
### ANZAC DAY 2018

### News from Lisa Neville MP Member for Bellarine

### **Power Outage Reimbursements**

The power outage to the Bellarine on Sunday the 28th of January was unacceptable and I understand the frustration many people felt at losing power on such a hot day.

This situation was not good enough and I welcome the news that several crews worked that night to restore supply.

I took your feedback and I discussed the issue with the Office of the Minister for Energy.

We have worked with the private power distribution companies to deliver a \$5 million heat relief package for thousands of customers affected by this extreme weather event.

Ordinarily customers would only be entitled to compensation under the Guaranteed Services Level if power supply is lost for 12-18 hours.

However under the arrangement agreed to by the private power distribution companies customers will receive a one off payment of \$80 if they were off supply for between 3 and 20 hours.

This compensation will be entirely funded by the private power distribution companies who will not recover the cost of this package from customers.

Eligible customers should have been reimbursed by the end of February.

If anyone who is eligible for the payment and has not yet received it or is having difficulty with such, please contact my office.

### **Festival of Glass**

Once again, another successful Festival of Glass has just been held. Every year the

festival, now in its 8th year, grows from strength to strength.

Unfortunately, for the first time in many I was unable to get to the festival due to other commitments on the Bellarine.

However, I am reliably assured that the event was very well organised, well attended and that displays were up to their usual high standards. One cannot help but feel in awe of the talents of our glass artists.

It was also great to see that Mauro Vianello from Italy continued the trend of Italian glass masters visiting the festival. The festival now has a real international flavour to it.

My congratulations go to all those people who have been involved in the festival this year and for many the last eight years. No doubt plans and work are now well underway for 2019.

Also thank you to all those important sponsors, especially our community based organisations including Lions, Rotary and the Drysdale Clifton Springs Community Association.

And last but certainly not least, thank you to all those people who volunteered their time on the day. Without your assistance the show would not go on.

### Mannerim and Portarlington CFA Announcements

I know all readers would agree that our Bellarine CFA brigades do a magnificent job in protecting our communities.

As local member I am always pleased to assist and support our brigades wherever possible.



In recent weeks I had the opportunity to visit both the Mannerim and Portarlington brigades.

At Mannerim, it was pleasing to hand over the keys of a new 1400 litre tanker to members.

Funding for the tanker came via a \$200,000 State Government grant and \$36,000 raised by the local brigade through sausage sizzles, garage sales and community donations.

At Portarlington, I had the pleasure of turning the sod of the new station, replacing the previous station built in 1959.

The new station is thanks to the ongoing hard work and commitment of the local brigade members, together with a \$2.1 million grant from the State Government.

To both Mannerim and Portarlington brigades I say thank you, as I do to all our brigades and their dedicated members.

# 1948 Drysdale Branch of the Country Women's Association of Victoria was born.



The first meeting was held on Tuesday afternoon March 23rd 1948. Mrs. Hunter, President of the Portarlington branch chaired the meeting. Group President Mrs. Noble and members of Portarlington and Geelong branches attended. Twenty-seven prospective members were present. Mrs. Noble explained the CWA aims and objects. Following discussion, voting took place and the Drysdale Branch was formed. There were 45 members by

November. Thus, began a rich history of friendship, fun, caring, sharing and community service. A member since 1948, Florrie Beck shares her vast knowledge and is our catering convenor.

This year in March we celebrated our 70th Birthday, – 70 years of friendship, fun, social days, craft days, catering, awareness of social issues, supporting the community, as well as personal development. We have assisted thousands of families and organisations during the

years and this is ongoing.

We are part of the largest women's organisation in Australia – all volunteers. There are branches in each state. It is a non-political and non-sectarian organisation for all city and country women. The Association was founded in Victoria in 1928 and quickly spread. There are over 6,000 members – this year the 90th birthday is celebrated.

We receive requests from organisations for assistance and provide money and goods. To name a few; Cottage by the Sea, knitted/ crochet rugs, knee rugs, knitted slippers and scarfs, head bands and beanies, Jetty Road Food bank, pamper packs and canned food, Special Needs Nursery at University Hospital Geelong, knitted and crocheted clothing and rugs for premature babies, outdoor activity programs at

the primary schools, CFA, SES, and Guides. Last year, we supplied the Drysdale Girls Junior football team with their jumpers complete with the CWA logo and Drysdale name.

- We sponsor the cookery section of the Bellarine show and provide volunteers to assist on the day.
- · We raise funds by catering, sausage sizzles and street stalls. There is a small group of ladies who make knitted and crochet items for us they are the Friends of CWA.
- Social activities sausage sizzles, birthdays, outing to Sorrento, afternoon teas at local venues, movies, fashion parades, Christmas lunch, and visits to other branches.

# Students inspired by Anne Drysdale & Caroline Newcomb on International Women's Day

Recently, on Internaional Women's Day, fifteen girls who are leaders at Clifton Springs PS and Ms Parker (Principal), Mr McCredden (Assistant Principal), Captains Dianne and Peter Hobbs (Salvation Army) travelled to the Coriyule Mansion in Curlewis.

The Coriyule Mansion is owned by Isobel and her husband Bryce. As we arrived we were greeted by two dogs but that wasn't the exciting part. We had a quick introduction to the mansion and some photos and headed into the 170 year old mansion. As we walked around we were amazed to find the mansion in such great condition. We sat and listened to Isobel tell us about the history of Anne Drysdale and Caroline Newcomb, and how they farmed the land and built the mansion. Captain Diane Hobbs reminded us how lucky we are to have an education when so many girls around the world are stopped from going to school. She reminded us about a great future we have ahead of us.





# Part Two Questions you always wanted to ask a person with Autism.

Hannah, 31, often gets asked questions about living with autism – and sometimes they are a little curly to answer!

Autism can be a different experience from person to person, but to break down the stigma of autism, Hannah is answering some of the curly questions she gets asked most often.







### What about relationships? Are they hard for you?

I am choosey about my friends because making friends and having friends is hard – it takes an awful lot of brain energy for me and it's easy for me to get burnt out.

Same thing for romantic relationships – I haven't had one because I am really choosy. I want to make the right choice because it's going to take a lot of effort

I'd love to be married, I'd love to have kids. But I'm happy to wait. I'm not good with the communication or emotional side of stuff, so I'm going to need a guy who can help me with that. But they're hard to find!

### Do you get sensory overload?

Yes I definitely do! Smoke always gets me, and so do strong fumes.

I've also got to be careful about what products I use around the house – sometimes I've given myself overload by putting on underarm deodorant.

### What does sensory overload feel like?

Imagine being in a room that is filled with people. And all these people are pressed up against you so you can't move - you're feeling their arms and their legs all over you.

And then, imagine it's also really hot so you're sweating. You want to get out and you're starting to shake. All of a sudden super loud music starts playing and the lights start flashing all at the same time. Wouldn't that make you panic?

When it happens to me, my autistic wall comes up. It takes all my

concentration to breathe. I can see and understand everything going on around me, I cannot communicate that though. I have learnt to wait it out until I am no longer a prisoner in my own body and my autistic wall comes down

Also, if I am standing still with a blank look on my face, please don't touch me. I can't handle it and it will take longer for the wall to come down!

### Do you need to stick to a routine?

I do personally like to follow a routine. I have supports on a Tuesday and a Thursday and I have those supports at the same time. Having appointments at the same time each week is how I learn. It's how I know how to predict life. It's how I can handle life.

If that changes, I am like AAAGGGHHH.... It throws me, it makes me uncomfortable, and it has made me panic in the past.

If my routine does change, I need to prepare - I am quite famous for not turning up to stuff if it's a change in routine. I have to keep reminding myself for the whole week beforehand. If I have to get up at 6 am one day this week, I need to keep reminding myself that it Is 6 am on Thursday, to both keep the anxiety at bay, and make sure that I don't just sleep in and not go!

The young child equivalent of this would be asking the same question over and over and over and OVER again! Not because the child does not know the answer but because they need the same one to battle their anxiety, and feel safe and secure.

## A blessing or a curse?

Anyone who has had the responsibility of caring for an autistic child knows how challenging it can be. But are there as yet unrecognised gifts in this disorder?

Paediatric speech pathologist Suzy Miller in her book 'Awesomism!: A new way to understand the diagnosis of autism' views autism not as a problem or mystery, but as a gift. Suzy pioneered a shift in the perception of autism from an individual "disorder" to a collective revolution in human consciousness. She talks about people on the spectrum as being multi-dimensional beings who communicate with each other, and her, telepathically.

### A far cry from the everyday perception of people on the spectrum!

In 2013 Suzy teamed with internationally respected physicist, Professor William Tiller, to run the Autism Intention Broadcast Project. This involves simultaneously sending 'information healing' to multiple recipients around the globe, with significant results. For more information: https://goo.gl/AVJcYX

There are really exciting things happening in medicine at the moment. According to Dr Nisha Manek, MD, FACP, F.R.C.P. (UK): we are entering the age of 'Information Medicine'. Here's a fascinating review of the work so far: https://goo.gl/fgsFuq

Now hang on a minute you say, that's a bit far fetched. Well consider the fact that medicine has, for several decades now, recognised the mind/body connection - psychoneuroimmunology as it's called.

Indeed, optimal wellness requires balance at all levels - body, mind and spirit. According to Tiller there is a cascade of healing effects from spirit to information medicine to energy medicine to chemical medicine.







much more intact. My parents Robert (Bob) and Laura Whitcombe would swim around inside to explore the old vessel, try to get a glimpse of some of the underwater sea-life, plant and coral growth, but hoping not to see a stingray. As a child I was not allowed to wade out that deep, but as a teenager, my brother Alan and I had a lot of fun diving into the paddle steamer in the summer months.

As we became teenage men, the calm waters of the bay were not quite as appealing as the glorious white rolling waves of Ocean Grove. Alan and I would ride our bikes from Bellarine to Ocean Grove to go body surfing. Mind you, the roads were not bitumen as they are today, but gravel, so we also had to circumnavigate the tree stumps and roots along the way. We were so keen on the body surfing, our father made us wooden surfboards out of an old piano box; they were a bit crude, but they did the job.

My brother loved speed, he could run fast and was a maniac on his bike. Alan had a racing bike, but I was a little more docile. I had an



old second-hand bike with a clutch and foot brake. As a young child I had Rheumatic Fever, so everything in my life had to be slow, with no fast moves. Unfortunately, Alan got caught up in a rut in the road one day going to work on the farm in Whitcombes Road. He had a bad fall on one of the hills of Bellarine and broke his arm in many places, sadly there was no surfing for us for a while. At that time in our lives we lived at Spray Farm in Bellarine, but that's another story for another day...... Story told by Ian Whitcombe and penned by

My nieces gave me this lovely bright watercolour painting of the "Old Ozone Wreck in Sunset" which is situated at Indented Head, for my 92nd Birthday, painted by Eileen Jenkins. They purchased it at the SpringDale Artshow in January, unfortunately I didn't recognize it as I now suffer from short term memory loss. The girls gave me the picture as every time they take me to Indented Head, it seems I always ask if the "Old Ozone Wreck" is still there. I remember it very differently in my mind, as what it is today.

In 1925, a few months before I was born, the Ozone Paddle Steamer Ferry which had previously been decommissioned, was scuttled and towed to Indented Head. It was intended as a breakwater, but on the day it was towed, the winds were very strong and the towing company lost control. The Paddle Steamer slew parallel to the foreshore rather than vertical, and got lodged in sand and there it lays. Even though I was born not long after it was sunk there, I remember as a child it being very long and having walls and was

CITRUS ne year group cit



Leaf Miner can be a problem for new citrus growth at this time of year. To avoid stimulating new growth it's best to avoid cutting citrus trees at all in late Summer

and Autumn. However, if you are seeing damage, use CLM traps (traps the male moth) and use Eco-Oil spray over and under leaves. If your tree is not too big you can trim back affected growth and dispose, though you will need to keep doing this until the cooler weather.

Watch out for Ants as they carry Scale on to your citrus. Let scale get out of hand and before you know it Sooty Mould is in control. Prevent these secondary problems by keeping ants off your tree using a horticultural barrier glue around the base of the trunk. Instead of putting the glue directly on the trunk we've had good success with using duct tape wrapped around to form about a 20cm wide barrier. Using a spatula of some kind you can then spread the glue over the tape. Be careful not to put it on too thick as it can run in warm weather. If you find ants are sneaking under the tape you can overlap the glue on to the trunk just enough to stop them. Trim all low branches such that none touch the ground and remove all weeds or grass at least to the drip line of the tree and mulch.

Control Scale or Sooty Mould (usually appears on the east side of a tree) infestation with Eco-Oil spray on the underside of affected leaves and branches. Remove any dead fruit still on the tree. Cut out branches affected by the woody swellings caused by Gall Wasp and burn or dispose in the rubbish.

Healthy trees are less affected so remembering to feed them 3 to 4 times per year is an important step. Citrus are hungry things and periods of heavy rain can leach nutrients, particularly in sandy soils. Feed with slow release or pelletised manure according to directions, blood and bone, layer compost or worm castings under mulch and let the microbes and worms do the work to avoid damaging precious roots through having to weed manually.



### Mixed Paella

4 cloves Garlic 1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil Chicken (optional) chorizo (optional) 1 red onion, chopped finely about 10 sprigs of thyme 1 green & 1 red capsicum, diced 1 jar tomato passata salt & pepper to taste 400g rice 1 litre fish stock 1/2 litre vege stock 400 g cleaned calamari pieces 1/2 kg cubed firm fish, like blue eye about 1 cup peas 12 large prawns 12 mussels 500g clams (optional) 1/2 cup chopped parsley pinch of saffron lemon wedges (optional)


- · Place a big pan on low heat with olive oil and garlic.
- Add chicken pieces, stir fry until golden. Remove from pan.



- · Add the chorizo pieces, stir fry until just browning.
- · Add the onion and stir briefly.
- Add the thyme and stir fry to soften the onions.
- Add the red and green capsicum and season with salt/pepper.
- Stir fry and cook for 10 minutes.
- Add the cooked chicken/chorizo and stir fry all together a couple of minutes.
- · Add half the tomato passata and stir in, then cook for a few minutes more.
- · Add the rice and stir well.
- Add the fish stock mixed with the remainder of the tomato passata and the peas.
- Mix the saffron in with vege stock and put aside.
- · Add the seafood starting with calamari and
- · Place the prawns neatly on top and add the saffron stock mixture.
- Top with the mussels and clams and simmer until the shells have opened.
- · Add chopped parsley and cover the paella with a lid for the last 5-10 minutes of cooking.
- Turn off the heat and allow 15 minutes or so before serving.

Serve with lemon wedges if desired and fresh salad and of course... fresh crusty bread.

### Drysdale Bowling Club - A History....cont'd Chapter Eight

At the Annual Meeting held on the 4th of June 1990, the Croquet Club was formally amalgamated with the Bowling Club and the new entity thus created became "The Drysdale Bowling and Croquet Club Inc."

Unfortunately, there are no written records available between 1990 and 2003 to verify the activities of the Club however, there were obviously a great number of events which took place during this period keeping the Club both socially and financially viable.

In 2003 long discussions were held about the playing surfaces. It was suggested that artificial turf could be the answer to the massively increased water bills because of the long drought and severe water restrictions. Hand watering of the greens was a lengthy and arduous process undertaken by a few very

willing members.

Due to unforeseen circumstances about this time, a higher than usual financial outlay occurred but the Club maintained its financial health although having to curtail the purchase of some wanted items. A watering system for the bowling greens was installed at a cost of \$10,000, a roller grille and a safe, were installed in the bar area and a showcase was donated to display the historic Bell used to start and finish play. This Bell was given to the club by "Digger" Warren, a Queenscliff fisherman. It is said to be from "The Times" sailing ship shipwrecked on the Corsair Reef many years ago.

In September 2006, the City of Greater Geelong gave a grant of \$7,000 for a pop-up sprinkler system for the Croquet greens and as time went on more discussions took place re changing the Bowling greens to synthetic surfaces, the costs being approximately \$150,000 per green. Four different models were mooted, these being

- 1. Retain two grass greens
- 2. One grass and one synthetic green
- 3. Two synthetic greens
- 4. One grass and one Tift-dwarf green.

Synthetics cost approximately \$170,000 each and will last 8 years, Tift-dwarf cost approximately \$40k to \$50,000 and last about 26 years. The vote was in favour of retaining two grass greens.
