hotels or accommodation places so an Indonesian hut that he built himself became home. It was for this work Major Proctor was awarded the MBE. Major Proctor was my father.

In December CWGC invited me to attend and speak at the Commemoration Service held in Ambon. In the heat of the morning I was joined by CWGC staff, representatives of British High Commission staff and many islanders from schools, churches and the community. The service will be treasured not only as a remembrance of my father but of the many men who are laid to rest here from Australia, Britain, Holland and one from the USA.

The Memorial also commemorates over 450 Australian soldiers and airmen who died in the region of Celebes and Molucca Islands who have no known grave.

I was stunned by the beauty of the gardens and the memorial and over whelmed by the kindness of the Indonesians. The Cross of Sacrifice stands no more as in 1998 it was destroyed by extremists but the stone of memorial survives. Around this memorial stone we of many faiths remembered those lives who were given in sacrifice.

The choir's challenge for 2017 is to have a year of consolidation; plans are in place to learn new repertoire, polish songs that have been on the 'back burner ' for a while, and to sing more of their repertoire by heart.

Musical Director, Joy Porter says that "connection with our audiences is vital to make our music interesting and relevant to those who attend our concerts and who hear us in other forums. That connection is enhanced when the choir sing without the use of musical scores. "

During my journey as a kinship carer over 12 years for my grand daughter I have met some wonderful people. I have won a trip to Hobart (pretty exciting for someone who had never been on a plane), I have been to terrific places and I have had more than one steep learning curve. But during the past 12 years times have also been tough. Being a kinship carer is at times heartbreaking, because as a kinship carer you are torn for the love of your children/child and the deep love for your grandchildren/child.

The reasons that grandchildren come to live with their grandparents can vary from case to case. Most kinship carers find themselves in financial hardship, after working most of their adult lives, some are forced to continue working to support the grandchildren in their care. Those kinship carers that rely totally on Centrelink to survive are living below the poverty line, but they know in their hearts that their grandchildren need them to care for

The numbers of kinship carers is now about 4 times as many as foster carers.

Every day grandparents are called upon to take on the role of parents, and studies have shown the kinship carers are aged over 60 years, most are single and most rely on Centrelink to put food on the table.

If you are a kinship carer, you are not alone. Come along to our next meeting, have some fun, laugh a little, cry a lot but more importantly meet others who understand.

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


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Free Document Signing Service

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Long forgotten Mannerim Soldiers Memorial



There is a long forgotten Soldiers Memorial situated in Swan Bay Road, Mannerim (on your left, Just passed the railway line, heading to Swan Bay) it was started a long time ago, never finished and had since fallen into decay. It was originally set up in memorial for all then local soldiers who volunteered for WW1 in and around the local area (Mannerim, Swan Bay, Marcus Hill, St Leonards) A local farmer took ownership of the site in 2012 and started to repair it, but unfortunately, he became ill and never completed then project. Since that time, the site has stood abandoned and inactive, resulting in it becoming overgrown and people using it for a dumping ground. The site has now passed into the hands of the Bellarine Landcare Group, who are valiantly trying to re-establish the site and complete the original project. I am looking for volunteers from the station to assist me, Mick KNIGHT and a few others, by donating their own time, over the next, say perhaps 12 months to help the BLG. I think this would be a wonderful opportunity to become involved with something that is important and worthwhile within our own local community. When I mentioned our possible assistance with the BLG Mngt. They were over the moon, literally, calling us their Blue Angels, never been called that before, but it sounded pretty good.

The idea would be to all request a RD during the week, go down to the site, do whatever is required, until the site is re-established. If you think you can assist / help with anything, labour, trade skills, machinery, catering, anything, it would be greatly appreciated.



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


Woodies Work Wonders

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If you want to give your tastebuds a treat and reduce your environmental footprint, I reckon you can't go past fresh salad from the garden. Those bags of mixed salad leaves from the supermarket are energy intensive (packaging, refrigeration, transportation) and they taste pretty ho-hum. After a couple of days in the fridge they're only good for worm food.

Trouble is, if you want to grow traditional lettuce varieties in the warmer months, you have to be quick: blink and they've gone to seed, or become tough and bitter through water stress. Fortunately there are lots of delicious alternatives. Here are a few of my favourites. Most of them are perennials which need little care once established.



Sorrel (French and sheep sorrel) is a perennial salad vegetable, producing lots of pointed green leaves which have a tangy, slightly citrus taste. French sorrel can suffer from water stress and needs to be grown in light shade; sheep sorrel is a lot hardier, and has small, delicious leaves.



Salad burnet is a short-lived perennial and will grow well in a pot. Its toothed leaves have a mild cucumber taste and are great when mixed with other salad leaves or sprinkled generously on cheese sandwiches. To pick the small leaves, snip off the whole stalk and run your fingers up it to strip the leaves off.



Wild rocket (arugula) has narrow, peppery leaves. It can be hotter than the normal salad rocket but I think it tastes far better. Let it go to seed and it will happily pop up in any odd cracks in the pavement. If you don't want it to spread, it's easy to pull up – but why wouldn't you want it all over your garden? The bees love the little yellow flowers (which you can also eat).

Leafy herbs add a bit of zing to a salad: mint, coriander and parsley are my favourites. Be careful to keep mint contained, because it will spread if you let it. Coriander and parsley will both self-seed readily and the flowers are great for attracting beneficial insects such as hoverflies.









Edible flowers look classy in a salad and taste great too. My all-time favourite has to be nasturtiums: both the flowers and the leaves are delicious and peppery. The seeds can be pickled to use like capers. Brassica (broccoli etc) flowers are tasty too. Borage flowers taste like cucumber (but the bees love them so much, I feel mean picking too many of them). There are lots of other edible flowers, but I'll leave it to you to do some research. Positive identification is important, as some flowers in your garden are definitely not edible!

Bouquet garni

A bouquet garni is a bundle of aromatic herbs. The bouquet garni (French for "garnished bouquet") is a little bunch of herbs tied with string and used in soup, stock, and stews.

The bouquet is cooked with the other ingredients and taken out just before serving.

There is no actual recipe for bouquet garni. Most recipes include thyme and bay leaf. It may also include parsley, basil, chervil, rosemary, sage, and tarragon. Celery leaves or celeriac, leek, onion and parsley root may be included in a bouquet.

I was in a local supermarket a couple of years ago and a customer was asking for BAY LEAVES. The shop assistant looked blankly at her and said something like "if it's not on the shelf we don't have it". I felt like telling them I've got a tree at home!

I'd like to share how easy they are to grow and how fantastic the flavour is in a marinade, pasta sauce, roast or stew. Even dessert!

Bay leaves are native to the Mediterranean. The bay leaf has a long and distinguished history. Historically bay leaves were woven into crowns or wreaths and given to champion athletes or heroes. Bay leaves are a symbol of prosperity, honour and fame in biblical times and stories of myth. Still to this day wreaths are worn by graduates of universities all over the world. This is a symbol of success when students have passed exams and hope to be starting a new and successful life in the work force.

At the local nursery the bay laurel shrub is available in pots to plant at home and supply your friends and family! It is an evergreen tree or shrub which grows as tall as 18-20 metres (60 feet) tall in full sun or part shade and in well drained soil. Shrubs may be used to make an amazing and edible hedge such as at Yering Station in the Yarra Valley.

Once the leaves are harvested and dried they are used in cooking. Fresh bay laurel leaves are not commonly used. The flavour emerges after air drying for a few weeks. The leaves can be taken off the stem and stored in a jar or airtight container. Bay leaves are available at the local supermarket in the herb section for about a dollar for 10 grams.

Dried Bay Leaves in recipes:

Just one or two bay leaves are enough to change the flavour of marinade for meat, fish or chicken. Leaves can be rolled up in a leg of lamb or inside the chicken with lemon and other herbs.


A couple of bay leaves in a jar with vinegar for pickling vegetables or olives to enhance the flavours.

In a slow cooked meat sauce for pasta, bay leaf may be added for about half an hour or so. If making soup, risotto or stews the bay leaf adds a pungent flavour of herbs and spices.

And for dessert... a couple of leaves to infuse in milk for custard or when making rice pudding.

Remember to remove the leaves just before serving.

Bowling Champion - Rhys Jeffs


