Remembrance Day Has a Special Significance in 2018

One hundred years ago on 11 November 1918, four bloody years of brutal conflict came to an end. Almost 62,000 Australians died fighting for our freedom and in service of our nation. Sunday, 11 November 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the Armistice which ended the First World War (1914–18).

In the four years of the war more than 330,000 Australians served overseas including 33 men and one woman from the Drysdale District. The social effects of these losses cast a long shadow over the postwar decades.

To commemorate the centenary of the Armistice that ended the First World, the Drysdale RSL Sub Branch will hold a Remembrance Day Ceremony at the Drysdale Cenotaph. The Ceremony will include a formal wreath laying and poppy laying service, and will begin with a march from the Drysdale CFA forecourt with step off at 10.15am.

As is customary each year on this day, we will observe one minute's silence at 11am, in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts.

Armistice Centenary Community Gathering

The Drysdale RSL Sub Branch, together with the Springdale Neighbourhood Centre, is holding a FREE family event



following the Drysdale Remembrance Ceremony. This gathering is to enable us as a community to acknowledge the sacrifice made by so many, and to celebrate the peace and freedom we enjoy today as a result of their sacrifice and service.

Activities will include: Live Family Entertainment, a Massed Poppy Display (the Poppy is a symbol of remembrance and of peace), Sausage Sizzle (Uncle Bob's Club), Face Painting, Animal Nursery, Tour RSL Rooms (includes CWA Banner on Display, Memorabilia Display, Model of a WW1 Australian Train used in France), Military Memorabilia expert on hand to appraise items "Antique Road Show" style, military history presentations, to name a few.

Also, with the kind assistance of the Geelong Cemetery Trust, three large 20 metre poppies will be painted on the Drysdale Cemetery hillocks adjoining Clifton Springs Road in early November.

So, come along on Sunday 11th November for the Remembrance Day Ceremony and the Armistice Centenary Community Gathering!!

Coordinator's News

"Whether you think you can or think you can't, you

are right." Henry Ford (1863-1947). This quote helps to inspire my life. I try not to be foolish about what I can do but I do continue to expand our horizons based on what we have been able to achieve together.

Over the last few months we have been working on a sewing project - 2 kilometres of bunting sounds like a lot to try to make, but for some reason it didn't scare me. I was happy that we had been asked to make as I believed we had been selected because of our *can do attitude*. I was surprised to discover many other groups had been asked but rejected the opportunity.

We have cut 2.5km of fabric, we are in the process of sewing 8km of rolled hem edging, 2 km of zigzag sewing, gluing 9360 triangle points and checking 40 lengths of 50m long bunting. As I write, we still have approximately 30 days and 30 lengths still to complete but I am sure we can achieve this project. As I type I hear the beautiful sound of an overlocking working. Just in case we need a little help near the end of this last sprint and you have some of the skills listed – feel free to offer!

Some people seem overwhelmed by the prospect of tackling something like this but we have trialled and tested our ideas along the way and sought expert help and learned from each step. We see this as an opportunity and a number of people so far have gained valuable overlocking experience. So if you need bunting for an event or a party, you might think about asking SpringDale.

Another creative activity which will happen this month is the painting of 3 x 20m wide poppies on the Drysdale Cemetery paddock in Clifton Springs Road. If you have been following our progress in previous editions, a few of us have been trialling painting poppies on grass and the Geelong Cemetery Trust have been preparing the paddock for us. If you would like to be part of our community art attack, please let SpringDale know we are aiming to paint very early in the month -Saturday 3 November but we would love to hear from you if you would like to help with this or any other art attack that happens along.

The poppies that Robyn Kane planted for us at the side of SpringDale started to flower a month ago and are bringing many people joy. Thanks Robyn and your team for all your efforts. Hoping to see you at the Remembrance Day event near Drysdale RSL and SpringDale on Sunday 11 November.

Finally hoping everyone might have time to attend SpringDale's annual general meeting on Monday 12 November at 5pm – we have Major Roads Projects Authority staff coming to talk and show information about the Drysdale Bypass.

Works Commence on Drysdale Child and Family Centre

I had the pleasure of turning the first sod of the \$13,320,000 Drysdale Integrated Child and Family Centre. The new centre which will increase capacity at the kindergarten and vastly improve its facilities.

This includes a long day child care facility, a four year old kindergarten, a maternal child health consulting suite, a multipurpose and consultation room, a toy library and parent lounge.

Construction is expected to finish in December 2019, meaning local families with young children can access the service by February 2020.

The State Government provided \$1.6 million for the project, with the City of Greater Geelong contributing \$11,720,000.

I am very pleased that the State Government is investing in first-rate early childhood facilities across Victoria, including in Drysdale, so local children can access great local kindergartens with first-rate facilities.

Modern centres like this one now under construction in Drysdale are extremely important because having such facilities does make a big difference to children's lives.

Update on current works at Clifton Springs Boat Harbour

The upgrade of Clifton Springs Boat Harbour continues with more works recently completed or now underway.

The existing 35-metre jetty is being extended by 38 metres and works are scheduled for completion in time for Christmas holidays. In addition, a new floating pontoon has been installed on the west side of the new boat ramp.



A dual level boardwalk will be installed on the west side of the jetty and will also be completed in time for Christmas holidays.

Importantly during the ongoing works, the community will still be able to access the car park, jetty and both the eastern and western boat ramps. However, one of the three slipways on the eastern boat ramp will be temporarily closed.

When completed the facility will be a great jetty and harbor for both local anglers and visitors alike.

history and understand the ways in which their people used the land," Mr Price said. The 30,000 artefacts found so far include:

- tools (used for hunting, cutting and scraping)
- hearths (remnants of campfires including charcoal and ash)
- middens (the remains of meals shared between Aboriginal people, represented as shell deposits, often from sea life).

Wadawurrung elder, Uncle Bryon Powell said that this is something that hasn't been done before.

"By getting school kids involved, it means that they can get a bit more history about this land that they now call home," Uncle Bryon said. Work on the Drysdale Bypass started in October 2018.

Bellarine Support Group for **Kinship Carers**

A lot of people often ask me why grandparents care full time for their grandchildren. My reply is and will always be simply "love for our grandkids, we cannot see them without a family to care for them".

The reason why children are removed from the care of their parents vary. The main reasons are related to drugs, mental illness and alcohol issues.

There are two categories of kinship care:-.

First those children removed from their parents by Department of Health and Human Services - child protection - and placed in the care of relatives mostly grandparents. These carers are referred to as Statutory Carers. Carers under this category are paid an allowance from Department of Health and Human Services to cover financial expenses for the children.

But on the other hand, some parents realise that they cannot care for their own children and take the children to stay with relatives and basically the biological parents never return. These carers are often referred to as Non-Statutory Carers, and receive no financial assistance from Department of Health and Human Services for the children in their care.

Non-Statutory Carers are struggling financially year after year. The only assistance Non-Statutory Carers receive is Centrelink - but only once the biological parents have notified Centrelink of change of care of the children.

If you are a kinship carer we would love to see you and support you in your journey as a kinship carer.

Our meetings are held on Mondays at SpringDale every month.

Meeting dates for 2018: 5th November and last meeting for 2018 will be held on 3rd December. Time: 10 am to 1pm. Please bring a snack to share.

Roundabouts

Roundabouts are a special type of intersection. There are a few on the Bellarine Peninsula and they are a great way to keep traffic flowing. The basic rule is simple – give way to any vehicle that is already on the roundabout.

As at any intersection, you need to signal your intension - left if you're turning left; right if you're turning right; no signal if you are driving straight ahead.

In a multi-lane road, if you are turning left then you should approach in the left hand lane. Similarly, if you're turning right you should be in the right hand lane. You may go straight ahead from any lane unless that lane is marked with an arrow indicating the direction to turn. Stay in the same lane right around the roundabout and into the road you plan to

Always give way to vehicles already in the roundabout. In this diagram, the red B vehicles must give way to the green A vehicles. Enter only when there is a safe gap in the traffic.

take. If practical, you should signal left just before you exit. In Europe, most motorists will signal as soon as they clear the exit before the one they plan to take. It is important that your signals are unambiguous.

Cyclists and horse riders have the option of using the left hand lane when they are turning right but they must give way to vehicles leaving the roundabout.

In an earlier article on pedestrian priority, it was noted that roundabouts are a special type of intersection. The rule to give way to pedestrians crossing the road you are turning into does not apply. However, you still need to be aware of pedestrians and pedestrians need to take special care when they are crossing a road at a roundabout.

There will be a boardwalk that will provide walking access around and preservation of the heritage Springs Site that gave Clifton Springs its name.

This will provide a continuous foreshore walk from The Dell to Edgewater Drive enabling people to enjoy Clifton Springs' beautiful beaches more easily and safely.

Drysdale Railway Station.

You may notice that Drysdale Railway Station is looking more attractive with new decking and some new paint.

Many thanks to Doug Carson and DCSCA volunteers for organizing and completing this valuable work on this Drysdale Icon.

Clifton Springs Jetty / Fishing Platform.

Visitors to the Clifton Springs Boat Harbour will notice that the Jetty is being increased in length and that improvements to the harbour are progressing.

Bypass.

DCSCA met with members of Major Road Projects Authority who are in charge of building the Bypass.

Some items of note: -

Work has started. The roads will be constructed first and the intersections later.

In line with a DCSCA submission to the

Hearing Panel the pedestrian underpass under the bypass is to be increased in size (to 8m wide by 3m wide).

SpringDale has applied to become an Approved Child Care Provider. For almost 30 years we have provided licensed child care and for a few years we provided approved Vacation Care, now we are heading into the Approved Occasional Care space. Until 1 July our Occasional Care service was one of a very limited number of Child Care Services which was ineligible for Child Care Rebates and Benefits. After surveying the families using our service, we decided to apply to enable our families the benefit of the Government's new Child Care Subsidy and we are close to being an Approved provider.

Being able to offer Occasional Care places which are eligible for Child Care Subsidy will hopefully help many more families and give our current families more opportunities.

I was excited a number of years ago when I received a notice from the Government saying that Child Care Rebates were available to all families and all Child Care Services and the very small print said except for us, but now we will be able to provide exactly the same benefits along with the service we have provided for so many years.

If you are thinking about Occasional Care for next year, please consider SpringDale Occasional Care. It is a very small service with a homely feel.

Memories of Gesteryear

The Whitcombe Walk - Robert (Bob) Whitcombe Part one cont.....



About three months before his 19th birthday (16th of June 1915), Bob enlisted in the A.I.F. He served in Egypt, Gallipoli, Sinai, France & Belgium. While fighting in Belgium, he was stricken with Trench Fever and hospitalised in France & London. Bob was put on Gallipoli just prior to our men retreating. He would often say how polite the Turk's were, letting them just walk away. Bob was discharged in Melbourne on the 8th December 1916. His hip joints were to deteriorate throughout his life, both being badly worn; in the end one leg was 4" shorter than the other. This caused him an immense amount of pain, however I cannot recall him ever complaining and he would only speak of it, if questioned.

His Discharge Certificate shows, service abroad 415 days, a total of 542 days. This included time spent recuperating in London & at Geelong Hospital where he met his wifeto-be Laura Purnell. In this brief time of active service, he achieved the rank of Corporal.

During his absence from home, his father died.

With the war over, both Bob & brother Jack were married in 1920. My father married my mother Laura Purnell at the Baptist Church in Geelong. They honeymooned in Port Fairy. Bob had a five-roomed house built, alongside the old family home - it cost 450 pounds. It was built by Bill Hines of Drysdale. He had a verbal agreement with the family that after the mother's death, he could buy the areas left in the Will to Harry & Bart. My grandmother Mary died at home in 1925, and was nursed by my mother during her last illness.

Bob attempted to make life a little easier



for himself by keeping a flock of hens. This venture was a disaster. So, when my Grandfathers estate was settled soon after my birth in 1926, this and the conditions of the Will made it impossible to carry out the consolidation of estate as planned. He was caught in a bind, where in trying to do the best for his aged mother, he had built his house on land that he could now never own. To be continued....

Community donation gives old gym lith you for life equipment new life

The activity and gymnasium space at Bellarine Community Health's Portarlington site has had a major upgrade of equipment thanks to generous community support from the Portarlington & Drysdale Community® bank branches and the BCH Portarlington Ladies Auxiliary.

Ageing and mismatched equipment acquired over many years has been replaced with modern new equipment suitable for the many groups that use the gym space.

"This funding allows BCH to enhance their programs which benefits our community, and we want to thank our customers because it's their ongoing support that enables us to be able to give back to the community," she said. New exercise bikes and elliptical equipment with consistent information screens have been purchased along with a new water resistance rowing machine with seat height extensions and two multi-function weight trainers. Smaller items suitable for use by people of all ages and abilities have also been added to the range of exercise equipment. BCH is looking into how the space may also be used by the community.

The equipment upgrade allows BCH to enhance its current range of programs including establishing a specific series of workshops targeted at people living with type 2 diabetes.

The workshops called 'EMPOWER' are a combination of education and exercise sessions to help people to self-manage their diabetes effectively. The sessions will cover areas such as food choices, wellbeing, oral health, motivation and peer support as well education about diabetes.

GOLF GOSSIP By COEE.

Clifton Springs - the Cinderella of Victorian seaside golf-links - was the elect of followers of the royal and ancient game last Saturday. Beautifully situated high up on the cliffs overlooking Corio Bay, these links have so many natural advantages! that will rival Flinders, Sorrento, Barwon Heads, and other older courses. An excellent hotel, with genial and attentive host and hostess, good seabathing, and every sort of sulphur, electro, and other baths in the hotel, form extra attractions to the tired and weary golfer, ... [with] Mr. Llewellyn Jones, the energetic and obliging masseur. The mineral springs are also an important feature of the surroundings, and, if a player fails badly in negotiating "Spion Kop" or the "Modder River" ravine, he can take to drinking the waters with beneficial effect. The course, laid out by "Dick" Banks, the well-known professional, possesses some fine features. It reminds one very much of Flinders, with the exception that turf at the Springs becomes somewhat baked and hard in dry weather. The late autumn, early spring, or even winter, would see the course at its

best. Some of the holes along the cliffside are full of interest, and require a lot of playing if one wishes to return a good card. "Spion Kop" and "Niagara" holes are almost a facsimile of their namesakes at Flinders, whilst the "Modder River" hole is an improvement on their "ravine." The club's Initial open meeting [had] some 50 visitors, entering two events,... played concurrently on the Saturday afternoon. Among those who assisted on this occasion were M. G. B. Jefferson, S. G, Pirani, F. Stuart, J. E, Lindley, and J. W. Samuels, of the Victoria Club; F. M. Douglass, J. P. M'C. Doyle, A. J. Ritchie, H. G. Moore. D. Aitken, G. G. Jobbins, and T. E. Bostock, from Geelong; whilst J. A. Lawson was the sole representative of the Metropolitan. The Bogey for the course, which is nine holes, is as follows: 5,4,4,4,3,5,5,5,5 - 40. M. G. B. Jefferson won the scratch event with the good card of 84, 44; 40. A. J. Ritchie was close with 85. His first effort was 41 showing improved form at his second attempt; had a fine chance of winning up to the 17th, where his tally was 77. A six at the last hole looked fairly easy, but be failed, and took eight. F. M. Douglass and J. W. Samuels each returned 88's. The handicap resulted in a win for T. E. Bostock, who returned the capital card of 90 - 12 - 78, his first round being 43 and second 47. J. VV. Samuels, 88 - 7 - 61, was second, and A. J. Ritchie, 85 - 2 - 83, third; M. G. B. Jefferson, 84 - scratch - 84, and D.

Aitken, 90 - 6 - 84, being next. An impromptu open sweepstakes Handicap was won by J. A. Lawson which just beat Dicks Banks. His cards were 39; 35. J.J K. Lindley who arrived too late [for] the handicap, returned two rounds of 50 and 42 - 92 - handicap 15 - net 77 - was third. His second round of 42 was the result of very good golf indeed. Rowley Banks also played in fine form, returning 40 and 37 - 77, plus 2, net 79. The weather was excessively hot, but Mr. Nunan. supplied the competitors with iced drinks and cold sulphur plunge baths at the finish. Everyone ...came away with the intention of having another day at the Springs. Visitors may travel by train to Drysdale or boat to Portarlington. Coaches meet both boat and train.

The Clifton Springs Golf Course was designed by professional golfer Dick Banks and was opened in tournament play on the 14th February 1910. Dick Banks and his brother Rowley were founding members of the Australian professional golfers association in 1911. Rowley Banks went on to become the first Australian professional golfer to play in the British Open.
