Free Pad and Tampon Vending Machines in Bellarine

Access to essential health items should never be a barrier to participation, education, or wellbeing. That's why free pad and tampon vending machines are now being installed across Victoria, an important step in supporting period dignity and ensuring everyone can access sanitary products whenever they need them.

Here in the Bellarine, I'm proud to share that the first machines have already been installed and are now available at:

- Leopold Library
- Drysdale Boronggook Library
- · Queenscliff Library

When the rollout is complete, 1,500 vending machines will be available at up to 700 public locations across the state.

Virtual Women's Health Clinic

Earlier this year, the State Government announced a Virtual Women's Health Clinic, and I am proud to announce it is now operational, delivering free specialist reproductive and sexual health care to all women and girls in Victoria.

This service is available without referral, offering video or phone appointments for services including cervical screening, sexual health, endometriosis support, pelvic pain support, menstrual health and menopause care, contraception, breast health and termination care.



In August 2015 I walked into SpringDale Neighbour Centre to discuss the possibility of starting a support group for kinship carers in our region.

I talked to Anne Brackley at length about kinship care and how it impacts families in our region. To Anne's credit she listened and asked lots of questions. Anne believed in my dream of supporting other kinship carers to the best of my ability, with such things as obtaining a birth certificate for the children in their care, Medicare card and issues with Centrelink.

In September 2015, we held our first meeting in the front meeting room at SpringDale. We started with just 2 kinship carer families, one of those families being my granddaughter and myself. Sadly, our numbers as of late August 2025 now stand at 96 kinship families in our region travelling the kinship journey. Each of our families has a different story to tell, no two families are in the same situation. Many of our families are grandparents raising their grandchildren, but we also have aunts and uncles, cousins and even friends all supporting the children in their care.

Over 90% of our families are involved in some way with child protection, these families are known as FORMAL Carers whilst the other 10% are known as INFORMAL Carers with NO child protection involvement.

Our Formal Carers receive an allowance each fortnight from child protection, sadly our Informal Carers do not receive the child protection allowance. The Informal Carers rely totally on Centrelink to put food on the table, clothe the children in their care plus everyday expenses. Our Informal Carers are doing it tough every day.

I would like to take this opportunity to say a big THANK YOU to the following - Anne Brackley from SpringDale and all the staff.

To the many kind and generous people in our community who have left donations of new children's clothing, games, books and the list goes on and on at SpringDale.

To all the Service clubs e.g. Rotary, Lions, View and Probus ... please accept my apologies if I have left any Service club out.

To all the schools in our region, both government and non-government which have held fund raising events to support our group.

To all the local businesses and churches.

You have all reached out to support the children we are caring for, local children, children are our future.

If you are a kinship carer or know someone who is - sitting at home alone thinking that life cannot get any worse, please come join Bellarine Kinship Carers - we talk too much, we laugh heaps and sometimes we cry, but we support each other

Bellarine Kinship Carers meets on the first Monday of each month (not during school holidays) from 10am to 12noon at SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre. Come join us.

Re-imagining Housing for Seniors - and Everyone!

Sometimes the simplest things are overlooked for the bigger, brighter, better alternatives. We think if something costs more, is bigger in size and is more often chosen over 'the ordinary', that it's got to be better.

Housing has become one of the things that is no longer simply a home to us that provides us with security, shelter, warmth and a place of belonging. It's now one of the 'bigger, bolder, better' commodities that costs far more and offers more than most of us really need.

How simple it would be for government to locate a piece of land and look for a local modular housing manufacturer to pre-build as many 1 or 2 bedroom homes as will fit on the block. Leave some space around each one, allocate some common space for a community garden, and rent the homes to people who can't afford the bigger, bolder, better 4-bedroom homes that developers are churning out for three times the cost.

The Modular Housing Industry is leaps and bounds ahead of common construction at the moment. Beautiful, clever design makes the most of the space and they are better insulated, and more eco-friendly than most mainstream builders are offering.

It would only take a small shift in our thinking, and the will and boldness to take on the challenge. We at S.H.O.W. believe this can be done.

Each week we're hearing from women and men who are interested in what we are doing and willing to help in any way they can. They're catching the vision that communities and grass roots movements like ours can bring the change.

If you're interested in chatting about an idea you might have, and you'd like to be part of the solution to the housing crisis that we're facing, we'd love to talk with you.

Councillors' News GEELONG

The Dell Eco Reef, just offshore at Clifton Springs, is drawing more international attention. Most recently, it has been on display at the Trienal de Design de Covilhã in Portugal, one of the world's leading exhibitions of sustainable design.

As chair of the City of Greater Geelong's Environment and Circular Economy portfolio, I am proud of the team for their achievements, and it's a great reminder that smart environmental solutions can start right here on the Bellarine.

Designed by Australian industrial designer Alex Goad, in partnership with the City of Greater Geelong, the reef was created to tackle two serious issues facing our coastline: erosion and habitat loss. Installed in October 2022, the reef modules sit in shallow water, around 60 metres from the coast. They're made from eco-friendly concrete using the bi-product fly ash instead of standard cement, blended with recycled shells.

The structures form a permeable barrier that slows wave energy, helping to protect our cliffs while also creating habitat for marine life. Already, the reef is showing signs of success. More than 1,000 juvenile Angasi oysters were recently placed on the modules by University of Melbourne researchers, and local Coastcare volunteers. The species is critically threatened, and the reef is helping to bring it back. This hands-on, community-driven work will be monitored over the coming months, to track

how the oysters grow and settle.

The reef also won the 2023
Dezeen Sustainable Design (Building Product) of the Year, an LGPro Award for Excellence, and the Victorian Marine and Coastal award, for Excellence in marine and coastal design-development in 2024. It builds on the success of another local project - Ramblers Reef at Portarlington, which has also demonstrated how nature-based solutions can protect our coastline while encouraging marine life to

Prostate Cancer Signs and Symptoms

Early Prostate cancer does not usually cause symptoms More advanced prostate cancer symptoms can include:

- Frequent Urination
- Pain whilst urinating
- Blood in Urine or Semen
- A Weak Stream
- Pain in the Back or Pelvis
- Weak Legs or Feet

More widespread disease often spreads to the bones and can often cause pain or unexplained weight loss Prostate cancer is the most common cancer in Australia








Before beginning my radio show on 94.7 The Pulse, I never realised just how extensive disability was in our community, but the more I spoke to other disabled people, or people who are working on and advocating for disability related issues, the more I saw how important it is to have these conversations. Discussions lead to understanding, destigmatising, and to everyone becoming more comfortable with the presence of disabilities in our community.

Working on the radio show was a wonderful experience of advocating for disability inclusion, and it's great to be doing this again with the SpringDale Messenger. My next few contributions will be discussing and recapping some of my radio interviews with local people whose impact and stories are worth resharing.

This month we are revisiting an educational and important topic that is typically uncomfortable, yet necessary. Sally Cant spoke to me in her role as (then) a board member, and a current volunteer with Compassionate Hearts on the Bellarine (CHoB). Sally has thirty (30) plus years of experience in the death and dying sector as a death advocate, including her published book 'Conversations About Death', made for an enlightening chat.

The topic of death is deeply personal. To understand our choices and rights for the end of life not only helps us personally, but those that we are close to, as they are going through the process. This is all part of death advocacy and support. End of life considerations are not just medical, financial or administrative; they are very importantly about human connection and mental and emotional sustenance.

As you know from their own contributions to the SpringDale Messenger, Compassionate Hearts on the Bellarine provides support to people who have a life limiting illness and their families. After matching a volunteer



with a client, these services include sitting with the dying person and simply listening, taking clients to local cafes or a walk on the beach if they're able, reading stories, being a sounding board, providing respite for carers and assisting those grieving post death. One volunteer journalist even offers a free scribing service for clients who wish to have their lives documented.

The impact of this volunteer support was made clear, when Sally shared a powerful anecdote, involving a client who has lived years beyond expectations. The client puts this down to the volunteer support from CHoB, whose constant presence has given her a sense of purpose.

From my conversation with Sally, it seems that volunteering with CHoB gives these wonderfully compassionate and talented community angels, as much emotional reward as they give to the recipients. How lucky we are to have such wonderful help when we really need it so close to home. Thank you, Sally, and all who volunteer at Compassionate Hearts on the Bellarine.

Footpaths for Health Murradoc Road Urgent Support

Over the last 3 years I have walked along Murradoc to attend a regular exercise program beginning at 6.30am. Each time I walk to the class, I am fearful for my safety. This is due to the unsafe nature of parts of my journey, I need to use parts of Murradoc Road for my pathway and although I haven't been hurt yet, I am always worried for my safety. I have bought safer coloured coats to increase my visibility at that hour of the day and pray that the drivers see me.

The surfaces are uneven, there are puddles, it's just unsafe. I understand that Murradoc Road is a State Government Road, but that City of Greater Geelong has responsibility for it where the speed limit is 60 kph or less. I understand these two levels of government are going to work together to improve access to this rapidly growing commercial area of Drysdale.

Others have told me of their concerns in getting to the last remaining bank in Drysdale. Many people cannot attend any of these businesses due to a lack of a car/licence, lack of public transport in this part of Murradoc Road, and lack of footpaths for access by wheel chair or mobility scooters.

Murradoc Road has been the highest priority for many residents and my reason for becoming part of the SpringDale Footpaths for Health group. I am hopeful that Murradoc Road is immediately addressed and footpaths along with whatever other infrastructure is needed, are built so that many in our community are not discriminated against and disadvantaged. Please do not wait until someone is injured or worse still killed because of the lack of safety.

Please contact me via SpringDale Neighbourhood Centre - office@ springdale.org.au to voice your concern and increase our pressure to get this infrastructure in place for the safety of all concerned.

SCAMMED?

YOU'RE NOT ALONE - AND IT'S NOT YOUR FAULT

By a local computer engineer with 45 years' experience

I'm sadly still seeing customers who have been scammed or had their Android mobile phone or PC infected with <u>mal</u>icious soft<u>ware</u> (malware).

I've been fixing computers for over four decades, yes well before PC's, and lately, I've seen a huge rise in people coming to me with the same heartbreaking story:

They've been scammed. Their bank account's been raided. Their phone or computer is misbehaving. They're embarrassed. They blame themselves.

Let me say this loud and clear:

It's not your fault.

Scammers are not amateurs working from mum's garage. They're professionals. Many of them work full-time in overseas call centres, especially from places like India and Southeast Asia. This isn't guesswork - it's what I see every week.

They're trained, persistent, and incredibly skilled at sounding convincing. They know how to manipulate your emotions - fear, urgency, even kindness. And they use every trick in the book:

- Fake phone calls from "Telstra"
- Emails pretending to be from Microsoft, the ATO, or your bank
- · Text messages with dodgy links
- Pop-ups telling you your device has a virus
- Apps that look innocent but secretly collect your data

These people scam hundreds of Australians every single day. And anyone can fall for it - no matter how smart or careful you are.

So here's what I want you to know:

Golden Rules to Keep Yourself Safe

1. No legit company will ever call you out of the blue to "fix" something.

If someone rings saying they're from Microsoft, NBN, Telstra, your bank, or the government - and you didn't ask them to - hang up. It's a scam. If you have clicked on something, get your PC checked as they can load malware into startup which loads in the background every time you start up the PC.

2. Never click on links in emails or texts unless you're absolutely sure they're real.

Scammers are experts at faking messages from real companies. If in doubt, don't touch the link. Go directly to the website or app yourself.

Tip: if you hover your mouse over the link, most browsers will show you at the bottom of the page where the link is actually going to, rather than where the scammers want you to think it's going.

Don't click on the link!

3. If a pop-up tells you there's a virus - it is the virus.

Close your browser or restart your device. Never call the number they give you even if it looks local, it's not they spoof it.

4. On Android phones, be very careful what apps you install.

Only download from the Google Play Store - and even then, check the reviews and the developer's name.

5. Use strong passwords and two-factor authentication.

Yes, it's a bit of a pain. But it's worth it. If a scammer gets one password, two-factor (like a text code to your phone) can stop them in their tracks.

6. If you're unsure - ask someone.

Better to feel a bit silly asking than to lose your savings. You can always call a local expert (like me!) or a trusted family member.

If It's Already Happened to You...

Please don't feel ashamed. You are not stupid. These scammers want you to feel that way, because then you won't tell anyone - and they get away with it.

Tell your bank. Tell your phone company. Report it to www.scamwatch.gov.au. And get your device checked for malware.

You can recover.

But the first step is speaking up.

We live in a world where crooks don't need to wear balaclavas or carry crowbars anymore. They just need a headset and a script.

But with a bit of knowledge, and a healthy dose of suspicion, we can beat them at their own game.

Stay safe out there, it's the wild west on the internet and you need to treat everything as suspicious!



Sustainability News

I achieved my "challenge" in financial year 2024/25 in having no home energy costs - in fact Red Energy owes me \$10.48 over the year. It has been helped by government subsidies and also a 5c /kWh feed in tariff so I'm unlikely to repeat it, but proved it was possible. Incidentally I spent \$156.35 on charging up my EV away from home which arose from two trips to South Australia whilst the other 8000km+ of local use was effectively free.

Over the last four years I've installed solar panels, a small battery, a hot water heat pump, two air conditioners and an induction cooktop (so getting off gas) as well as sealing up lots of gaps, re-laying the ceiling insulation, installing under-floor insulation and zoning off areas within the house better and buying an EV.

As the weather is warming up there will be less intense heating demand so using the air conditioner for heating whenever possible should be financially worthwhile.

The Federal Government Battery Program is proving to be extremely popular which is not surprising since it is a 30% subsidy on the cost of an installation. There may be a bit of a waiting list but, I'd recommend those with or want to get solar panels, check out the financials again as the Feed-in-Tariff has fallen to almost zero.

There are good local suppliers available. Also a scheme being run by Geelong Sustainability covers not only solar and batteries, but a large range of appliances and also Electric cars and bikes. If you don't have solar, but can use much of your power during the day (and can't afford the battery) then also check out the figures for just solar cells and remember your grandchildren may also be very appreciative of your contribition to a clean energy future.

In early 2026 the Victorian Government will also be introducing a ceiling insulation subsidy which is likely to be financially attractive for many households.

AEMO (The Energy Manager) has just published its 2nd Qtr 2025 report which compared to Q2,2024 shows:

Overall electricity demand increased by 0.7% but residential Solar output increased by 15% so demand on the generators fell by 0.7%.

Wind energy increased by 31% and grid solar by 17% so overall renewables increased from a 32.2% to 37.9% market share. Shares for black coal fell 3.9%, brown coal 0.9%, gas 0.9% which continues the steady transfer from old fossil fuel sources to Renewables.

Overall demand increased due to population growth, electrification of heating (water and space), increased EV usage and data centre growth.

Overall CO2 emissions reduced by 5.9% for the Electricity sector.

New capacity progressing through the system increased by 31% to a huge 53GW.

Finally, China reports that its energy consumption increased by 8.8% in 1st half 2025 vs 1st half 2024 with the vast majority from solar (+62.7%) and wind (+19.8%) so their carbon emissions actually declined for the first time.

Memories of Yesteryear, THE FAMILY HISTORY QUEST 16 CONVICTS

In the past, having convicts in the family was seen as an embarrassment and not what you wanted on your family history tree. Nowadays it is seen as having royalty in the family. It is special to have convicts in the family.

Transportation to the Australian colonies began in 1788 to Botany Bay in New South Wales and finished in 1868 in Western Australia. Over the eighty years throughout which convicts were transported to the Australian colonies, more than 160,000 prisoners were shipped here. Of those, only around 25,000 were females.

Your criminal ancestors may not have been innocent, but some of them will have been unlucky; unlucky to be caught, unlucky in that they lacked sufficient connections to pull them clear of the courts, unlucky that they lacked the social capital to effectively work the system. English criminal trials were very different from those of today. Trials were quick, lawyers were rarely present, and prosecutors, judges, and jurors exercised considerable discretion in how they interpreted the law.

Unfortunately, in New South Wales the government decided in the 1860s and 1870s to destroy many of the detailed records about convicts. By way of contrast, in Tasmania (Van Diemen's Land), many of the convict records have survived.

Ancestry.com has a lot of convict records including England & Wales, Criminal Registers, 1791-1892. English newspapers often had summaries of the convict court cases and are worth looking at. Many of those transported


