# News from Lisa Neville MP Member for Bellarine

### Point Richards boat ramp upgrade gets underway.

Boaters and anglers on the Bellarine can look forward to a better boat ramp at Point Richards as plans to upgrade the facility begin.

Point Richards is one of six ramps the Andrews Labor Government will upgrade in Port Phillip and Western Port.

Water Technology has been commissioned to undertake a coastal processes study that will inform a design to improve the facility.

Water Technology is a specialist coastal and environmental consultancy who have conducted similar projects within Port Phillip. Their study at Point Richards is the first step towards minimising the impacts of seaweed and sand build up that currently affect the ramp.

The study will be completed by the end of the year and will be used to develop concept designs for a better facility that will reduce the number of closures at the ramp.

The Labor Government has also appointed Thompson Berrill Landscape Design to investigate options and prepare a concept design for more boat-trailer parking at the ramp.

Boaters and fishers will get an opportunity to have their say about the Point Richards boat ramp upgrade and give feedback to the concept design options that will be presented to the public later in the year.

This upgrade is part of the Government's \$47.2 million work to remove fees at all public boat ramps, upgrade six priority boats ramps and review boating infrastructure management arrangements in Port Phillip and Western Port.

Better Boating Victoria will work closely with Bellarine and Bayside Committee of Management and other key stakeholders during the Point Richards boat ramp upgrade.

# Ahead of the Curve T

The idiom "to be ahead of the curve" is used when someone or something is said to be more advanced or more modern than someone

or something else, or to be on the forefront of a trend, or to get a jump-start on a craze or idea and to act upon it before others do. It is an abbreviation of the expression "ahead of the power curve", which derives from early aviation. The "power curve" is an aviation term which refers to the relationship between drag and airspeed, or how the engine power of a given aircraft acts upon that aircraft's airspeed. The mathematics of the "power curve" may be plotted as a line on a chart showing the power required to match the drag forces and maintain a constant airspeed.

The idiom "ahead of the power curve" came into use in the 1920s, as more aircraft took to the skies When discussing the amount of power a pilot must ask of his aircraft engine in order to maintain speed and altitude, pilots talked about being "ahead of the power curve" or maintaining good speed and altitude, or being "behind the power curve" in which case they lost speed and altitude. The idiom was shortened in the 1960s and 1970s to just "ahead of the curve", and was popularised by the Nixon administration.

# RAINBOW LORIKEET

How can such a brightly feathered little bird be so noisy yet often hard to view! You can stand beneath a tree and hear the constant squabbles and yells of excitement but your eye search does not reveal the noisy owner. How can the violet-blue head, orange red breast and bright green and yellow underparts blend so nicely into the foliage! Maybe I need new glasses but I often have to search hard for the garrulous, chatty little bird.

Though I have said little bird, the most frequent lorikeet that we hear and see in the Bellarine is the Rainbow Lorikeet and it is the largest of the lorikeet family. Scaley-brested, Musks, Purple-crowned and Little Lorikeets make Victoria home. They are most commonly found in parks and gardens, yet are equally home in agricultural land as well as suburban.

Rainbows have a loud metallic screech which they send through the air whilst flying as well as during their squabble during eating. When out in the open they are easy to spot as they swiftly fly from one environment to the next all loudly announcing to one and all that they are moving to new feeding grounds.



The birds delight in nectar and pollen which they find in abundance from native flowers for example bottle brush and grevilleas. Their mouth parts are most suited to feeding on pollen with unique brush like tongue that is quite unique. Sometimes berries and fruits attract them however the best way you can attract these colourful birds to the garden is by planting lots of indigenous growth.

# Councillors' News GEELONG

### By Councillor Stephanie Asher

The issue of climate change is stirring considerable passion around the world, just as it is in our own region.

The council addressed the subject during our meeting, with a packed gallery joining the spirited discussion.

While there was debate among councillors about how our response should be worded, all 11 of us agreed that urgent action on climate change is needed.

Every councillor acknowledged that climate change poses a risk to the people of Geelong and Australia, and requires a genuine and coordinated response. The vote included a request for the City's CEO Martin Cutter to develop a Sustainability Framework, with an implementation plan and measurement program as an immediate priority. We asked for this to be presented to council by February next year.

This provides a clear, strategic direction for further action and kicks off the platform for a solid evidence base.

It was at times an uncomfortable discussion but a positive step forward.

Most importantly, it's an indication that this council is serious about representing the whole community and showing leadership on this critical topic.

### Now for some brief local updates...

Construction of the brand new Drysdale Integrated Children's Centre at 38-40 High Street is taking shape. If you've driven past lately, you'll see the scale of this new building – you can't miss it!

Due to open in January, it's a state-of-theart \$13.3 million facility with day care, kindergarten, maternal and child health services, toy library, playground and more.

Work on the Drysdale Sporting Precinct Master Plan continues. A draft of the plan was available for community feedback and received 103 responses.

City staff are now considering all of this feedback and expect to present a report to council early in 2020 with any recommended changes to the draft.

We'll then have the opportunity to endorse a final version, paving the way for design and construction of the new facilities to begin.

Finally, City of Greater Geelong staff have proposed several new names for local roads that have been cut in two by the new Drysdale Bypass. A list of the proposed new names was available for community feedback on the council website, all public submissions will be presented in a report to council. We'll then consider the feedback and make a decision on the proposed names.

Thanks for your involvement and contribution to date, please keep talking to us and letting us know your views.

The line was first opened in 1879 mainly to transport troops to Queenscliff then later to transport goods, building material and shell grit. It stopped taking passengers in 1932 and became just a goods line and sometimes a tourist attraction, before closing in 1976 and re-opening in 1980 as a tourist railway.

Markets are run from November to April. We start at 9am till 2pm cost is \$10. Set up time is 8am.

Meredith Norman and her husband Dr. Terry Norman, have recently arrived in Clifton Springs. They are both highly qualified and experienced musicians and music teachers and have worked and performed in Australia and overseas.

They met in a church in Melbourne when Meredith was asked to turn pages for the visiting organist from Adelaide, her future husband Terry. On their first wedding anniversary they received word that they had both been awarded scholarships from the Australia Council to study overseas, and they subsequently travelled to Vienna to study organ and church music, with some of the finest performers and teachers of the time. While living in Vienna they travelled around Europe playing organs and attending summer schools.

Terry later studied music and music education at the Orff Institute in Salzburg.

They have travelled about since then teaching and performing on both organ and harpsichord, both solo and in ensembles. They are also both excellent accompanists having accompanied a number of singers and instrumentalists from students to professionals.

Some of their bigger concerts have included performances in the Melbourne Town Hall, Adelaide Town Hall, the new Cathedral in Linz



(Austria), Norwich Cathedral in the UK, the National Shrine of St. Francis in San Francisco, and many other places.

"The beauty of being an organist is going around to different places, and playing organs which are totally different from one another." commented Terry.

Organs like those in San Petronia, Bologna in Italy, or St.Bavo in Haarlem (The Netherlands) or the organ in Poitiers Cathedral in France are just revelations. By playing these organs you can learn so much about the music which was designed for them.

# ANZAC DAY Address 2019

Last November we recognised the 100th anniversary of Armistice Day - the horrible events of World War I now more than a hundred years in our past. It was to be a "war to end all wars". Unfortunately international violence and armed conflict have continued to this day.

In 1915 the first ANZACs stormed ashore in Turkey. It was our first major contribution to the world as a nation; Australia was only 14 years old. It was certainly a baptism of fire. Two thousand ANZACs were dead by the end of that day, but through perseverance, courage and comradeship they held their ground for another eight months, when the 35,000 Australians and New Zealanders remaining were evacuated. We should never forget the deeds, courage and fortitude of these original ANZACs. They established traditions that we should be proud to follow.

These men and women possessed an enormous desire to do their duty for their country. While they were not professional soldiers, once convinced that the war was for a just cause, they made the commitment and got on with the job with energy and initiative. They took great pride in showing what Australians could do and matched it with the best in the world and they were successful as a result. As fighters, they were highly respected by both allies and enemies.

Of course, there are many other wars where Australian lives were lost in the cause of a better world. We remember the airmen who flew in dangerous missions over Europe in World War Two. We remember the sailors and submariners on hazardous duty fighting to keep the vital sea lanes open across the Atlantic and in the South West Pacific. There were battles near our homeland in the inhospitable terrain of New Guinea where my uncle Eddie and mum's cousin Dudley fought in the infantry at Milne Bay in the first real reverse for Japanese land forces. We remember those who became Prisoners of War including the brave nurses.

Later Australians fought with distinction in Korea. We have taken part in campaigns such as Borneo and Malaya. During our long commitment in Vietnam, where over almost eight years, 46,000 Australian men and women served - some volunteers and some conscripts - but all there to do their duty. Then there was a period of Cold War which coincided with my own military service. The Berlin wall came down in 1989 and we all expected a peace dividend that never came.

In more recent times, Australians have served in Rwanda, South Sudan, East Timor and the Solomon Islands. We must not forget today's veterans, the young men and women who are returning from duty in the Middle East with physical and mental scars - they are truly deserving of our help. They were all volunteers exemplifying the best traditions of Anzac. Since 2007, 41 Australian military personnel have been killed and 261 wounded. It is dangerous work and no Australian is left untouched when a member of our defence forces is killed in action.

Australia has never sought to expand its territories or grow an empire by warfare.

We need to be vigilant that our society remains one that values freedom, tolerance and a fair go for all. We need to maintain a sense of commitment, courage and perseverance to get through the tough times. Recent events in New Zealand, Northern Ireland and Sri Lanka remind us of the need for us all to look after each other.

Fifteen years ago I was fortunate enough to visit Gallipoli, with its landing beaches, the trenches on the cliffs opposing each other, and the Australian memorial at Lone Pine. I have visited the Somme area in Flanders fields - Fromelles, Pozieres where my great uncle was killed, and the Australian cemetery at Villers Bretonneux. I've been to the Menin Gate and some of the battlefields in sleepy green Belgium. I attended a dawn service at the Australian memorial near Hyde Park in London, with several hundred Australian and New Zealand young men and women - there were lamingtons and Anzac biscuits after the service. And my two sons and I joined a couple of hundred mainly young Australian backpackers at a dawn service in the military cemetery in Dublin Ireland.

I know that in dozen of places around the world, and in hundreds and hundreds of cities and towns, like this one, around Australia we can all join together.

Some people react to emotional stress by eating more than usual. Others find they cannot eat when they are under emotional stress.

The healthiest snacks are fresh or dried fruits, bread, toast or muffins and low-fat dairy products. Here are some nutritious snack ideas if you find you cannot stop eating.

- A big glass of water with a slice of lemon, lime or orange helps.

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# Maggie Selina Butcher (Nee) Whitcombe 1885 - 1914 The Butcher Family - Part 3

It has been brought to our attention that the City of Greater Geelong (COGG) has found it necessary to change some road names in Drysdale due to the bypass going through and Whitcombes Road East will be one of those roads, as it will no longer connect to the West side. COGG are proposing Whitcombes Road *East, be changed to Quigley Grove in memory* of John Francis Quigley a Drysdale born, ANZAC returned soldier. Whilst we understand the need to change the road name, so there will be no driver confusion. We passionately disagree with the road name being dedicated to John Quigley as he has no alliance or affinity to the land. We have sent an objection letter to COGG and have suggested two alternatives in memory of our Grandfather Robert Austin Whitcombe. Fingers crossed that COGG powers of be, have a change of heart.....

### In the meantime, let's get back to the story of: Frederick (Fred) William Butcher Born 1912 – Died 2002

In the early days Fred was to move in and out of our lives, in much the same way as did Vic. However, after his marriage to Eunice Stephenson, my father got him a full-time job at Spray Farm, with a small cottage. I remember it as being in rather poor condition, however they very quickly had it cleaned up and painted.

After a while, they went on to work at "Emu Hill" Linton, for Rex Bell who at the time was owner of "Spray Farm". They had an unfortunate time there, as the outgoing couple put arsenic in the sugar bin, tipping a full bag of sugar on top. Rex the boss, suffered the most as he would use 3 or 4 teaspoons in his tea.

Fred joined the A.I.F. early in the war, he was



promoted to the rank of Sargent within a few days. He served in the Middle East, New Guinea and Borneo. He attained the rank of Warrant Officer.

For some years after the war, Fred worked for us again, he was always a prolific and conscientious worker. Ever so fast at potato bagging.

Eventually Fred found his niche, when Bert Oakley, stock manager at Strachan & Co. employed him as their agent at Shelford, much of his work was with Soldiered Settlers.

Fred and Eunice had two children, one surviving, Christine.

Bellarine

Nearly all the inmates served in the Crimea War or in India. Barrack-Room life and military discipline were carried out as far as possible, the rooms being kept remarkably neat and clean and the veterans ranked among themselves according to the grade they held in their own corps. One was a sergeant and two were corporals. The veterans were clothed in a uniform of the same pattern as that provided for the Royal Chelsea Hospital pensioners. (see photo) It was composed of a scarlet frock-coat, blue collar and cuffs, brass buttons down to the waist, blue trousers with red welt down the side. Blue coats were worn by the navy men. The head-dress was the usual three-cornered pensioner's black hat with a rosette.

An appeal was made by Sgt Major McDonald of Geelong for the donation of books and printed matter. Response was spontaneous, not only of printed matter but anything in the form of amusement such as cards, draughts, etc., that would help pass the time for the veterans.

The home became a show place for visitors, who went by coach or drag.

At various times the different units of the forces arranged parties and gave vocal and instrumental items to the boys of the old brigade. A well planned garden planted with fruit trees and shrubs surrounded the home with each inmate taking pride in his own flower bed or vegetable The Earl of Hopetoun at Drysdale, March 25, 1891. Among those associated with him on his visit to the Bellarine District were : Lord Roschill, A.D.C.; Sir M. H. Davies, Speake, of the Legislative Assembly; Messrs, J. F. Levien and Officer, M's.L.A.; Major-General Tulloch, Captain Mann, of the Navıl forces; Major Hannay, Lieut-Col. Penno, the Rev. Dean O'Hea, the Rev. Fr. Kennedy (chaplains), Cr. A. Lang, Mayor of the City of Melbourne; Mr. E. G. Fitzgibbon, Town Cierk, City of Melbourne; Mr. Jenkins, Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, Cr. M. J. Hooper, President of the Shire of Bellarine.



plot. They grew their own potatoes, onions and vegetables. When they could do it, wood-chopping was a favourite pastime, they had their own cow and a pig or two. The home was self-contained in every way.

From the canteen which was controlled by the cook, they were allowed a liberal amount of beer, but at times when troops from Melbourne and Queenscliff visited them the tap was turned on a little bit harder, for, to an old soldier in those days all beer was good beer and many of the veterans had an unquestionable love for the beverage.

The men could be found seated on the benches about the garden, their breasts adorned with

medals, quietly smoking their pipes and only too glad to enjoy a friendly chat with any visitor who approached them.

On the 18th October 1892 a distinguished party composed of Lady Hopetoun accompanied by the Earl of Northesk, A.D.C., General and Mrs Tullock, Major Rainsford-Hannay, Captain White, R,N, the then Naval Commander of Victoria, Colonal and Mrs Tom Price, Colonel Otter, Major and Mrs Umphelby, Major Purchas, Captain and Mrs Pelham and Lieutenant Taylor visited the home. Lord Hopetoun was a frequent visitor and was much respected by the inmates. (See photo of Lord Hopetoun opening the home)

# Gold at Victorian State Clout Archery Championships

Local Curlewis resident. Neil Mann is a member of the Geelong Archers, based at Deakin University. Recently competed in the Victorian State Clout Archery Championships in Morwell and brought home the gold medal in his division. Neil Competes in the compound bow veteran division. These are the most powerful bows used and are shot over the greatest distance of 180 metres. Other bow types and

divisions shoot over lesser distances. Clout archery is one of the three branches of archery in world archery competitions. The others being target archery, firing at the common upright coloured targets usually from 18 - 70 metres, and field archery which shoots at similar targets at variable distances from 10-60 metres. In field archery the archers walk between targets much like in a golf game, the targets are set in bushland on various angles. Clout archery uses a small wooden post set in the ground at 180 metres with concentric circles on the ground around the clout (post). Arrows embed in the ground and are scored by proximity to the clout. Geelong Archers had four competitors travel to Morwell



for the State Clout Archery Championships, each being successful in their division (2 gold and 2 silver medals). The day itself was long and tough, involving 12 rounds of competition in very cold windy and rainy conditions and over 7 kilometres of walking back and forwards in muddy conditions, collecting and scoring arrows. Neil is a semi retired University of Melbourne Professor who has been involved in archery competition for five years. This was his second gold in the veteran division of clout archery at state championships.

The Geelong Archers are a strong archery club in Victoria and have members competing successfully in many competitions around the state and interstate. The club regularly runs "Come and Try" courses at our target archery field at Deakin University, with qualified Archery Victoria Instructors. Visitors are always welcome to enter these training courses and receive a certificate to allow them to come and shoot in club functions held each week. Details are available on the club web site:
