Coordinator's News

Dear Friends and Friends I am yet to meet

How lucky am I, to have been at SpringDale for more than 20 years and to have seen so much change in our community. Not only seen it, but to have had a hand in creating change, with the help of our community.

There have been so many different engagements with various levels of government and some have come to fruition. Watching how the Walkability and Centre of Drysdale engagement by City of Greater Geelong happened in 2007 and then the Drysdale Clifton Springs Structure Plan in 2008-2009. After watching these unfold, I realized that the community needed to be aware and prepared for engagements so that we could get the best outcomes.

Then there was the Urban Design Framework engagement in 2010, I had the opportunity to sit with the traffic management consultant and asked him to ensure that whatever he reported/designed, was done knowing that the Drysdale Bypass was in place. Although he didn't believe this could ever happen, I assured him that the community was sick of developments happening in a piecemeal manner, we need big picture thinking.

In 2011, SpringDale and DCSCA partnered to hold a 4 day summit for our community. During this Friday - Monday summit, more than 460 responses were recorded. People attended the summit, completed surveys and helped prioritise more than 20 issues that were affecting life on the Bellarine. The results of this summit and the completed surveys, showed us the priorities of the community and gave us a mandate to pursue. In the last 14 years, together we have made the Drysdale Bypass a reality, made the North Bellarine Aquatic Centre a reality with stage 2, the indoor pool elements, about to be started. More recently we have been working on trying to find Sustainable Housing for older women and with the help of our community we did get another woman housing this month. We are also working on footpaths for the older parts of Drysdale-Clifton Springs, this has been a goal for more than 30 years and hopefully our residents are going to be ready to help this become a reality.

The other big project that is happening at the moment is bringing information about the 150 years of Drysdale Primary School together. We are collecting stories about education, families, special events, fund raisers, teachers and photos of classes. This information will be published in a book available on the celebration weekend Saturday 18 and Sunday 19 October 2025. Please contact me if you have information / photos to share. We have photos from 1923 onwards, but we would love more. Friday afternoons in August and September, 3pm - 5pm will be devoted to collecting information and names to go with photos, so the book can be as comprehensive as it can be. Yesterday I received a bag full of photos from 4 generations of a family, who attended Drysdale PS over the last 70 years.

Thank you to everyone who has helped to make these dreams come true and thank you to all levels of government who have helped to support these projects. What could you help the community to achieve?

Last year, we proudly

opened the dedicated Children's Emergency Department at University Hospital Geelong. This purpose-built facility features a paediatric triage system, assessment and waiting areas, and treatment rooms designed specifically for children and their families. Located just 100 metres from the main Emergency Department entrance, it's a vital addition to our local healthcare services

In the recently announced 2025/26 State Budget, further investments have been made to expand and strengthen urgent care services across Victoria. I want to take this opportunity to outline the range of free healthcare resources available to Bellarine residents:

Victorian Virtual Emergency **Department (VVED)**

The VVED offers free, online emergency care for non-life-threatening emergencies. Consultations are conducted via video and accessible from your smartphone or computer. Currently the VVED delivers care to more than 600 callers every day, and with the State Government's recent investment, this number will nearly triple in size.

Nurse-On-Call

This free helpline will connect you with a registered nurse who can provide expert medical advice on whether to seek further medical assistance and what is available locally. Available 24/7 1300 60 60 24

Urgent Care Clinic

Urgent Care Clinics provide GP-led care for conditions that require urgent care but aren't emergencies such as mild infections, burns, sprains, or suspected fractures. Many clinics also offer onsite or nearby pathology and imaging services. The closest clinic for the Bellarine is in Belmont.

Community Pharmacy Program

The Community Pharmacy Program started as a pilot program with pharmacists delivering free consultations for uncomplicated UTIs, resupply of some oral contractive pills, mild skin conditions and travel vaccinations at select pharmacies.

As part of the recent 2025/26 Budget this program will expand and become permanent from 1 July 2025. Over the next two years, additional common health conditions will be introduced into the program including nausea, minor wound management, allergies, reflux and school sores.

Most consultations will remain free for patients, helping local residents access the care they need here on the Bellarine without the cost of GP or consultation fees.

Re-imagining Housing for Seniors -Changing Our Culture.

We are making progress in our quest to tackle the ever present, quiet but urgent crisis in our community — the rising risk of homelessness among single women over 55 on the Bellarine

Many older women in our area face losing secure housing through no fault of their

own. After years raising families and caring for others, many have little or no superannuation, minimal savings, and few job options later in life. When a marriage breaks down — which is common in this age group — the family home is often the only asset to divide. After settlement, too many women are left without enough to buy again, forcing them into a tough rental market at a vulnerable age.

Modern homelessness often looks invisible: couch surfing with friends, sleeping in cars or garages, staying in caravan parks, or even camping in the bush. Sadly, this is happening right now on the Bellarine, which can result in negatively affecting job prospects, mental & general health and food security.

Nationally, the federal government spends just 0.6% of its budget on housing, while 64,000 people are on Victoria's public housing waiting list, with a 12 to 15 year wait time! But older women want to stay connected to their community — near friends, family and vital support networks.

S.H.O.W.'s vision is to help make that possible. With a newly elected Committee and loyal supporters, the group's incorporation is well underway, opening doors to funding, partnerships with the goal of building small, secure cottages for older women who need them most. Promising leads on land are being investigated, but the need is urgent, and the challenge is large.

To succeed, S.H.O.W. needs land, capital, and community partnerships. With local support and determination, we can help ensure every woman has a safe, stable place to call home as she ages.

Councillors' News

There is no denying that we are living in a period of economic upheaval, so I'm proud that Council has updated its Financial Hardship Policy to support our residents who are doing it tough.

The policy gives the City of Greater Geelong a guide to providing financial relief to customers impacted by significant life events, such as job loss, family crises or natural disasters.

As a Council, our revenue from municipal rates, fees and charges helps us to maintain the delivery of our important services.

But it's critical that we are compassionate when we consider how these rates and charges are collected. We must acknowledge that in times of emergency and financial hardship, our residents need support, rather than additional duress caused by unpaid fees.

'Hardship' is a broad concept, and this policy helps to determine whether the payment of rates and charges may be detrimental to a person's quality of life.

The Financial Hardship Policy is a framework that our rates team can implement through the deferral of fees, rates and charges, payment plans, fee waivers and other means to remove the burden of an unpaid debt.

Our team at the City are fantastic at managing hardship arrangements and other flexible payment options where possible for those in distress.

The updated policy requires the City to consider an application for financial hardship

relief confidentially and objectively. After receiving an application and the required

supporting information, our team has 14 business days to respond to the application.

The team at the city are very compassionate and we want to ensure our community feels supported. We don't want to increase levels of stress in our community.

Drysdale Primary School - 150 years



I attended Drysdale Primary from 1948 to 1953 when it was only a three-room school with under 100 enrolments. Grades 5 to 8 were taught by the principal, Mr Mortimer; Grades 3 and 4 were taught by Mrs McAdam; kindergarten to Grade 2 were taught by the formidable Miss Martin. At this time, it was possible for students to complete all their education at the school without going on to a secondary school in Geelong, but very few took the option to enroll in Years 7 and 8. Life and schooling were still adjusting to peacetime conditions. Teaching methods were simple with few aids - although I do recall an ancient 1930s radio receiver which was trundled out occasionally for relevant broadcasts. Material from the blackboard was copied down using a steel-nib pen dipped in an inkwell, making it impossible for a lefthander like me to get high marks for neatness. I walked to school alone, or with other kids, from our house at 25 Princess Street, crossing the busy intersection of roads at the old post office. After school I often wandered around the town with others for half an hour or more before arriving home. Unimaginable today!

The principal, Mr Mortimer, whose descendants still live in the district, was both a good teacher and a wise and sensitive man. I still recall his deep sadness on the death of King George VI in February 1952. He felt a strong emotional attachment to the royal family, telling us that he was a similar age to the late King, married around the same time, and with two children of similar age to the King's children. Mr Mortimer's main defect was that he barracked for Essendon at a time when that team and Geelong were competing for premiership glory. If Geelong defeated Essendon I always raised this at the regular Monday Morning Observation, where we had to talk about any recent event. But Mr Mortimer seemed to take it all in good spirit. A motivation to do well in tests was that Mr and Mrs Knight, who operated the general store in

High Street, offered the top student a block of Cadbury's chocolate and you got to choose the flavour!

The provision of core education was excellent, but co-



non-existent. The only regular inter-school sport I can recall was an annual athletic carnival held at Queenscliffe, where we competed against other schools on the Peninsula. Lloyd La Beach, the Panama sprinter who won bronze medals at the 1948 London Olympics, gave a demonstration run at one meeting. We did eventually play a cricket match against Portarlington Primary. This was when a turf wicket had been newly installed at the Drysdale Oval, with assistance from my father who was Shire Secretary and a cricketer with Wallington (Drysdale did not have a team). For what was meant to be the inaugural match, we excitedly awaited the arrival of the regular bus from Portarlington, but to our disappointment there were no children on board -- Mr Mortimer had forgotten to notify Portarlington! Another match was soon arranged and both sides turned up. As a project in Grade 6 we cleared land in the Recreation Reserve near Wyndham Street and then planted pine trees, trundling down in Mr Mortimer's ancient car. I suspect this was a project designed to raise funds for the school.

It was a carefree period, but education was narrow in scope. Ross Williams AM

Celebrating Woodlands of The Bellarine

Bellarine Landcare Group is collaborating with Artisans of Australia to celebrate biodiversity on the Bellarine by hosting an exhibition of nature-inspired works by local artists. This free, fully accessible exhibition runs from Wed 16 July to Monday 11 August and is part of Geelong Nature Festival.

The Woodlands of the Bellarine Peninsula are precious patches of native vegetation where we can observe plant communities which have evolved here over millennia.

Before colonisation, the Bellarine was mostly open woodland, with scatterings of trees such as Red Gums and Bellarine Yellow Gums on the heavier soils, and Manna Gums on the sandy soils, as well as Sheoaks, Banksias, Swamp Gums and various Wattles. Around the coast, on alkaline soils rich in shells, the Moonah woodlands flourished. The understory of the woodlands contained many kinds of native grasses, herbs, orchids and lilies. The Wadawurrung people skilfully managed these woodlands to maintain an incredible diversity of plants and animals.

Since 1835, much of the landscape has been cleared and modified, resulting in the loss of many of the original plants and animals. Today many groups and individuals are working to restore this native vegetation, which is habitat for native animals. Once again, the Wadawurrung are actively contributing to the preservation and management of our remnant woodlands.

You can catch a glimpse of the Bellarine's former glory in these special places: Ocean Grove Nature Reserve; Murrk Ngubitj Yarram





Yaluk; The Basin Reserve; Edwards Point Reserve; Buckley Park Foreshore Reserve; and Point Richards Flora and Fauna Reserve.

Recycled water update

Increasing access to recycled water on the Bellarine

As part of our goal to recycle 100 percent of the wastewater treated at our water reclamation plants, we're maximising the use of recycled water to support agricultural production, tourism and regional prosperity for the Bellarine.

To reduce the salinity of the recycled water and nearly double the amount of recycled water used on the Bellarine, we're upgrading the Portarlington Water Reclamation Plant (WRP) on Grassy Point Road. Works are progressing well, and we expect the lower salinity recycled water will commence flowing to customers during the 2026/27 irrigation period (weather dependent).

To effectively manage the brine (saltwater waste) from the new treatment plant, we're designing and constructing a new 11-kilometre brine pipeline from the Portarlington WRP to our pump station in Clifton Springs. It will transfer the waste into our existing sewerage network.

The brine pipeline will likely travel along Coatsworth Road, Scotchmans Road, Panaroma Court and High Ridge Drive. Construction will commence in late 2025. We'll continue engaging with local landowners over the coming months as we finalise the design and alignment of the pipeline.

Sustainability News

Our evening session on June 23rd on the Harmful Impacts of Gas in the Home and Alternative Cooking methods was a great success. Thanks to the large group who attended.

The two Doctors for the Environment explained about the triggers for asthma which included nitrogen dioxide and other nitrogenous oxides which are produced by gas cooking and heating. Australian Research shows that 12% of childhood asthma is attributable to gas cooking stoves and for a child with asthma living in a house with gas cooking 30% of their risk is from the stove which is equivalent to having a smoker inside the room. Further concerns were raised about other products from gas cookers and heaters, eg formaldehyde, carbon monoxide, benzene and fine particulate matter which also have adverse health impacts.

To minimise risk it is essential to have excellent air extraction systems venting outside the house and to have the heater, cooker and gas supply system checked frequently (Every two years) as small leaks are quite common and are impactful.

Induction cooking is an easy alternative and one can experiment with a portable unit costing less than \$100 that runs off an ordinary electric socket. This is what I did for a few months with a \$49 IKEA unit until I was convinced I didn't need the gas top. My sonin-law bought two units and placed them into holes cut into a thick polished timber board and placed on the old stove top and connected to two sockets which looks very professional. Treevore explained that induction cooking is quick, very responsive and controllable and much safer. Many units have boil-over and dry pot protection and the pans and "stove" top do not get very hot which is very reassuring and beneficial for the absent-minded, children, disabled and aged. They are also more efficient as the heat is transferred to the food in the pan directly through the base and there are minimal losses to the surrounding air. They use electromagnetic induction so the pans must have a magnetic base. This can easily



be checked as if a fridge magnet sticks to the base it should work. The samples made were produced quickly and were very tasty, including chocolate nuts made directly on the cooktop. Anne managed to run 7 air fryers and produced a huge range of samples from scones, pork and potatoes to chocolate cake and all were excellent. The advantages of air fryers are they heat up quickly and only heat a small volume so are much more efficient than an oven. They also are safer as they have automatic temperature and timing controls so can't be left on by mistake.

On 1st July the Federal subsidy of about 30% of the installed cost of home (and small commercial) batteries started which is very generous. The feed-in-tariff will also almost disappear during the middle of the day so the economics have significantly improved. One is therefore able to replace peak rate power in the evening by one's worthless feed-in electricity. One needs to have or going to install solar panels and the installer and the batteries have to be from approved lists. This includes many local installers (and also Geelong Sustainability are currently running an Electric Homes Scheme). The subsidy decreases annually until it is zero in 2030 so don't wait too long.

The China Energy Report for May shows that their electricity demand for YTD May increased by 4% vs last year but wind and solar production increased by 30% so their share increased from 20% to 25%. Coal imports reduced for the third quarter in a row vs the previous year. New solar installations have dramatically increased this year and this year alone is well over double Australia's total installed capacity,

Electric Vehicle sales have increased by 32% and now account for 44% of all sales in 2025. They certainly have the momentum. **Rob Gardner**



Answers to questions about the Jam from a Journalism student.

What is the aim of the event?

Jam for Refugees, has been in existence now for nearly ten years aims to raise both funds and awareness regarding the plight of refugees. Refugees are among the most vulnerable people on the planet, and that as fellow members of the human race, we have a responsibility to give them such help as we can. There are of course many groups of individuals who are vulnerable: the elderly, the young, the poor, the sick, women, and so on; the list is endless. But many refugees have virtually nothing: their fight for survival is so all-encompassing that they have little time or motivation to think of that basic human dignity which ought to be their right.

The refugee problem is a huge problem worldwide, and the temptation is to throw our hands in the air and say, this is too big for

us. But we believe that if we can help in our little corner of the world, and if enough other people or groups think in the same way, then change can be made.

How will this contribute to support of refugees in the region?

At the moment, all money raised by Jam for Refugees will benefit CRAG, the Combined Refugee Action Group of Geelong. The money will go into their legal fund which assists refugees in our local region to navigate, and pay for, the incredibly complicated legal process of trying to stay in Australia. I think it is hard for us to imagine not just the difficult circumstances, but the anxiety and lack of selfesteem which must accompany this situation

When and how did the idea for the Jam emerge?

The first Jam for Refugees was held in All Saints Anglican Church in Ainslie, Canberra about ten years ago. Three annual Jams were held in Canberra, supported strongly by local refugee agencies, by some local schools, and by the church.

When I moved to Geelong, I tried to start Jam for Refugees here. For the first year we were defeated by Covid. The following year we were again threatened with defeat by Covid, but held a Radio Jam, which was a three hour program on local Pulse Radio involving recordings of local artists, and encouraging people to ring in and donate. This raised nearly as much money as a live jam.

In the following years we ran two live jams in

St. Paul's Anglican Church, strongly supported by CRAG and by the church. The following year we were again defeated, this time by a problem with the ceiling of the church which rendered the building unsafe to use for many months.

We have decided that Jam for Refugees needs a new and more exciting format, and so plans are now under way for Jam for Refugees Mark 2.

Most people who research their family history are not trained in historical research, but everyone can be a good genealogist, by learning appropriate skills and techniques. *The Good Genealogist*. *How to Improve the Quality of Your Family History* is a practical guide for everyone researching their family history. It will help those who are just beginning their journey to start out right and it will help more experienced researchers to reassess and refine their approach.
