What an honour it has been to be able to help our community to such a degree. Yesterday I was privileged to help another 6 people with their MyGov etc and two had moved to Drysdale only 4 days ago. I felt so fortunate to be able to help these people who didn't know me at all.

Centrelink has sent people to SpringDale for our assistance, the Library has sent people to us for our assistance, neighbors and friends are recommending us. People have sincerely thanked us for our help. Medicare gave two people linking codes and sent them on their way - but they needed help with the process before that - we were able to help. Medicare didn't say that the reference number for the linking code was the Medicare Card number and the person's number position on the card at the end - luckily I had used linking codes over the last few weeks and knew that information.

We have made so many good friends through this process and we have encouraged people to keep their details near their birth certificates so they can find that information again later. Hopefully everyone feels more confident to be able to live and participate in our community with their new certificates and information.

Hoping that over the Summer you will find time to rest and revitalize ready for a wonderful 2022. I am looking forward to life slowing, giving time to take a deep breath and time to enjoy the wonderful place we live in or places we might even visit.

Councillors' News GEELONG

As someone who compiles annual reports as part of my 'other' job, I do enjoy delving into the nitty gritty detail of an organisation's performance over the financial year.

The City of Greater Geelong's 2020-21 annual report, released recently, gives terrific insight for the community into the strategic decisions made by the council, as well as the sheer volume and variety of the work carried out by staff on a day-to-day basis.

To give you a brief snapshot of the operational side of the organisation, here are some numbers:

- The youth development team engaged with 15,000 local young people through 1,070 different activities;
- Meals on Wheels staff and volunteers delivered 46,000 hot meals;
- The waste team processed 27,141 tonnes of garden organics at council's facility in Anakie, turning it into compost for use on parks, reserves and farms;
- The graffiti team removed graffiti from 4804 different locations.

Strategically, a major focus for the council during the financial year was to entrench sustainability - environmental, social and financial - as a key consideration in absolutely everything we do. From an environmental standpoint, we have made strong progress reducing emissions by beginning the changeover of 25.000 streetli

changeover of 25,000 streetlights to energy efficient LEDs, and switching all of the City of Greater Geelong's operations to renewable energy.

A key project this year is our food waste collection trial, which is the first step in our plan to remove food waste from residents' red-lid landfill bins region-wide.

Food waste makes up about a third of the material in our red bins at the moment, so removing it will make a significant impact on the volume of waste being sent to landfill overall.

The trial is beginning in Lara, where a group of residents have been supplied with orange-lid wheelie bins for food waste only.

These bins are being collected weekly and sent to the processing facility in Anakie.

The trial will run for 12 months, and if it's a success it will then be rolled out across the region - including here on the Bellarine.

We hope to have it in place Greater Geelongwide by 2024.

This builds upon a previous project called Neighbourly Networking which helped people to get to know their neighbours but during COVID many people have moved into our area and it would be great for them to feel the community spirit that we all love. Port/Drysdale Lions offer Free Skin Cancer Checks

Free skin cancer checks will be available in Portarlington when the Lions mobile screening and awareness van visits the town early in December.

The large screening trailer will be stationed in the car park adjoining the Elderly Citizens' Club in Newcombe Street on Friday 4, Saturday 5 and Sunday 6 December between 9.00am and 4.00pm.

Screening will be conducted by fully trained certificated volunteer dermoscopists, who will refer any suspected problems to skin specialists.

Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world, with two out of three people likely to be diagnosed with the condition by the time they are 70. Early detection greatly increases the chances of successful treatment.

A project of the Lions V District Cancer Foundation, the mobile screening unit was launched in March this year to service residents in rural Victoria and southern New South Wales.

The \$400,000 outfit consists of three screening booths, a small office and reception area and is towed by a truck. The trailer also has disabled access by way of a fitted lift.

Leanne's wheel life

I appreciate my privilege growing up in a comfortably secure family where Christmas time and the summer holidays always had a magical vibe. I got such a buzz from the promise of continuous hot, bright blue days and star-filled warm evenings, further enhanced by limited scheduling and routines. The increased temperatures brought yellows, blues, oranges, and greens of summer that glistened in the heat with a kind of innocent joy.

I was fortunate enough to experience life with no stress or pain. Just endless fun-filled sandy, watery holidays, which I could later share with our own growing family. But life can kick us in the pants quite randomly and at any stage of our journey. And while I still love the idea of social gatherings and summertime in general, the exuberance once felt is now tempered a tad. I'm not sure how much age has to do with it. I know, though, a chunk of my sometimes apathetic feeling towards summers possibilities is related to living with adult-onset disability, Limb-Girdle Muscular Dystrophy. Perhaps you feel this too for your own reason's, maybe resulting from our Covid restriction period.

We all know that change is inevitable. However, I thoroughly believe that most of us can make choices that determine how we feel when faced with changes outside of our control. For instance, I have always loved my role as a party host. I would decorate, organise the food contributions and cook and prepare my own. I love welcoming people into our home, dressing for the occasion, having a great music playlist, and filling indoors and outdoors with laughter and fun.

Our family Christmas will be held at our children's home this year – a consensus decision that is entirely fair for the majority, yet one that initially upset me. Partly because it will involve staying at an accessible hotel - not with the family (as fully accessible designed homes aren't yet a thing). Also, the rigmarole involved in finding and booking appropriate accommodation and organising equipment such as a transfer hoist, shower commode, and air mattress. For me, these factors, combined with feeling more attendee than host, instantly sucked the joy out of our planned annual celebrations.

But I have a choice in how I wish to feel about this change. I feel proud of my three adult children and their partners for happily continuing the family Christmas joy. I choose to be invigorated by their energy, happy to contribute from my Christmas supplies cache and Mum-type advice. I choose to be so very grateful to share in my baby granddaughter's first Christmas. I also choose to purchase a lovely celebration dress. Although the guileless joy of youth may be watered down, I choose to feel the ultimate

My mind will never forget the afternoon that I took a group of excited youngsters aged 4 to 12 with their extremely friendly mothers clutching babies, one very knowledgeable father, a couple of other hangers on who attached as we wandered and some very, agitated dogs for a birding tour along the beach. Before we started I explained very carefully to the children about being extremely quiet so as not to frighten the birds however the friendly happy parents plus dogs and babies did not think this 'silence' applied to them. I don't think that you will be astonished to read that there wasn't much birdlife to see as every self respecting bird took off for quieter, more calmer environments. Using all the skills I had, we eventually turned the wander into a feather hunt. The dogs succeeded the most finding the remains of some very dead and slightly eaten birds. However the day was saved by a very grubby but intrigued White Ibis who stared from afar and despite my misgivings the children were intrigued.

The Australian White Ibis has been called different names over the years from Bin Chicken, Sacred to Egyptian. It is a commonly seen bird and most recognisable with its distinctive leathery head and neck. In recent times the birds have had difficulty finding food in shallow wetlands, mudflats, swamps and damp pastures so it has migrated to scavenge in suburban areas thus the name 'Bin Chicken'.

In the Bellarine we are fortunate to have large ibis colonies and if you look skyward you will see arrow head formations of birds flying from their rookeries to their favourite food areas. Their bare black head is perfectly formed for searching under or near muddy areas for invertebrates and carrion. The lack of feathers keeps the head and neck clean but that curved beak is not really made for preening and sometimes their bodies show the mud and dirt gathered from the sticky environment from which they spend their day.

The habit of flying in v formation is most economical, as the front bird does most of the work and the rest of the flock in the 'slip stream,' use very little energy. When the head bird is tired it drops back allowing another bird to take the full force of air flow. All ibis enjoy finding an

upward draft of warm air or thermal to leisurely soar in circles whilst they search downward for promising feeding areas.

We have large breeding areas here on the Bellarine. Mud Island in Port Phillip Bay is particularly popular. Hundreds of birds gather between June and November to nest and bring up their very, fluffy young. Both sexes look after the youngsters for about 48 days. The call of ark, ark is loud and dominating. The nests are made of shallow cup or sticks or reeds very near to water.

The Australian White Ibis can mix sociably with other waders such as the Straw-necked Ibis. They are easy to tell apart by colouring with the straw-necked have a straw coloured neck plumes and iridescent feathers. Spoonbills and Egrets feed harmoniously along side too. Each different shaped beak made for catching different food. No competition here.

Our numbers stand at 53 carers (families) and over 95 children ranging in age from newborn to 18 years of age. Once a young person reaches 18 years of age, they are still part of the group and so are their carers.

We also have several 'special' carers, who no longer have children in their care. The experience these carers can offer our new carers is so valuable. Most of our new carers have no one they know in a kinship situation, that's were our 'special' carers step in. Our 'special' carers find out how they can best help the new carer - even it is just to sit and have a coffee and chat.

Our motto is - being a kinship carer you are never alone.

If you are a kinship carer sitting at home, thinking that you are all alone please come join our group.

We laugh too much, we talk too much and at times we cry.

But we support each other.

I would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to everyone in our community who has reached out to help us as kinship carers. Your continued support is just so awesome and very generous to the carers and children in our group.

May I take this opportunity to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a safe 2022.

Have your say on north Bellarine flood study

A second stage of community engagement is underway, as part of a detailed flood study of Bellarine Peninsula's north.

The City has partnered with Corangamite Catchment Management Authority to examine the Clifton Springs and Drysdale catchment, which also takes in Curlewis and Bellarine.

The outcomes of the study will inform stormwater management, land use planning and the response to emergencies in the catchment area.

During the first stage of engagement in August 2020, community members shared their experiences of flooding in the north Bellarine region.

In this second phase of engagement, residents are being asked to submit feedback on our goals and stormwater-management options. Greater Geelong Mayor Stephanie Asher said

extensive research and modelling had helped to develop a range of options, which had been grouped into three main themes:

- Waterway rehabilitation;

- Integrated Water Management; and
- Flood mitigation.

Discovering the warmth of a community

After moving from Ballarat seven years ago, Wayne Pick and his wife Caroline built a new house on the Bellarine. Wayne's work commitments were such that he didn't socialize in the local community. Then, three years ago, at age 59, his life suddenly changed from happy-go-lucky to being in wrong place wrong time.

This is Wayne's story:

Part of one leg was amputated after road trauma in 2018. I went into a dark place. Two Rotarians, Terry Baker and Martin Richards, lived close by. It took a while, but Terry said, "Have you thought about joining Rotary?" I've been a private kind of person, didn't get out in the community much, but after my accident I realized I needed to find things to do, that had meaning.

I started to attend Rotary meetings in 2020, 18 months after my accident - I went to Terry's place for the first few weeks to join him on Zoom, and then I decided to zoom in from my own home.

A lot of club members didn't know I was an amputee - for a long time I could not drive - but now, if I needed some shopping done, people would say, "We are here for you, we can help."

I realized I had had associates through life but not friends. The warmth of the Rotarians has drawn me in. I haven't been ostracized because Lam different.

Everyone in Rotary is so welcome it has softened my attitude to group meetings...my anxiety can rise in large meetings or when the room temperature is hot and so I will go out and cool down. I can do that without being judged. I never thought I could join a group but Rotary proves that with the right attitude and temperament, everyone is welcome and can fit in. I never expected to carry on with it

but I am. I like meeting different people from different walks of life and different stories and exchanging those stories.

When you meet the Rotarians, you discover there is genuine care - Rotary is about assisting people and I noticed this first off. When I'm stuck at home and can't do anything, my mood can go downhill but getting out and meeting and mixing with people has been like rehabilitation for me.

Before the lockdown restrictions hit, I was enjoying helping with the assisted reading program at Clifton Springs Primary School. When I went for the first time, I said I will explain the story about my leg. I passed the prosthesis around. It's made of plastic and metal. I addressed the elephant in the room and the children accepted me right from the start.

The worm juice for enriching the garden is another project that I have undertaken to help raise money for Rotary.

As a Rotarian, you get a feeling that there are people out there who can help. The organization is a social outlet, even on Zoom. I have discovered a sense of community.

When Captain Prue Davies isn't dominating on the football ground, she is dominating in the kitchen. See below for her famous 'Maple Whiskey Baked Ham' recipe.

Ingredients -

5kg Ham 185g maple syrup 165g brown sugar **3tblsp Dijon mustard** 1tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp all spice 1/2 cup whiskey or bourbon. Juice of 1 orange Enough cloves to cover the top of the ham. Method -

Step 1 - Preheat oven to 160 degrees, mix all glaze ingredients together and set aside.

Step 2 - Cut a criss cross pattern into the fatty part of the ham and place 1 clove in each of the squares.

Step 3 - Cover the ham in some of the glaze mix and bake, re coating in the glaze mix every half an hour.

Bake in total for approximately 2 hours
