Clifton Springs Primary Science Academy Excels at First Lego League: Building Robots, Solving Real-World Problems, and Winning **'Breakthrough'** Award

Recently, the Clifton Springs Primary Science Academy made the trip to Werribee to compete in the Western Districts final of the First Lego League. The First Lego League is a worldwide competition for teams of students aged to 9-16 to engage in research, problem-solving, coding and engineering - building and programming a LEGO robot that navigates the missions of a robot game. As part of Challenge, teams also participate in a research project to identify and solve a relevant real-world problem.

We have been preparing for this competition all year but only received the final challenge at the beginning of term. We have been feverishly building and programming our robot, preparing our innovation project and putting it all together to present to the panel of judges. The competition was held at the Wyndham Tech School with 20 other primary schools from the Western side of Melbourne.

This was our first experience of the competition and under the guidance of our coach Mr. Smith and with a lot of time during spent during lunches and before school, we were able to finish sixth out of 21 schools. For the robot game we had 3 rounds to get our best score and on our last round managed to score 170 points. There were only 40 points separating the top teams and us, next year we are hoping to do even better.

Our research project challenge was to invent a new way to share and encourage people to participate in a hobby. We all like riding bikes so we thought about some of the problems that kids face when getting out and about on their bikes. After surveying other students, the biggest problems were not being allowed to go out by themselves and being afraid to ride too far away from home. We developed the idea of an app that anybody could use to explore bike rides in different places without leaving their home. The app would use virtual reality technology and 360-degree videos to allow people to explore places they might not be able to in real life. We called our app VRider.

We were all excited and proud of our efforts and although we finished sixth, we were given the "Breakthrough" award as the team that showed the most improvement throughout the competition. Thank you to the First Lego League for this awesome experience and Mr. Smith for your guidance throughout the year.

Councillors' News GEELONG

We were very excited to open the new North Bellarine Aquatic Centre this month.

This project has been a long time coming, so it's fantastic to finally see it operating.

The doors were thrown open on 5 November for a free open day, to allow everyone to have a look at experience the first stage of the wonderful new facility.

It features:

- An outdoor eight-lane 50-metre pool
- Kiosk with outdoor seating; and
- Shaded tiered seating and landscaped lawn areas.

The centre becomes part of our Swim, Sport and Leisure (SSL) network, meaning existing SSL members have reciprocal rights.

The first stage works were possible thanks to a \$10 million investment from the federal government and \$5.5 million from the Council.

There is obviously a larger component still to come.

Designs for stage two, featuring indoor aquatic facilities, have been approved.

Thanks again to the Community Advisory Panel - and to the wider Drysdale community - for their valuable input into the concept design.

We can be confident, that when complete, the North Bellarine Aquatic Centre will support all members of the community for many years to come.

It will be able to host swimming carnivals, learn to swim lessons and other aquatic programs, while providing an array of public meeting space and multi-purpose activity areas.

Stage two includes:

- An eight-lane 25-metre pool
- Warm water pool, to host learn to swim classes
- Café and social space
- Gymnasium and group exercise studio/s; and a
- Changing places changeroom.

The significant works have the support of \$20 million each from the state and federal governments.

Council is set to provide up to \$300,000 for additional capital expenses.

Two special services that are available:

- Bank @ Post is available at many Post Offices on the Bellarine and enable people to perform transactions for more than 80 financial institutions. SpringDale is continuing to advocate for all financial institutions to cover these fees especially as more branches disappear or are located in inaccessible places.

It's been a productive time, and as the year draws to an end, we are busy exploring another possibility of funding and assistance which has just presented itself.

This year we've continued to look at a number of possible solutions to the housing crisis for women over 55, on the Bellarine, and we've had some interesting guests join us from time to time. At our last meeting, Alison Marchant MP came along with Linda Tonkin to hear about the options we've looked at, and the obstacles that we find in the way of pursuing these options. We'll be keeping in touch with Alison, and hope that she will be able to assist us in the future.

Carolyn wrote about our trip to Castlemaine in the last Messenger, and we are still looking into the many things that need to be "sorted" and worked out, if we are to pursue this model of Co-housing for women. We've also looked at a more modest version of Co-housing which is being achieved in Queensland, through Sharing With Friends (www.sharingwithfriends.org). This organisation provides smaller co-housing communities of up to 5 accommodation units, built around a community hub. This requires smaller parcels of land. and a smaller budget, but still a great deal of planning.

We are excited about what the future holds, and looking forward to making further progress in the New Year.

3. Write your mission Statement You may like to use a template such as:

"This Christmas we will.... (do/goal) by... (actions/how) for... (audience) so... (impact).

e.g. "This Christmas we will celebrate love, kindness and family connection by cherishing traditions and creating memories with family and friends, so we can all feel calm joy and gratitude."

(We will strike a balance between enjoying the festivities, spreading goodwill, and respecting our financial stability.)

Otherwise design your own:

e.g. "Christmas at our house is about making time and effort for family and friends. Our gifts are small, thoughtful, and gentle to the environment. We make an effort to connect with each other and practice kindness and gratitude throughout the season."

4. Make it Visual

Write it up and put it somewhere you can refer to when making decisions about Christmas. Decorate it and share it with the rest of your friends and family.

5. Use it

When Christmas blindsides you, or gets a little off track, you can return to this statement and use it to clarify decisions and necessaries

Encourage your family to remember what the intention of Christmas is, and offer a clear way to keep grounded and calm this season.

This area has been known as Jetty Road Urban Growth Area Stage 2 and has been talked about for almost 20 years.

A few more steps in my upgrades but always check on the risks, safety aspects and practicality before starting.

My two heating / air conditioners have been installed.

It was a quick and clean installation and the paperwork (re grants) went smoothly.

I'm now using minimal gas - just for the gas hob so the next stage will be to install an induction cooktop and then no gas connection fee of approx \$375 / year and also an annual home insurance saving of \$50.

There are also associated health benefits resulting from gas leaks and the chemicals generated by burning fossil gas (mostly methane) and reduced risks from fires and burns. My grand-daughters are surprised how hot the hob and the pans get when cooking on gas (compared to induction) and how they stay "burning" hot for quite a while and also how much easier it is to control the heat level on the induction cooker. It is also cheaper to cook using induction rather than gas due to the much higher efficiency (lower heat losses).

As the temperature increases one may need to try and keep at least one room coolish which may involve improvements to reduce leaks and avoid heat penetration.

We are holding a Q&A session at SpringDale Centre Friday 8 December 7pm to discuss sealing products, insulation, double glazing and other ways to make a home more pleasant and liveable both in summer and in winter (and save money along the way). 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The Clifton Springs Dell Eco Reef project was recently featured on the ABC and I thought it was timely to ask Ralph Roob, Senior Strategic Environmental Planner City of Greater Geelong, for an update to share with our community.

We constructed the reef to stabilise the beach, prevent further erosion and accumulate sand through the reduction of wave energy. This nature-based coastal protection approach is encouraged by the Victorian Government before implementing things like seawalls. Yes, there was a risk of failure with nonconventional approaches such as this, but the City of Greater Geelong is a big advocate of trialling innovative initiatives to identify better ways of doing things.

We wanted a solution that not only attracted more visitors to this stunning beach but addressed the environmental impacts, so we set about creating a sculptural reef that inspired people's imagination. The City of Greater Geelong commissioned Alex Goad from The Reef Design Lab to create a shape that met the environmental needs of the project but also fit in with the natural surroundings. Alex came up with an inspirational shape that was based on the holdfast of a kelp plant or seaweed.

The reef is now home to a host of algae, or seaweeds, but also a diverse range of shellfish, such as limpets and top shells as well as



crustaceans, like shore crabs and shrimp. The wave shadow created by the reef provides some protection for seagrass from severe wave action.

The Dell Eco reef modules are constructed from recycled materials, we used small shells, a by-product from shell grit processing, as the aggregate, instead of crushed rock. We also used fly ash, which is left over from the process of burning coal, instead of standard cement. The fabrication of the reef modules focussed on minimalizing our carbon footprint on our journey towards net zero.

The Dell Eco reef provides an opportunity for all the community to come and enjoy these eye-catching sculptural forms either by wading or snorkelling amongst them. They provide habitat and structure for interesting sea life, my favourites are the crabs and shrimp who play a game of hide and seek when approached, it's simply a fun solution to what is a serious problem.

The City has also partnered with the University of Melbourne to undertake experiments such as shellfish seeding trials and establish a monitoring program that measures the effects the reef has on the beach, foreshore, and marine environments.

In 1959 he arrived in Hollywood and, while sitting in a cafe' on impulse wrote a letter to the studio rep and gave it to the gate guard. Next day he received an invitation for an interview and was promptly dispatched to an actors agent, who immediately placed him on their books.

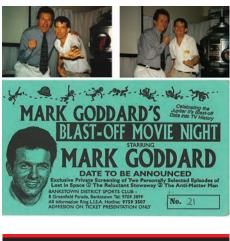
Three weeks later he was signed up as *Cully* in the Western T.V. series Johnny Ringo.

Queenscliff Coast Guard

Queenscliff Coast Guard is based in Queenscliff Victoria and is a volunteer marine rescue service. Their charter is keeping people safe on the water and this time of year is extremely busy with the warmer weather enticing boat owners to get back on the bay for fishing or pleasure. However, disappointingly, the Coast Guard more than they would like, find themselves getting calls from skippers of vessels in distress which are due to circumstances which could have been avoided. Over the winter months, fuel can become contaminated and batteries can go flat. So, before you set out, please check:

- Old fuel that has been sitting around over winter is emptied and fresh fuel added, and sufficient for your proposed trip.
- Fuel system hoses have been checked for cracks or leaks. Not only can this cause you to run out of fuel, it can be a serious fire hazard.
- Engine has had regular servicing by qualified marine mechanics.
- Steering system a boat that cannot steer is an accident waiting to happen
- Battery has been charged.
- Radio/communications equipment is in working order.
- Anchor is working and functional.

And of course, make sure all safety equipment, lifejackets etc. are up to correct standards and are in good working order. Also, make sure you know the weather conditions when you head out, but also what tides and winds are doing throughout the day, in case you do find yourself out on the water for longer than you intended.

Coast Guard Queenscliff respond to close to 100 distress calls each year and as much as we love our job, we would prefer not to get rescue call outs in rough seas and high winds, turning a day of pleasure into a nightmare because the basics were overlooked.
