














# Coordinator's News





### The Potato Shed kicks the year off with some great cabaret performances!!



# Seaside Victoria, Point Henry

POINT HENRY, a few miles from Geelong, is one of the headlands at the entrance to Corio Bay. It is an arrow-shaped promontory. Opposite to Point Henry stands Point Lilias, and between the two has been cut the Hopetoun Channel. From Point Henry there are fine views in every direction. Agriculture has been carried to a high pitch. In an easterly direction the shore describes a bold curve, with Portarlington, 12 miles distant across the water, at the far end. About midway are Clifton Springs, the buildings standing up prominently.

The most notable thing at Point Henry is the big farm owned by Howard Smith and Sons, the well-known shipping company, which dates back as an Australian institution to 1854, when the Express steamer was put on between Melbourne and Geelong. The farm, garden, poultry yards, are kept up for the victualling of the extensive fleet of steamers which the company has running round the Australian coast. An area of 340 acres, including Point Henry, has been purchased, and 60 acres have been leased from the Government.

About 100 acres are under cultivation. Potatoes, peas, cauliflower, lettuce, onions and celery are here grown. Mangels and carrots are supplied from the farm to feed the numberless lorry horses the firm keep in Melbourne for delivering coal and cargo. About 90 head of cows can be seen grazing, about 60 being milked regularly, and from their milk butter averaging about 1,000lb. per month is made in the compact little creamery and factory, and thence forwarded to their many steamers. Point Henry is something more than the site of a model farm. An hotel has been built, park and garden laid out, bathing houses



erected, all with the idea of making the place a popular seaside resort. Trees have been planted for shade, and any number of seats erected along the shore frontage.

The hotel is a substantially-built two-storey structure, with wide verandahs and balconies. One great convenience is the telephone. Though Point Henry is from 34 to 42 miles from Melbourne, according to the route taken, you can speak by wire from the hotel to Geelong or to Melbourne and suburbs. There is a large hall frequently used by picnic parties as well as for concerts and balls.

Point Henry can be reached by three different routes. By road from Geelong, affording those arriving by train from Melbourne or any other of the many stations on the various lines connecting with Geelong, a ready means of transit at all times and seasons. During the summer season a paddle steamer runs between the piers at Geelong and Point Henry every hour. The third way to reach Point Henry is by Messrs. Howard Smith and Sons' S.S. Edina, running from the Queen's Wharf, Melbourne, every morning, leaving at 10, the fare being only 1s. 6d.

# Vehicle Lights

Vehicles today come equipped with a range of lights to enable them to be seen more clearly and to help the driver see, especially at night.


Daytime running lights are now common and most of these come on automatically when the car is started. These make a car more visible to other road users, especially in conditions of poor

Headlights enable drivers to see more clearly at night, though they can also be beneficial as an addition to daytime running lights or when a car is not fitted with daytime running lights. Headlights must be switched on when driving between sunset and sunrise. A good rule of thumb is 'street lights on: headlights on'. In conditions of low visibility such as fog, smoke or heavy rain, switching on your headlights will make you more visible to other road users.

High beam lights provide better lighting for open road driving and enable drivers to see further ahead. However, this increase in lighting increases the risk of blinding other drivers. High beam lights must be dipped when within 200 metres of another vehicle (see fig 69). If an oncoming driver dips his lights earlier, it is good practice to dip yours too. Do not get into headlight flashing duels with approaching motorists!

Many vehicles are fitted with fog lights and high intensity rear lights. These may only be used in times of low visibility. It is common to see vehicles driving with their fog lights on today but this is not permitted under current rules. Make sure you know how to turn off your fog lights and high intensity rear lights.

Many four wheel drives have aftermarket driving lights fitted. There are strict rules on the placement of these and you need to consult with the Vic Roads web site before fitting additional lighting. Illegal placement of lights can result in fines and expensive relocation of the light units.

# Lions adventure camp thrills local children

Twelve local school children had the time of their lives at Lions Licola Wilderness Village in Gippsland in January thanks to a generous grant from the Portarlington and Drysdale Branches of the Bendigo Community Bank.

The lucky students from Drysdale, Portarlington and St Leonards Primary Schools spent a week at the adventure camp, 254 km east of Melbourne.

The word "oregano" is from the Greek language: oros meaning "mountain" and ganos meaning "joy". Of course, it is "joy of the mountains" and it grows wild in the fields of Europe. It is used dried and sprinkled on cooked meat, fish, all vegetables and makes a salad even better. It has lots of Antioxidants and is full of vitamins. Go oregano!

**Thyme** is a small herb often used fresh with fish, eggs or vegetables. In ancient times it was dried and smoked as incense to give one courage! Dried thyme is just as flavoursome as fresh and can be used as a substitute.

**Bay Leaves** burned like incense have a calming effect.

Bay Leaves add a "secret" flavour many of us just can't quite describe. Too many bay leaves make a meal pungent or bitter. Fresh bay leaves (no more than 4) added to a sauce or stew add a delicious flavour. Dried leaves have an even stronger way of adding flavour (only 1 or 2) but are best removed before serving. Added to custard or milk-based deserts, bay leaves impart an amazing flavour. They go well with cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves as they contain the same essential oil.

A Bouquet Garni (French for "garnished bouquet") is a bundle of herbs usually tied together with string and mainly used to

prepare soup, stock, and stews.

There is no actual recipe for bouquet garni. Most include thyme and bay leaf. It may also include parsley, basil, chervil, rosemary, sage and tarragon. Sometimes celery leaves or celeriac, leek, onion and parsley root are included in the bouquet.

The bouquet is cooked with meat, fish and vegetables but always removed before serving.

Some like to place the ingredients in a small sachet, a net, or a tea strainer. Traditionally, the aromatics are bound within leek leaves, though a coffee filter (or cheesecloth) and twine can be used, instead.

**Marinade** is sometimes acidic made with vinegar, lemon juice, or wine or other times enzymatic using ingredients such as pineapple, papaya or kiwifruit.

In addition to these ingredients, a marinade often contains oils, herbs, and spices to enhance the flavour of the food.

It is commonly used to tenderise cuts of meat, e.g. good quality stewing steak, chuck steak, shins, osso buco or other meat on the bone.

Depending on what is marinating, it could take an hour or so to a few days.

**AROUND THE WORLD** most cuisines use a mix garlic, herbs and various spices in marinades:

The Italian (salmoriglio pronounced sal more eel yoh) and Spanish (salsa) tend to use red/white wine or red/white wine vinegar - depending on whether it is fish or meat.


Greek use lemon juice and garlic – mainly with lamb or fish.

Indian cuisine - more spice, lime juice.

Other cuisines use a variety of citrus zest.

Apple cider vinegar and salt & sugar brine are common with pork.



The Convenience of Single-Use Items Comes at a Huge Environmental Cost

For a long time we have been taught about the 3 R's, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle – but now there's another R in the mix - REFUSE!

Our lives are full of stuff we don't need, and each thing has an environmental cost. Single-use items in particular have a huge environmental impact, firstly because as the name suggests, they are made to use only once, which means after their short lifespan, if not recycled, they generally end up in the trash.

#### 1. Plastic Water bottles

Australians have been estimated to spend \$385 million each year on bottled water, even though we have some of the world's best quality and very inexpensive tap water.

#### 2. Single-serve coffee pods

It is currently estimated that Australians consume between 2.5 and 3 million capsules per day.

Most coffee pods are not recyclable. The more sustainable option is to stick to brewing coffee yourself.

#### 3. Paper coffee cups

There's no excuse these days not to carry a reusable coffee mug with you whenever you buy takeaway coffee. They're not expensive, and may even save you money as many eco-conscious cafes now offer discounts to customers who bring their own reusable mugs.

#### 4. Boxes of tea bags

Buying boxes of tea bags generates a lot of cardboard and plastic waste, while the staple and string must be removed before putting the single-use tea bag into the compost (if they're compostable at all). Instead buy loose leaf tea that comes in a single paper bag or refillable tin

#### 5. Disposable utensils

You can now buy biodegradable, wooden and other types of compostable utensils and keep a fork, knife and spoon in your hand bag...and refuse a disposable set with your take-away.

#### 6. Plastic bags

About 1 million plastic bags are used every minute. They might be convenient, but they take more than 1,000 years to disintegrate and remain toxic even after they're decomposed. Canvas bags, reusable bags or good old cardboard boxes are the way to go.

#### 7. Produce bags

Although many people reuse their produce bags once at home, at some point they're going to end up in the trash. Better not to use them at all, there are plenty of reusable options available, or make your own from old net curtains.





The Sea Baths at the Dell were a popular spot a century ago and I can imagine that a rebuilt baths would delight today's swimmers.




The CliffCurl Baths would provide a safe place free from the boats and other vessels so that swimmers can thoroughly enjoy deep water lap swimming.

Memories of Yesteryear
by the Older Generation of the Bellarine

The Whitcombe Walk - Part Four Robert Austin Whitcombe (Bob) 1896 - 1967

During World War 2, our new farm in Whitcombes Road produced canned asparagus, greatly desired by the American Forces, who were staged in this country, ready for the great push north, to rid us of the Japanese threat.

At the same time Bob, maintained & expanded the share farming at Bellarine, producing many tons of onion seed, as well as other vegetable seeds. This was a matter of great urgency, as up to that time, almost Australia's entire supply of seeds, were imported from overseas. My father Bob was a man of many facets.

His parents had been very strict Methodists. Hence, in his early life, it was early to bed, early to rise.

He was a trustee of the Methodist Church, for most of his adult life, as had his father Samuel and brother Jack. He had a good voice and as a soloist, sang at various district churches on special days. He never learnt to read music, but could play by ear: Mouth organ, Accordion & Cornett even a large sea shell with a hole in the end.

During his Army Service, he played kettle drum, in the unit's pipe band. The captain of his unit was Tom Maltby, later to win a seat in State Parliament. Bob only attained the rank of Corporal, but this did not prevent their life-long friendship.

Throughout the 13 years we lived at Bellarine, Bob & Laura conducted the Sunday School and Youth Club. I never had any doubt that my father, had strong Christian beliefs. He believed that if one lived properly, then there should be no need for penance. He was a quiet man, not given to bursts of enthusiasm, or despair. I do not recall him or his brother Jack, ever use a bad word, or raise their voice in anger.

In spite of Bob's difficulties, he was a determined & highly productive worker. In his youth he was known as a "GUN" in the pea paddock. Later in life, always on his knees, with someone to shift bags. He had an uncanny ability to handle potatoes & onions with great speed. Bob had a wide practical knowledge of fruit & vegetable growing, extending to the production of high quality vegetable seeds.

He was the originator of an excellent strain of white Spanish onions, at a time when most others were still growing mixed lines.



During the years of the second world war, he contributed greatly to the establishment of the Brown Spanish Onion Seed Certification Program. Up until this time very little effort had been put into vegetable seeds production in this country.





#### HAWKS LOOKING FOR FINAL PIECE


