### Regional Community Sports Infrastructure Grant

In very exciting news, the Wallington Reserve has been successful under the State Government's Regional Community Sports Infrastructure Fund, which means serious upgrades for the pavilion to improve allabilities access, the changerooms and social spaces for the Wallington Cricket Club and the Bellarine Bears Baseball Club.

In addition to these upgrades, both clubs will share \$50,000 to support their all-abilities programs which create opportunities for kids of all abilities to play baseball or cricket and be a part of their sporting community.

Over August, the Bellarine Bears will run their junior all-abilities baseball sessions, and you can find more information at their Facebook page.

Congratulations to both clubs and all members, as I know many people have worked towards this project over many years. The project jointly funded by State Government and Local Council, demonstrates the positive impact we can make when working together.

#### **Tiny Towns Fund**

Five projects were recently announced as recipients of the first round of the Tiny Towns Fund in the Bellarine. This funding empowers our small towns to thrive, ensuring projects that locals are passionate about can become a

reality and make our communities even better places to live and visit across the Bellarine

These projects include Bellarine Bears Baseball Club to upgrade and improve fencing at the Wallington Recreation Reserve Baseball field, and Queenscliff Maritime Museum, to refurbish the historic Gil Allbutt Boat Shed.

Indented Heads Yacht Club were also successful in receiving funding to deliver clubhouse refurbishments, St Leonards Progress Association to deliver upgrades to the Memorial Hall, as well as Portarlington Bayside Miniature Railway Inc, to refurbish the Point Richards Station and Signal Box Building.

I know grants like these make a big difference to our communities, and a big congratulations to all the passionate volunteers who have worked hard to see projects like these come to life

#### **Orange Door Access Point Drysdale**

Recently, I joined the Minister for Prevention of Family Violence to visit The Orange Door Access Point in Drysdale, to meet with staff and hear more about the impact this service is having in the region.

The Drysdale Orange Door has allowed for support closer to home for Bellarine residents and assists families experiencing family violence. It has been operating for a year now, and unfortunately the Bellarine is not immune, with the service being very busy.

With an older population on the Bellarine, The Orange Door also raised a worrying concern, with a growing trend of elder abuse. This may be from family members, but it may also be from neighbours or someone in the wider

community taking advantage of an older person.

If you are someone concerned about this, you can seek confidential advice from Seniors Rights Victoria, on 1300 368 821 Mon - Fri 10am-5pm.

### **Re-imagining Housing for Seniors**

I've been quite surprised by the number of people who have responded to these last few articles about "Re-imagining Housing for Seniors".

It's been an interesting mix of senior women and retired or semi-retired builders and part time property developers.

We have senior women who own their homes and are looking to downsize. They aren't interested in the very small units that are available, or the very expensive Retirement Village options.

We have women over 55 who will never be able to own a home and are needing to find more affordable and long-term rental options.

We also have some retired or semi-retired men, who have many years of experience in building, construction and property development.

I was most surprised by this group. They have expressed frustration over the lack of imagination or even common sense, in continuing to build a constant stream of 3 or 4-bedroom family homes, without any thought for singles, couples or smaller families that can't afford, and don't need these bigger homes.

In so many ways these days, we are overwhelmed by choice when buying products. But it seems this doesn't extend to the housing market. Developers continue to serve up an offering that only caters for one section of the market, and because of a lack of choice most of us pay more for a product that doesn't really suit our needs.

#### Treaties in Victoria Discussion

We recently had an information sharing session at SpringDale on the Treaties being developed in Victoria with the Victorian Government and the Traditional Owners of the Aboriginal countries in Victoria.

It was provided by two members of Geelong One Fire Reconciliation Group, to bring a conversation for learning together.

It was explained that the Yoorook Justice Commission has completed its hearing sessions: listening to the experiences of Aboriginal people in Victoria since communities' lives were changed by settlement of European peoples. You can listen to them online: some are harrowing experiences, while others show that some people held onto language and traditions despite pressure to lose their cultural practices. The Commission will prepare a report in 2025 to submit to the Victorian Government and the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria which will assist with changes to agencies such as policing and welfare services in Victoria

Meanwhile the Treaty negotiations will begin soon between the First Peoples' Assembly (including recently elected leaders from 32 communities) and the State Government. The first stage is an overall Victorian Treaty and then later on there will be separate ones for Traditional Owner Groups with the councils/shires on their Countries.

The Treaty proposes to make a better future for the Aboriginal communities and to be able to share, celebrate and benefit with all people who call Victoria home from the wisdom and knowledge from the many tens of thousands of years living on and caring for this land,

We propose to have further session/s as the negotiations and discussions progress.

# A story to spark conversations with young children about Dementia by Glenda Mac Naughton

My mother Joyce Neal (nee MacNaughton, nee Davis) was 93 years old when she died. She'd live all but a few years of her life here on the Bellarine, and many artificacts from her life are now housed in the Bellarine Historical Society. Her smile and sense of fun, was a gift that endured throughout the hard, amazing and the wonderful special times in her life. It even endured through her dementia, that touched her life in its final couple of years.

As many readers will know, when someone has dementia, the person you once knew, you must constantly learn to know all over again. As I learnt to do this, Mum's dementia brought hard times and sadness amongst love and laughter. It also brought very special new people into our lives who shaped new stories with us - her carers.

In my final days with Mum, when I knew our story-making together was coming to an end, I wrote a story for young children about dementia. It was inspired by my experiences of living with mum's dementia, and how so often when I was most sad about it, mum and her creations gifted me a smile. I wrote it for me, for Joyce, her legacy, and for anyone whose lives are touched by dementia.

Briefly, the story is about Meg and Joyce. Meg has a special friend Joyce who has dementia. Sometimes when Meg visits, Joyce forgets things, but then amazingly and wonderfully something special happens that makes them smile. Based on the author's experience with her mother Joyce, the book reminds us that special joyful moments are possible for everyone, even those with advanced dementia, and those that care for them, when we find ways to see them.

I have written many non-fiction books for adults about young children. This was my first foray into writing for young children. I hope it starts conversations with young children about the unpredictable effects of memory loss on people they might know.

The illustrations are taken from my photos of mum's "daily creations", that became more and more bizarre, but amusing also as her dementia progressed. With the help of AI, I have turned them into paintings full of detail and personality, that offers lots to explore and discuss with young children.

The book is available on Amazon.com and all profits from its sales are being donated to Dementia Australia.

# Memories of Yesteryear

#### THE FAMILY HISTORY QUEST 05 CEMETERIES

Many people see cemeteries as gloomy places and refuse to visit even to see the graves of family members. I have visited lots of cemeteries and although I am careful of snakes and spiders, especially in country cemeteries, I always enjoy the visit, especially if I have found the grave of an ancestor and family member. By looking at the headstones, we can gain information on the past, including birth and death dates and family members. Cemeteries act as a place of memorial.

Cemetery records can provide information about the death of family members and can be useful when you can't find a death certificate.

There are two types of cemetery records - burial records, and headstone inscriptions.

Burial records can vary in the amount of information they provide, but might contain: the name of the person who died, their age at time of death, the date of their death and/or burial, where they lived, who performed the ceremony, and the name of the undertaker, their religion, the location of their grave in the cemetery, names of other people buried in the same grave, and, a transcription of the inscription on the headstone. Burial records list all burials in a cemetery, even when there isn't a headstone or plaque. You will need to know the cemetery your relation is buried in and contact them for this information. Many large city cemeteries have websites you can search for your ancestor and provide maps to

locate the grave. The small country cemeteries often do not have this luxury.

Headstone inscriptions are the words found in cemeteries on plaques, headstones and at gravesites. They often provide useful information not found elsewhere, particularly for early deaths where written records don't exist or contain little detail. You will not always find a headstone on a grave. Many people were buried in unmarked graves, and old headstones have often weathered, been destroyed or are hard to read. In this case, you might be able to find information from registers published by local family history societies.

Note: that some tombstones can have the wrong dates, and you need to consult several sources to confirm dates.







### **Bellarine Food Scraps** & Compost Warriors

So much has happened since Clancey and I started this project late last year. We record the weight of the food scraps returned to us, which in late July has reached 500KGS.

Worms are breeding in our compost and the compost is turning well.



I don't know how many buckets I have washed, but it must be in the 100's What we offer, is another option for people who don't want to put their food scraps into landfill. We will provide you with a bucket and lid to collect and store your food scraps in.

We also offer four drop off points where you can leave these buckets, and collect a fresh bucket - Artisans of Australia, 1472 Portarlington Rd Curlewis; 16 Station St Drysdale; 203 Country Club Drive Clifton springs and 4 Wiltons Rd Ocean Grove.

These food scraps will then be collected, and turned into compost, which in turn takes a few months. In the future, we will offer you a free bucket of compost for your garden. Talks and workshops tailored to local groups interested in this project will be offered. We are unfunded and always looking for donations of unwanted large compost bins and bird Avery wire minimum one meter square. We can utilise shredded paper, straw, small animal bedding and sawdust.



### Making my Home more Sustainable - Part 15

Hopefully, you've found the gap sealing that you have done, made the house easier to heat and maintain its temperature and at a lower cost. Extra insulation may have helped, as both will assist in improving the hot summer conditions and making ongoing energy savings. Using the air conditioner to heat specific areas could also be very effective. If you have any outstanding questions and want to learn more, I recommend you attend Tim Forcey's presentation on his new book "My Efficient Electric Home Handbook" at the SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre at 7pm to 8.30pm on Friday 6th September.

I have just returned from a visit to family in Canada, and I find it fascinating comparing the similarities and differences. They are both huge countries with small populations, which are concentrated in a few cities, leaving huge areas of sparsely populated wilderness. They both have similar histories of British invasion and impact on the original First Nation peoples.

Both countries experience increasingly larger and more intense wildfires as the climate warms, and, both countries are endowed with massive and valuable mineral and natural resources.

Electricity is predominantly made by hydro in Canada and the retail price is significantly lower. Quebec has by far the cheapest rate (hydro) and British Columbia (BC) is also very low (Hydro), whilst Ontario is more expensive (Nuclear and even after a huge subsidy), with Nunavut very expensive (Diesel). Residential solar is insignificant and is expensive to install (more than double that in Australia). This confirmed that this is one area that Australia has done extremely well with a very efficient installation regime, and associated management and controls, and of course the best solar resource in the world which is also "free".


In Canada, electric cars are much more common, as are recharging centres, but these environmental and economic benefits are partially offset by many massive trucks/utes (which must be expensive to run at Canadian petrol prices - higher than Australia).

There is quite a large population of Chinese in Canada, but, at government level, the political relationship is currently troublesome. However, there is still lots of trade and financial information available.

I noted that they quoted the May 2024 data (vs May 2023) for electrical production in China showing a massive increase (+78%) in solar farm production and overall, renewables increased to a record 41% share, and coal dropped to its lowest level ever of 53% (down from 60% in 2023 and 70% a decade earlier). Gas usage also fell substantially (-16%) and accounted for only 5% of overall production. Nuclear supplied 5% of their electricity. The emissions from electricity production fell by over 3% which is a "first", and perhaps an indication that China could actually be getting to its peak emissions much earlier than expected. Electric cars and buses have also been booming in China which eases the emission pressure from the transport sector.

Effective weed management is crucial for preserving native vegetation and biodiversity. For the past six months Clifton Springs Curlewis Coastcare Group volunteers have been working with officers from the CoGG Nature Reserves team, to remove invasive weed plants along a narrow stretch on the Clifton Springs beach. Changes can already be seen. A few indigenous coast flax-lilies (Dianella brevicaulis) became noticeable, when overgrowing flax-leaf broom shrubs were removed.

Community involvement can play a significant role in successful restoration projects. The CSCC group meets every third Wednesday of the month for habitat restoration activities on the foreshore. Come along to help at the next weeding working bee planned for 18 September.



### Craig Morgan Shared His Road Trauma Story at Drysdale Football Clul

The Drysdale Football Club hosted a special event as part of the AFL TAC road safety round featuring Craig Morgan, who shared his inspiring and harrowing road trauma story with the community.

Ten years ago, Craig Morgan was an accomplished and successful commercial lawyer and people leader at Telstra. He was married with two young daughters and was a top age group triathlete who competed extensively both domestically and overseas. However, on 21 November 2015, Craig's life and that of his family changed forever.

While on a training ride in Geelong, Craig was involved in a devastating hit-and-run accident. The incident left him with life-threatening injuries, including over 30 fractures, two punctured lungs, a bleed on his brain, and catastrophic damage to his spinal cord, resulting in paraplegia. Despite these overwhelming challenges, Craig has shown extraordinary resilience and determination in his journey of survival and rehabilitation.

During his presentation at the Drysdale Football Club, Craig recounted the details of the accident, the arduous process of recovery, and the incredible strength it took to rebuild his life and that of his family. His story is not only a testament to his personal fortitude but also a powerful reminder of the importance of road safety and the profound impact such accidents can have on individuals and their loved ones.

It was a unique opportunity for the community to hear Craig's story firsthand and be inspired by his unwavering spirit. TAC band together round serves as a crucial platform for raising awareness about road trauma and the critical need for safer driving practices.
