A very special thing happened this month, a young mother and her 4 year old daughter, River, volunteered to deliver the SpringDale Messenger, making River our youngest deliverer (that I know of) so far. They were excited to be helping the community and I was excited to have more deliverers.

It is now 2 years since we started delivering Messengers and in that time, we have delivered more than a quarter of a million SpringDale Messengers - amazing. I thought people might deliver one edition and then move on to something else, and some did. But we have a strong team of approximately 100 people who help happily every month.

Another special task that I was able to achieve this month was to help 2 people to gain concession on their electricity accounts and to have them retrospectively applied. One had a sight problem and the other a hearing problem. One needed a greater deal of assistance as the pension had been suspended due to overseas documentation needing to be supplied. After a few phone calls and document uploads all was reinstated.

We were also happy to be able to meet 5 requests over the last 5 weeks for items not easy to source from elsewhere and I was so happy that we could meet every request. From plastic colourful size 7 knitting needles to an electronic keyboard. I love it when we can find the right homes for things.

Helping apply for Police Checks and Working with Children Checks, helping with passport renewals and a variety of other computer based tasks have kept us on our toes and enjoying seeing people leave so much happier and more confident. Simple printing, faxing, laminating, and shredding fit in between our other tasks. Welcoming people to SoringDale for the first time and showing them around the building continues to be a highlight of my job. But then we need to meet their ongoing expectations and mostly I believe we do. But we are human and we keep trying our best. Although our successes do out number our issues.

SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre provides a wide range of activities that people seem to be surprised that we do once they come through the door for the first time. Almost everyone one says "I'll be back!".

#### Orange Door Network Bellarine Access Point

It's important that there are local services available for everyone, if things at home or in a relationship are not ok and help and support are required.

Last year, The Orange Door network, opened a new access point in Drysdale, meaning adults, children and families living in the Bellarine don't have to travel far to access coordinated family violence, and child wellbeing services.

The Orange Door network provides access to coordinated help and support for people experiencing family violence, and for families needing support for the wellbeing and development of their children.

This means people can get the different areas of assistance they need in one place, locally, where safety and confidentiality is paramount.

The landmark Royal Commission into Family Violence handed down 277 recommendations to improve Victoria's response to family violence. The Orange Door network was one of those key recommendations, and has assisted people and families across Victoria, including 156,000 children since it began in 2018.

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## **Councillors' News**

#### CITY OF GREATER GEELONG



At our April meeting Council endorsed the release of our proposed budget for public exhibition.

The budget has been produced following considerable work from officers and Councillors, having listened closely to what the community wants and needs.

For those in Drysdale and Clifton Springs there is much to be pleased about.

One of the highlights is the \$6.61 million this coming financial year, and \$2.82 the next year, that will go towards stage two of the Drysdale Sporting Precinct development.

This is a major investment in the health and wellbeing of the community, and combined with the North Bellarine Aquatic Centre will be a landmark facility for the area.

There is also \$500,000 in the 2024-25 financial year that has been allocated for the Bellarine Trail shared trails masterplan implementation.

This involves the design of one of three major shared trail routes, and as someone who has advocated for this infrastructure, I am glad to see this funding allocation.

It is another step towards creating a lasting culture that celebrates healthy living options, and demonstrates Council's recognition of the importance of providing high-quality outdoor spaces. These facilities encourage community members to enjoy the beautiful natural environment we have here on the peninsula which is so pleasing.

Beyond capital works, the budget includes an increased community grants budget to support more community-led initiatives and also allocates funding for environmental projects, reduces al fresco and busking fees to aid our hospitality industry, and supports arts, culture venues, and libraries.

Councillors recently attended multiple engagement sessions to hear from the public regarding their thoughts on the proposed budget, and I thank those who turned out for their feedback.

The final budget will now be presented to Council for consideration during our June meeting.

## Footpaths for Health

Thanks for the feedback to the article published last month. We received many emails and a number of people came into SpringDale to obtain a bigger copy of our proposed Priority Footpath Network. Most emails ask for better paths to enable students to be able to safely journey to and from the educational precinct on Peninsular drive. Here is an example of one of the emails we received -

Princess St is a known hazard, every school morning and afternoon, and I have been in contact with the council about this. Princess St does not have footpaths on one side of the road, and only partially on the side that does have footpaths. The bike lanes are also only partial. School kids who ride to and from school have a tough time, and are still not sure which is the safest way to travel. If kids use the foot path on their bikes, they get scolded by pedestrians, to use the road, and if kids use the road, they get honked at to move over so cars can pass. I have seen this happen so many times, and witnessed minor incidents. This road has become much busier since the bypass opened, and adequate bike paths are so desperately needed. Approximately 5 different schools use this road, and I am aware that more students would use it, if this road was bike friendly. I have been in contact with St Thomas' for assistance, and with this letter I hope you can perhaps help with this.

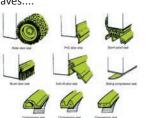

## Bellarine Support Group for Kinship Carers

Wow June already, 2024 is going so fast.

I like to re-read my articles that I write each month for the Messenger, just to make sure everything is right.

In the June 2023 Messenger, I wrote that the Bellarine Kinship Carers had 65 families in our region, all on the kinship journey.

Some families are managing very well, but others are struggling both financially and physically.

But in June 2024, our numbers now stand at 85 families within our region, travelling the kinship journey. That is sadly an increase of 20 families and rising. It seems like every single day; I get a call from a kinship carer, thinking that they are all alone.

Every single family in our group, has a different story to tell, about how and why they are caring for mostly younger family members: mostly grandchildren.

We have one family in our group, both grandparents aged over 70, raising their grandchildren, four teenagers.

The grandparents have learnt a lot from both our group but also their grandchildren. The grandchildren have taught their grandparents how to navigate modern technology, like phone and iPad. We all know how teenagers are with their phones.

I would also like to take this opportunity to THANK you, our local community, for supporting Bellarine Kinship Carers, with such things as new underwear, new socks, new clothing and the list goes on and on.

So again, I say a big THANK YOU.

If you are a kinship carer sitting at home, thinking that you are all alone come join our group.

We as a group would love to assist you in any way we can.

# Bellarine Birdlife Orange-bellied Parrot

I often look at my diary, and with anticipation, realise that I have a free day, so a quick glance out of my bedroom window to see blue sky, the trees standing silently, means it is a birding day. Great!!! With a bit of luck, the Western Treatment Plant beckons me. But first, I cautiously look at the conditions for Avalon/Werribee. I learnt this when one day, I took a chance, neglected the weather, and was nearly blown off the road. As for the birds, not one to be seen as they were far wiser that I.

To assure you, 'The Western Treatment Plant' is not a smelly land covered with pools of dubious coloured water that suspiciously looks unhealthy, I have repeatedly tried to assure many friends and acquaintances, whose faces show their amazement at my choice of entertainment. The Plant is a place where the treated water lies in large settling ponds, surrounded by low undergrowth, a few trees of intermittent height of low-lying heath and copses of small bushes. It spans a huge area, and you can spend a delightful day slowly driving and finding many pleasures.

The treatment plant was set up in the 1890s to combat the spread of disease. Prior to this, refuse was disposed into creeks, rivers and then to the bay. The Wadawurrung People had lived on this land for years, in fact their story goes back thousands and thousands of years. To them it was a place of special significance and of much spiritual importance, they deeply cared for the area.

To the birders who delight in visiting the WTP, it is a place of special interest and excitement. To gain entrance you must first attend a forum for a day's education re the rules and regulations expected within the area. Then you are able to 'buy' a key (buying means a payment which covers two years after which you must renew cost or return). The rules and regulations are quite common sense, however surprisingly, some people recently have been seen disobeying (do not wade in the water, wash your hands or drink the water).

The dirt roads follow the edges of the ponds, and as you drive at a snail's pace, you can scan the edges and the waters for:

- 1. The 'tourists' (birds that fly from the extreme cold in the Arctic, Russian Kamchatka and Alaska) who delight in feeding here, whilst gathering strength for their return flight back to their nesting sites, in the far, far north.
- 2. The Victorian locals (birds who spend all year in this area knowing that the food will always be there).
- 3. The Aussies who may live in Tasmania for part of the year but know



that spending some time at the WTP feeding will help to increase their chances rather than risking a cold, cold winter in their breeding areas. This definition also includes birds who may live in an area on the mainland where food becomes scarce. (I have seen birds who have joined us from the Murray/Darling or Mungo National Park).

4. Lastly, the rare birds who have been blown off route, and are amazed to find a place to live temporarily, with plenty of food and an element of peace and quiet. (I say this with tongue in cheek, as when a rare bird is sighted, usually you can find it due to the number of birders who are parked along the roadside, staring in awe at the visitor.)

I have visited the WTP regularly, and to my frustration, I have never been able to see the Australian rarity, The Orange-bellied Parrot and I came to the conclusion I probably wouldn't see one. A friend contacted me recently, and asked if I would like to see the 'mega rarity', an American Golden Plover who had been sighted at the ponds. Of course, I would. Off we went to spend the day searching. Did we find the plover? No, despite so many hours there, but yes I came home happy. We had stopped for a bit of lunch at the side of the road when from the car window I glanced at a nearby bush to see two little birds on one section. Two little birds who looked like parrots. Two little birds who looked like Orange-bellied Parrots. Soon we were joined by three other cars, and the parrots most obligingly posed for photographs all round. Whilst watching, two swept out of another bush, and swiftly flew off. Also, I must admit, that these rare birds who were left were a little bored by all the attention they were getting, and and one even fell asleep while I was taking photos - such is birding.

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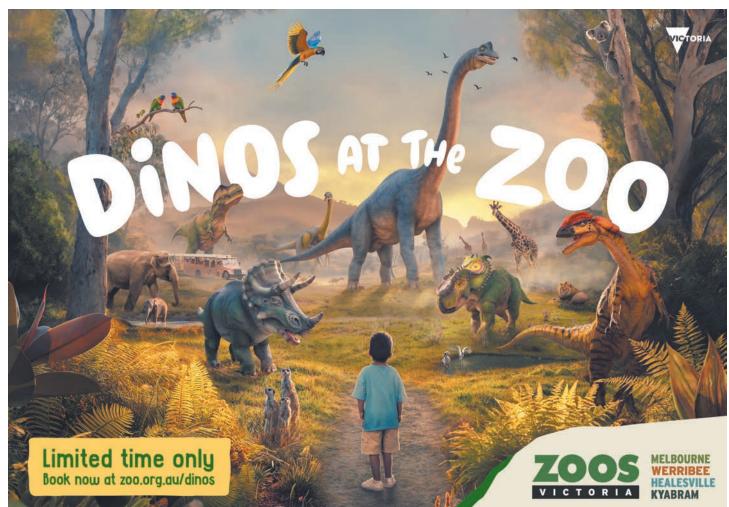

## Memories of Yesteryear

#### THE FAMILY HISTORY QUEST 02 REFERENCING

In the last edition I suggested that when starting your family history quest start with what you know. Start with yourself, write down your birth, marriage dates and that of your partner, children, and parents. Collect as much information as you can by talking to family members.

As you collect information it is important that you document or reference your sources. Where did you get the information. Whilst it is easy to borrow someone else's research on Ancestry.com for example, a good family historian will need to check the sources and check you have the right person or family.

A **source** is the record in which you found for your family history, whether that information is a quotation, a fact, an image or a document.

A **citation** is a note describing your source of information and recording exactly where you found it. For example, if the information is a date of death, you may have found it on a gravestone, or on a death certificate, or in a set of probate papers. The gravestone or the death certificate or the probate file is your source.

**Referencing** is how you identify the sources you have used in your family history. It is an essential part of your family history research tool kit. It enables the readers of your work to find the evidence you have used, evaluate it, and draw their own conclusions. It also proves that you have conducted reasonably exhaustive research, and importantly it saves you from having to remember exactly where you found your information.

It is important to be consistent and accurate with your references so that you provide enough information for someone else or yourself to retrace your research steps with confidence. If you look carefully at the references in a work of history, you will see that they contain information about **who**, **what**, **where** and **when**.<sup>1</sup> For example, a reference for a book might include the name of the author, the book title, the publisher, the date it was published, and the page number you are quoting from.

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# Memories of Yesteryear

#### WHAT DO YOU DO IF YOU BECOME ILL IN THE OLD DAYS?

Drysdale/Clifton Springs was a big place, and you didn't travel to Geelong. There were a lot of businesses except for the most important business concerning your health. There were no ambulances and only one doctor. I think he was Doctor Renouf. In my day, Drysdale had a hospital thanks to Sister Whitecross, and her sister, who turned their house into a hospital. This building still stands today in Wyndham Street. Getting sick was dangerous, many children used to die at birth or before their second birthday. Adults also would die from growths, appendicitis, pneumonia, and many other health issues. This is where the bush nurse was so important, along with the Jackson Hospital in Wyndham Street, which they ran for many years.

The property in Princess Street was donated for the Bush Nursing Centre by Mister George Wisbey. Meetings were held in the old shire hall. Some of the people listed at the early meetings were Messieurs Maltby and Armitage, George Wisbey, George Filbay, Mister and Missus J B White and Missus Searl.

Money was scarce in the old days and some people such as B Wisbey, I Wisbey and B Nichols, gave money to keep the centre running. I remember my uncle Stan Hutchinson as president for many years used to collect and bail cardboard and paper in the shed at their farm. He was helped by his brothers. They put in a lot of time making money for the centre.

Hundreds of patients passed through the bush nursing centre or were visited at their homes. With the Bush Nursing Centre in Wyndham Street, they kept people alive and well in the Drysdale/Clifton Springs and surrounding areas. Before this, people would treat themselves with old remedies and many would die as a result.

We don't know how lucky we are today with medical support. Many families lost children from whooping cough, appendicitis, pneumonia, poisoning, and many other health issues before the Bush Nursing Centre. Some families used to have eleven to twelve children, but many would die before they were two years old.

Many lives were saved by the Bush Nurse and hospital.

We have done a variety of walks in the last few weeks, including a conducted tour of the Bellarine Nursery, and walk around the Basin then past the schools; walks along the beaches at some very low tides; exploring a new area along Lake Connewarre and a longer trip with a walk up the Anakie Gorge in the Brisbane Ranges.

Our walks generally start at 9.30am every Thursday morning from a different spot and we usually go for 70 to 90 minutes followed by a coffee.

The longer walking group, The Terrific Tuesday Trackers, are doing longer walks (2.5 to 3 hours).
