News from Lisa Neville MP Member for Bellarine

MORE WEEKEND BUSES TO GEELONG FROM THE BELLARINE

I welcome the announcement that three extra weekend services on the four bus routes running on the Bellarine will be introduced later this year. These extra weekend services will boost access to and from the Bellarine Peninsula for residents and visitors alike.

For the Northern Bellarine region, it was particularly pleasing for me to announce that the Route 60 St Leonards via Portarlington and Route 61 Drysdale via Clifton Springs/Leopold will each get three extra services, helping better connect local residents with the city and importantly train services departing from the Geelong station.

As part of this change, all Route 61 services will be extended to the Bayview shopping centre in Curlewis and new bus stops will be built at the shopping centre and on Centennial Boulevard.

In addition Route 55 Ocean Grove via Barwon Heads and Route 56 Ocean Grove via Leopold would also increase their services.

The Bellarine timetable changes will begin in December 2019 with timetable information available a month prior to these changes at ptv.vic.gov.au.

These new bus services will make a huge difference for many especially those having the requirement to regularly travel into Geelong or beyond. "

Drysdale Bypass Taking Shape

On travelling to and through Drysdale it's great to see the bypass is really beginning to take shape. With major earthworks now complete you can see the alignment the new 6km road will take from Jetty Road to Whitcombes Road. When complete like all, I'm looking forward to eased congestion in Drysdale and a smoother run to the northern Bellarine region and communities

In July the project reached another important milestone as work started on the foundations for the pedestrian underpass at the Schools, Sporting and Education precinct at Peninsula Drive, and the overpass over the Bellarine Rail line.

The rail overpass has had forty eight piles driven into the ground to build the foundations to support an arch bridge standing 7 metres high and 25 metres wide. The overpass will have a striking bluestone appearance designed to match the area's rural and historic landscape.

In addition twenty six piles have been driven to support the 8 metres wide, 3 metres high and 26 metres long pedestrian underpass which will enter onto a new, landscaped open space with seating and bus shelters





Over the coming months the project team will continue building the rail and pedestrian underpasses as we move one major step closer to completion.



Councillors' News

GEELONG

The Bellarine Peninsula is a diverse and vibrant community, home to many cultures and people with different abilities.

Our differences are something to celebrate and learn from, and that's why I'm excited to report an Auslan language program has launched at the council-run City Learning Care Children's Centre in Drysdale.

The young kids there have started learning Australian sign language for up to three hours a week, as part of their curriculum.

The centre is one of nine across Greater Geelong involved in teaching kids a second language, as part of the state government's Early Childhood Language program. Some of the other centres are also trying their hand at Auslan, as well as Mandarin, Japanese and French.

There are so many valuable benefits to learning a language at such a young age. It helps improve overall literacy and cognitive flexibility, and gives children a self-esteem boost.

The Auslan program will also give children the opportunity to communicate with kids in our region who are hearing-impaired. This will no doubt lead to new friendships and less isolation experienced by hearing-impaired children.

Meanwhile construction at the Drysdale Integrated Children's Centre is

progressing nicely, with roofing, framing the first floor and glass installation being the current areas of focus.

We've tipped in a massive \$7.5 million from the 2019-20 Budget to finish off the High Street centre, which is expected to open in early 2020.

Over in Clifton Springs, the Springs Dell Boardwalk is now in the detailed design phase, with completed designs expected in August/September.

The construction of the boardwalk will provide safe walking access and preservation of the heritage mineral springs area, which is experiencing coastal erosion and deterioration.

The Drysdale Clifton Springs Curlewis Association has been working with the City on this project and was awarded a \$200,000 'Pick My Project' grant from the state government.

Due to the significant and sensitive nature of the environment there, the City needs to secure a number of approvals from organisations including Heritage Victoria. Construction will start once this happens, something I'm sure local and tourists alike will be excited about!





BEEFING UP RED MEAT'S

Beef and sheep producers are working to allay community concerns about the environmental footprint of the red meat industry by reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Cows and sheep produce methane and carbon dioxide - two greenhouse gases which contribute to global warming - when they burp and fart.

The two gases are a product of the digestion process which takes place when bacteria in the livestock's rumen break down plant material such as grass and hay.

Globally, the livestock industry is believed to contribute about 14 per cent of human related greenhouse gas emissions (the vast majority of emissions come from the energy and transport industries.)

Since 2005 the beef industry has cut its emissions by around 60 per cent and there are plans

to reduce them even further.

Meat and Livestock Australia have set an industry goal to have Australia's red meat production 'carbon neutral' by 2030.

This means Australia's sheep and cattle producers are adopting farming practices which will offset their greenhouse gas emissions by capturing carbon from the atmosphere and storing it on farm.

The two main ways of storing carbon on farms involve planting trees, and changing pasture management to allow carbon to be stored in the soil.

Increasing numbers of farmers - including those on the Bellarine Peninsula - who have planted trees and changed their pasture management are already showing that they are 'carbon neutral', that is their farms are now storing as much, if not more carbon than their livestock produce.

The other benefits of the trees are improved shelter and animal welfare and greater

Friendship between the Bellarine Peninsula & Viqueque (Timor-Leste) Part 2 by the Thurmans

Let me tell you about Jhony. A young man who recently spent 3 months living in Clifton Springs with the aim of broadening his practical skills of Civil Engineering and experiencing our Australian culture and improving his English. He is one of the fortunate ones who have family in Dili (Timor's capital) to live with and a Geelong family sponsored him with his university tuition fees. He grew up in the village of Viqueque with his five siblings and, with his parents, lives in a humble dwelling with often many relatives sharing their home. His parents pastor a local church. His extended family live on a farm in a nearby village growing vegetables, selling firewood and raising livestock, as do many in Vigueque. Rice costs \$25US per 20kg bag and an average wage is approximately \$115US per month. Many families share dwellings and grow their food (vegies and livestock). Jhony studied for 4 years at University to gain his Degree in Engineering, but with high unemployment (60%) and no government benefits, he will move back to the village with his family. Whilst in Clifton Springs, Jhony had the opportunity to obtain some work experience in a variety of engineering contexts in and around Geelong. Jhony is proud to be Timorese and his desire is to help his country back to a healthy economy and good life for his family and community. He realizes he needs to keep learning to improve his chances of employment, which may not be in the area of his study. Jhony is already making a difference being a great role model in his community.





Behind the Scenes

The Rotary Club of Drysdale does many things that happen behind the scenes, things that happen on the quiet, without fanfare just to help in the community.

We collect used batteries at the Drysdale Library, SpringDale & St Leonards IGA which are then taken to a

recycle centre, helping with our environment and sustainability.

Annually we have members deliver Bowel Scan kits to five local pharmacies. Four hundred kits were delivered with two hundred and forty-six of them purchased. Unsold kits are then collected and returned. Another way we serve our community and help make people aware of their health, a voluntary service we provide.

We hold regular knitting sessions at the Drysdale Library in an effort to bring people's attention to Mental Health through our own IgKnite Program. The brainchild of one of our members now been taken up by Australian Rotary Health, an arm of Rotary that assists with research into many aspects of health.



We sponsor people of all ages but particularly young people to attend Rotary Programs that give them the opportunity to explore science through the Rotary Science and Engineering Challenge, art through our Bruno Callori Young Artist Mentorship Program or the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) that has 18-24 year old's exploring their plans and goals for their own lives and minds.



Grey Butcher Bird



My most recent stroll around Lake Lorne was a seemingly quiet one. For once there was not much activity from the smaller inhabitants - the tiny birds that hide amongst the bushes and trees and soon I found out why. Sitting on a fence post surveying the world around was the culprit, a Grey Butcher Bird. It eyed me solemnly then moved a few fence posts away.

These birds are beautifully feathered in black, white and grey with a large, strong beak. They are aptly named 'butcher birds' as they are clever hunters and will hang or impale their prey on thorns, branches or in a crevice. Though some times seed and fruit eaters, they do prefer grasshoppers, all types of insects, lizards and baby birds.

The call of the Grey Butcher Bird is most melodious. The trills and warbles can be loud and varying. Frequently duets or group chorus can be heard. Sometimes I have heard a delicate whisper as if one is practicing and does not want the indignity of making the wrong note in front of its contemporaries so a whispered practice is necessary.

The birds can be found in scattered bushland, farmlands and recently urban areas, where ever there is a wooded area for cover. Lately they have been seen in the Bellarine feeding from birdtables. A most adaptable bird. There are several species of butcher birds in Australia but only the Pied Butcherbird and the Grey Butcherbird can be found in Victoria.

United Services Home Crimea St Drysdale Part 2



The committee of management controlled all activities connected with the home which was wholly maintained by public donations and the efforts of individual members of the Victorian Military Forces. Funds were obtained from the takings at the Naval and Military Tournaments and Tattoos held at the Victoria Barracks and the Melbourne Exhibition.

Another source of income for the maintenance of the inmates was by deductions from the pay of the permanent artillery and engineers by one day's pay in each year. The cost of an inmate averaged one shilling and four pence per head per day. There was no charge for the management, it being self-contained. Services were rendered by the members gratuitously, for it was realized that old soldiers never die, they simply fade away and must be properly cared for.

A special meeting in connection with the erection of the home was held at the Melbourne Town Hall on 20th February 1891, the Mayor Cr Mathew Lang presiding. Major-General Tulloch, Colonel Bruce Smith, the Hon

N Fitzgerald, M.L.C., Colonel Tom Price, Major Rainsford-Hannay, Captain Mann, R.N., and Mr H.R. Reid were also present.

The committee were instructed to accept the tender of Messrs Waring and Rowan at a cost of 930 pounds for the erection of the home at Drysdale, provided they would guarantee it's completion in 12 weeks, failing that the next tenderer would be applied to. A subcommittee was formed consisting of Major-General Tulloch, the Re. Father Kennedy, Mr Fitzgibbon, and the ar-chitect Major Purchase.

This body proceeded to Drysdale for the purpose of inspecting the land and marking off the site. His Excellency the Governor of Victoria had in the meantime been requested to lay the foundation stone, an offer which he generously accepted.

A further meeting of the committee of management was held in the Melbourne Town Hall on 5th March 1891, the Mayor presiding, when a deputation from the Bellarine Shire Council waited on the committee. It was desired by that body and the committee to accord His Excellency a fitting reception on his arrival for the ceremony on 25th March. The proposal was that the official party should proceed from Melbourne to Portarlington by the Government steamer "Lady Loch." (This steamer was built in Melbourne in 1886 for the Colony of Victoria and named after the Governor's wife.) The deputation was heartily welcomed and it was agreed that the transport from Portarlington to Drysdale should be left in the hands of the local committee.

Major John Stanley also announced at the meeting that he had induced some of the militia regiments to guarantee the amount necessary annually for the maintenance of one nominee each, the announcement received with much gratification. It was also arranged at this meeting that the tickets to the official luncheon which was to be held at the Shire Hall, would cost one guinea, and any surplus funds to go to the home.

Through the generosity of the Bellarine Shire Council a site was obtained for the building.

That selected was in the prettily situated township of Drysdale and was situated midway between the railway station and the township. The extent of the land was six acres and was donated by the council.

Major Albert Purchas, a retired officer of the volunteer forces who had arrived in Victoria in 1851 was an architect by profession, and to him the credit must be given for the erection of the building, for it was he who prepared the design and plans, and gave his services as an architect free of charge. He was Vice President of the Victorian Institute of Architects for some years and elected President in 1888. Many notable buildings in Victoria are of his work.

The building was a brick structure with an imposing central tower and was arranged as near as possible to meet the needs of a small hospital.(See SLV photo c1980 by John Collins) It had its barrack rooms, recreation rooms etc. and the main building contained six rooms and a bath-room. By its side stood the kitchen and—adjoining that a little further off was the hospital of one ward and a restroom. The whole extent of the premises was surrounded by a garden and paths, well kept in the days when the home flourished, and at first the home was planned to accommodate eight or ten inmates, this being the number of known applicants at the time. On the 12th April 1891 General Tulloch, Colonel Dean Pitt and Major Stanley proceeded to Drysdale to inspect the progress of the work, and to arrange for accommodation of eight moreapplicants, making a total of sixteen. At a previous meeting Major Stanley brought to notice the desirability of enlarging the place. Major Purchase had received tenders and he estimated the cost of building two additional rooms which would accommodate six men at 350 pounds. The tender of Mr D Kerr was accepted.

Memories of Yesteryear by the Older Generation of the Bellarine

Maggie Selina Butcher (Nee) Whitcombe 1885 - 1914 The Butcher Family - Part 1

Just when you thought it was over it is not! A few more thoughts come to mind of our time at Spray Farm....

Father's favourite sister was Maggie Selina Whitcombe. Maggie married William Butcher and they had five children, Victor, Eric, Frederick and twins Edward (Jack and Phyllis. Sadly, Maggie died not long after complications of having given birth to the twins Jack and Phyllis at the age of 29 years. Her husband William Butcher a Drysdale Blacksmith, married twice more... Consequently, we had a lot to do with Maggie's children, our Cousins.

Victor Butcher - Born 1907 - died date unknown

We saw quite a deal of Vic, during our childhood at "Cote Royd" and "Spray Farm". Vic, Eric and Fred were always welcome and my father often found work for them at Spray Farm. Fencing, rabbit control, crutching etc. At harvest time picking peas, digging potatoes and onion harvest.

On one occasion Vic was with us for many months, after an accident on the water works. Vic was the mole who wormed his way back up the pipeline to correct faults. Once, backing out of a pipe he damaged his spine. The Geelong Hospital was unable to help him. At the time one of the few places where such operations were being done was the Caulfield Military Hospital. My father was able to arrange for it through his former army officer and friend Thomas Maltby who was by this time a member of State Parliament.

When Vic was brought home, his dressings had to be changed daily and he was confined to bed for many weeks. The nursing was undertaken by one of mother's friends, a trained nurse Ivy Anderson, of Colac, who just happened to be out of work at the time. A little later when Vic was convalescing, two high waterhole banks in the creek at Spray Farm were washed out in a flash flood. The first attempt at repair was under a foreman, an out of work carpenter. This work was carried away when a second downpour occurred.

Vic was then put on as foreman, using methods he had seen used on the earth and clay filled dams in the Otways. He was also very good at fixing old motorbikes and cars. He kept father's old Maxwell car going strong. (Father must have loved his car so much as I was named after it - Ian "Maxwell").

Vic put a lot of effort into rebuilding his physique and after a number of rejections, was accepted into the Australian Army Engineers. After the initial training he spent the whole of his years of service at Darwin, including WW2.

After the war he bought a garage at Wentworth in the Blue Mountains west of Sydney. Part of his success came from his knowledge of substitute parts. He was reputed to hold the largest stock of motor parts outside Sydney. Vic was widely known throughout the mountains and became an extremely respected citizen. He took part in a number of clubs and organizations; he was also a recognised breeder of Australian Terriers.
