

Hopefully you will find something to interest you at SpringDale and I continue to have my heart warmed every time I hear that someone has been prescribed a dose of SpringDale and I thank the doctors who are doing this.

SpringDale is turning thirty years old, which means SpringDale has been serving our community for 30 years and as our present to SpringDale, my son Stirling and I spent the last weekend clearing each room which has carpet and shampooing the carpet as completely as we could and we striped the lino in the Recreation Room of its polish. I couldn't think of a better present to give to SpringDale and in turn to our community. 

Protect Yourself from Identity Theft

The issue of identity theft is one that can confront anyone of us at any time. That is, an unknown party illegally obtaining our personal identity details and using those details to access things such as bank accounts.

To minimise the risk of having personal details stolen each one of us can take some pretty easy steps in our day to day lives. These include:

- Putting a lock on your mailbox and destroying any documents containing personal information not required.
- Being very cautious about requests for your personal information over the phone, via the internet or in person.
- Regularly checking your bank and superannuation statements for any unknown or suspicious transactions and notifying your bank or fund organisation immediately.
- If you suspect your personal information has been stolen, act quickly to report it to police and notify the relevant organisation, such as your bank.

Although not completely eliminating any risk,

In addition, if you have already not done so, I would also encourage readers to have a look at the Bellarine bsafe Website. The site is the initiative of the Bellarine Community Safety Group and provides locals with up to date community safety and emergency services information. Simply google Bellarine bsafe.

State Government Solar Homes Program

The State Government is making more rebates available for households installing solar panels and solar hot water systems.

The Government is committed to renewable energy and the Solar Rebate Program for the year 2019/20 will support over 40,000 homes install solar panels and 6000 hot water systems. This builds on the 32,000 homes that have installed solar since the program begun in August 2018.



To apply for a rebate to install panel or a hot water system householders need to contact a qualified solar retailer to obtain a quote and the retailer will start the application process for you.

Councillors' News

Shared Trails on the Bellarine

If ever there was an indication of the enthusiasm in our community for connecting our townships via shared trails, it was the jam-packed full-day forum in Ocean Grove in late June.

Organised by the community, driven by Noel Emselle, the forum explored the possibility of a shared trail between Ocean Grove and Point Lonsdale.

This "Lonny to Grove" connection has multiple considerations including highly sensitive flora and fauna, indigenous cultural heritage, a variety of land ownership and management authorities, coastal dunes, wetlands and both state and local roads.

When (not if) we get this one right, it will be a flagship for how to develop shared trails with complex considerations.

I say 'we' but I mean the community members because it was the 130-plus attendees who were stunning in their positivity, intelligence and respect for each other.

Much of the northern Bellarine is already well connected via the Rail Trail, which is now sealed all the way from Geelong to Leopold. Council has allocated \$220,000 in the 2019-20 council budget to seal the section between High Street, Drysdale and the new path beside

the Drysdale Bypass.

But there are gaps, most notably to get to the Rail Trail itself.

The Bellarine councillors allocated \$250,000 in last year's budget to complete a shared trails master plan to identify gaps and improve linkages.

This year we added another \$200,000 to start work on building those connections.

Heart Safe Communities

Finally, a quick plug for a very important local initiative being run by The Heart Foundation and Ambulance Victoria.

The Heart Safe Community program will teach people how to respond in an emergency event where someone's heart has suddenly stopped (a cardiac arrest).

They'll be running free sessions on the Bellarine until December. Community groups and residents can register their interest in hosting a session by contacting Samantha Robinson: samantha.robinson@heartfoundation.org.au

LIONS DONATIONS HIT NEW HIGH

Portarlington/Drysdale Lions Club has distributed nearly \$65,000 to local charities and other community organizations over the past year – a club record.

In addition, the club also has set aside \$15,000 (to be matched by a similar grant from the Australian Lions Foundation) to assist Bellarine Bayside in the construction of its new playground at Little Reserve, central Portarlington.

At the 2019 changeover dinner, Portarlington resident, Stephen Love, was installed as club president for 2019-20.

Immediate past secretary of the Club, Stephen takes over from 2018-19 president, Geoff Smith. Stephen is a senior teacher at Geelong Technical Education Centre at Gordon TAFE, East Geelong.

Moon landing



Didn't we all have a great time at the moon landing day at SpringDale?

We hear a lot nowadays about all the work done behind the scenes to bring any project to successful fruition. This is particularly true of the space program which was preceded by decades of development work by far sighted pioneers who didn't necessarily get the credit or support they deserved. Robert Goddard was one of these.

Born October 5 1882 in Worcester Massachusetts, Goddard excelled in scientific subjects at school. Although plagued by ill health, he was awarded a degree in physics in 1908 and the next year started writing about using liquid fuel to more efficiently propel rockets. Although few at this time believed that rocket propulsion would work in a vacuum Goddard, in the lab, proved otherwise. He also developed the swivelling engine technique for guidance which was still in use on Apollo 11.

By 1939 Goddard had flown a rocket to a height of 2.7 kilometres under successful self-guidance. His ideas were adopted for the German V.2 rockets.

After the war German V.2 expert Wernher von Braun was imported to America to work for N.A.S.A. (National Aeronautics and Space Administration) and we were away. Von Braun said "Dr. Goddard was ahead of us all." N.A.S.A s' Goddard Center was named in his honour. He died in 1945. He was indeed a hero of the space frontier.



Friendship between the Bellarine Peninsula and Viqueque (Timor-Leste) Part 1

Timor-Leste celebrated its 17th year of Restoration Independence... Australia's neighboring country has fought for independence for many years, and has experienced oppression, devastation, poverty and a struggling economy. In 2002 it gained independence with years of rebuilding and restoration ahead. Geelong has had a "sister friendship" with Viguegue since that time. Many Geelong schools and organizations have helped and visited along the way...... We returned to Viguegue in April this year with a group of ten from Christian College, Geelong (teachers, students and tradies). It was a wonderful reunion with our Timorese friends and colleagues. Our purpose was two-fold: to renovate the "Friendship House" and to facilitate a Teacher Conference around Literacy, and in particular, reading picture storybooks to groups of children in their own language Tetum. Over the last few years, we have been raising funds to purchase sets of books and distribute to the schools and kindergartens in the Viqueque District. The teachers were given practical help, in, not only reading the books, but to engage the children through reading with enthusiasm, with expression and interest, using ageappropriate questioning and as a platform for learning. In some schools, the class sizes can exceed 60 students which presents many challenges and will be the focus of the next teacher conference. The play-based learning approach in the kindergartens has been the focus of previous conferences and we were so encouraged to see the teachers continuing this teaching practice in their kindergartens. The Department of Education in Timor-Leste does recognize that education is important and is providing support for their staff in training, curriculum and paying a small wage. (There are many teachers who are not paid.) The teachers lack quality resources, so our trips always involve taking donations of computers, books, puzzles, games and teaching resources. The Timorese teachers are dedicated and so keen to learn because they identify education as an important part of their country's restoration and development - and a better life for their people. It was with much sadness that we recently



said farewell to Ms Deb Singleton, of Clifton Springs, following a protracted illness. Deb is remembered by many students of Christian College, Bellarine for her inspirational teaching of Science and Environmental Studies. She was a wonderful advocate for Timor-Leste having made over 20 trips and was instrumental in establishing the Teacher Conferences and student trips in Viqueque. She was also well known amongst local environmental groups on the Bellarine Peninsula. The service at the Christian College auditorium was attended by more than 350 and was a wonderful celebration of a life welllived. Her passion for Timor and in particular the people of Viguegue, was well known by the many who were privileged to know Deb and travel with her. A beautiful tribute was sent via internet from her Timorese colleagues and friends of the Friendship House. Her legacy of inspiring students, taking care of the environment and her passion for helping the people of Timor-Leste will live on.

- 3 Chicken breasts skinless and cut into small squares
- 1 onion cut into small squares
- 1 Zucchini cut into small squares
- 1 Capsicum cut into small squares
- 8 Mushrooms cut into small squares
- 1 Eggplant cut into small squares
- 1 cup tomato passata or a can of chopped tomatoes
- 1 cauliflower (chopped finely)

The Flame Robin

It is the time of the year when the Flame Robin leaves the high ranges and makes a journey to the open spaces further down south such as the grass lands and farm lands of the Bellarine. The robins can travel in large flocks however we usually see them in small groups usually in twos or threes. They arrive in the Bellarine in autumn and stay for winter, returning to the high country to breed. In the woodlands of the ranges they are more solitary birds only seen in pairs or singles.

For such a brilliantly coloured little bird it is often a treat to find them sitting on a fence or cowpat or elevated mound looking curiously at the human who has wandered by and yet one can be astounded and wonder why didn't I see the creature much earlier? How does such a vividly coloured little bird blend so well into the landscape!

The female Flame Robin is a delicate, buff coloured brown with finer white streaks in her wings. In comparison to her handsome male she is quite dull. The male has a vivid scarlet tummy patch that travels right to below his beak. Sometimes it glows a yellow or orange



in the sun light. The black wings are marked with white streaks.

Recently as I stared at three robins happily feeding in a paddock within eyesight of the sea, I wondered where they would go in future years as just beyond them was machinery and forms of hundreds of new homes being constructed. Homes that I may add, had very little space that we could call a back front or even side yard so even if they wanted to the robins couldn't feed there.

These birds are ground dwelling feeders, searching for insects, spiders and other small creatures. They sit on fence posts and other exposed areas so that they can observe their prey before pouncing from above. I wish that

I could encourage them into my garden but alas as the Bellarine grows their feeding areas are restricted.



The United Services Home -Crimea Street Drysdale

When Major General Sir Alexander B Tulloch, KCB, CMG, learned of some old soldiers in Melbourne and Ballarat who had become stranded and whose scanty pensions were inadequate for their support, all over 70 years of age and inability to work leaving them in great destitution, he got all the facts together and wrote very strongly to the papers on the subject of' the friendless old soldier'. This was the first seed for the creation of a home. Tullock also learned through the press that a Victoria Cross hero of Crimea fame had been found sleeping in a rightof-way in Fitzroy on the 5th January 1890. The man was destitute and when a passer-by went to his assistance he found him in a very weak condition. When asked where he lived he said he had no home and no friends. On his miserable garments, hanging by a piece of dirty ribbon, was a bronze cross. When asked his name he showed the engraving on the back of the clasp suspending the cross which said " Private Thomas Grady, 4th Regiment". That is my name he said with pride, and my regiment was the 4th [Royal Lancaster].

Grady was cared for and was a prospective entrant to the proposed home, but he died on 18th May 1891 and was buried from Bacchus Marsh with full military honors - a sad end for a man who, on 1st October 1854,in the face of the enemy had displayed gallant conduct in spite of severe wounds.

These episodes gave Tulloch the idea for the establishment of a miniature Chelsea and Greenwich Hospital combined in one. He realized that funds would be needed to build and maintain such a hospitable institution, and forthwith made a public appeal for funds for he was determined to build such a place.

The establishment of a home for decayed and maimed soldiers was considered by the Victorian public as one of the noblest institutions formed, and any gala event or demonstration in its cause was wholeheartedly responded to. In the cause of the appeal a public meeting was held in the Melbourne Town Hall in August 1890, with the Governor in the chair, resulting in some 2000 pounds being subscribed. Additional events added a further 1800 pounds and with the funds now available arrangements were made for their appropriation. A committee of management was formed, headed by Major General A.B.Tulloch and comprised mainly military and armed forces senior personnel. Major John Stanley was the first honorary secretary to the committee of management, according to a copy of a letter to the commissioner of the Victorian Police on 6th March 1891.

lemories of Yesteryear by the Older Generation of the Bellarine

The Whitcombe Walk - Part Nine Robert Austin Whitcombe (Bob) 1896 - 1967

In 1961 after 16 years, for health reasons, I found it necessary to withdraw from the family partnership, land was sold so that I could build a house in Geelong. My father continued to work along with my brother Alan, until he was eventually confined to a wheelchair.

Towards the end there was much hospitalization. During one operation to restore circulation to both legs, to head off gangrene, he suffered cardiac arrest, but was resuscitated. He reported what we now describe as a near death experience. In his simple way he said that he was sent back to clear up a misunderstanding between himself and mother, Laura.

He was able to return home for a short time, then on the 7th April 1967 in his 71st year he died at the Heidelberg Military Hospital, one day before a leg amputation. Something he said he would never accept. He went willingly and totally at peace with his conscience to the next level of life.

After my Father's funeral service, several people who I did not know approached me, mentioning that they were recipients of Bob and Jack's kind support. My brother and I had never been told of these earlier incidents. The common thread that there was never a profit motive, only compassion for others misfortunes. Yes, Bob had some experience of life's misfortunes himself.

In light of what happened later it is my belief that "LILYDALE" was in fact a gift to my father, from a HIGHER POWER, to make up for his relentless battle against his infirmities & the disposition of his first home. It was not meant to be handed on.

After our father's death. "Lilydale" was sold and the proceeds divided between my brother Alan and myself. For one reason or another, neither of us were able to hold that money for very long. Bob was prone to unusually vivid dreams, premonitions or perhaps they were visions.

He would wake in the middle of the night, knowing that dogs or foxes were at the sheep, get his gun and go to that part of the farm that he had been shown in his dream. On each occasion when this occurred, he would find the sheep being harmed, he would then be able to shoot the offenders or at least send them off. Similar incidents occurred in daylight hours, when he would feel compelled to go to distant parts of the property, where the sheep were in trouble.

It is hard to believe that our properties helped feed the residents of Geelong for the greater part of a century (lots of hard work and soil that would grow anything) and now some of it has been carved up for residential living and freeways and it may over the next 50 years be built out completely. My only hope is that Drysdale does not lose its rich historical AGRICULTURAL heritage and significance.
